The Earth Volunteer Fire Department met in a called meeting Monday night to discuss the ways and means to buy a much needed fire truck for the rural area.

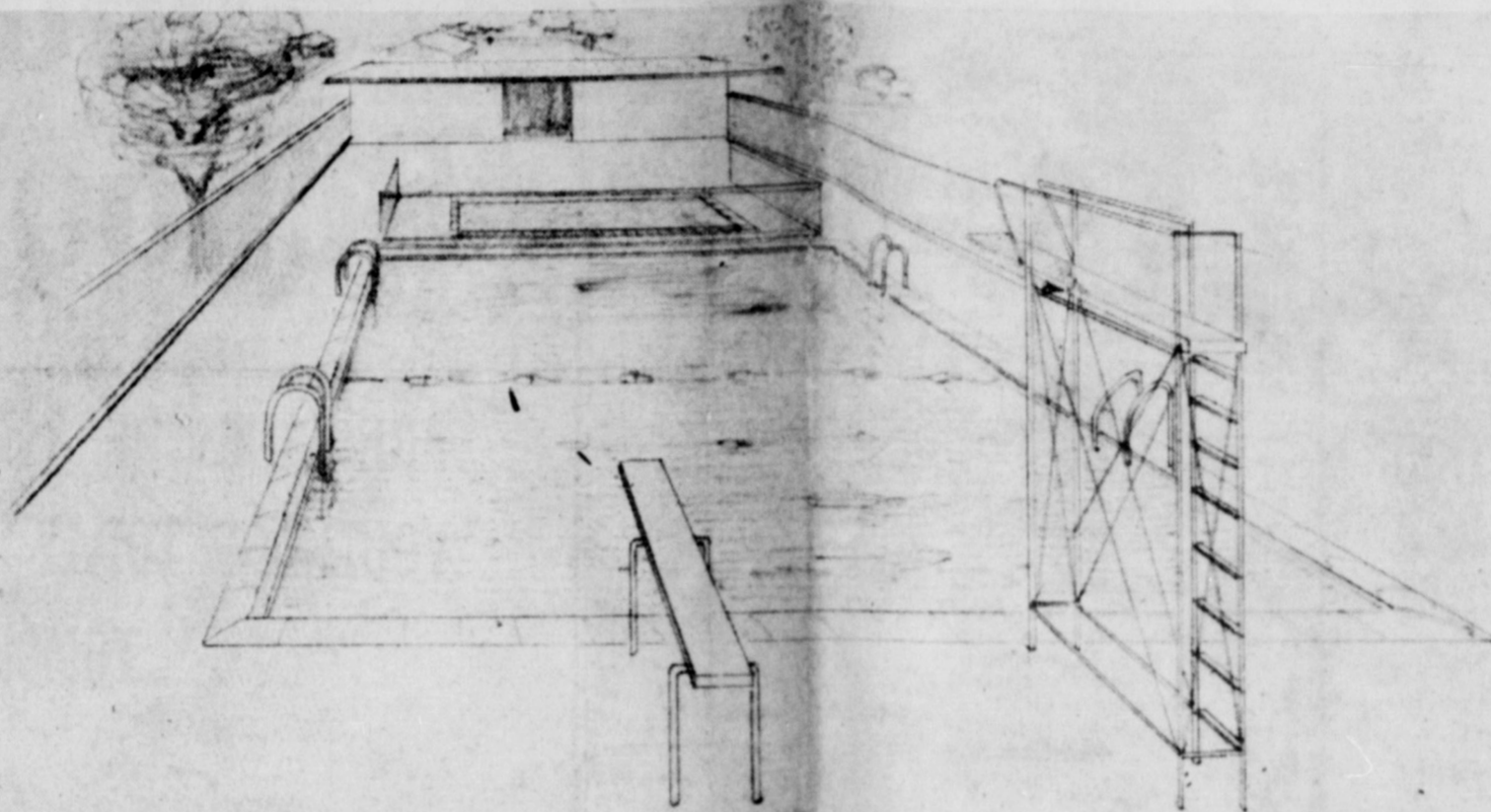
The City Officials were forced to stop the fire truck from going to fires outside the City limits by a clause in the insurance policy stating that the Fire Truck should not leave the City Limits. The truck has been answering rural calls for a number of years hoping a fire would not occur in town at the same time.

