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Commissioners Seek Solution To Paving Bill Problem

Lamb County commissioners, officials from the City of Earth, and a representative from Jake Diel Paving, met in the Commissioners' meeting room in the Lamb County Courthouse to discuss the debt which was incurred with the paving of a county road running to the Springlake-Earth School.

County Judge Don Joyner said, that because the court did not approve the project, and did not advertise for competitive bids, the court could not legally pay for the more than \$3,000 debt, although

the county received benefits.

However, the Commissioners' Court said they would place the matter on their next meeting agenda, to vote on whether they would pay for the paving, provided a legal way to pay for the project could be determined.

Judge Joyner advised, "I feel the court will pay the debt, if a legal way can be found," and again emphasized they would have to take definite action in the next meeting. He said, "We're not objecting to

payment, if we can do it legally. We'd like to get it settled."

Earth's city attorney Andy Stroebel and County Attorney Curtis Wilkinson have been working on the case, attempting to find a legal way to pay the debt, and the court is now waiting on the Attorney

General's opinion. County Attorney Wilkinson advised he has written the Attorney General, asking "not for a formal new opinion," but an opinion on cases already settled on similar matters throughout the state.

Judge Joyner said, "the court feels that the contractor should have seen that things were in order" before they began doing the work.

Warner Lawson, a representative from Jake Diel's paving, advised they could not check out every contract because of the legal involvement, and he said that the contract stated that a county road was to be included in the work.

Commissioner Jack Peel brought up the question of whether one governing body could act

for another on advertising for bids. Judge Joyner advised the commissioners have to meet, pass an order to advertise for bids, and advertise before any joint action can be taken. Judge

Kelly advised that he heard no more about it until about a week after bids were opened.

Larry Tunnell, who was mayor of Earth at that time, advised that the school board, Clarence Kelley and the city council had met to discuss the paving, and that Kelley was later invited to the bid opening, "but nobody showed up."

City attorney Stroebel asked Commissioner Kelley if he was satisfied with the paving job, and Kelley said he "was not". Kelley continued, "I'll take any of you out there and show you why I'm not satisfied."

And when Stroebel asked him what was wrong, Kelley said, "they didn't put enough stuff on it." Diel's representative said the job was under warranty, and "we're obligated to get the job done to specifications."

Earth representatives asked if the county could take new bids on the

project and in some way come up with paying for the previous job. Again, the court advised they could not, until a legal way could be found.

Earth officials said they "had had more cooperation from the court today, than they have had in several months," and they thanked the court for hearing their side of the situation.

Judge Joyner assured them, "We certainly don't want to alienate you from the rest of the county, and we want to do what is right to resolve the problem."

Bank Deposits

Deposits and loans for the first quarter of 1977 in the eight Lamb County area banking institutions are up considerably from the same period of 1976.

Total deposits are up \$9,623,713.50 and loans are up \$8,633,911.71 from the January 1-March 31 period of last year.

Total deposits on the call date were \$115,470,903.50, compared to \$105,847,190 for 1976.

First Federal Savings and Loans of Littlefield showed savings of \$31,295,162, up \$4,330,020 from last year's \$26,965,142. Loans were \$26,125,618, up \$3,544,728 from last year's \$22,580,890.

Deposits at Littlefield's Security State Bank totaled \$26,978,804.39, which revealed a net increase of \$1,424,806.27 over last year's \$25,553,998.12. Loans and discounts for the first quarter of this year are \$10,455,221.31, a net increase of \$870,487.51 over last year's \$9,584,733.80.

Olton State Bank deposits totaled \$20,851,868.89, which reveals an increase of about \$2,230,868.89 over last year's \$18,621,000. Loans and discounts are up \$1,462,072.45, from \$13,385,000 to this quarter's figure of \$14,847,072.45.

The First National Bank of Littlefield reported deposits totaling \$8,964,342.39 up \$432,700.66 from last year's figure of \$8,531,641.73. Loans and discounts are up \$1,295,510.12 or from \$2,193,265.26 in 1976 to this year's \$3,488,775.38.

Citizens State Bank of Earth showed deposits of \$8,535,892.89, up \$210,892.89 from last year's \$8,325,000. Loans are up \$720,744.48 from \$5,957,000 in 1976 to this year's \$6,677,744.48.



