City To Get More Street Lights Soon

The Earth City Council met Monday night at the regular meeting with Mayor M.E. Kelley, and Councilmen, Dud Chesney, Richard Stockstill, Eldon Parish, Wendell Clayton, and M.W. Messer, and Ruby Anderson, City Secretary, present. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

School Trustees Stamp Approval On Desegregation Policy

The Springlake School Board met last Wednesday in a special session and took action to officially integrate the Springlake Schools, in full compliance with the nondiscrimination Section of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

The action opened the doors for integration beginning immediately, but also left the choice of campus to the students for the remainder of this school term.

In making this announcement, Supt. Bill Mann, explained that separate facilities would continue to be operated for the remainder of this year.

Beginning with the new school year in September, there will be no separate facilities maintained, the Colored school will be closed; and no extra bus transportation to other districts would be available.

Mann explained that letters were mailed to all Colored families in the district on Thursday, explaining the action of the Board, and informing them that they may apply for enrollment at any time in any of the Springlake Schools. He told the press at noon Monday, that no one had applied for enrollment from the Colored school at that time.

The decision to integrate came as a result of federal notification to the Texas Education Agency in early January that all schools must be in compliance or forfeit federal aid.

Springlake School District is receiving approximately \$50,000.00 in Federal Funds this year, through school lunch, vocational training, and National Defense Education Act Programs.

In mid-January, the local

school received their "compliance" forms, and were given until February 22 to file these signed compliance certificates with the state in order that the Texas Education Agency would have a signed statement from each school district to determine eligibility for federal funds. Each district could reply in one of four ways:

1. District in full compliance
2. District under final court order for desegregation.
3. District with locally initiated plans for desegregation.
4. District not in compliance

The signing of the assurance of compliance forms with the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare came about Wednesday at the called session, these forms were mailed to file in the state office, to assure Springlake School of receiving Federal Funds to supplement the school budget.

Federal funds being received here this year include approximately \$30,000.00 for the school lunch program, \$16,000.00 for the vocational training teachers salary, and approximately \$1,400.00 for their travel expenses, and \$1,500.00 for NDEA. These add up to approximately \$50,000.00. In explaining this decision to integrate, Supt. Bill Mann remarked, "Actually, there was no other choice, we could have waited possibly until next year, by submitting a signed statement that we were working on a plan, however I see no problem involved, we were expecting it, and we're ready for it, we have only 55 Colored students and we can and will make room for them."

THE ASSURANCE OF COMPLIANCE SIGNED BY SCHOOL BOARD

The Springlake Public School will comply with title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (P. L. 88-352) and all requirements imposed by or pursuant to the Regulation of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare (45CFR Part 80) issued pursuant to that Act, to the end that, in accordance with title VI of that Act and the Regulation, no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity for which the School receives Federal financial funds; and HEREBY GIVES ASSURANCE THAT it will immediately take any measures necessary to effectuate this agreement.

If any real property or structure thereon is provided or improved with the aid of Federal funds to Springlake School, this assurance shall obligate the school, or in the case of any transfer of such property, any transferee, for the period during which the real property or structure is used for a purpose for which the Federal funds is extended or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits. If any personal property is so provided, this assurance shall obligate the school for the period during which it retains ownership or possession of the property. In all other cases, this assurance shall obligate the school for the period during which the Federal financial assistance is extended to by the Department.

THIS ASSURANCE is given in consideration of and for the purpose of obtaining any and all Federal grants, loans, contracts, property, discounts or other Federal financial assistance extended after the date hereof to the school by the Department, including installment payments after such date on account of applications for Federal financial assistance which were approved before such date. The school recognizes and agrees that such Federal financial assistance will be extended in reliance on the representations and agreements made in this assurance, and that the United States shall have the right to seek judicial enforcement of this assurance. This assurance is binding on the school, its successors, transferees, and assignees, and the person or persons whose signatures appear below are authorized to sign this assurance on behalf of the Applicant.

have a repertoire of a proximately 300 songs and are adding new ones along

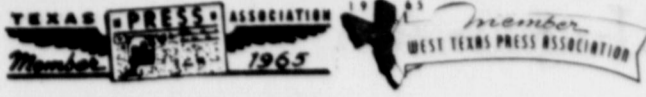
'65 Tags Selling Slowly, Deadline April 1

FINAL WEAPON...

Comply or Forfeit All Federal Funds

Greetings from Uncle Sam, to thousands of Hospitals, Universities, School Boards, and Welfare Offices all over the nation, left little choice as to what their decision would be when the greeting contained a, "You will or else," tone.

