Chamber of Commerce officials have contacted Smith, and are expecting him to arrive here early Saturday afternoon. Borum will then present him a plaque from the C. of C., designed with a world globe in the center with Earth located on the outline of Texas, and a container of "Earth soil" to present to President Eisenhower. Postmaster Marshal Kelley will postmark the certificate which Smith has had stamped and signed in each planet city where he has visited. Smith's plans are to go to Washington, D. C. when he leaves Earth and will present the certificate and container of soil to the President. Smith will also be asked to speak at the ceremonies here.

The Fire Department siren will sound two long blasts, with a short pause between, to signify Smith's arrival Saturday.

Everyone who can possibly do so is urged to come out and be on hand for the welcome. Newspaper reporters from Fort Worth, Amarillo and other towns, as well as TV personnel, are expected to attend.

The official ceremonies, which will take place in surroundings probably familiar to Smith, but a little "peculiar" to most of us, will be held immediately after his arrival. A facsimile of a huge rocket ship is being prepared on the float. It will be labeled "Earth or Bust, And He Made It!"

While the space traveler does not bear an uncommon name, he does claim some unusual accomplishments. When he arrives here he will have completed his 12,000 miles hitchhiking tour of the "planets on Earth." He will have visited Stars, moon, Mars, Sun, Pluto, Jupiter, Ceres, Mercury, Vesta, Venus, Appollo, Neptune and Earth, all of which he has "claimed" for the United States of America.

Remember to listen for the siren blasts Saturday afternoon and come out and assist in the welcome of the "planetary traveler."

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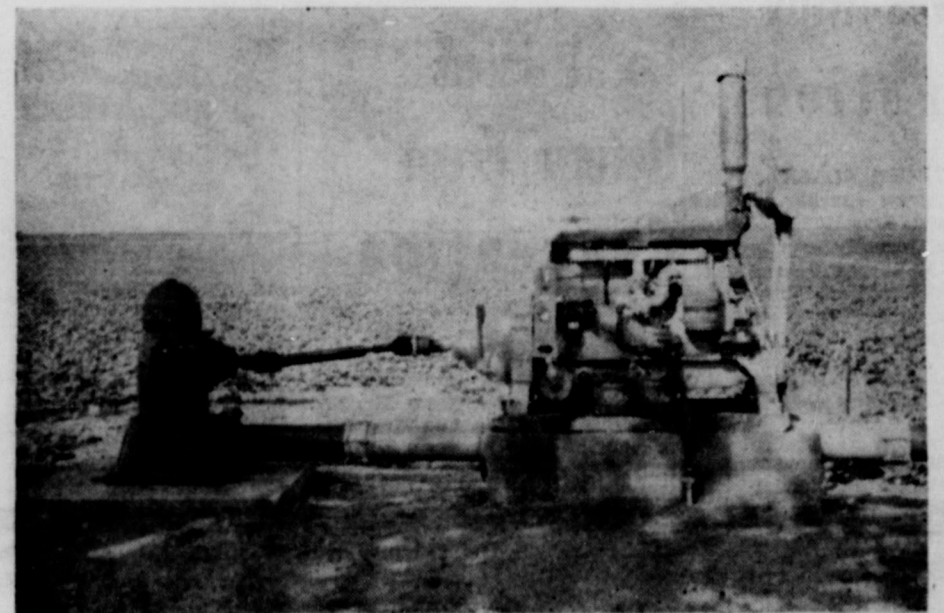
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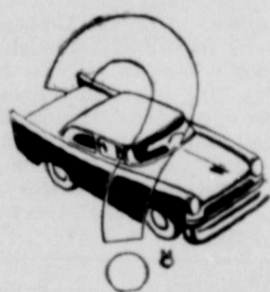

## A. S. (Pete) Parrack, Candidate For County Treasurer, Makes Statement To County Voters

In April, when I authorized the newspapers of Lamb County to place my name in the political column as a candidate for County Treasurer, I stated that my official announcement would follow later. Inasmuch as the primary is drawing near and I feel that the voters want to know (and are entitled to know) exactly what kind of a person, what kind of character, and what kind of qualifications each candidate is or possesses, I give you the following information regarding myself and my family.

I was born in Lubbock County (Becton Community) where I resided all my life until moving to Littlefield, with the exception of time spent in the United States Army and time while I was away at school. I moved to Littlefield 18 years ago as manager of the Crystal Ice Company and worked

for that company for 12 years and quit to become manager of the Crystal Ice Plant where I worked for three years or until the Crystal Ice Plant sold at which time I returned to the Crystal Ice Company and served as manager until the company decided to discontinue many of their plants throughout West Texas, which left me without employment or any source of income whatsoever and after being solicited by many friends and supporters and after much thought and prayer I decided to ask the people of Lamb County for the office of County Treasurer.

