# Earth Gets First Bale of Cotton

bale of cotton was grown by Abe Griffin, a well known farn er and a member of Earth's City Commis-

The bale was pulled Monday, September 7 from 25 acres of Gregg Cotton at his farm seven miles north and one and one half mile east of Earth by 20 laborers.

The 2130 lbs. of cotton was ginned at the Earth Co-op Gins, Inc. by Jesse Goode, manager.

The bale netted 495 lbs.

Griffin said the cotton was planted under the "B" plan. The Government Grade was Strict Middling. One inch.

This is Griffins second time to produce the first bale of cotton for Earth. On September 15, 1955, Griffin produced the first bale, which has been claimed as a record, as this seldom happens in any cotton farming area.

Last year's first bale of cotton was produced by G. L. "Lowboy" Chrisman on September 1.

Chrisman's bale of Half and Half cotton weighed 2040 lbs. and netted 570 lbs. of cotton. Chricman raised the cotton on vacant city

Griffin is the recipient of approximately \$500 in premiums donated by Earth businessmen and sponsored by the Earth Jaycees.

Each year the Earth Jaycees sponsor the first bale of cotton prize raising program.





#### WHY TRADE GOES ELSEWHERE -

As the ancient ballad tells, for want of a nail a kingdom was lost. A modern paraphrase could be that for the right kind of advertising great amounts of business are lost.

The Windsor, Missouri, Review, points out that "The chief competitors of the small city retailers are not other locial merchants. His most serious competition comes from nearby metropolitan centers." Prices on standard brands of merchandise. the Review goes on, are virtually the same everywhere Low overhead sometimes gives the small - town retailer a competitive advantage over the big - city merchant. So the review asks and answers a question: "Why, then, do so many shoppers travel fifty or a hundred miles to buy the same items they could obtain at home for the same price? Many retailers who ask this question should look to themselves to find the blame. Inadequate advertising is likely to be the answer."

The merchant who just opens his doors and waits for the customers to enter, without attracting them through his doors through advertising, is going to do a minimum of business. The merchant who sees to it that people know what he has to offer is going to do the maximum. And the local newspaper is the outstanding advertising medium for the retailer.

#### THOSE "SLAVE LABOR LAWS" —

The top union officials have branded all proposed labor legislation - with the single exception of a toothless bill that would have accomplished exactly nothing, and which Congress refused to seriously consider - as an attempt to destroy unions. Even moderate proposals, according to these leaders would, if enacted into law, make it impossible or virtually so to operate effective unions.

An observation made in this connection by the Wall Street Lie ways and in noint. The paper save "Every labor leader of any stature at all insisted a decade ago that if Congress passed the Taft - Hartley law they were passing a 'slave labor law'."

What has happened since Taft - Hartley went on the books? Everyone knows the answer to that question. The unions have grown enormously in power, strength, wealth. Along with that, the grossest kind of abuses and rackets have appeared, vitally affecting business, the rank - and - file of union membership, and the public at large.

Taft - Hartley was as good a law as could be passed at that time. Very likely it also was adequate for the needs of that time. But now we are in another time, and Taft - Hartley simply can't do the job.

Judging by the attitude of the country, and of significant shifts within Congress, the labor leaders have cried "wolf" Mrs. L. E.Sullins at Littlefield. too often. No one with any sense wants a slave labor law, and none could be passed. But the peoplt want a law that will correct the abuses and make for honest, decent, responsible unions.

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