They served notice that Section 6 of the Civil Rights Act is in effect after January 3 and that these institutions must stop discrimination against Negroes or forfeit federal aid.

There is rarely a community in this country that doesn't draw some federal funds one way or another, either for school lunches, vocational training, welfare programs, hospital construction, and numerous other projects.

There are some instances where school districts receive over one third on their entire budget from the federal funds, however, Springlake School District depends very lightly on Uncle Sam for their school budget.

Medical, Dental, and Nursing Schools cannot qualify for federal funds for construction if Negro students are not allowed to enroll. Universities, under this new law, may have their research grants stopped unless they integrate.

Even sewage plants can no longer be constructed with federal funds unless they are to serve both Colored and Whites.

The Health, Education and Welfare Department, which administers most federal programs affected by the Civil Rights Act has taken the lead in implementing the ban on federal funds.

The withdrawal of Federal Funds is the final weapon for enforcing Civil Rights. This will doubtless be the consequence if a locality fails to make reasonable effort to desegregate.

President Johnson has turned this project over to Vice President Hubert Humphrey for enforcement. Humphrey fought long and hard to see this passed, while others raged a battle and succeeded in making a few changes before its passage.

So... it all boils down to this... **COMPLY OR NO FEDERAL FUNDS.**

HEADED FOR A LET-DOWN?

Despite its enormous cost—estimated at anywhere from \$1.5 billion to \$3 billion annually in the early years—the Medicare plan under Social Security could prove a keen disappointment to the very elderly people it is supposed to help.

The authority for that statement is Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, which has primary jurisdiction over legislation of the type in question. He has pointed out that the provisions of the plan have been exaggerated to the point where the benefits are wrongfully pictured.

"Contrary to the widespread assumption on the part of many elderly people," said Chairman Mills, "the bill does not cover such items as doctors' visits to the home, visits to doctors' offices, surgical devices, drugs which many elderly people require, private nursing services except when the patient has come out of a hospital and goes to a hospital-affiliated nursing home."

The heavy volume of mail he has received, the Congressman added, indicates that many elderly people mistakenly believe that Medicare will take care of all their hospital and medical requirements.

"This simply is not true," he said. "Unfortunately, 'Medicare under Social Security' has become an all-embracing slogan which in my opinion has not advanced the cause of those who need it."

It seems to us that the evident confusion over the extent of the benefits provides another good reason why both houses of Congress should carefully examine every facet of the Medicare proposal before taking action that would impose added burdens on taxpayers and yet disappoint the elderly.