IRS Urges Private Applicators Training Check SSN Program Set

Taxpayers should make sure that the correct social security numbers are listed on their 1977 tax returns. When an incorrect social security number appears, the processing of the return is slowed and any refund due could be delayed, the Internal Revenue Service said.

To help avoid this problem, taxpayers should use the peel-off label included in the tax package received in the mail. This label contains the name, address and social security number of the taxpayer. If the social security number or other information listed is incorrect, the correct information should be written in right on the label.

If a taxpayer has had a change in name since last year, a local office of the Social Security Administration should be contacted so that the taxpayer's name will correspond to his or her social security number. The social security number of both husband and wife must be listed on joint returns, the IRS said, even for couples with only one income source or one spouse working.

The Private Applicator Certification Training Program, one of the optional means of qualifying for certification as a private applicator of restricted-use pesticides, includes a discussion of laws, labels and labeling, pesticide safety, mixing and calibration and pests and pest damage identification.

The program prepared by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service includes a review of certain questions relating to the information presented.

The program will require approximately 3

1/2 hours. Those attending and seeking certification as private applicators will have an opportunity to complete a Request for Private Applicator Certification which will be forwarded to the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) for issuance of certification.

The law which requires certification of private applicators is the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA), which will be enforced by the Environmental Protection Agency. Under this act, all uses of pesticides will be classified as either registered use or general use, and all applicators—both private and commercial—will be certified as a requisite to legal use or supervision of the use of registered pesticides.

The Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA) as amended, enforced by the Environmental Protection Agency, includes among other requirements (1) the classification of all uses of pesticides as either restricted use or general use and (2) certification of applicators (private and commercial) as a requisite to the legal use or supervision of use of restricted-use pesticides.

The Texas Pesticide Control Act, although not requiring certification of private applicators, authorizes the Commission of Agriculture to establish a program to certify private applicators, on a voluntary basis, who wish to use or supervise the use of

restricted-use pesticides in compliance with federal law.

The term "private applicator" means a certified applicator who uses or supervises the use of any pesticide which is classified for restricted use for purposes of producing any agricultural commodity on property owned or rented by him or his employer or, if applied without compensation other than trading of personal services between producers of agricultural commodities, on the property of another person.

The single-product, single-purchase, single-use certification for emergency situations will be available as restricted-use pesticides

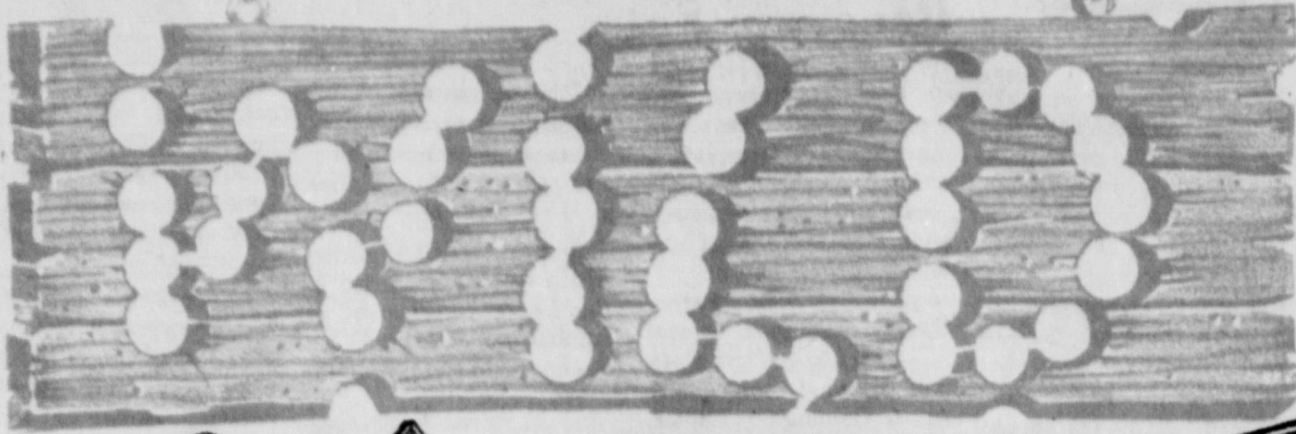
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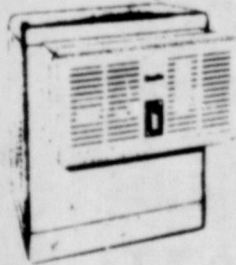
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
