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School Board Meets

Members of the Springlake Earth School Board met Monday night September 11. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The board reviewed the school's enrollment to date. The enrollment, so far this term is 343 in elementary, 203 in junior high and 214 in high school with 22 pupils enrolled in special education classes. The total enrollment is 782. This number is slightly down to this time last year, but up several from when the school was out last May. The board met with an attorney, Justice of the Peace and the Tax Collector-Assessor and had a work session on delinquent taxes, with a view toward collecting the delinquent taxes outstanding to the school. They reviewed the list of delinquent taxes and considered additional methods of collecting. The board also heard a progress report on the repair of the tennis court. No decision was made since all the bids have not been received. An audit report was also reviewed. All the board members were present for the meeting.

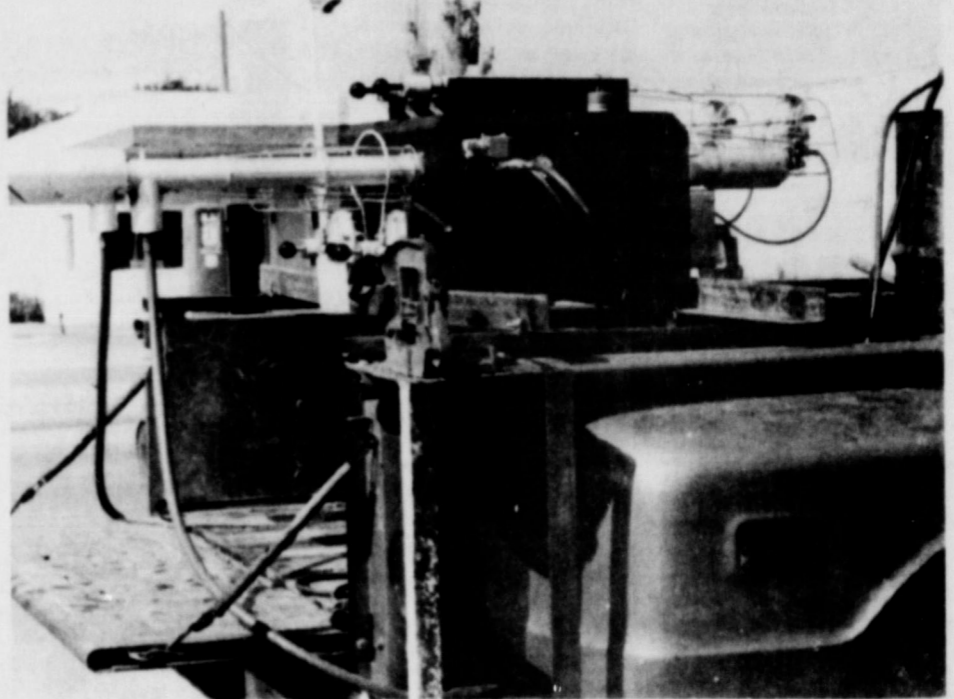

The City of Earth received a new Dyna Fog machine last Wednesday and has been using it to spray alleys and streets in an effort to cut down on the fly and mosquito population. The new Dyna Fog was purchased at the cost of \$315.00 and can be easily operated by one man as everything is controlled from inside the pickup. The old machine required two men to operate. It was necessary for one to ride in the back of the pick-up to operate it. Along with the new machine they received a supply of U.L. 48 which when mixed with water one pint will spray a two acre plot. It seems to be effective on the mosquitos and flies. City Dads had decided mosquitos and flies had become immune to the other spray they had been using. The City Council hopes this will aid in combating the health hazard here, with the cooperation of citizens in cleaning-up of our city, so as to do away with breeding places.