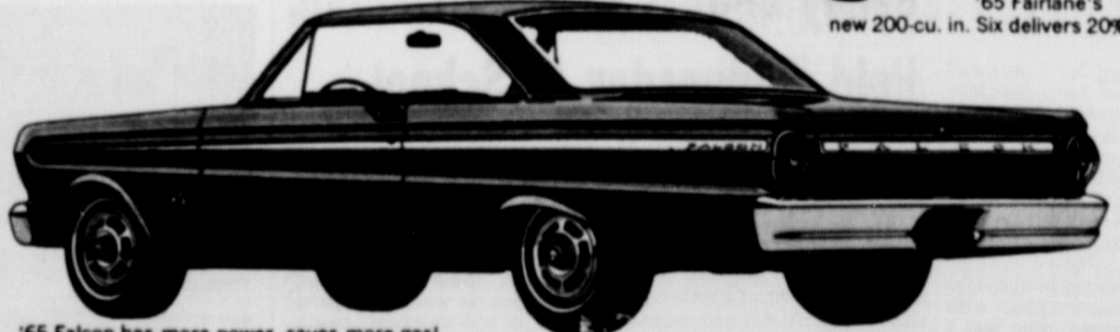

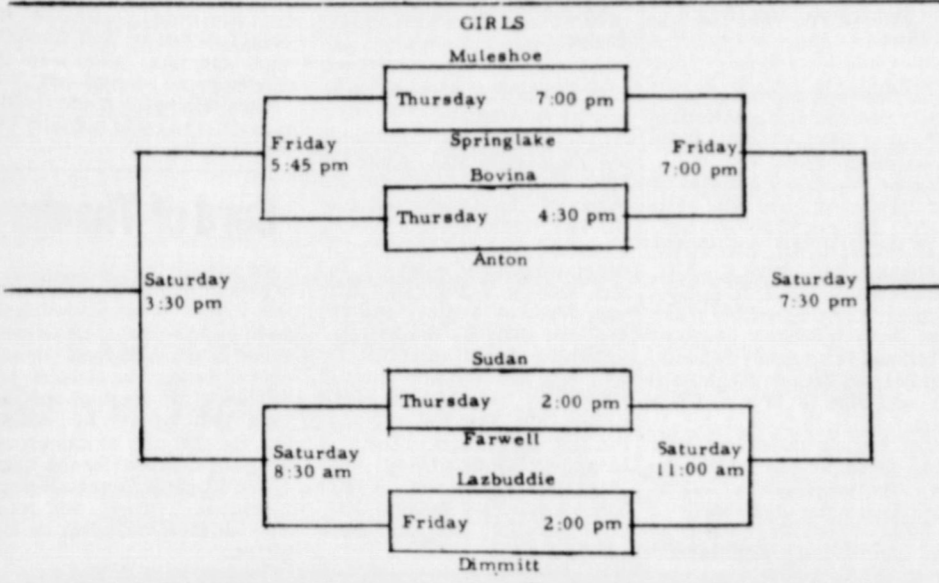
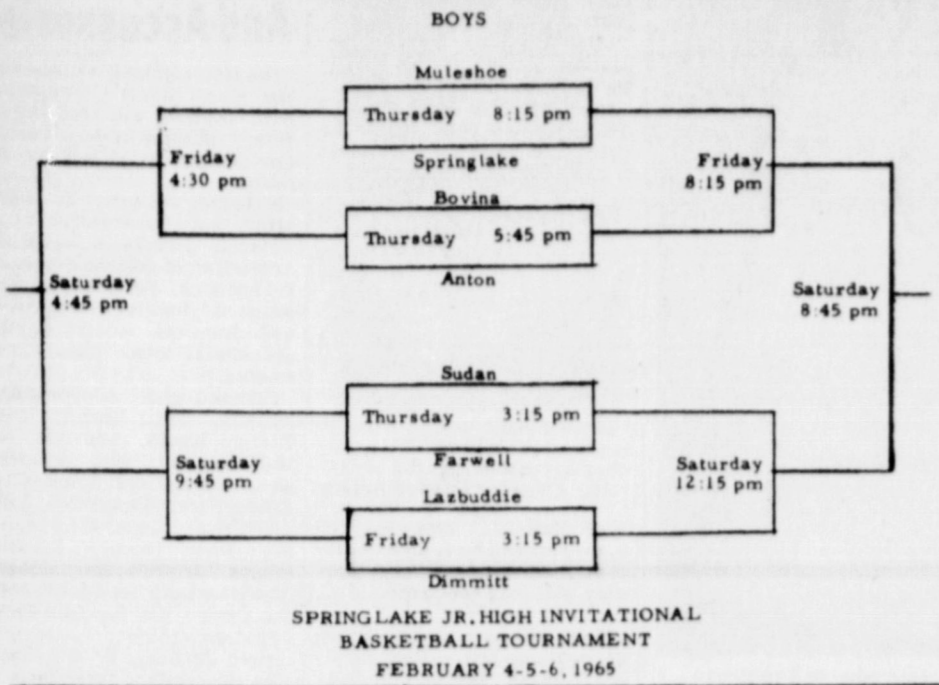

Resistant Hybrids Best For Combating Smut

Grain sorghum producers can best wage an effective war against head smut by growing resistant hybrids.

Among the newest resistant hybrids released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station for certified seed production are RS 625, RS 626, and RS 671. These, however, are but a few of the resistant hybrids available to farmers from commercial seed producers, reports Wendell Home, plant pathologist, and Ben Spears, agronomist, both with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Hybrids RS 625 and RS 626 are similar in appearance and performance to RS 608 and RS 610 respectively, except that they are resistant to head smut. Hybrid RS 671, however, matures somewhat later and should be grown only under irrigation. Having a maturity similar to Texas 660, it is five to six days earlier than late commercial

hybrids.

Reports on the yield, standability, head smut resistance and relative maturity of these and other hybrids in performance tests conducted by the Experiment Station are published each year in late December or early January. Copies of these reports will be available at any county Extension office.

Sorghum grown from clean seed planted on infested soil may be attacked by smut fungus since it is carried in the soil. Planting treated seed eliminates spread of the disease on the seed. Therefore, it is the soil-borne spores, which are able to remain viable in the soil for many years, that are responsible for infection.