A regular meeting of the Fire Department will be held Monday night March 4, and the drive for

Kickoff for the swimming pool fund drive will be Friday, March 1st. The drive will be completed in two weeks, and at least \$25,000 is needed to complete the pool.

The pool and fence will cost approximately \$22,000 with the bath house and decking extra. The F. F. A. Boys are donating their time to do all the concrete work on the decking. Donations in work and hauling material can be accepted to increase individual donations. Nothing has been done on the pledge angle at presstime.

The Finance Committee is composed of Mrs. Bonnie Haberer, Clarence Kelley, Pody Welch, Buzzy Jones, Ardis Barton, Cecil Lemmons, Oliver Tunnell, Bill Beasley, Mike Dent, Marcus Messer, Lynn Glascock and Mrs. Barney Glascock.

Jarvis Angeley, head of the Swimming Pool committee said \$25,000.00 for this community would call for large donations from those who can, and any donation will help toward reaching the goal.

A letter from the Bureau of Internal Revenue, received by Clarence Kelley, stated that all donations to the pool fund would be income tax exemptable.

Plans for a follow up program that will systematically teach the benefits of swimming would follow completion of the pool. He said, "ability to swim widens the hobbies to other water sports. The finished swimmer can teach others.

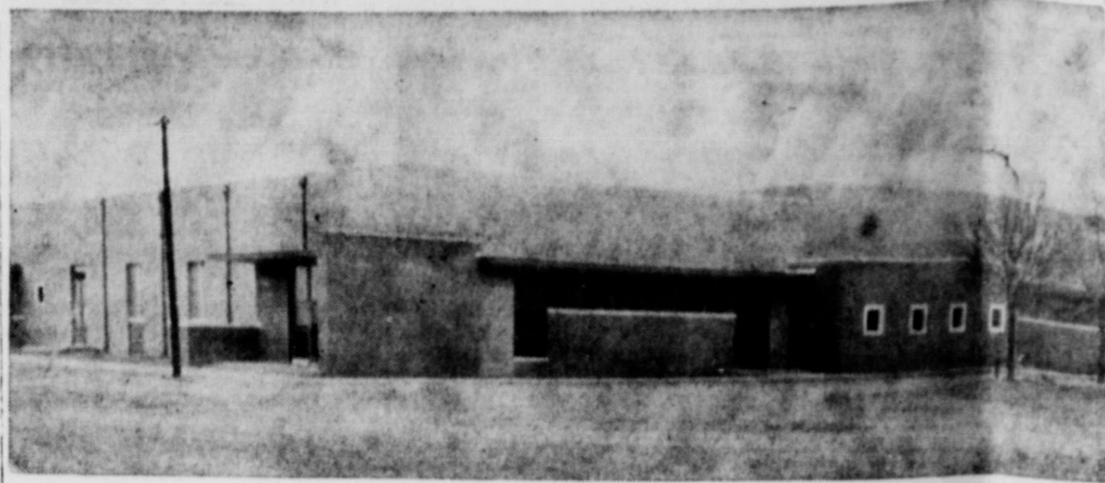

Lower Auto Insurance Aim Of New Bill Introduced In Senate

AUSTIN — Legislation aimed at permitting companies to charge lower automobile insurance rates has been introduced in both houses of the Texas Legislature.

This would be possible when, as the legislation proposes, a flexible rating system is substituted for the present single (for uniform) rating system for determining rates for surety and casualty (including automobile) insurance.

The bills proposed (Senate Bill 26 and House Bill 27) are sponsored by Senator Jarrard Secret of Bell County and Rep. Retzen D. Talasek of Temple.

The sponsors said that many insurance companies were now in a position to charge lower insurance rates, but were not permitted to do so because the State Board of Insurance Commissioners must under the present law set the rate for all companies.