Over 200 Attend Appreciation Dinner

"Real education requires more than just a B.S. degree or whatever kind of degree one may have to sign behind his name," said Rev. Jim Pickens, pastor of the United Methodist Church of Dimmitt as he addressed an audience of more than 200 people, Tuesday night at the Springlake-Earth faculty and personnel appreciation dinner, co-sponsored jointly by the Earth and Springlake Lions. The event was held in the school cafeteria. Education can't stop with a degree, for it requires more than just book learning. A well rounded education requires faith in God and in your fellowman. It is a process that must be carried on from the cradle to the grave, to obtain lasting updated education. He stated that 63 million Americans started to school at the beginning of the '72-'73 school year. This, he explained, included students from kindergarten age through college, also included in that figure was faculty members and school personnel. Paying for this education during this term, he indicated would cost about 90 billion dollars. This figure does not rise to the amount spent on fighting equipment and wars. He expounded on the fact that teachers were underpaid, as well as the preachers in the country. Rev. Pickens told of how Maw and Paw could sometimes undo the good work of the teachers. He explained the home environment had much to do with what a student learned, because of what he heard and saw on the home front. Educational growth comes from everyone the student comes in contact with, he indicated. He needs more than just classroom assignments and teachers reading the lesson over aloud to him. Education, like religion, is something very exciting in this great big world today, but, he indicated, there are still a few groups that do not believe in changing their old methods, or putting enthusiasm into practice. He concluded by stating that education was many things including joy, integrity, and happiness in living. Master of Ceremonies for the event was Elroy Wisian, invocation was presented by Rev. Glenn Smith, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Springlake. The group sang "America" and the pledge to the Flag was led by Springlake Lion Boss, Dan Quigley. Faye Washington presented lovely dinner music as the group enjoyed a delicious barbecue dinner, including beef, ham, hot rolls, potato salad, corn, tossed salad, tea, coffee and cobbler. Earth Lion Boss, Weldon Barton, gave the welcome address. Elroy Wisian introduced the local school trustees and their spouses, honorary Lionesses and Springlake-Earth Lion's Club Queen, Lovely Pat Cleavinger. He also asked Lions and wives from each of the two clubs to stand to save time on long introductions. Ed Dawson introduced the school administrators, faculty and personnel. Rev. Charles Dunnam, pastor of the United Methodist Church introduced the guest speaker, Rev. Pickens. Benediction was given by Rev. David Hartman, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Earth. The cafeteria was decorated in the Fall and western decor. The head table was covered with a red and white checked table cloth centered with a colorful arrangement of gold and rust mums intermingled with green in a large wagon with a team pottery container. Other floral arrangements included an old zinc coffee pot holding salmon colored gladiolus. Also barrels of lovely flowers and greenery dotted the table. The other six tables were decorated with boxes and flowers, driftwood containers holding colorful fall leaves and foliage.

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
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## Brownie Troop 308 Meets What's Cooking At School

Some homemakers wonder why the yellow stayed--in their

clothes, that is, after a thorough wash using chlorine bleach. Often the reason is the bleach itself and the fabric finish of the clothes.

### BOOKMOBILE IN S-E, PLEASANT VALLEY, SEPT. 21-22

The Bookmobile will be in the Springlake, Earth and Pleasant Valley communities on September 21 and 22.

The library on wheels will stop in the city of Springlake on Thursday from 11 to 11:45 a. m. From 12 noon to 1 p. m. the library will be at Springlake-Earth School and from 1:15 to 3:45 p. m. it will be in the city of Earth.

On Friday, from 10 to 11 a. m. the bookmobile will be parked at the Pleasant Valley community building for the convenience of readers in that community.

According to Roxanne Schnorr, clothing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, yellowing can be caused by using chlorine bleach on fabrics with some types of resin finishes.

"These particular finishes are used to give a wash-and-wear property to the fabric and are most often found on cottons and rayons," the Texas A&M University specialist explained. "Although there's less of this type finish being used, there are still some available on the market."

Miss Schnorr suggested the following procedure to restore fabric whiteness when yellowing is the result of using chlorine bleach:

Rinse the garment with clear water.

Soak the fabric for half an hour or more, as necessary, in a solution containing one teaspoon of sodium thiosulfate to one quart water.

Use water as hot as is safe for the fabric.

Sodium thiosulfate is available at the drugstores and as "hypos" at photographic supply stores, the specialist noted.

Dye remover may also be used to restore the whiteness of some fabrics, she added.

"To prevent yellowing with the use of chlorine bleach, read the hangtags and permanent care labels of permanent press and easy care fabrics. Follow the recommended bleaching and laundry instructions carefully," Miss Schnorr concluded.

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# Wolverines Scalp The Indians 13-0

The Springlake-Earth Wolverines got off to a big start in the new season by defeating the Morton Indians 13-0.

The first scoring was in the first quarter when Brian Sanderson went over from one yard out. Nicho Triana tried for the extra point but missed.

In the second half Luis Palacio scored on a long pass play from Larry Thomas. Triana made the extra point count, and the game ended with the score 13-0.

In offensive the game was almost even. The Wolverines had 20 first downs, 10 in the first half and nine in the second half, also one passing; Morton had 21 first downs, 9 in the first half and 11 in the second half and 1 by penalty.

The Wolverines had 52 rushing plays for an average of 3.5 yards per rush. The Indians had 56 rushing plays for an average of 5.8 yards.

The Wolverines attempted 5 passes and completed 2 for 28 yards. The Indians attempted 2 passes, completing 1 for 22 yards.

The Wolverines were forced to punt 5 times for an average of 36 yards per punt. The Indians punted 2 times.

The defense for both teams was good at forcing fumbles. The Wolverines fumbled 4 times and lost the ball twice. The Indians fumbled 4 times and lost the ball 3 times.

In penalties, the Wolverines were penalized 2 times for 30 yards and the Indians 3 times for 35 yards.