Planting seed of any hybrid should be treated with a good fungicide to prevent spreading these spores to clean fields. Crop rotation and sanitation practices have limited value in

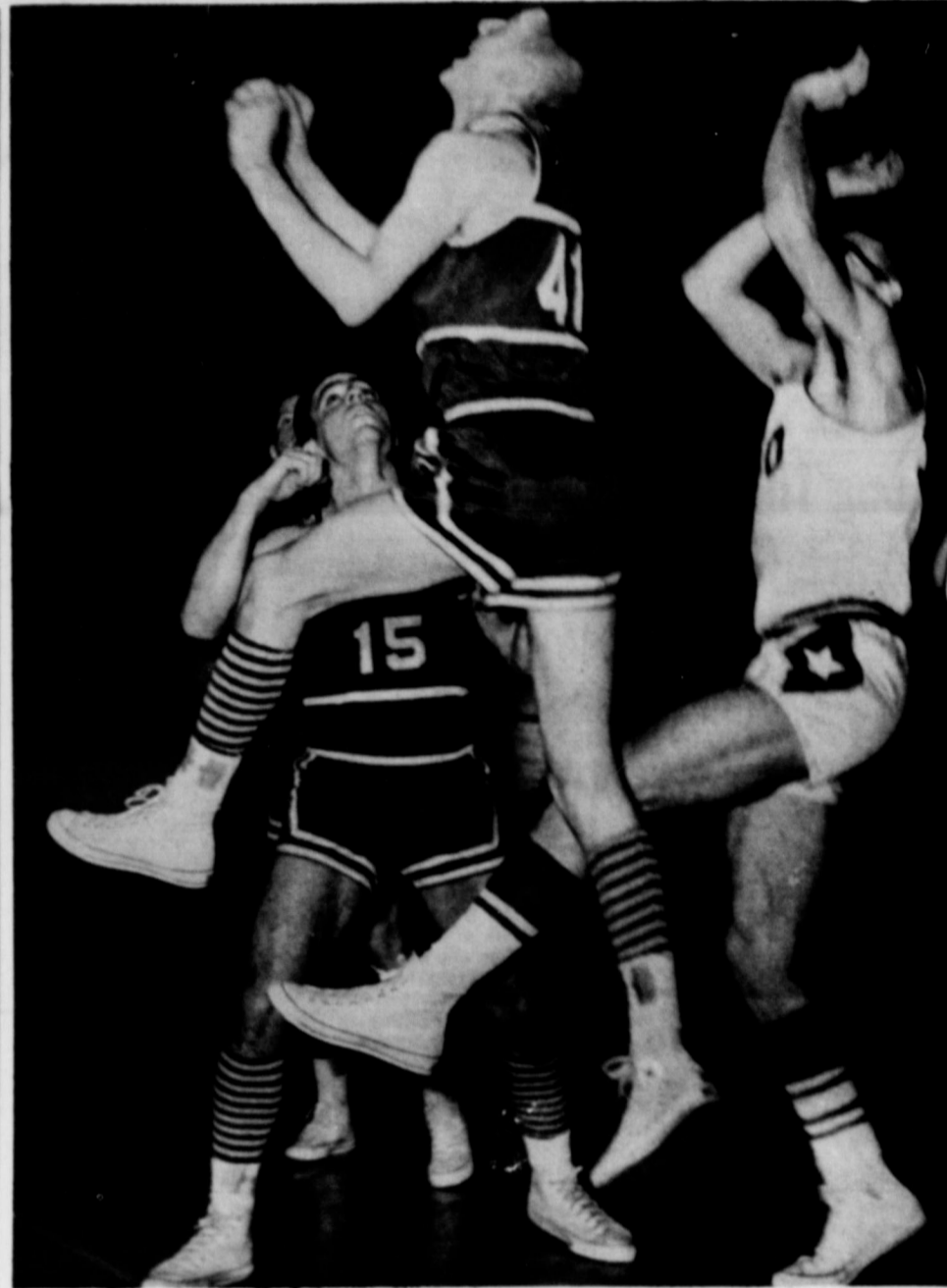

Triple Tax Relief Bill Reopened In Congress By Texan

A Texas lawmaker has reopened his battle in Congress to bring tax relief to the parents of college students, to homeowners, and to working mothers who must pay for child care.

Rep. Bob Casey of Houston, a four-term Democrat, introduced three tax relief bills in the House of Representatives Tuesday.

The first would permit parents of college students to deduct from gross income reported the actual costs of keeping dependents in college not to exceed \$1,500 per year.