There are several other advantages to the flexible system, such as proposed by the legislation, the sponsors said:

1. A buyer of casualty and auto insurance can shop around to find the lowest rates and best coverage — something he cannot do now because all companies must charge the same rate.

2. The careful driver is penalized under the single rating system. Rates are determined by the State Board of Insurance Commissioners on an average basis. Thus, the careful driver pays the same rate as the careless driver.

3. The auto and casualty insurance business would be put on a competitive basis, rather than on a one-rate basis, with the State fixing the price.

4. The State is now losing nearly \$4,000,000 in taxes a year because much insurance business that should go to companies authorized to operate in Texas is going to "non-admitted" companies that pay no State taxes.

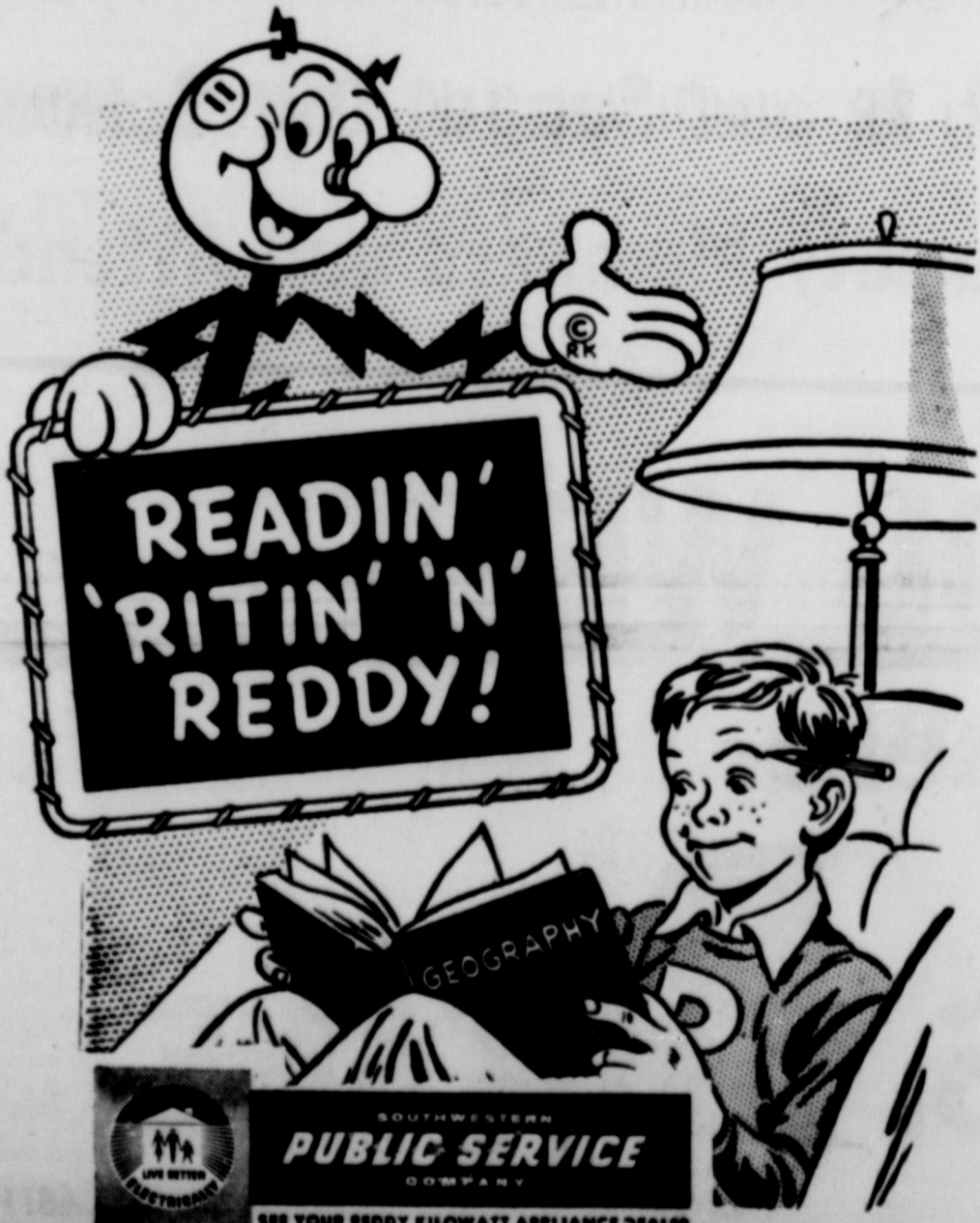

 Our system of public education requires the active interest of all our people, and it is the privilege and likewise the duty of every citizen of the State to cooperate with our respective School Boards, Superintendents, Principals and Teachers in an effort to make Texas Public schools the finest in the Nation.
 Every Texan has the opportunity and the right to attend our public schools and acquire the necessary learning for making an honorable living, as well as an appreciation and understanding of the corresponding duties, obligations and rights of American Citizenship.
 THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of March 4-9, 1957, as
PUBLIC SCHOOL WEEK in Texas, and urge each and every citizen to visit a public school during this period so that all may become personally acquainted with the accomplishments and the improvements of our educational system.
