## Farm Electrification Course Scheduled April 24 - 25

A Farm Electrification short course for adult farmers will be held April 24-25 under the sponsorship of the Springlake High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. W. L. Mann Superintendent and Mr. E. G. Gaston, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Mr. Bob Jaska, Farm Electrification specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A & M College, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A & M College.

Mr. Jaska holds a Master's Degree in Agricultural Engineering. Since 1947 he has been prominent in research work in Farm Electrification at A & M College, in addition to teaching Farm Electrification in the Agricultural Engineering Department. His research and field work carried him over the entire State so that he is very familiar with all types of electrical problems on the farm.

Many Farm Electrification short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Jaska and all have met with outstanding success, according to Walter Labay, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Plainview, Texas. Arrangements for the adult education course in Farm Electrification and in other fields are made through Mr. Walter Labay's office.

## Lamb County To Begin Planter Box Survey Soon

Lamb County is one of the five cotton producing counties in the state of Texas and the only county in the High Plains area in which a Planter Box Survey will be conducted in 1961.

This survey is being sponsored by the Texas Certified Seed Producers, Inc., Texas A & M College, and the cotton ginners of Lamb County. The actual survey work will be done by the local Extension Service personnel and the local cotton ginners, with many other firms and agencies cooperating, under the direction of County Agent, Bill Kimbrough.

Service personnel will contact approximately 250 Lamb County farmers while they are actually engaged in planting cotton.

The survey worker will take a one pound bag of cotton seed from the farmer's planter box and will fill out a short questionnaire after talking with the farmer.

A germination and purity test will be run on the approximately 200 samples of cotton seed. This information, along with the questionnaire information, will be transferred to IBM cards and processed at the Data Processing Center at Texas A & M College.

The information obtained will be kept confidential or on individual basis and will be published only on the total county findings.

Farmers contacted are urged to cooperate in this survey since the information obtained will be used in an educational program to help further the cotton industry in the state of Texas and see that better quality planting seeds are in the hands of farmers.

## Lonnie Hucks Enrolled in Children's Training Center in Lubbock

Lonnie Gene Hucks, 6 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Hucks, Springlake is attending special classes at the Children Training Center in Lubbock.

Lonnie, blind since birth, was enrolled in the school in October. He spend the week in Lubbock in the home of Mrs. John Musler, 5011 14th St., special teacher in the school, returning home each weekend.

The unique program offered by the school is principally one of orientation, aimed at preparing blind students to enter a public or state school which teaches braille.

These methods are designed primarily to help the youngsters adjust to a school situation and to learn independence of action.

Toward this end students are given speech therapy, are taught how to work and play with other children, how to travel in their immediate environment, and how to take care of their individual needs.

Speech therapy serves to develop the conversational abilities and thus arouses their interest in group participation.

They practice elaboration using full sentences rather than words or phrases in asking and answer-

ing questions. Familiar objects, such as clothing, tableware and toys are employed as "conversation pieces" to facilitate speech and understanding, both of words and numbers.

Puzzles and games are used as a means of developing sensitivity to "touch and texture."

"Sensitivity of touch must be well-developed before they are ready to learn braille." In other words they must learn to see the tiny raised dots "with their hands" before they can learn to read.

Lonnie is a victim of retrolental fibroplasia, a condition caused, usually, in premature births to infants weighing less than 4 and one half pounds by too large a concentration of oxygen in incubators of premature infants.

Lonnie has a twin brother whose eyesight was not affected.

Tuition at the center is on a sliding scale, beginning at \$60 per month for out-of-county students.

Another area boy, Stephen Arthur Brewer, son of Rev. and Mrs. Arthur Brewer of Canyon is also enrolled at the training center.