Total yardage for the game for the Wolverines was 183 yards rushing, 28 yards passing and 35 yards by penalty for a total of 246 yards. For the Indians it was 172 yards rushing, 22 yards passing and 30 yards by penalties for a total of 224 yards for the game.

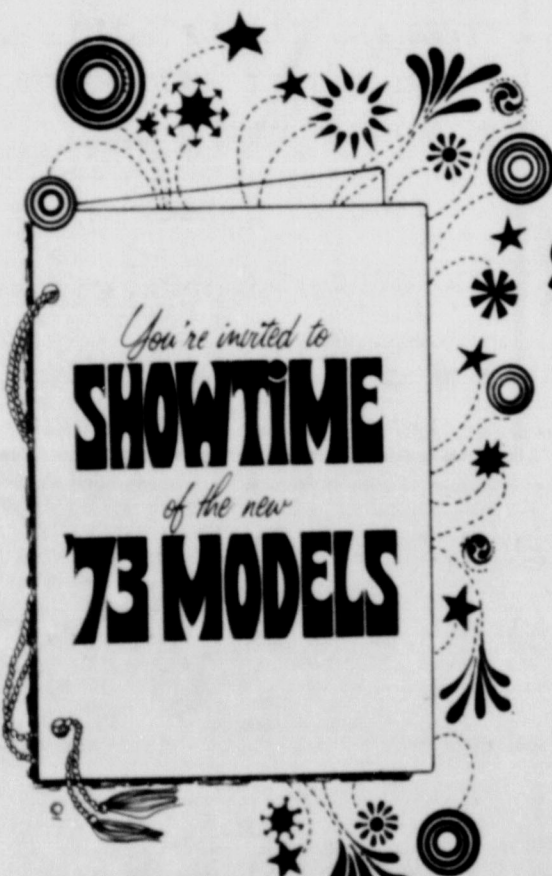

## Local Resident Attends Parents Day at State School

On Parents Day, September 10, Mrs. Paul DeLaCorda attended a program at Lubbock State School, a school for retarded children, in Lubbock.

Mrs. DeLaCorda has a 26 year old daughter, Rosalinda, in the school. Rosalinda has been at Lubbock for two years, transferring from Abilene State School, Abilene.

She has been paralyzed from the waist down since she was six months old and has only partial use in one of her arms. known. Included in the list were the following items: Jewelry (discarded bracelets, earrings, necklaces, etc.), head scarfs, educational toys, and books (children's books, comic books).

Mr. and Mrs. DeLaCorda have lived in Earth for 15 years, where Mr. DeLaCorda is employed at Earth Elevator. They are the parents of five other children, Mary Lou, 21, and a secretary in Amarillo, Paul, Jr., who recently completed a tour with the U.S. Army and is presently employed as a dental assistant in Louisiana, Blanca, a 10th grade student at S-E, Janie, a 9th grade student, and Michael, who is in kindergarten.

