Strong men blocked the doorway, holding the others back. Not one of the 26 people who had sought shelter in the cellar were hurt. Nothing was left standing of the Ben Waters home where this cellar is located or his brother John's home which was only 100 yards away.

Tornadoes Strike Plains, Lamb Area Hit

A series of destructive tornadoes lashed across a wide area of the Central South Plains Sunday night demolishing at least twenty homes and injuring at least twenty-five persons.

The vicious funnel snaked its way across country dipping near Whitehall, Spade, Littlefield, Hart Camp, Anton, Lubbock and Shallowater.

Mrs. Joe Prater of Spade told how she watched the funnel approach and strike the home of her neighbor, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Padon, but since neither had telephones there was no way to warn them.

Mr. and Mrs. King of Spade, also neighbors of the Padons said when they saw the funnel approaching their home they all rushed for the cellar, but before they could get out the back door the storm hit, trapping the five members of the King family in a small closet like room in the southwest corner. This was the only part of the King

home left standing. The family was uninjured.

The Three Waters brothers homes in Whitehall was destroyed. Two brothers Ben and John's homes were only 100 yards apart. Bud Waters home is located one mile north.

In the John Waters home 26 people sought shelter from the storm several tourists returning from their Easter Holiday trips. None were injured, but nothing was left erect on the farm. The two homes, barns, pump house and brooder house, also the farm equipment was demolished. A tractor setting near by was started and the plows dropped in the ground and plowed right through the foundation of the house as the house was blown away. The seven automobiles around the house was completely wrecked.

The Hart Camp Area received severe damage as several homes were wrecked and some demolished as the tornado swooped low cutting its vicious path across the community.

Eldon had also been active in sports having played on the basketball team for three years, participated in baseball one year and one year on the track team.

In addition to school activities, Eldon is a member of the First Baptist Church. He plays the guitar in the local Western Band known as the "Rock-Its."

Eldon plans to attend college. Carolyn has attended Springlake school all of her life and is the seventeen year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gardner Sanderson, who reside on a farm north of Earth. She has been active in F. H. A. and Pep Squad throughout high school.

In addition to school activities, Carolyn is a member of the Literary Events of the Interscholastic League and placed first in poetry reading and third in short hand her senior year. Carolyn was valedictorian of her class when she finished Junior high.

Carolyn was first place winner in the District Lamb County Soil Conservation essay contest. The X. I. T. Study Club of Springlake sponsored her as Youth of the Year.

She is a member of the First Baptist Church and sings in the Choir.

Carolyn plans to attend West Texas State College.

Grade averages were based on the last two years of high school and included only regular academic work subjects and did not include band, football or P. E.

Earth and the surrounding area are indeed thankful as all the area received were dark clouds, severe rainstorms and tornado warnings which sent people in the Earth area scurrying to storm cellars, Sunday night.

The rainstorms and tornado warnings began about 6:00 p. m. Sunday evening and continued until midnight, with Earth receiving two inches of much needed rain.

Members of the Earth Ground Observer Corp. were in the observation tower Sunday night from about 7 p. m. to midnight.

The vigil of watching over our City was in good hands as members were sent to points out of the City to watch while others manned the post. Messages were transferred back and forth by another group.

All the church services were dismissed early to allow the people to seek shelter. Tornadoes were sighted several times near Earth but none was reported to hit the ground.

Tornado warnings were lifted around 10:00 a. m. Monday morning into effect again Monday morning by 9:00 a. m.

A twister was reported to be forming in the Springlake area around 10:00 a. m. Monday morning. Instructions were broadcast over the radio and television to seek shelter, either in storm cellars, basements or the southwest corner of the building. School children should not congregate in auditoriums or gymnasiums.

Several parents picked up their children at school by 11:00 in order to have them near a storm cellar.

The Tornado warning from the local observer Corp. will be one long blast of the fire siren.

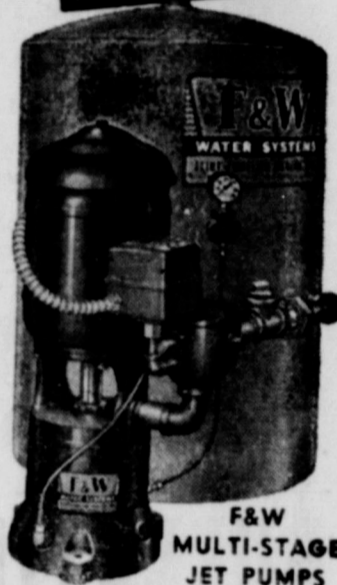

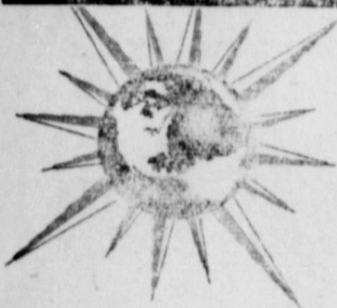
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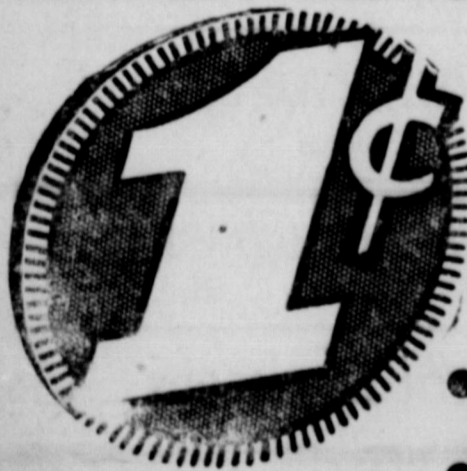

Wage Increases

Granted General

Telephone Employees

General Telephone Company of the Southwest and the Communications Workers of America, Local 6180, have signed a 12-month contract after 31 days of negotiating, according to F. W. Hamper, Industrial Relations Director for the Company.