 In witness whereof, I hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of Texas to be affixed this 15th day of January, 1957.

LAW OF OTHER STATES
 We're all proud that Texas is a growing state. Each year thousands of people swarm here from other parts of the country to benefit from the many opportunities in business and industry. In addition to their skill and brainpower, these newcomers bring with them a variety of legal papers and ideas which are based upon the laws of other states.

We don't always remember that federal laws are only a part of our system and that each of the 48 states has "reserved powers" under the constitution to make its own laws. "States' rights" is one of the most jealously-guarded principles in American Government.
 Because of this difference in state laws, for example, a state like Nevada becomes a popular spot to get a divorce, many businesses incorporate in Delaware, and some other states become havens for quick marriages. But there are many lesser-known variations in state laws which can have quite a bearing on your legal affairs.

If you own property in another state, or prepared your will before moving to Texas, or have business interests elsewhere, no matter how small, the variations in state laws could make a difference to you and your family.
 If one is new in Texas he should take a second look at his legal standing in the light of Texas law. If one should move to another state, he should do the same thing when he gets settled there. Or if one has a plot of land in Florida or California as part of his retirement plans, let's say, or even minor interests in another state, he should protect himself beforehand against any possible complications due to difference in state laws.
 The best laid plans in your home state might put you or your heirs at a disadvantage when interpreted under the laws of another state.

