



# Springlake Deadlocks Portales 12 To 12

The Springlake Wolverines opened the 1959 football season at Wolverine Stadium Friday night with a hard fought 12 to 12 tie with the Portales, N. M. Rams. The good showing of the Wolverines was marred by the injury to senior, first string Wolverine quarterback Joe Neal Ellis who suffered a broken ankle in the first quarter.

Joe has been a regular for two years, and was expected to be his peak as quarterback this year. Not only will Springlake miss his playing ability, but also the boys will miss his leadership qualities. We all miss Joe, but we're glad to

know he'll probably be ready for the basketball season.

Though Ellis will be missed, Junior Robert Cortez did well the remainder of the game, and with more experience will fill the gap satisfactorily.

Although Portales gained 395 yards rushing to Springlake's 231, the Wolverines held when it counted. The boys played hard and showed a tremendous amount of spirit. Many mistakes were made, as seen in the films of the game, but these will be corrected, and the hard hitting throughout the entire game enabled the Wolverines to come out with a tie in spite of the mistakes.

The first quarter was scoreless, although the Rams threatened several times but was held in each case by a fumble. Portales fumbled four times in the first quarter, all recovered by Springlake at crucial times. The Wolverines couldn't move the ball with any consistency. They had a drive started near the end of the quarter which was stopped by a fumble of their own.

Both teams scored in the second quarter, Portales drawing blood first. Early in the quarter the Rams drove down to Springlake's 10 but fumbled. Springlake ran three plays and fumbled, and it was recovered by Portales on Springlake's 15 yard line. From there they scored in

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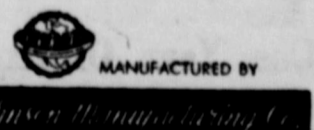

WHY TRADE GOES ELSEWHERE —

As the ancient ballad tells, for want of a nail a kingdom was lost. A modern paraphrase could be that for the right kind of advertising great amounts of business are lost.

The Windsor, Missouri, Review, points out that "The chief competitors of the small city retailers are not other local merchants. His most serious competition comes from nearby metropolitan centers." Prices on standard brands of merchandise, the Review goes on, are virtually the same everywhere. Low overhead sometimes gives the small-town retailer a competitive advantage over the big-city merchant. So the review asks and answers a question: "Why, then, do so many shoppers travel fifty or a hundred miles to buy the same items they could obtain at home for the same price? Many retailers who ask this question should look to themselves to find the blame. Inadequate advertising is likely to be the answer."

The merchant who just opens his doors and waits for the customers to enter, without attracting them through his doors through advertising, is going to do a minimum of business. The merchant who sees to it that people know what he has to offer is going to do the maximum. And the local newspaper is the outstanding advertising medium for the retailer.

THOSE "SLAVE LABOR LAWS" —

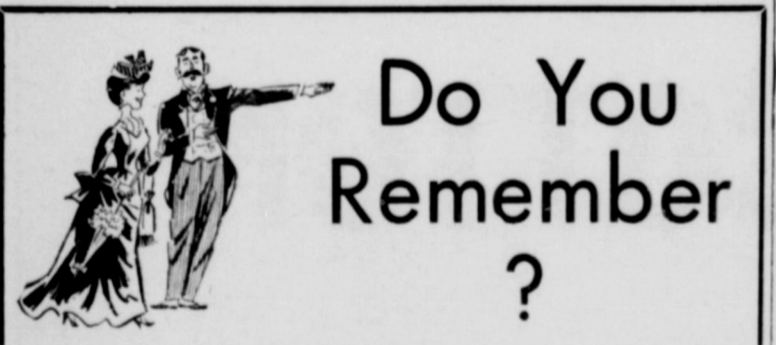
The top union officials have branded all proposed labor legislation — with the single exception of a toothless bill that would have accomplished exactly nothing, and which Congress refused to seriously consider — as an attempt to destroy unions. Even moderate proposals, according to these leaders would, if enacted into law, make it impossible or virtually so to operate effective unions.

An observation made in this connection by the Wall Street Journal is worth in point. The paper says: "Every labor leader of any stature at all insisted a decade ago that if Congress passed the Taft-Hartley law they were passing a 'slave labor law'."

What has happened since Taft-Hartley went on the books? Everyone knows the answer to that question. The unions have grown enormously in power, strength, wealth. Along with that, the grossest kind of abuses and rackets have appeared, vitally affecting business, the rank-and-file of union membership, and the public at large.

Taft-Hartley was as good a law as could be passed at that time. Very likely it also was adequate for the needs of that time. But now we are in another time, and Taft-Hartley simply can't do the job.

