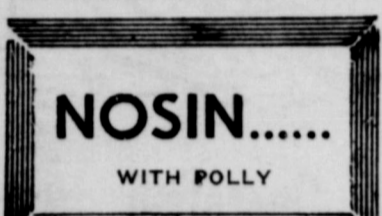

Living in this old world takes a lot of doing. It's tricky just to be able to meet the demands of each day. I sometimes wonder if living in a larger town would require more activity, more meetings and so forth than does a small community. If it does, then I'm deeply in sympathy with big town folks.

I think of my mother more often than I used to, and I wonder how the heck she raised eight children, without any of the conveniences of today.

I remember too, we had hot homemade biscuits and home grown meat for breakfast with gravy and that sorta thing. My kids can't remember biscuits that didn't come out of a can (since I started to work).

We did everything the hard way, washing, ironing, also our house was cold and no furnace to keep it warm. Our meals were prepared straight from the garden or the cellar of canned foods and the meat house. (To go to the grocery store more than two to four times a month was unheard of). However, with the inconveniences and shortages of material things, we never missed anything in life. We had love and understanding and the tender care of a Godly mother. I imagine we must have learned early in life that we couldn't have everything, because we never wanted very much as I remember. I don't imagine we even noticed when the depression came, it was probably about the same at our house.

However, today we parents work so hard to give our kids all the things we didn't have. The material things we grew up without, and by so doing I wonder if we're not missing the boat completely and depriving them of backbone and courage enough to face an uncertain future.

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I heard this little story today, which in my estimation has some real meaning. I couldn't help but pass it on to you.

"A hunter and his dog once got lost in the woods for a week. The hunter and the faithful dog sat down under a tree and he became hungry and cut off the dog's tail, built a fire, cooked it and ate every bite. When he had finished he pitched the dog the bone. The little dog grabbed the bone and ate it, when the dog finished he went over and licked the hunter's hand in sincere appreciation for the bone." That's the same story today of the people with Government and Federal Aid.

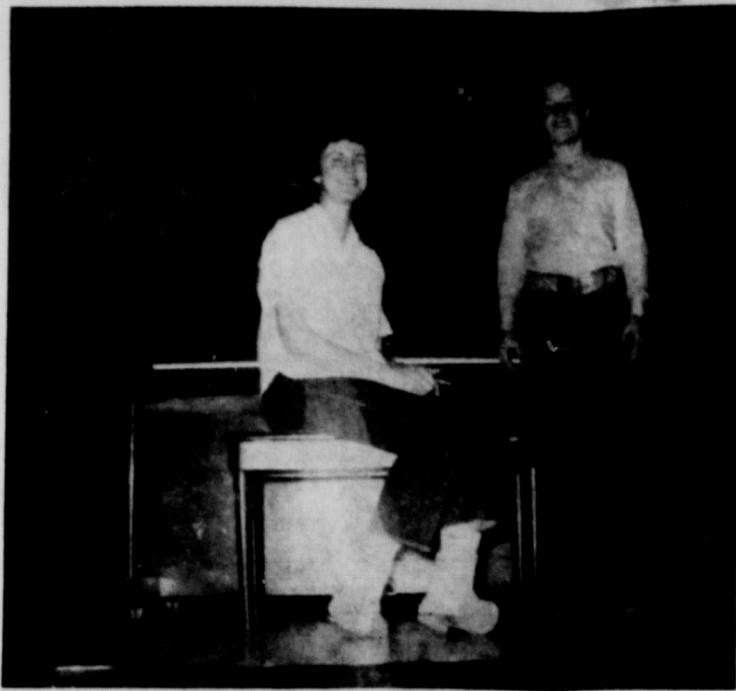

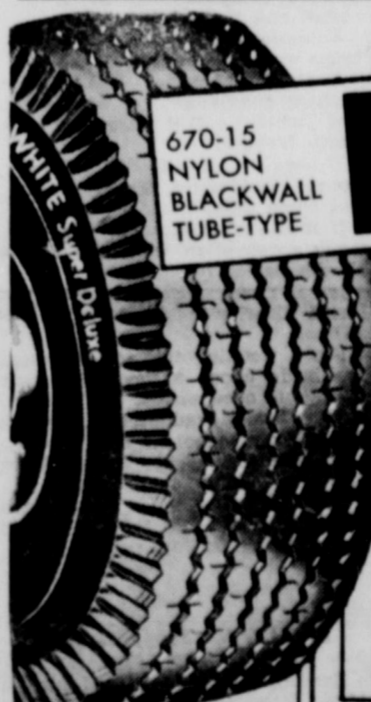

ATTENTION TAX PAYERS! Read Noxious Weed Control Act Carefully

POWERS OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 16 — The Board of Directors Shall Have The Following Powers:

