

# Local Man Director Of Quality Fiber Control

In order to advance with modern day times, and to insure each of their customers the very best returns from their cotton a group of West Texas Independent ginners have financed the purchase of \$60,000 worth of automated fiber testing equipment to test cotton samples from their gins.

R. H. Belew, owner-manager of the Earth Gin is one of the directors in the expansion of Quality Fiber Control. Others in the area who are members of the newly organized Quality Fiber Control Inc., a Corporation formed by the independent ginners, include, Barton Bros. Gin in Earth, Nickels Gin, near Pleasant Valley, Campbell Cotton Gin in Earth, at Dodd, Springlake Gin Company in Springlake and Morrison Gin at Sunnyside. At present there are 80 members of the QFC, each ginner has purchased \$1,000.00 in stock in order to finance the purchase of the automated fiber testing equipment.

The ginner then joined hands with the Textile Research Center at Texas Tech in Lubbock to aid the merchandising of area Produced Cotton this fall. The equipment has been loaned to Tech Textile Research Center to be used in the fiber Lab to Test Cotton Samples sent in by QFC. They in turn will furnish the ginner with precise information on length, strength, fineness, color and preparation. Houston Swett, Lubbock, is president of Quality Fiber Control. He believes the arrangement with the TIC will result in better bale values for producers and more interest in South Plains cotton by mill buyers who want all the information they can get about spinning performance and fiber properties. Quality Fiber Control arrangement with Tech's fiber lab is for one year. It will be decided at the end of the period whether the arrangement will be continued. Mr. Belew, has nothing but praise for the entire operation, he said it was a dream come true for ginners and cotton producers on The Plains.

## TANE Representative To Speak At Earth Churches

Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education (TANE) representatives will speak in two Earth churches on Sunday, November 3. The two churches are the First Baptist Church and the Mt. Zion Baptist Church.

TANE speakers, ministers and laymen of several Christian denominations, speak in some 2,500 churches in Texas each year. The organization is dedicated to the prevention of problems that arise from the use of alcohol, narcotics, and other dangerous drugs. TANE programs include public school assembly programs publishing, production of audio visual aids, legislative information service, free film lending library, and an annual school on alcohol and narcotics studies, sponsored jointly by TANE and Baylor University.

TANE's books and film strips, geared to prevent alcohol and drug problems, have been distributed throughout the English-speaking world. Some are being translated into other languages for use in the Far East and South America.

A non-profit, educational organization, TANE is supported financially by Texas churches of 19 denominations. "The speaker's purpose in visiting a church is not to reach drunks and narcotics addicts, but to report to the church on alcohol and drug problems, what can be done, and what is being done about them," said Rev. Albert F. Tucker, TANE Executive Director.

## Tuesday Is The Day To Pick Your New President

Millions of concerned Americans in every state of the USA will be going to the polls Tuesday, November 5 to cast their vote and elect new leaders for the nation.

Polls have been taken throughout various areas of the country in an effort to produce a cross-section report and tabulate the pulse of America. Although the polls have revealed slightly varying reports as the tempo increased through the long weeks of campaigning, they have definitely shown a people concerned about their country. For all know it is the citizens at the polls who will make the final decision.

Voters in this county will receive a ballot bearing 40 candidates seeking the twenty-eight National, State and County offices available. Of this number 28 are Democrats with a full and complete ticket. Only eleven of these offices are contested, these are contested by this states fastest growing Republican party. The American party has only one candidate on the ballot they are seeking the Presidential office. At the bottom of the ballot are fourteen amendments voters are expected to vote for candidates and amendments by placing an X in the box beside their choice.

The remaining 17 offices have no opponents. Those running for offices are: J. R. (Dick) Brown (Democrat) and Bob Price (Republican) for U.S. Representative, 18th Congressional District; Penston Smith (Democrat) and Paul Eggers (Republican) for Lieutenant Governor; Crawford C. Martin (Democrat) and Sproesser Wynn (Republican) for Attorney General; Robert S. Calvert (Democrat) John M. Bennett, Jr. (Republican) for Comptroller of Public Accounts; Jesse James (Democrat) and Manuel Sanchez (Republican) for State Treasurer; Jerry Sadler (Democrat) and Millard K. Neptum (Republican) for Commissioner of General Land Office; John C. White (Democrat) and E. G. Schuhardt, II (Republican) for Commissioner of Agriculture; Jim C. Langdon (Democrat) and Jim Segrest (Republican) for Railroad Commissioner; and Bill Clayton (Democrat) and Frank Ford (Republican) for State Representative, District 72.