I am 54 years of age, married and have three children, served 18 months in the United States Army and my wife and I both are members of the Order of the Eastern Star having served as Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron of Little-

field Chapter for the year 1957-58. My family and I are each members of the First Baptist Church. I attended Tyler Business College and have attended A and M College for two short courses in office management and a higher course in bookkeeping and auditing.

In asking for the office of County Treasurer I am asking for an office that I know I am fully qualified to handle; the type of work I have prepared myself for and the kind of work I have followed for 29 years, I am familiar with the duties of the office and know I can handle it to your complete satisfaction and approval. I have no source of income, no employment or job and am asking for the office strictly on my own merits and qualifications to do the job. If and when I am elected I will give my full time to the office of County Treasurer and will not have any other employment, job, or duties to detract from giving you the kind of service you are entitled to. I have seen many of the voters

of Lamb County but I am sure I have missed many of you. I hope to see each of you before the July Primary but in case I fail to see you please know that the entire Parrack family of five will appreciate your helping me in any way to, so moved back here and hate to

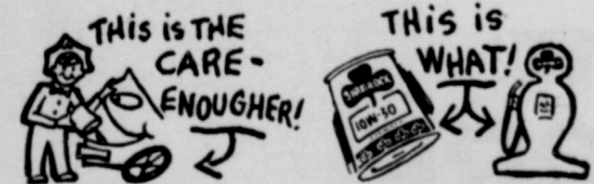

The City Council of the City of Earth, Texas, has by ordinance duly passed and adopted, ordered that the herebelow mentioned portions of the streets and avenues of the City of Earth, Texas, be improved by raising, grading, excavating and filling, and paving with caliche base and triple asphalt surface, and by constructing curbs and gutters where necessary as provided in the plans and specifications for said improvements prepared by the Engineer

for said City and now on file in the office of the City Clerk and heretofore approved by the City Council; and a contract with the partnership of J. H. Chastain and E. E. Creel, dba CHASTAIN AND CREEL, of Snyder, Texas, has been made and entered into, for the marking and construction of such improvements, which contract has been executed by the City and is on file in the office of the City Clerk, which said plans and specifications and said contract are referred to for all pertinent purposes. It is proposed and provision will be made that a portion of the costs of all said improvements will be assessed against abutting property and owners thereof as follows: Not exceeding nine-tenths (9/10ths) of cost of all improvements in front of property, and not exceeding nine-tenths (9/10ths) of the cost of all improvements on sides of property. By the term "front" as used herein is meant: where a parcel of property is unimproved the front thereof is the street or avenue on which same faces according to the official recorded maps or plats of the original town of Earth, Texas, and any additions where improvements are ordered made; and where parcels of property are improved the front thereof is the street or avenue on which the improvements face. Estimates of the costs of such improvements of the portions of the streets or avenues in the various districts or units of construction as hereinafter designated and set out, have been prepared and filed by the Engineer and approved by the City. The portions of such streets and avenues ordered to be improved are divided into and designated as separate and independent districts or units as hereinafter set out. The Estimates prepared and filed as aforesaid show the costs of improvements and the amounts to be assessed against abutting property and owners thereof in such separate districts or units, and the improvements will be in such districts or units, numbered and designated as UNIT NUMBER ONE. The portions of the streets or avenues to be improved in each district, together with the estimated costs of the improvements in each district, the amounts per front foot to be assessed against the abutting property and owners thereof on the portions of the streets and avenues to be improved in each district, and the total estimated amount to be assessed against property and the owners thereof in each district are as follows:

### UNIT NUMBER ONE

3rd Place, from the East Property Line of North Elm Street, to the West Property Line of North Fir Street; Estimated cost of improvements is \$5,160.00; estimated amounts per front foot to be assessed for all improvements in front of property is \$3.99; and the total estimated amount to be assessed in the entire district or unit against property and the owners thereof is \$4,644.00.

AND NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that hearings will be given and held by and before the City Council of the City of Earth, Texas, on Monday, the 4th day of August, A. D. 1958, at 8 o'clock p.m. in the regular meeting place in the City Hall of Earth, Texas, to all owning or claiming any pro-