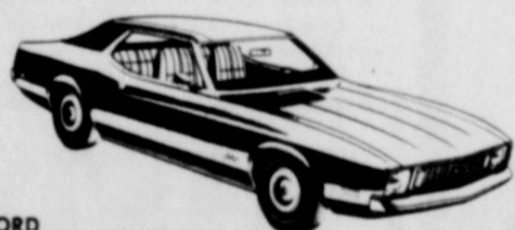

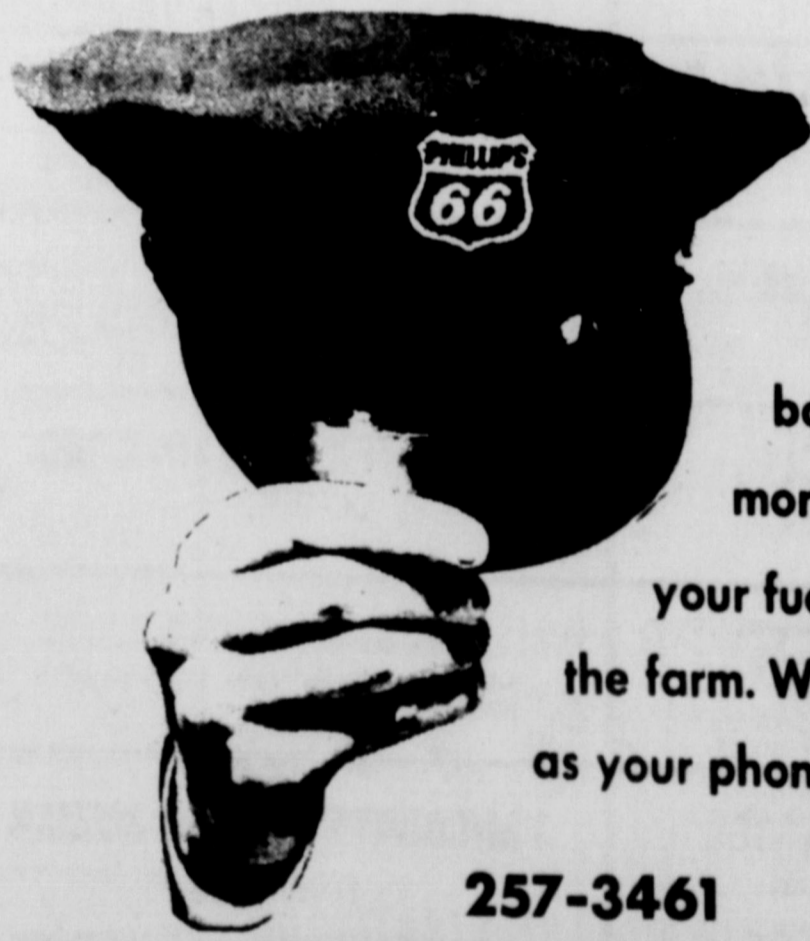

# Yield May Require Topping

High Plains during the development period. Wet weather, untypical in the High Plains area, has caused delay in fiber development and has caused the cotton to be less than 70 percent mature. The Foundation point out that cotton fiber does not develop at temperatures less than 70 degrees. However, for every degree increase above 70, the rate of fiber development increases. This shows the importance of taking every advantage to expose cotton plants to the warmest temperatures possible.

Offering tips on cotton topping, Vaillant said the operation is usually done the first two weeks of September so that the portion of the plants removed can deteriorate before harvest. Vaillant said the amount of foliage to be removed depended on the plants and fruiting. The portion of the plant with bolls smaller than nickel-size should be removed. Long range weather records indicate that the High Plains has some remaining time in which much cotton fiber can be developed if conditions are ideal. Vaillant said. And with these ideal conditions and other practices, cotton should develop until the freeze, he noted.

Editor's Reply: First, may I thank you sincerely for the letter stating your opinions on publishing.

In answer to why the school menu was no longer being published, you must have overlooked it in the August 31 issue for it was published. However, since school has just begun, I rather imagine they are having a rush at getting all settled in at school. We did not get it until Wednesday morning this week, but Oletha explained the rush. Perhaps, last week we may have forgotten to call or it could have been not made up in time; I really couldn't say - but, I feel certain that we will be publishing the menu regularly, as we did last year.

In reply to the statement, numerous trite and personal comments mingled within the news stories used as padding not being necessary. This, I agree with wholeheartedly. However, time doesn't permit overseeing everything that goes into the columns of each issue, or spending a lengthy time turning out a master piece. Ever forced to leave the dishes overnight? They're there waiting when you're fresh and ready to hit it the next morning.

Deadlines do not permit this privilege - they must be written up as quickly as possible to meet the deadline in Hereford for printing Wednesday night. The amount of advertising does not justify employing more people, also very few people here have taken courses in journalism, but they assuredly do the best they can.

Many folks call Wednesday afternoon to report events that took place four or five days prior to their call. Many times we try to write them up when its far past the time we are due in Hereford.

As for the local news media failing to abide by what is and is not acceptable in a journalistic sense - not knowing what instructor you had in your journalism courses, I can not conclude as to what your instructor considered acceptable. However, our media is judged at least four times annually in approximately six categories. Included in these are news writing, general excellence and advertising composition. In 1970, I won the first place plaque in the state in news writing in our division. The judges have always written comments about the large amount of local news the News-Sun manages to publish each week from a town of this population.

Judges do ask us not to write as though we were staffers on the New York Times, but more in the form of small town friendly people.

As for the religious experience of the Editor, if you are giving reference to the trip to Casper, Wyoming, there were 34 of the towns populous who were on the trip, many were mentioned in the story, and the names of each one taking the long trip was mentioned. To many it was perhaps of little interest, however, there was other news they could have read. That week we were indeed glad to get the story back and the pictures, as there was not enough news to fill up the paper. The amount of advertising determines the number of pages we print. Out of town advertising has helped keep a paper in Earth, so local news could be printed.

I notice "The Free Press" at Diboll in Angelina County dedicated four full galleys of type to a story headed "The Faith Healer" using a goodly portion of it on the front page. The Canyon paper had a six column head "Lay Witness Meeting - A Huge Success". The Lubbock paper also dedicated many galleys on a lay witness meeting and also many stories when Pat Boone came to Lubbock to head the "Day of Prayer", a year following the Lubbock tornado. They included much of his religious experiences and background.

Last week we dedicated many galleys to a story written by Frank Butter. We thought it interesting, and surely did need it badly last week to fill up. Hope I have in some small way helped to clarify your questions.