Judging by the attitude of the country, and of significant shifts within Congress, the labor leaders have cried "wolf" too often. No one with any sense wants a slave labor law, and none could be passed. But the people want a law that will correct the abuses and make for honest, decent, responsible unions. They are tired of secondary boycotts, blackmail picketing and exemptions of labor monopolies from all laws applying to all other monopolies.

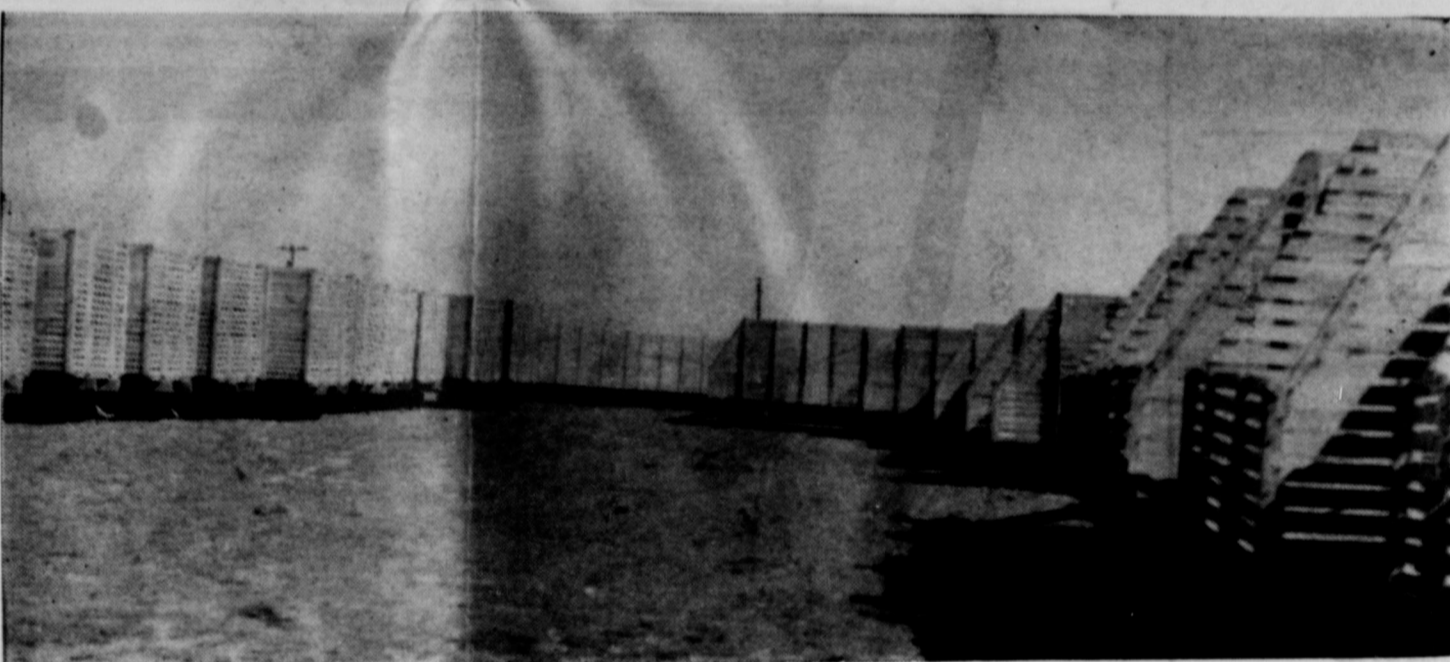



### Stars To Perform At Prison Rodeo Performances

HUNTSVILLE — (Special) — A star-studded cast, including darlings, convict riders and entertainers, plus a host of the nation's top-flight television and recording artists will headline the 28th Annual Texas Prison Rodeo in the prison's \$1 million stadium here each Sunday in October beginning at 2 p.m.

To get the 1959 rodeo series off to a flying start will "Big Jim" Arness, the popular Marshal Matt Dillon of the TV series "Gunsmoke" along with Johnny Cash, whose country tunes are known from coast to coast. They appear on October 4. On two successive Sundays, the world's wildest rodeo turns the spotlight on Dale Robertson and Tommy Sands on October 11. And Steve McQueen and Johnny Horton on October 18.

Robertson, star TV's "Tales of Wells Fargo," and Sands, singing sensation, were just a few of the crowd-pleasers during the 1958 rodeo.

McQueen has moved up on the entertainment ladder as star of the TV series "Wanted - Dead or Alive" while Horton is a byword since his recording, "The Battle of New Orleans" has taken the nation by storm.

For the fourth and final Sunday performance on October 25, prison rodeo officials say they are working diligently to obtain the personal appearances of at least two more famous entertainment personalities.

Time and again we have commented on the tremendous importation of foreign military rifles.