- (A) To determine which noxious weeds shall be subject to control.
- (B) To determine the method or methods of control, either by spraying, cutting, burning, tillage, or any other appropriate method.
- (C) To prescribe the specific areas within the district on which control measures are to be carried out.
- (D) To prescribe the period within which the control measures are to be carried out.
- (E) To take such other action as is necessary to effectuate the purposes this Act.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Section 17 — The Board of Directors is specifically authorized to promulgate rules and regulations requiring the cleaning of farm implements and machinery which is brought into the district or which is moved from one (1) location to another within the district, and prescribing the method of disposition of materials taken from such implements and machinery. Before such rules or regulations are put into effect, notice of their adoption shall be given by posting a copy thereof at four (4) public places in each county within the district at least ten (10) days before the effective date and by filing a copy with the county clerk of each county within the district. A violation of the rules and regulations shall constitute a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine of not less than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) nor more than Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250).

NOTICE TO LAND OCCUPIERS OF CONTROL MEASURES; INSPECTION OF PROPERTY; FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH ORDER

Section 18 — The Chairman of the Board of Directors shall give written notice to each land occupier informing him of the control measures which are in effect on his land and all other necessary information to enable the land occupier to carry out the measures.

It shall be the duty of each land occupier to comply with the control measures prescribed by the Board of Directors. It shall be the duty of the County Commissioners Court in each county to comply with the control measures on right of ways of all public roads and other public lands with the district.

The Board of Directors or any inspector appointed by the Board shall have the right to enter upon any land within the district to determine whether control measures are necessary and to determine whether control measures prescribed by the Board are being carried out. If it is found that any land occupier is not complying with the Board's directions, the Board shall give him written notice ordering him to comply within a stated time. If he fails to comply with the order, the Board may file a suit for a mandatory injunction in the district court of the county in which the land is situated, to compel him to comply with the order. Any land occupier against whom an injunction is issued shall be liable for all costs of the suit and for a reasonable attorney's fee, to be fixed by the court.

LEVY OF UNIFORM ASSESSMENTS

Section 19 — The Board of Directors may levy an annual uniform assessment against the land within the district, not to exceed Three Cents per acre, for the purpose of paying the expenses of the district.

Interest On U. S. Savings Bonds Must Be Considered As Taxable

"Interest on U. S. Savings Bonds must be considered taxable income," Howard O. Nichols of Internal Revenue Service, Lubbock advised taxpayers today.

"If you are on the cash basis, you have an option as to when you may report the interest on your income tax return. You may want to report interest yearly. If you do it this way, the amount of interest to be included in 1960 comes each year as given in the table on the bond."

The taxpayer may wait until the bonds are matured or cashed before reporting the interest earned. In this case the interest must be included as income for that year. Also, once the taxpayer begins to report interest yearly, he must continue with this plan, unless he is given permission to change to another method.

"Accrual method taxpayers must report interest on U. S. Savings Bonds each year as the interest accrues. They are not permitted to defer the reporting of interest until the bonds are cashed or matured," Mr. Nichols concluded.

Sunburn And Skin Cancer

This may hardly be the time of year to be discussing the effects of too much sun, but an American Medical Association spokesman has again pointed out the extremely high rate of skin cancer among Texas farmers and ranchers.

Dr. Stephen Rothman of Chicago, chairman of the AMA's committee on cosmetics told a clinical session in Dallas that Texas has six times as high a rate of skin cancer as the northern and eastern states. He attributed the situation to the direct rays of the sun in Texas and the fact that many people in the state pursue outdoor livelihoods.

This extremely high rate, he said, could be reduced to a fraction by the daily use of simple sun-protective creams. A number of products are now available. Dr. Rothman reported, which have been found to be absolutely effective in preventing skin cancer if the individual who works in the sun would apply a thin layer on

his hands and face each morning. But his suggestion to the U. S. Public Health Service for such a preventive program, the Chicago specialist said, met with a response something like this: "If you think you can get a Texas farmer to smear cream on his face every morning, then you just don't know Texas farmers."

Consensus of the clinical session in Dallas was that the sun has been highly overrated as a source of health, and that its bad effects for most individuals may considerably outweigh the good.

For the normal skin, said Dr. Rothman, "I am not sure there is anything good to be said about the sun."

Ironically, he pointed out, the confirmed sun bather, seeking a tan which has become symbolic of youth, is hastening the aging process and prematurely developing for himself an unattractive, old-looking wrinkled skin. The full effects of sun bathing have not yet been completely assessed, because the fad has not been prevalent for a sufficient length of time to provide the required study.