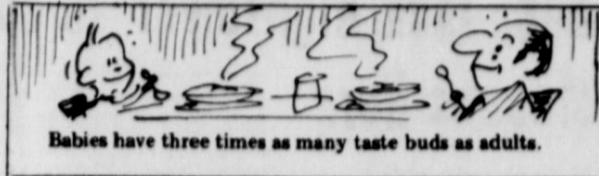

AMENDMENT TO CITY ORDINANCE NO. 43 OF THE CITY OF EARTH, TEXAS, AND REPEALING AMENDMENT OF SAID ORDINANCE PASSED AND APPROVED BY THE CITY OF EARTH, TEXAS, ON MAY 6, 1968.

Paragraph Number One(1) of Ordinance No. 43 of the City of Earth, Texas, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Earth, Lamb County, Texas, that no person, natural or artificial, shall hereafter install, erect, construct or build a butane or gasoline storage facility or facilities aboveground within the City limits of Earth, Lamb County, Texas or provide fuel therefor or service same in any manner within said City in a residential area. The sole and only exception to this Ordinance being a legal butane or gasoline wholesale distributor which may install, erect, construct or build a butane or gasoline storage facility or facilities aboveground within the business district of the City Limits of the City of Earth, Lamb County, Texas."

ORDINANCE NO. 75

AN ORDINANCE TO PROTECT THE PUBLIC HEALTH AND PROMOTE THE PUBLIC WELFARE OF THE CITY OF EARTH, TEXAS, BY PROVIDING FOR THE FILLING UP AND DRAINAGE OF LOTS THAT SHALL HAVE UNWHOLESONE PLACES OR PLACES WHERE STAGNANT WATER MAY ACCUMULATE THEREON; THE CLEANING OF ANY BUILDING OR PREMISES OF FILTH, CARRION OTHER IMPURE AND UNWHOLESONE MATTER; REQUIRING OWNERS OR OCCUPANTS OF LOTS IN THE CITY OF EARTH TO KEEP SAID LOTS FREE FROM JUNKED MOTOR VEHICLES, OR ANY OTHER RECEPTACLE CONDUCTIVE TO THE SPREAD OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE, WEEDS, RUBBISH, BRUSH AND OTHER UNSIGHTLY OR UNSANITARY MATTER; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE TO BE GIVEN TO OWNERS OR PREMISES IN CASE OF FAILURE OF OWNER TO MAKE LOTS AND/OR PREMISES SANITARY AND SIGHTLY THAT THE SAME MAY BE DONE AT THE EXPENSE OF THE CITY OF EARTH; DECLARING SAME A PUBLIC NUISANCE WITH CERTAIN EXCEPTIONS; PROVIDING FOR THE FIXING OF A LIEN AGAINST SUCH LOTS FOR SUCH IMPROVEMENT; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY; AND REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. 60.

WHEREAS, it is deemed by the City Council of the City of Earth, Texas, that it is dangerous to the public health for lots in the City of Earth to have places thereon where stagnant water may accumulate and for filth, carrion or other impure and unwholesome matter to accumulate on lots in said City and that it is dangerous to public health and constitutes a fire hazard to have weeds, brush, rubbish, and other unsightly and unsanitary matter on lots in the City of Earth including junked motor vehicles which are and constitute a public nuisance; and

WHEREAS, it is expressly provided by the provisions of Article 4436, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, that cities shall have the power to correct the evils hereinbefore recited;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EARTH:

SECTION 1: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation who shall own or occupy any lot or lots in the City of Earth, Texas, to permit or allow holes or places on said lots where water may accumulate and become stagnant, or to permit same to remain.

SECTION 2: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation who shall own or occupy any lot or lots in the City of Earth, Texas, to permit or allow the accumulation of stagnant water thereon, or to permit same to remain.

SECTION 3: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation who shall own or occupy any house, building, establishment, lot or yard in the City of Earth to permit or allow any carrion, filth or other impure or unwholesome matter to accumulate or remain thereon, including, but not by way of limitation, junked motor vehicles, or any other receptacle conducive to the spread of infectious disease.

SECTION 4: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation who shall own or occupy any lot or lots in the City of Earth, Texas, to allow weeds, rubbish, brush or other unsightly, objectionable or unsanitary matter to accumulate or grow on said lot or lots.

SECTION 5: Junked motor vehicles as herein used shall be described as any motor vehicle which does not have lawfully affixed thereto both an unexpired license plate or plates and a valid motor vehicle safety inspection certificate, and the condition of which is one or more of the following:

- (a) Wrecked
- (b) Dismantled
- (c) Inoperative
- (d) Partially dismantled
- (e) Abandoned
- (f) Discarded

SECTION 6: The presence of any junked motor ve-

hicle on any private lot, tract or parcel of land, or portion thereof, occupied shall be deemed a public nuisance; and it shall be unlawful for any person to cause or maintain such a public nuisance by wrecking, dismantling, partially dismantling, rendering inoperable, abandoning or discarding any motor vehicle on the real property of another or to suffer, permit or allow any junked motor vehicle to be parked, left or maintained on his own real property, provided that this Section shall not apply with regard to:

- (a) Any junked motor vehicle in an enclosed building;
- (b) Any junked motor vehicle on the premises of a business enterprise operated in a lawful manner, when necessary, to the operation of such business enterprise; or
- (c) Any junked motor vehicle in an appropriate storage place or depository maintained at the location officially designated and in a manner approved by the City of Earth or arranged in such a way that the Sanitation Department of the City of Earth may by the use of chemicals or other means render such articles to an acceptable degree of sanitation.