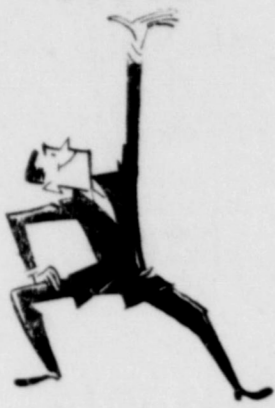

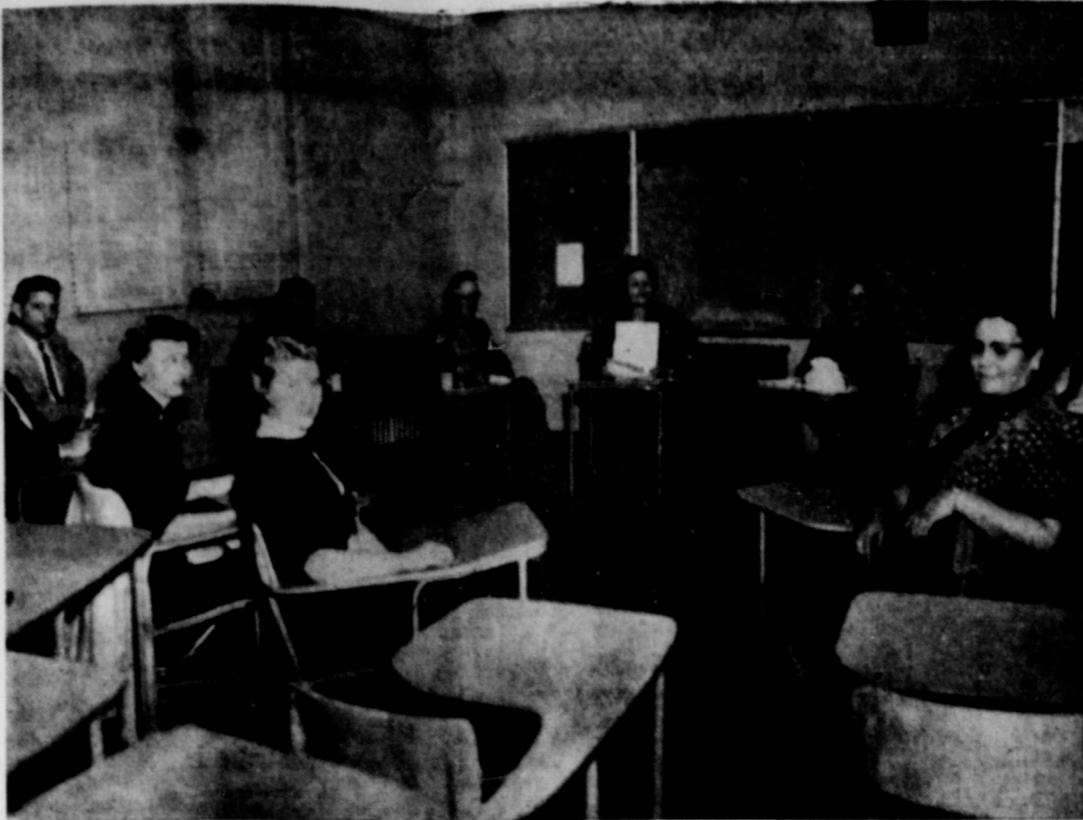

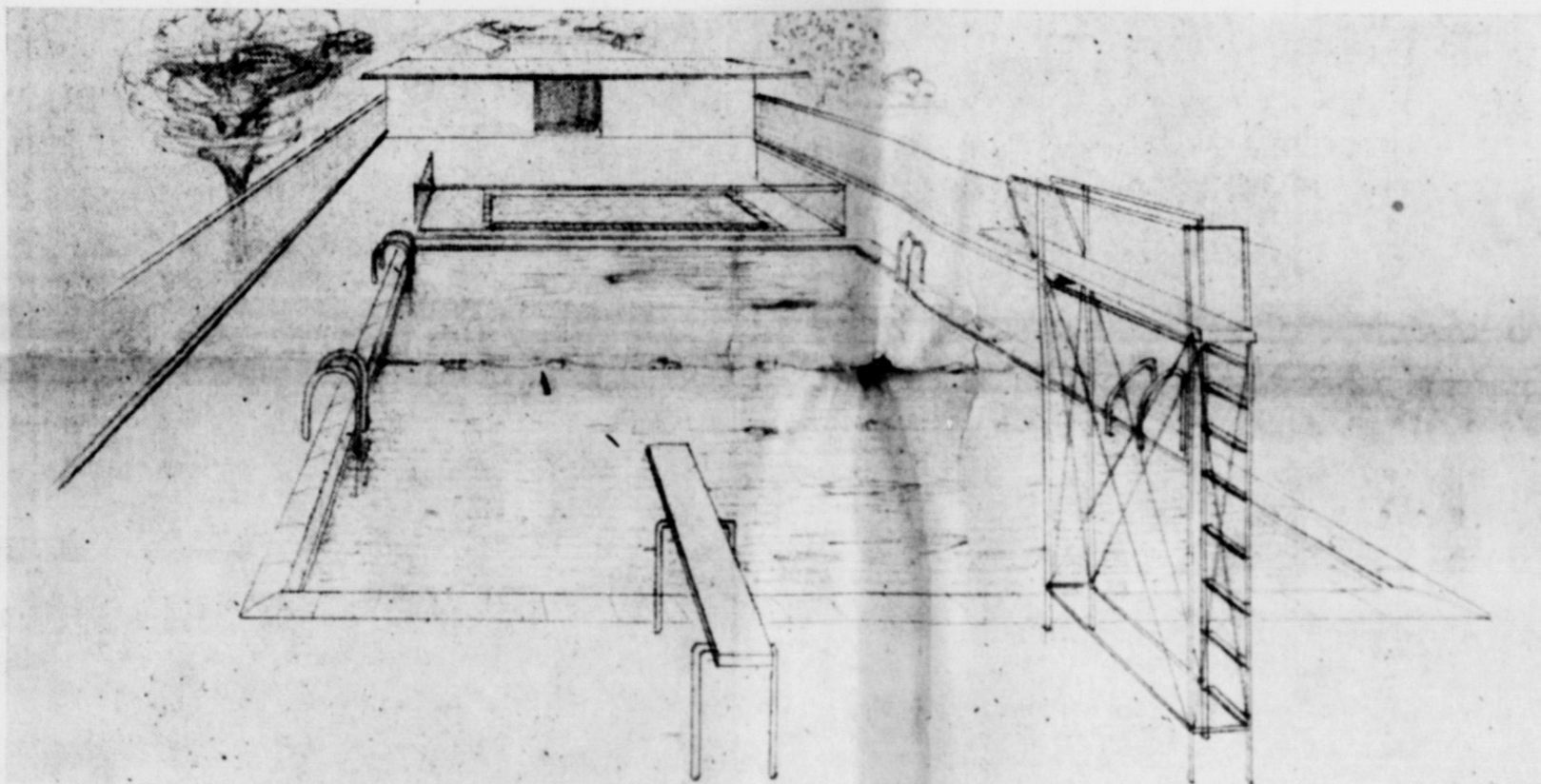

His last statement was correct. Everyone has to be "fully insured" to get old-age benefits upon retirement. Where he had gone off the beam was in his interpretation of

the adverb "fully." For social security purposes it simply means that you have been in work covered by the law long enough to be entitled to benefits at the time you claim them. The AMOUNT of the average monthly check depends on the amount of the average monthly earnings credited to your social security account.