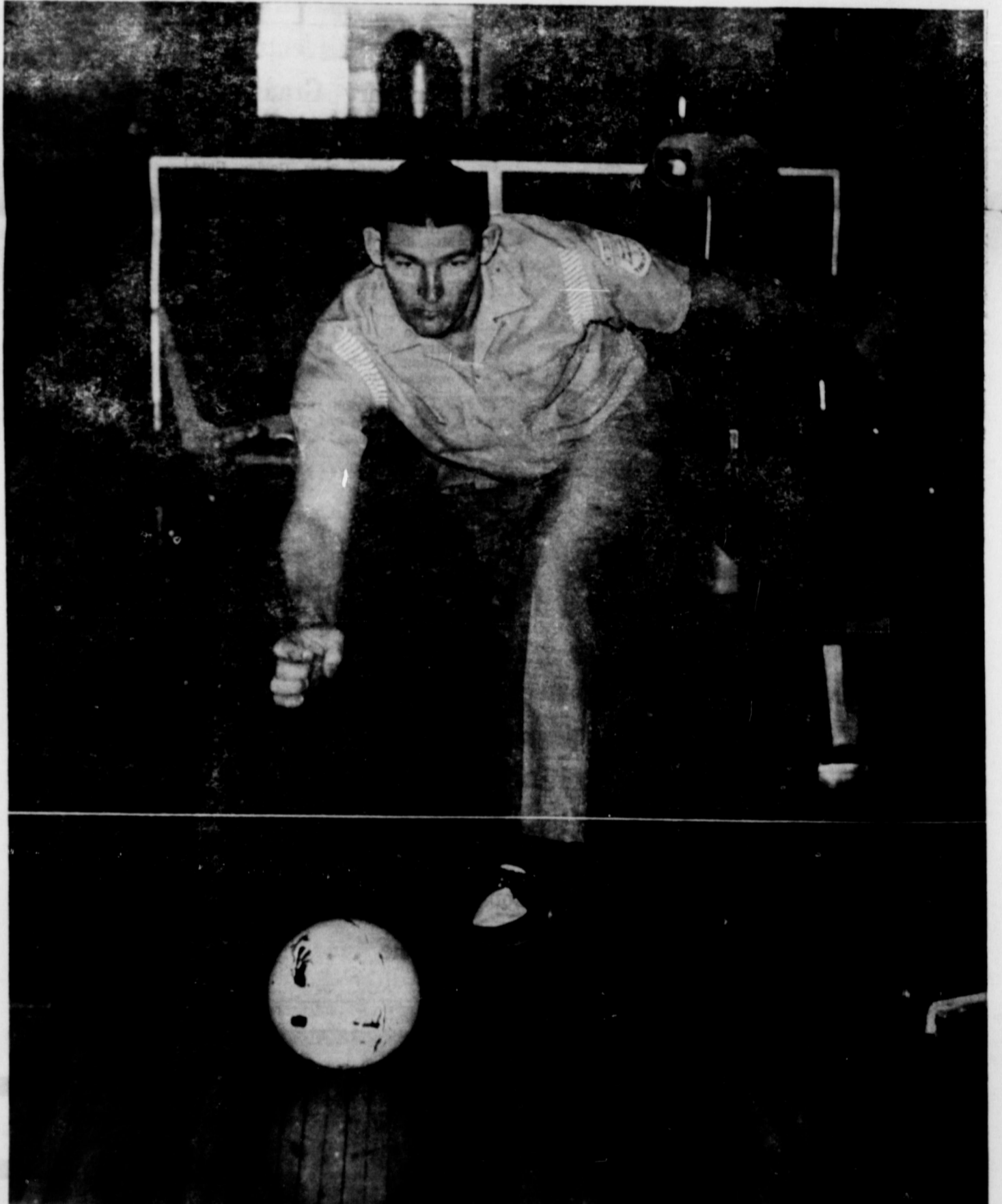

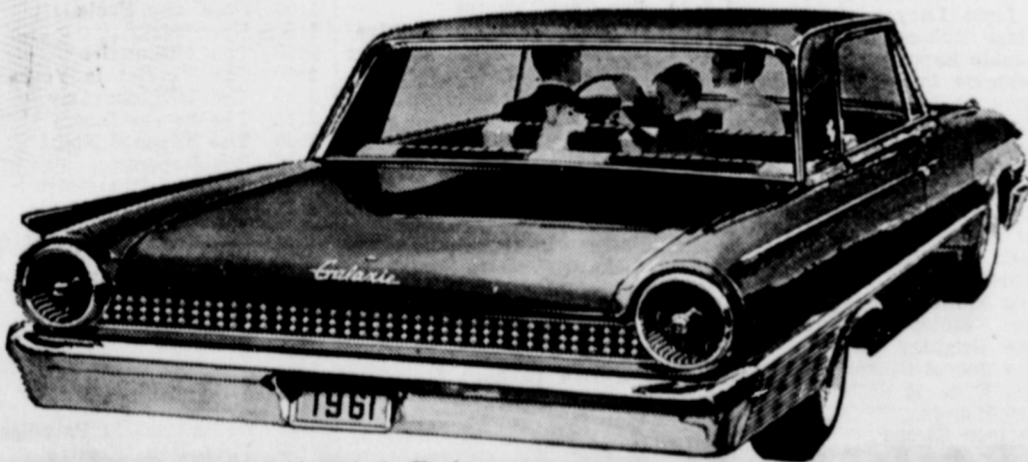