SECTION 7: The decision of whether or not a given condition or conditions exists which may constitute a violation of this ordinance shall rest solely with the Mayor, the City Health Officer, or the Head of the Sanitation Department.

SECTION 8: Should any owner of such lot or lots that have places thereon where stagnant water may accumulate and/or which are not properly drained, or the owner of any premises or building, junked motor vehicles, or any other receptacle conducive to the spread of infectious disease, upon which carrion, filth or other impure or unwholesome matter may be found and/or refuse to drain and/or fill the same lot or lots, or remove such filth, carrion, or other impure or unwholesome matter, as the case may be, within ten days after notice to said owner to do so, in writing, or by letter addressed to such owner at his post office address or within ten days after notice by publication as many as two times within ten consecutive days in any newspaper in Texas, if personal service may not be had as aforesaid, or if the owner's address be not known; then in that event, the City of Earth, Texas, may do such filling or draining, or removal of filth, carrion, etc., or any other unsightly, objectionable or unsanitary matter, or cause the same to be done and may pay therefor and charge the expenses incurred in doing such work or having such work done or improvements made to the owner of such lot or lots or real estate, and if such work is done or improvements made at the expense of the City of Earth, Texas, then such expense or expenses shall be assessed on the real estate or lots upon which such expense was incurred.

SECTION 9: Should any owner of any lot or lots within the City of Earth, Texas, who shall allow weeds, rubbish, brush or any other unsightly objectionable or unsanitary matter to grow or accumulate thereon, fail and/or refuse to cut down and/or remove such weeds, rubbish, brush or other unsightly, objectionable or unsanitary matter, as the case may be, within ten days after notice to said owner to do so, in writing, or by letter addressed to such owner at his post office address, or within ten days after notice by publication as many as two times within ten consecutive days in any newspaper in Texas, if personal service may not be had as aforesaid, or if the owner's address be not known; then in that event, the City of Earth, Texas, may do such cutting down and/or removing such weeds, rubbish, brush or any other unsightly, objectionable or unsanitary matter, or cause the same to be done any way may pay therefor, and charge the expenses incurred in doing such work or having such work done or improvements made to the owner of such lot or lots or real estate; and, if such work is done or improvements made at the expenses of the City of Earth, Texas, then such expenses shall be assessed on the real estate or lot or lots upon which such expense was incurred.

SECTION 10: The Mayor, the City Health Officer or the Head of the Sanitation Department, of the City of Earth shall file a statement of such expenses incurred under Section 8 or under Section 9 of this Ordinance, as the case may be, giving the amount of such expenses, the date on which said work was done or improvements made, with the County Clerk of Lamb County, Texas, and the City of Earth, Texas, shall have a privileged lien on such lot or lots or real estate upon which said work was done or improvements made to secure the expenditures so made, in accordance with the provisions of said Article 4436, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, which said lien shall be second only to tax liens and liens for street improvements; and said amount shall bear ten per cent interest from the date said statement was filed. It is further provided that for any such expenditures, and interest, as aforesaid suit may be instituted and recovery and foreclosure of said lien may be had in the name of the City of Earth, Texas; and the statement of expenses so made, as aforesaid, or a certified copy thereof, shall be prima facie proof of the amount expended for such work or improvements.

SECTION 11: Any person, firm or individual who shall violate any of the provisions of the Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) and each and every day's violation shall constitute a separate and distinct offense, in case the owner or occupant of any lot, lots, or premises under the provision of this Ordinance shall be a corporation, and shall violate any provision of this Ordinance, the President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer or such corporation or any manager, agent or employee of such corporation shall be also severally liable for the penalties herein provided. Ordinance No. 60 is hereby repealed.

SECTION 12: If any part of this Ordinance is, or should be held invalid for any reason, then that fact shall not invalidate the entire Ordinance, the balance thereof shall remain in full force and effect.