erty abutting upon said portion of said streets and avenues in said districts or units, and to all holding liens on any of said abutting property, and all owning or claiming any interest in any of said abutting property. A separate hearing will be held for each separate district or unit as above designated, separate from and independent of the hearing on any other district or unit. At said time and place all owning or claiming any such abutting property in any district, and all holding liens on any of said property, and all claiming any interest in any of said property, shall be and appear and will be fully heard concerning said improvements, the cost thereof, the amounts to be assessed therefor, the benefits to the respective parcels of abutting property by means of the improvements of said portions of said streets and avenues in any district, and concerning the regularity, validity and sufficiency of all proceedings, including contract for the work, relating to such improvements as aforesaid. Any matter or thing as to which they are entitled to hearing under the law in force in the City and under the proceedings of the City with reference to said matters. Evidence will be heard on all the matters above mentioned. Following the hearings if evidence justifies, assessments will be levied against abutting property, each district to be considered separately. The assessments will be levied against the abutting property and the owners thereof, and when such assessments are levied same shall be liens on the abutting property and personal obligations and liabilities of the owners thereof, and shall constitute a first and prior lien upon the property as provided by law and according to the powers and provisions of the Act passed at the First Called Session of the 40th Legislature of the State of Texas, known as Chapter 106, be-

ing Article 1105B of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas now in force. In conducting hearings, in hearing evidence, and in considering all matters in connection with said improvements and the assessments to be made, each district will be considered separate and independent of any other district as aforesaid, and a separate hearing will be held for each district, and the assessments to be made in any one district will not depend upon the assessments to be made in any other district, and assessments will be made in any particular district according to the benefits arising from such improvements in that particular district and independent of the costs and benefits arising from improvements in any other district.

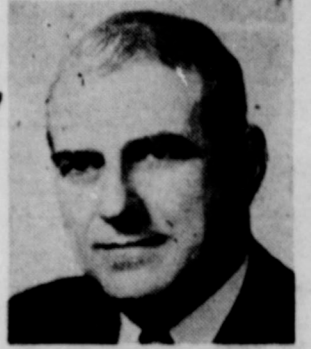

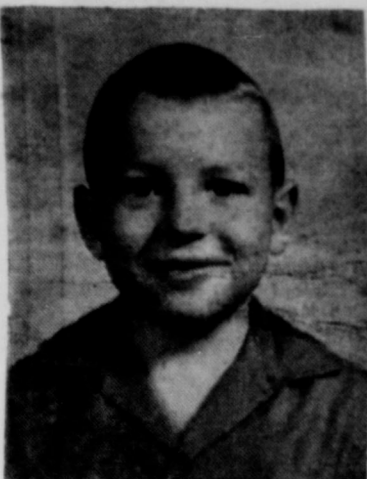

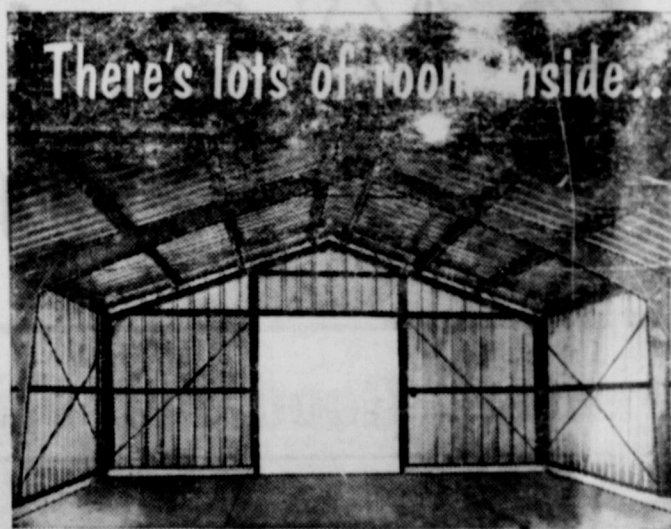

## Water Sports Are Fun But Can Be Very Dangerous

Texans own a lot of pleasure boats — 286,000 in 1957 — and their interest in water sports continues to increase, reports Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist. Each year about 10,000 new fishing licenses are bought by fishermen in the State and crowds continue to grow at popular lake, river and seashore spots.

But, warns Cooper, fun and enjoyment can end in disaster as it did last year for 593 Texans who were drowning victims. This needless loss of life can be prevented, points out the specialist, if water sport participants would only observe the rules of water safety.

Learn to swim. It is a good sport and may save your life. But

Cooper advises swimming with another person and in a safe place. Know the area where you intend to swim and before diving make sure the water is deep enough and that no hidden objects such as submerged rocks are present.

Respect the water and don't try to perform beyond your own limitations. Water can be a deadly enemy or a friend. Try to remain calm should you experience trouble while in the water, says Cooper. Don't swim immediately after eating or when overheated or tired and always keep safety equipment available, he cautions.

It is wise to wear a life vest when riding in a small boat. Should you be involved in a boating accident, don't leave the boat. Most small craft will float even when filled with water or overturned.

Finally Cooper advises against overpowering a boat. Motors too powerful make a boat hard to control and may cause upsets or other accidents.