He had average monthly earnings of \$235; his neighbor had a monthly average of \$350 — the highest average that can count towards benefits.

Let's look at it this way. The attendant at the filling station is fully employed, so is the plant superintendent of the automobile manufacturer who built the car he is greasing. However, there is a slight difference in the salary

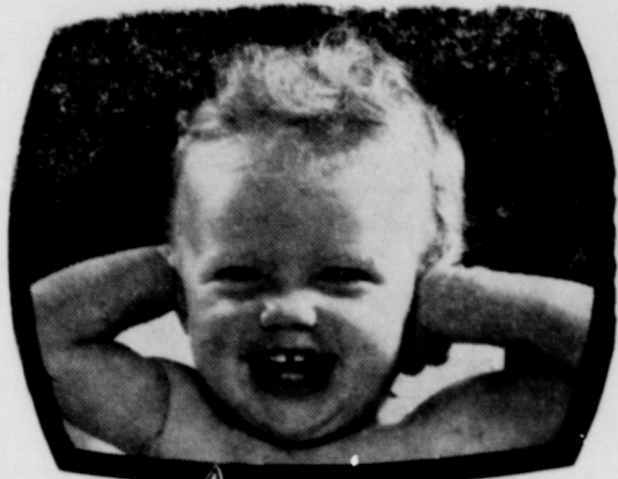

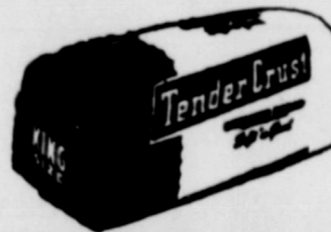

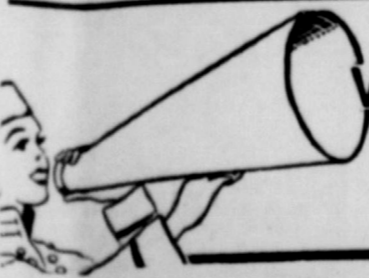

State Health Department Says Get More Sleep If You Want to Live To A Ripe Old Age

AUSTIN, February 14. — The supersonic speed of modern life is costing us one of the most vital ingredients of good health — sleep.