The second would permit homeowners to deduct actual cost of repair and improvement to his home from gross income reported not to exceed \$750 per year.

Casey's third bill would permit working mothers to deduct the actual cost of child care from gross income reported not to exceed \$2,400 a year, a substantial increase over the present allowable of up to \$900.

"These three segments of our population need immediate tax relief," Casey said, "and so far, they have been completely overlooked by Congress."

"I'm particularly gratified that my efforts to bring tax relief to parents of college students, and to homeowners for the expense of repairs to their residence, are gaining support throughout the country," Casey stated.

"I have been fighting for this ever since I came to Congress, and we are slowly making headway. Whether we are successful depends upon the support given these proposals by the people."

Casey pointed out the federal government spends millions on urban renewal and slum clearance programs.

"My bill would give homeowners the incentive to keep

their property in repair. It would also permit rent property owners to amortize the cost of rehabilitating or restoring rental housing, and would strike at preventing slums rather than waiting until they are created to act," Casey said.

Casey's bills were referred to the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee.

"I intend to do my utmost to press the committee for consideration of these bills," Casey stated. "I am convinced of the soundness of this approach in bringing relief to these people."

Hinn Soybean Released To Area Farmers

The first soybean for the High Plains of Texas has passed the rigorous growing season of 1964 with flying colors. The Hinn Soybean, developed by the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway, Texas, was released to farmers from Lubbock to the top of the Panhandle.

The Hinn was developed to give Texas a better soybean as well as another high yielding cash crop, and was released to Texas Certified Seed Growers early in 1964. Over 6,000 bushels were turned over to farmers to get this new soybean into production throughout the irrigated belt of the Plains.

Desirable qualities of the Hinn soybean are; generally a higher yield over other varieties grown

in West Texas; good standability that is, the beans will not fall down or lodge; has a high degree of shatter resistance; fruits high off the ground, about 4 to 6 inches, for better harvesting; All of these qualities of the Hinn make it a soybean much sought after by the area farmers.

The Hinn was developed by Dr. Earl H. Collister, Director of the High Plains Research Foundation. Later work was taken up by Barry Love, Agronomist for the Foundation. The first selections of the new bean were made in 1959. In keeping with the Foundation's policy of doing research that will help the agricultural economy, the soybean was released to Certified Seed Growers from throughout the West Texas area.

Highest yield reported to the Foundation for the year of 1964 came from Ewald Quebe, a farmer near Lockney, Texas, with a field average yield of 45 bushels per acre. Average yields from the total area in which the Hinn was released ranged from 30 to 35 bushels.

Dr. Collister has reported that under optimum conditions at the Foundation, yields were up to 53.4 bushels per acre. Net returns from this yield were \$119.88 per acre.

One new aspect that has been

developing from the Hinn soybean is the current study underway by the American Soybean Association to test the Hinn for human consumption. Dr. Collister stated, "It's sheer speculation at this time, of course, but if the tests do prove out, it will put the Hinn soybean in a premium category on the world market."

Certified growers who wish to plant the Hinn soybean for 1965 may contact the High Plains Research Foundation, Box 1267, Plainview, Texas. This year's supply of good quality, high germination (89 to 96 percent) will be allocated on a first-come basis.

General Telephone Reduced Station Night Calls Effective February 1

General Telephone customers will join others throughout the nation in enjoying reduced station to station interstate long distance rates effective February 1, 1965, according to Joe H. Collins, director of public relations.

The rate reduction, announced late last year by the Federal Communications Commission, extends the hours during which station to station late night rates and night rates are in effect.

For example, the late night rates which apply only to station to station interstate calls (formerly referred to as the "After 9" rates) are now in effect all day Sunday and from 8 p. m. to 4:30 a. m. Monday through Saturday. Station to station interstate night rates, formerly in effect from 6 p. m. to 9 p. m. each day, will now be in effect all day Saturday (from 4:30 a. m. to 8 p. m.) and from 6 p. m. to 8 p. m. Monday through Friday.

that only station to station calls of over 431 miles between states are affected by the new rate reductions. Person to person rates and regular day time calling rates remain essentially the same.

E. H. Danner, president of General of the Southwest, has indicated that it is too early to determine precisely what effect the rate reductions will have on the long distance calling habits of General's customers. However, he pointed out that it is entirely possible that the effect will be to provide an additional stimulus to long distance traffic, thereby resulting in little or no change in General's toll revenues. "It is extremely important to bear in mind that long distance traffic has been increasing steadily from year to year and that this upward trend is expected to continue," he said.

