Colored School News Lamb County To **Begin Planter Box** Survey Soon

Lamb County is one of the five cotton producing counties in the state of Texas and the only county raising and selling pidgeons, a citizenship and hog raising badge, a Planter Box Survey will be con-

Some twenty ginners and Extension Service personnel will contact approximately 250 Lamb County farmers while they are actually engaged in planting cotton.

The survey worker will take a one pound bag of cotton seed from the farmer's planter box and will fill out a short questionnaire after talking with the farmer.

A germination and purity test will be run on the approximately 250 samples of cotton seed. This information, along with the questionnaire information, will be transferred to IBM cards and processed

The information obtained will be kept confidential or on individual basis and will be published only on the total county findings.

Farmers contacted are urged to cooperate in this survey since the information obtained will be used in an educational program to help further the cotton industry in the state of Texas and see that better quality planting seeds are in the hands of farmers.