That's the considered opinion of experts at the State Health Department who remember the easy, languid existence of days gone by when he bop was just a hiccough.

Twenty years ago people got plenty of sleep and were better for it, the health men said in making recommendations for avoiding insomnia. People knew about fission in those days, but it was the hook and line variety, rather than nuclear. Things have changed. . . . Say you stay up for 20 hours a day. If you follow this routine for a week or so at a time, first thing you'll notice is your hands jumping from nervousness. A dull ache will begin gnawing at the base of your skull. You'll be picky

and indifferent toward food. You'll be quarrelsome — projecting casual remarks all out of proportion. It will sound like an insult when someone says hello. You might think a good night's sleep will fix you up. Maybe it will — on the surface. The nervousness might leave you and the headache might disappear. It could be that a single night of sleep will give you the sweet disposition that was formerly sour grapes.

But it's all on the surface. During the stretch of sleeplessness your heart may have been strained, your blood pressure increased, your digestion upset. "These things," to quote State Health Commissioner Henry A. Holle, "cannot be put aright by a mere eight hours in bed."

Sleep, the commissioner says, gives the human body a chance to recover from the fatigue of one

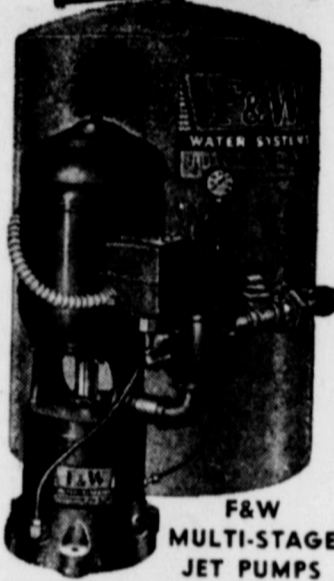

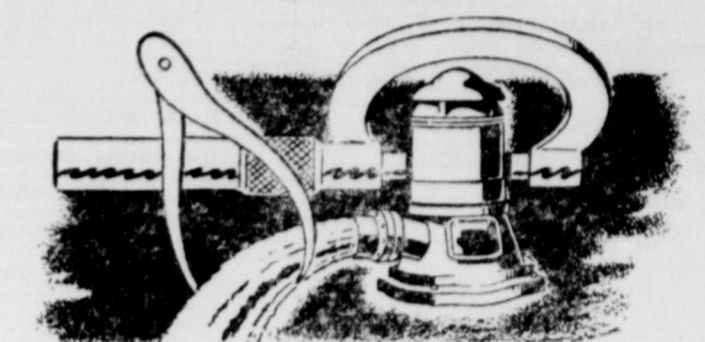

Cotton Diseases Cut Annual Yield In Texas an Estimated 10 Per Cent

COLLEGE STATION — Estimates place the loss to Texas cotton producers during the past five years from disease at more than 2,000,000 bales. About 20 per cent of the total is charged to seedling diseases. Angular leaf spot or bacterial blight, root rot, boll rots, fusarium wilt, verticillium wilt, root knot, nematodes and rust, says Dr. Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist, are other diseases of great economic importance.

The loss during the last five years amounts to about 10 per cent of the total yield but last year's loss was 11.5 per cent, the highest on record for the state. The increase last year is attributed to the widespread appearance of verticillium wilt in the High Plains and Pecos areas and (apparent) increases in cotton root rot in the Lower Rio Grande Valley and the Pecos, Fort Stockton, Bakersfield areas of West Texas. Too, rust was found in South Texas for the first time since 1943 and fusarium wilt in West Texas for the first time ever. Losses to root rot in the Central Blackland area last year were less than usual. This loss normally ranges from 10 to 25 per cent annually, says Smith.

In addition to the direct loss of stands and plants, cotton quality is often lowered because of disease damage. Angular leaf spot and boll rots each are often cited as the reason for lowered cotton grades.

Smith urges cotton growers to give more attention to practices which can be used in cutting these losses. These include seed treatment, planting disease resistant varieties, crop rotation and the use of chemicals. Local county agents, he adds, can supply information on the control practices.