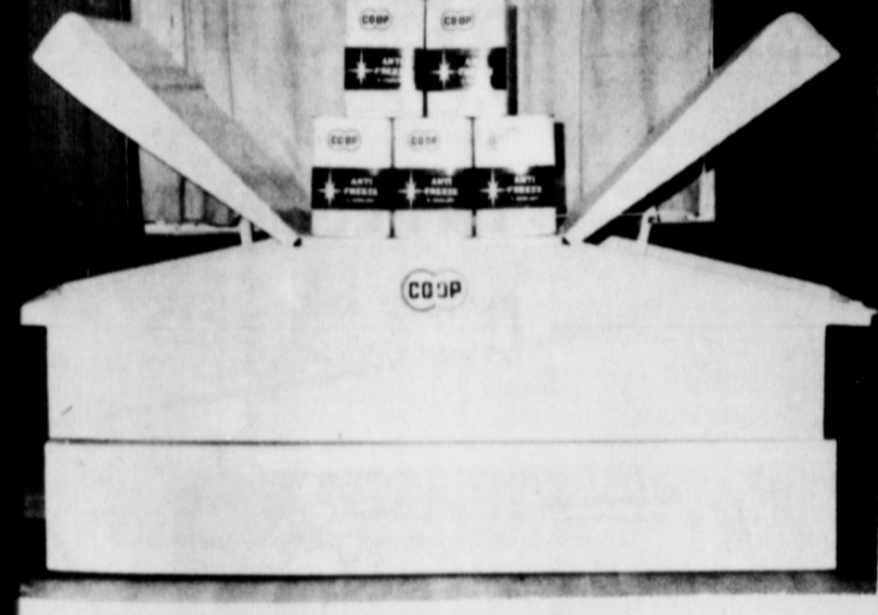
SECTION 13: All other Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed, and of no further force and effect.

## Sen. Jack Hightower To Speak to Masons Here

Upon graduation he established a law practice in Vernon, Texas, and was elected to the Texas House of Representatives in 1952. He did not seek re-election to this position, but was appointed District Attorney in January, 1955, serving until he resigned in December, 1961. He was elected to the Texas Senate in 1964 where he has made an outstanding record. He has served on all of the major committees. In the regular session of 1971 he was elected President Pro Tempore, a position which placed him third in line for the governorship. On April 3, 1971, during the absence from the state of the Governor and Lieutenant-Governor, he served as Acting Governor.

Senator Hightower served as President of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association, and was appointed by Governor Price Daniel to the Texas Law Enforcement Commission. He has also served as a Vice-President of the Texas Junior Bar Association.

In 1962, Governor Daniel appointed Senator Hightower to the Board of Regents of Midwestern University, where he served as Vice-Chairman until his election to the Texas Senate in 1964.

Senator Hightower is married, the father of three daughters, and an active church man. He has served on the Board of Directors of The Baptist Standard, and is now serving on the Human Welfare Commission of Texas Baptists. In May, 1971, he was honored by Howard Payne College with an honorary Doctor of Laws degree.

Senator Hightower has a distinguished record of service in the Masonic fraternity. He has served in positions of leadership in both the York Rite in which he is a Knight of the

York Cross of Honor, and Scottish Rite in which he holds the 33°. He is a Past District Deputy Grand Master, Past Workshop Chairman, Past Grand Orator and former Chairman of the Masonic Jurisprudence Committee. In December, 1971, he was elected Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Texas.