Outlook For U. S. Cotton To Be Discussed At Prod. Conference

The outlook for U. S. cotton will be presented in Lubbock during the first session of the annual Western Cotton Production Conference, March 2-3.

Dr. M. K. Home, Jr., chief economist for the National Cotton Council, will discuss current domestic and export programs and analyze cotton's competitive situation.

The two-day conference, oriented specifically for the Western growers, will convene at the Koko Palace. General chairman is Roy Forkner, president of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock.

Dr. G. A. Niles, associate professor at Texas A&M University, will discuss cotton quality with particular emphasis on the High Plains. Dr. Niles also will deal with staple length and its relationship to varieties planted, the quality in terms of fiber properties and spinning performance of leading High Plains varieties.

Farm Management Specialist John J. Seibert, Texas Tech, Lubbock, will discuss the use of electronic systems for production cost analysis, going into its potential in assisting cotton producers to define their pro-

duction costs in more accurate detail. This program, he will point out, has definite advantages in pinpointing areas where costs can be reduced.

James S. Parker of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., will outline mill quality requirements in years ahead, discussing changing mill technology, chemical finishing blends, and synthetic competition.

The conference is sponsored jointly by the Southwest Five-State Cotton Growers Association and the National Cotton Council. Local host will be Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Cooperating in the meeting will be the agricultural chemicals industry, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Arizona Cotton Growers Association, El Paso Valley Cotton Association, Western Cotton Growers Association, land-grant colleges, vocational agriculture and farm organizations.

The conference is open to anyone interested in cotton. There are no registration fees.