The American Party ticket will go as it reads on the ballot, and voters will not be required to write in the name of Le May as the Vice-Presidential candidate. To indicate the tremendously heavy voting expected in this election there has been a total of 241 absentee votes cast in the county, 95 of these votes were by mail. Absentee voting will end Friday, November 1 at 5:00 p. m. Ballots will be accepted through the mail however through noon on election day. Absolutely no applications for ballots through the mail will be filled Friday.

In the general election of 1964 there were 6,565 votes cast in the county, with 382 of these as absentees. Polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m. over the county. Polling places in the county are:

The Springlake-Earth Wolverines did a complete about face Friday night, after playing their best game of the year against Farwell and then fell to pieces and played their worst game of the year, getting defeated by the Bovina Mustangs 28-14.

The offense could do nothing but fumble the ball and they gave the Mustangs good field position 5 times on penalties and had six penalties for illegal procedure, roughing the passer, and holding which gave Bovina good field position each and every time. On the next series of downs, Stanberry was held for no gain, on second attempt picked up 3 yards and on third down Beauchamp hit McMeans for 8 yards and a first down. Quarterback Beauchamp rolled out on a keeper, netting 2 yards and then handed off to McMeans for 3, Stanberry picked up only 2 yards and Bovina was penalized for backfield in motion. Stanberry tried his luck once more, but picked up only 3 yards and the ball went over to the

Wolverines on the 4 yard line. Deep in the hole, Hoyt sent Bridge up the middle on 2 plays picking up a first down and Tony Barton rolled to the outside for no gain and a backfield in motion penalty made it first and 15 and once more Tony was stopped at the line of scrimmage for no gain. With the ball resting on the 8 yard line Hoyt rolled to his left and found plenty of space to run and scampered 92 yards for the first score of the night. Bridge kick for extra point was no good and with 11:07 left in the first half, the Wolverines were out in front 6-0.

Bovina returned the ball out to the 25 yard line on the kickoff and on first down Beauchamp missed Murphy on a pass and a roughing the passer penalty gave the Mustangs a first down on the 40 yard line. McMeans was trapped on a pitchout by Haberer and dropped for a loss of 8, Poyce Sisk rolled out and picked up a first down for Bovina. Staying with Sisk, on 3 plays, netting only 6 yards, Bovina was forced to punt to the 22 yard line.

Hoyt elected to roll out on the first play getting 4 yards for his effort. On second down Barton went up the middle for 3 but a holding penalty was called and it set up a second down and 20. 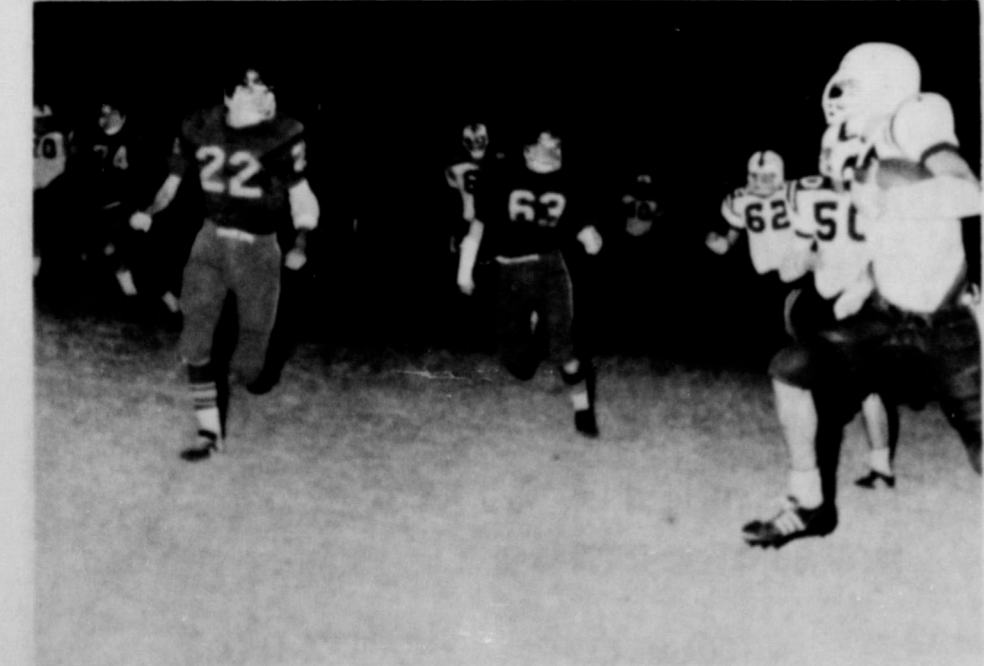