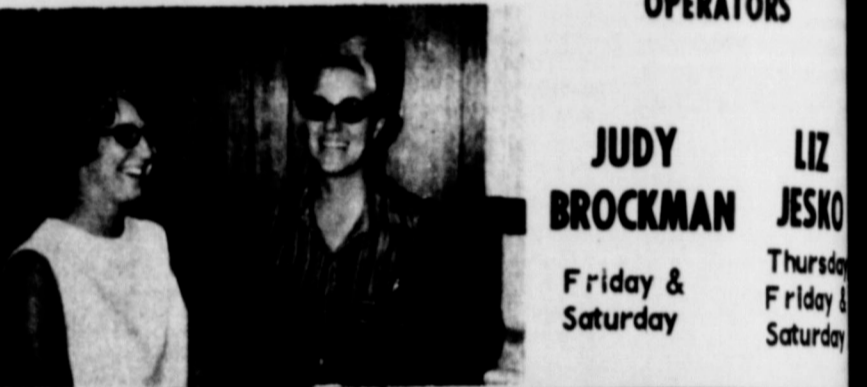

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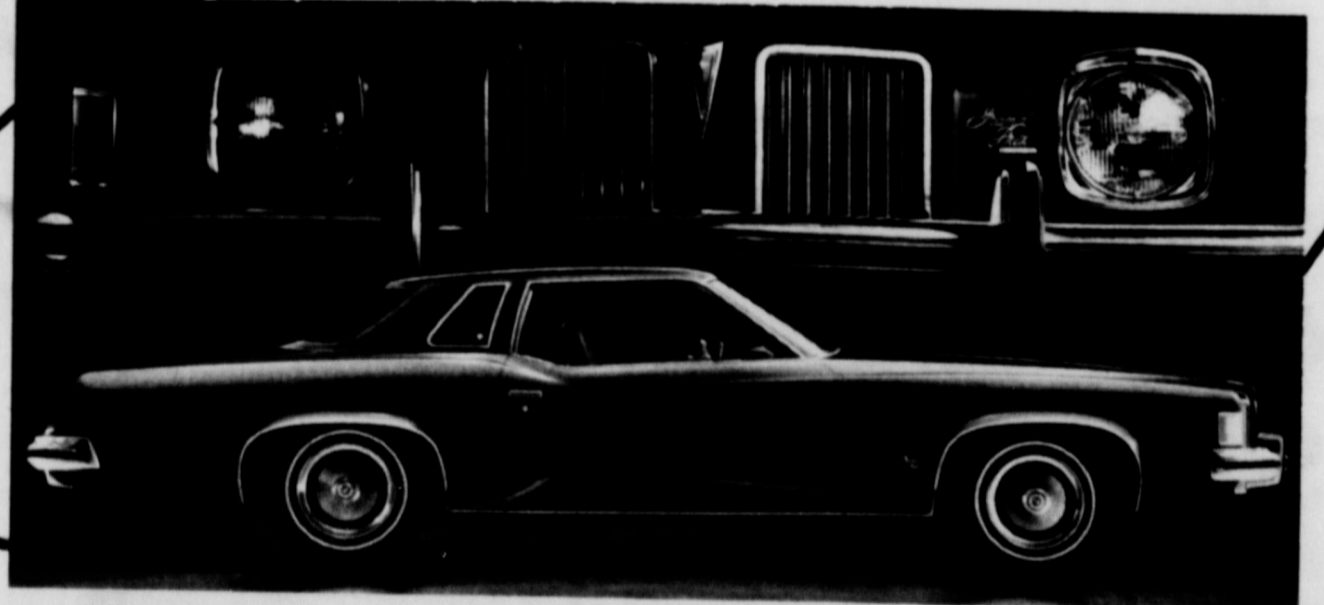

## L.C. Rudd Found Dead in Pickup

L.C. "Christie" Rudd, a 53-year-old Sudan farmer, was found dead in his pickup on the Ray Woods farm five miles west of Sudan in an abandoned garage about 1 p.m. Thursday. He was well known in Earth, having visited here with his sister, Faye Adrian, who is a former resident of Earth.

His pickup was seen by his aunt, who told his uncle, Lee Hardy, who went to the scene and found him lying in the seat.

Rudd had been missing since Aug. 29 and Justice of the Peace W. T. Vereen of Sudan said he had been dead a week or ten days when he was found.

Vereen said a plastic hose was connected to the exhaust pipe of the truck and run through the left window of the cab. He ruled the death due to self-inflated carbon monoxide poisoning.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday morning in the Sudan First Baptist Church, with Rev. J.R. Manning, pastor of the Kermit First Baptist Church and Rev. Eddie Freeman of the First Baptist Church in Sudan officiating.

Rudd was born December 25, 1918 at Altus, Oklahoma, and lived at Sudan since 1926.

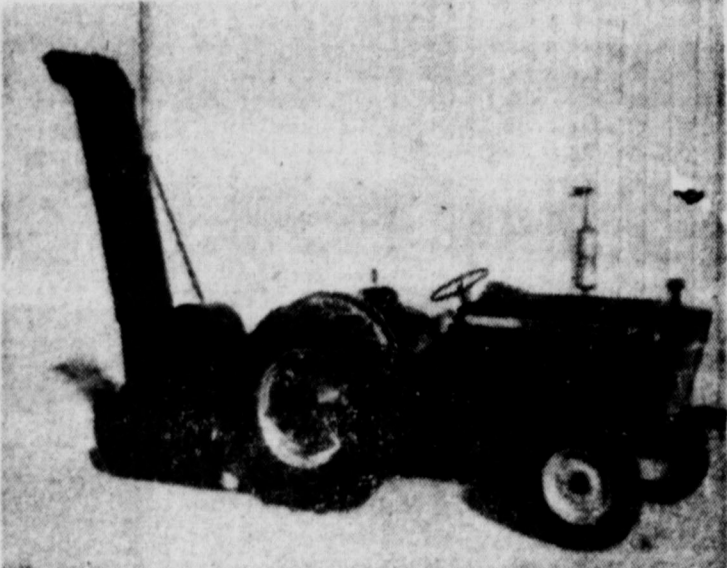
He was a veteran of World War II, and was a member of the First Baptist Church of Sudan and the Sudan Masonic Lodge.

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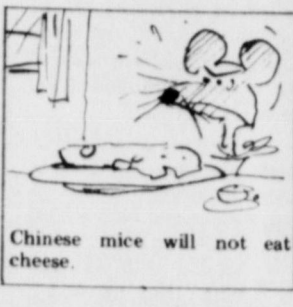