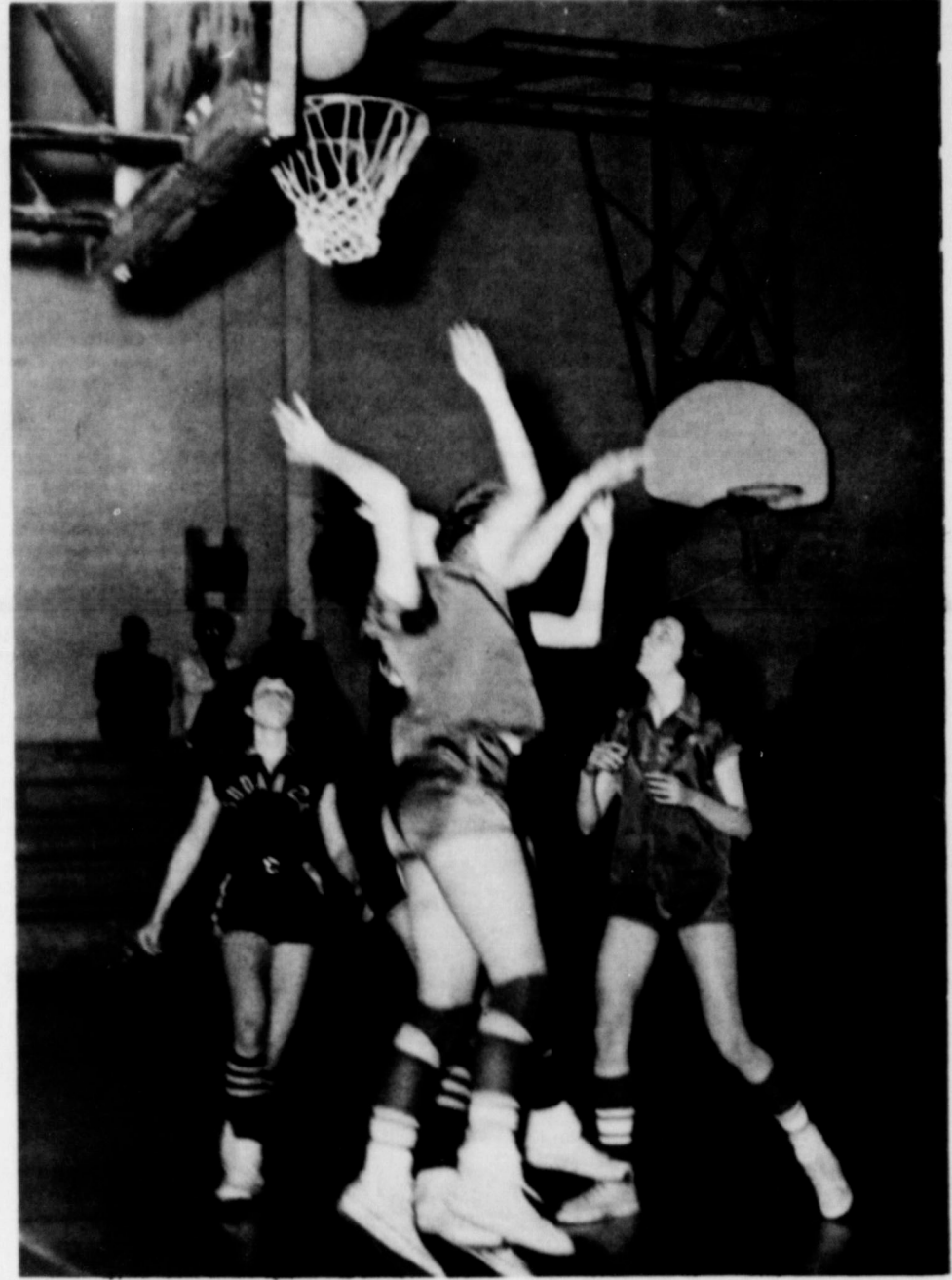

Countians Have Interest In Pooling Law

Citizens of Lamb County, producer of some \$5 million worth of oil and gas a year, have a special interest in the "pooling" bill now before the Texas Legislature. James L. Sewell, Dallas, president of Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, reported this week.

"Although Lamb County has production, the oil men who operate here, as well as the landowners and governmental officials, are interested in securing maximum development," Sewell said. "A pooling law will encourage a more efficient and more equitable approach to development of our oil and gas resources."

A measure, supported by all segments of the Texas petroleum industry after two years of intra-industry conferences and study, was recently introduced as Senate Bill 2 by Senator Galloway Calhoun, Jr., of Tyler, and as House Bill 2 by Rep. Wayne Gibbons of Breckenridge.

Sewell stressed that the measure does not affect normal leasing and voluntary pooling arrangements between landowners and operators, nor does it affect in any way reservoirs discovered and produced before March 8, 1961 (date of Supreme Court decision that wells on small tracts could not produce at rates disproportionately higher than adjoining tracts).

"The pooling bill is designed to make it possible for mineral owners regardless of the size tract of land they may have to get their fair share of the oil and gas that may underly their acreage," he said.