But Dr. Rothman holds to the theory that modern man, provided with plenty of nourishment and vitamins, could live in perfect health for many years in a cellar without ever seeing the sun.

about 16,000 acres, from 178,296 acres to 161,297 acres.

The Texas Certified Seed Program is a voluntary program. Farmers or individuals apply voluntarily for inspection of their acreage and they must meet all of the requirements necessary for the Foundation Registration and Certification Classification.

The Texas Department of Agriculture used some 55 inspectors in 1959, who inspected around 200,000 acres of 29 different field crops consisting of 139 different varieties. An average of two and one-half inspections was made on each field, and in 1959 the department issued more than 250,000 Foundation and Registered tags and more than 2,000,000 Certified tags.

This service is paid for by those making application for certification, without cost to the taxpayers of the State. In 1959, the department took in a total of \$193,485 for services rendered to seed producers and spent \$181,781 to provide these services and certifications.

A field upon which application for inspection is made must show evidence of good management. The Texas Department of Agriculture approved inspector must inspect for isolation, varietal purity, other crop diseases, weed and noxious weeds. The field must meet high standards for each of these factors. Seed eligible under the Certification Program must pass high laboratory standards for purity, other crop seed inert matter, weed seed, noxious weed seed, and germination.

The Texas Department of Agriculture inspector draws official seed samples from tagged Foundation, Registered and Certified seed for testing by the department's seed laboratories as a further means of checking to see that such seed meets with seed certification standards.

New Method For Controlling Boll Weevil Promising

COLLEGE STATION. — A late season chemical and cultural control program at College Station in 1959 showed promise in reducing the overwintered population of boll weevils. This reduction appears to be great enough to delay the start of boll weevil control programs the following year to effect substantial savings in insecticide costs.

The program consists of chemical treatments just prior to and during harvest period to prevent the weevil from going into diapause, the physiological condition in which they survive the winter.

These insecticides treatments are followed by stalk destruction if harvest is completed before frost kills cotton.

Results obtained to date indicate this practice may be an effective eradication measure, according to Dr. J. R. Brazzel, associate professor, Texas A & M Department of Entomology.

who worked on the project. He said the chemical and cultural control program was used in an isolated 15-acre cotton field, about four miles from a cotton field of five acres and more than 10 miles from large acreages of cotton.

Insecticides used were methyl parathion, toxaphene, DDT and pentachlorophenol. They were applied over a two-month period, at five day intervals during the growing season and every seven-

nine days during the late-season before defoliation.

This experiment will be continued in 1960 and if the final results are as favorable as the data obtained to date indicate, this chemical and cultural control program late in the season may offer a means for eradication or greatly reducing the boll weevil populations.

Taxpayers of the Earth area along with other Lamb County taxpayers are urged to study the Noxious Weed Control Act before casting their vote Saturday, March 5.

Each farmer will be required to furnish his own labor and chemical or what other eradication he may choose.

If the Noxious Weed Control Law should carry in Saturday's election, money for eradication of the noxious weed on county right-of-ways will have to be raised through some tax increase.

Section 17 of the Noxious Weed Act plainly states that the Board of Directors is specifically authorized to promulgate rules and regulations requiring the cleaning of farm implements and machinery which is brought into the district or which is moved from one location to another.

Each land occupier will be required to comply with the control measures prescribed by the Board of Directors and shall have a right to enter upon the land and determine if the control measures prescribed by the Board are being carried out.

Section 16, 17, 18 and a part of 19 of the Noxious Weed Control Act is printed in this issue of your newspaper. Taxpayers and farmers are asked to read these rules and regulations carefully and consult their commissioner and neighbors about this important matter.

All sixteen voting polls throughout Lamb County will be open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Saturday, March 5.

Day taxpayers are urged to go to the polls Saturday and express their opinion.

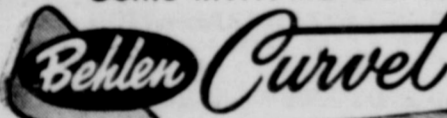

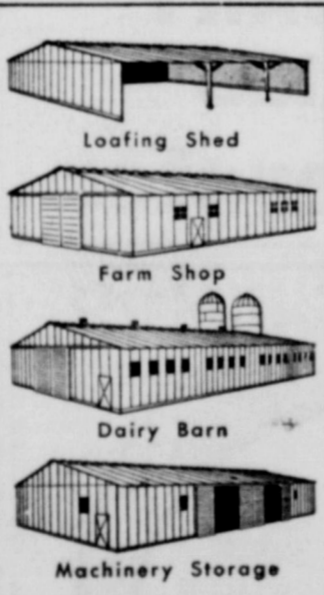