Highlights of the new contract include increased wages and benefits which amount to nearly one-half million dollars and a provision which will allow the company to schedule plant craft employees on other than a five consecutive work week.

Wage increases up to twelve cents an hour were granted depending upon the group and classification of the employee.

Some employees of the former Texas and Oklahoma Telephone Companies will receive additional wage increases in order to place them on the General Telephone Company wage schedules.

The new work schedule feature will give the company an opportunity to provide a more effective and efficient method of scheduling work forces.

Other provisions under the new contract will make changes in termination allowances, military leave town reclassification, and double time on certain Sunday work schedules. A new agreement was also reached on a plan for employee disability benefits.

Insecticides In Your Back Yard

AUSTIN -- Between now and fall, insecticides in back yard gardens will fog the air like smoke as the annual battle between gardener and garden pests is joined in earnest. Farmers will fight with spray planes and aerosol mists as a summer sun brings maturity to insect-vulnerable field crops.

Inevitable, the insect will lose.

A single breath of lethal spray, a single drop on his tiny body, a single bite of spray-covered grass and his doom is sealed. He has a single consolation -- a grim, but satisfying one: his executioner, being human is liable to the human disease of carelessness. Which could mean that the man behind the spray gun stands a fair chance of being himself a victim of the very weapon he employs against the insects.

So it is that the executive becomes the executed. Modern insecticides and miticides -- including the deadly "organic phosphates" -- allow slight margin for error. Improperly used, they have a high toxicity for warm-blooded animals -- including humans -- as they have for insects.

Does their danger restrict their use? Yes, but only to a certain extent. Skilled doctors and chemical engineers in the State Health Department's Division of Occupational Health and chemical engineers in the State Health Department's Division of Occupational Health, while acknowledging the dangers of careless use, say: "Any poison, however toxic, can be used with safety when proper precautions are taken."

It is for this reason that the State Department of Health, in cooperation with the Texas Medical Association and Texas Agricultural Extension Service, has undertaken to acquaint as many persons as possible with exactly what those precautions are. The project has taken this form:

Kits of material on every conceivable phase of insecticide usage including the composition of poisons and their relative toxicity, and a description of insects and mites each is effective against, have been made available for pest-control agents, veterinarians, and county agents. Also contained in the kits are guide sheets listing laboratories prepared to perform highly complicated blood tests for cholinesterase activity, how specimens should be prepared, and the limits of exposure to potent insecticides.

What To Do In a Tornado

All the information is the latest obtainable (condensed to bare essentials for quick reading and reference. The intention is to make the office of every doctor and every county agent an information center in the safe use of economic poisons.

Still, the burden of safe use will always be on the person behind the spray gun. He is the one who must follow the instructions on the manufacturers' label. He is the one who must guard other people and livestock against wind drifts containing spray. He is the one who must make sure he is gloved and casked and properly clothed before using the poisons. He is the one who must be alert to spillage or inhalation.

He is the one who stands to be executed by his own weapon.

● People in open country can view the approach of a tornado and move at right angles to its path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.
● In towns or cities, seek shelter inside, preferably in a substantial building. Stay away from windows.
● The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is safer than in a brick or stone house. If there is no basement, lie down on the first floor under a table or bed (preferably in the southwest corner).
● Urban schools: Stay inside, away from windows; remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums.
● Rural schools of frame construction: Teachers should remove children to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.



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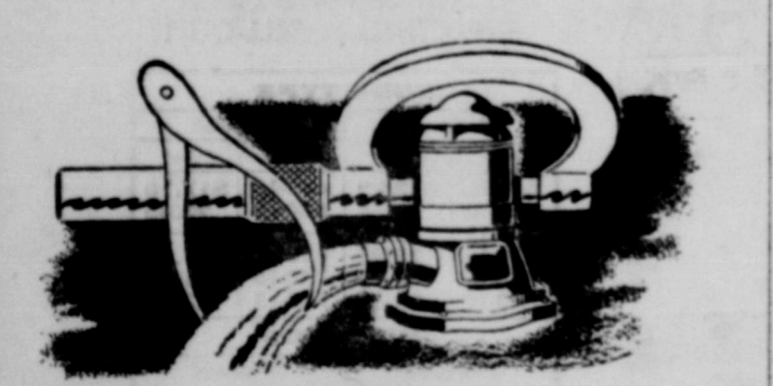