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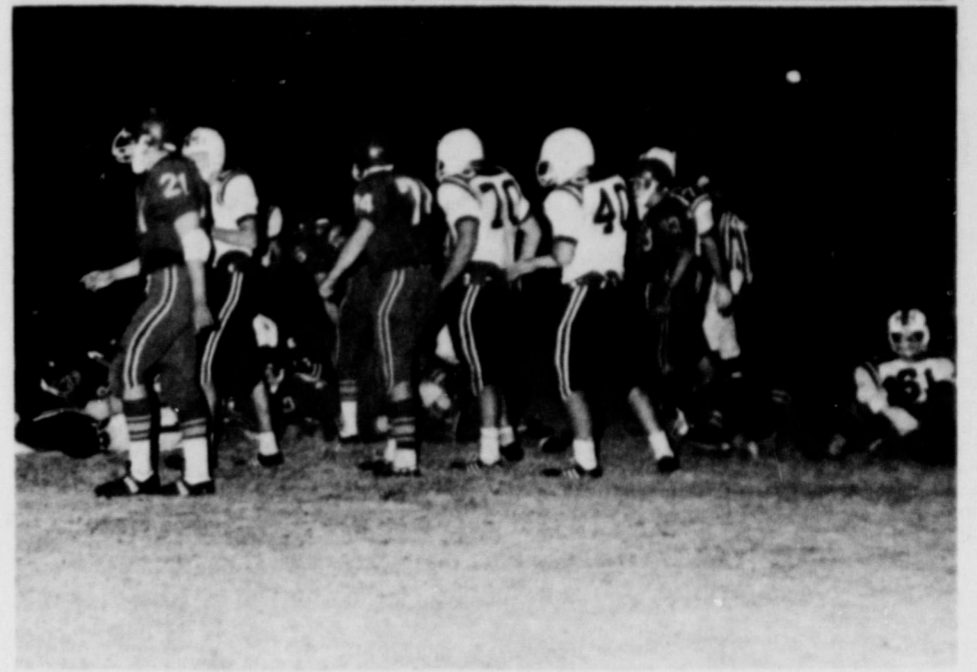

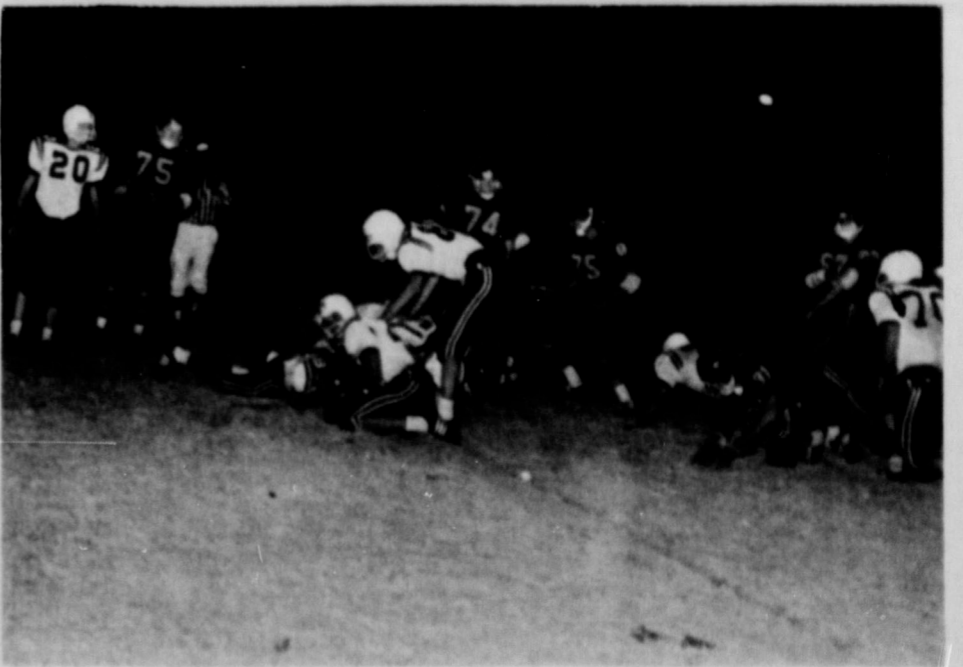

The members of this organization urge that the voters give this amendment their approval. It will cause no one an increase of expense. The present Teachers' Retirement Provision places \$8 400 as the ceiling on which individual teacher's annual salary is the principal from which a percentage may be paid into Teacher's Retirement Fund.

The proposed amendment will permit all Texas teachers to pay retirement funds out of their total salary even though it may exceed \$8400. Please give this amendment your careful consideration.