We warned of the dangers involved in trying to convert them into sporting guns. We also warned of the economic dangers.

Now comes a group of the leading gun manufacturers with a warning to the Federal Government that foreign gun imports are endangering our national security.

Six member companies of the Sporting Arms and Ammunition Manufacturers Institute have filed a petition with OGD, asking that imports be limited to their 1945-55 historical level.

mittie. "We are doing everything possible to attract more people to this thrilling and unusual two-hour show."

Coffield reminded the public that net proceeds from rodeo ticket sales go to the prisoners' welfare fund for services not furnished by the State Legislature.

This year's rodeo will also feature for the first time a barrel race contest for girls; the Texas Range Riders of Houston; the Pasadena Mounted Square Dance Team; and the Austin County Sheriffs Posse Square Dance Team as outside attractions to round out the show.

Officials pointed out that there are plenty of good reserved seats available for each performance. They are priced at \$2.40 and \$4.40, tax included, and can be obtained by writing Rodeo Ticket Office, Huntsville, Texas, enclosing check or money order.

Those signing the petition were High Standard, Ithaca, Mossberg, Remington, Savage and Winchester-Western. They contend that the market for high-powered hunting rifles has been glutted by foreign surplus guns at fantastically low prices.

We think the expression "fantastically low price" is an erroneous statement. When a person puts good money into a piece of junk it isn't a low price — it's a costly expenditure and a waste of money.

It is possible for the OGD to recommend to the President that such importations be based on a quota which will not continue as a threat to national security.

Sometimes the wheels of governmental agencies work slowly. If outdoorsmen will quit buying this junk, the get-rich-quick importers will have to sell it for scrap metal.

And as long as some of our leading dealers continue to offer such items they will have only themselves to blame for what happens.

I still feel bad about keeping my mouth shut recently. I was in the gun department of a big retail store. Among the generous supply of honest American-made guns there were two rows of surplus military rifles. One was an import with a price of \$29.95. It was a monstrosity. Alongside it was a U. S. Springfield for \$39.95.

A young fellow, lame from some affliction, walked into the place and studied the guns. He looked first at the Springfield and then at the import. He kept on fingering the price tags.

I wanted to offer him some advice. In the first place I doubt if, in his condition, he had any business with a gun at all. But I could overlook that, for nearly every man wants a gun. But here was a man who definitely couldn't afford a gun. And he was about to buy a piece of junk. I only wish I had put in My two-cents worth and warned him against it.

I doubt if anyone, who knows anything at all about guns, ever would be proud of making a shooting iron from one of these imports. To my way of thinking these guns were designed to kill soldiers and it didn't make much difference which end the soldier was on.

If this sounds like I am prejudiced in favor of the American manufacturer, it is not accidental. I believe in American-made, American money and American enterprise. Although I have viewed our financial magnitude only from a distance, I am a strong believer in capital.

I am the same way about a good many other things. I like good brand names. I like to read my advertising in a good newspaper or a legitimate magazine rather than in throw-away material that is passed out to clutter our mail boxes or litter our streets.

I get mad when I find some gyp bargain circular under the windshield wiper on my car.

It is for these reasons that I hope the OGD will ask the President to act on the petition of the manufacturers and at least put a limit on junk gun imports.

In the meantime, we are now in the season when we can use the guns we have. There is a bountiful supply of most game, except waterfowl, this year.

Research men like to use the word "explosion" in referring to the tremendous increase in wild-

life population. This might be a good word, especially for quail.

Word comes from every section of the state that there are more quail this year than ever before. Old timers in the top Panhandle of Texas say they've never seen anything like it.

Latest to come to our attention is a dove decoy. It's called "The Real D-Coy." It's made by the C. L. B. Co. of Houston. And believe you me it's well named.

"The Real D-Coy" is so designed that it can be placed high in a tree; on limbs that are large or small; on either a wooden or a wire fence; or placed on the ground. A number together look like the real McCoy!

They really look real. Secret lies in the fact that they are balanced on a perch and not fastened to it. Weighted legs enable the decoys to be positioned several different ways.

No need to climb trees either. Through the use of a cane pole these decoys can be placed high in a dead tree, where they will be visible for a considerable distance, and they are just as easily removed.

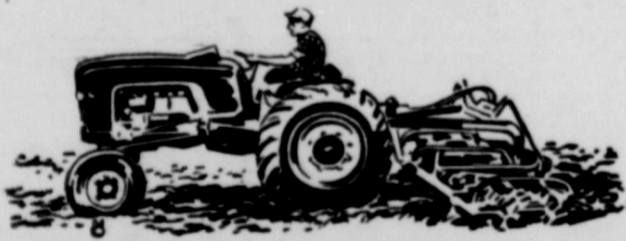