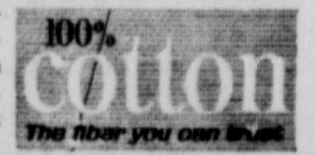

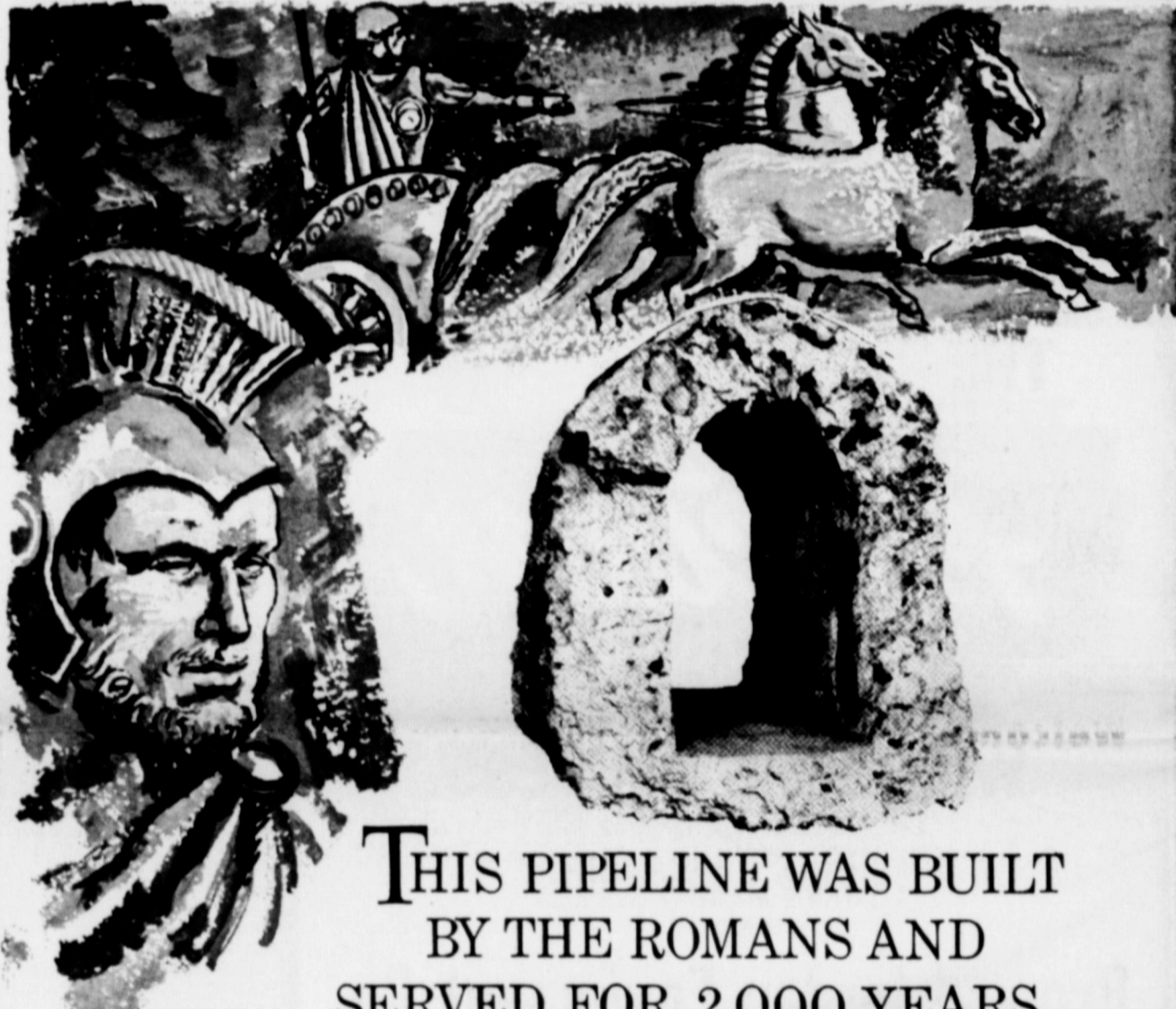

This photo, from the Smithsonian Institute in Washington D. C., shows a section of the original aqueduct that served the water needs of the conquered city of Cologne, Germany. It was constructed in 80 A.D. by the engineers of Fabius Sabinus Titus, Emperor of Rome. The aqueduct extended 56 miles underground between Cologne, and Eiffel and served as the main artery for the Cologne water supply until the late 1920's.

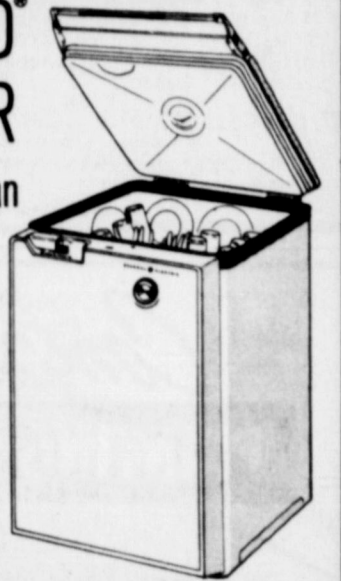

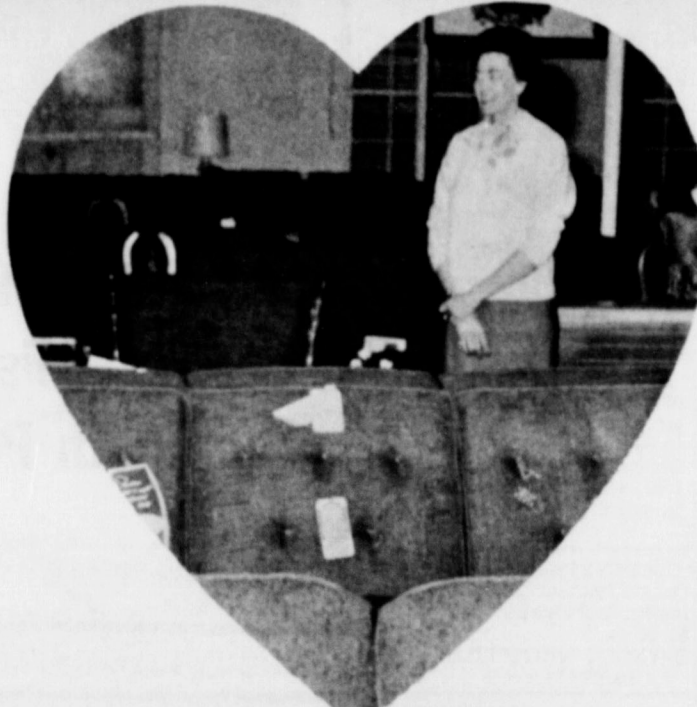
