Quote: "The filing date deadline was actually March 5 and we set it up to end on March 4 instead, because the City Office would be closed on Saturday." #### LOCAL VOTES ARE IMPORTANT

Next week city officials will be elected in our community. City government is the smallest unit of government in our nation. While small, it is extremely important. The policies carried out by a city administrator affect your life, your community, in many, many ways of each and every day.

Two posts will be filled at the election. Bob Armstrong and Price Hamilton whose terms will terminate are seeking re-election.

#### EARTH CITY ELECTION TUESDAY, APRIL 5

Voters will go to the polls Tuesday, April 5, to elect a Mayor and three aldermen in the Earth City Election.

Names of candidates on the ballot will be Marcus Messer (incumbent) and J. Carroll Blackwell for Mayor.

The citizens in the newly annexed area north and east of Earth are eligible to vote in the Election next Tuesday.

Candidates for Aldermen will be H. S. Hickman, John Welch, Bill Bryant, E. C. (Shorty) Kelley, M. H. Been, Herb Wendborn, Carlis Bills, J. E. (Pat) McCord and O. B. Whitford.

The election judge will be Carroll McDonald and clerks will be Mrs. Minnie Pate and Mrs. J. D. Newton.

The polls will open at 7 a.m. at the community building and will close at 7 p.m.

Citizens are urged to go to the polls and vote in the Trustee Election and Earth citizens are urged to vote in the City Election.

Five Aldermen and a Mayor are to be elected in the Springlake City Election.

On the ballot will be a spot for a write-in Mayor as no one has filed as a candidate for Mayor.

Aldermen candidates are Sandy Sanderson, A. M. McGowan, Jerry Barden, W. B. Hucks, Clifford Hopping, Ernest Goforth and James Washington.

## Springlake's New Telephone Exchange Cut-In At 1:01 A. M. Today

The long awaited moment will arrive at 1:01 a.m. (today) Thursday when Springlake's Telephone Exchange will be complete and hooked to the National Intertoll Network dialing system.

Details were worked out and agreed upon in early 1957 and at that time General Telephone agreed to have the exchange in readiness in March 60. The agreement will be fulfilled today, and approximately 125 telephones in the Springlake area will be hooked to the National Network. Prior to this Springlake has had approximately 30 telephone subscribers with very poor service for these subscribers due to the burdened lines leading into Earth.

The City Commission and Springlake Lions worked tirelessly together in a combined effort to get the telephone service in the Springlake area, and at last their dream will have become a reality.

Billy Wayne Clayton was chairman of the committee working to gain telephone service for the rural area around Springlake.

With this new exchange hook-up telephone numbers will be changed for Earth and Springlake.

This change-over is one of the steps in a complete change-over which will take place in Little-

field August 21, according to District Manager Bob Saunders.

The Earth Community which is already on a four digit dial system

will experience a change of dialing situation with the Springlake

change-over. The Earth numbers will remain

the same, but a three-digit prefix will be added to the usual four

digit number.

In Earth, telephone numbers will all begin with the same (257) numbers.

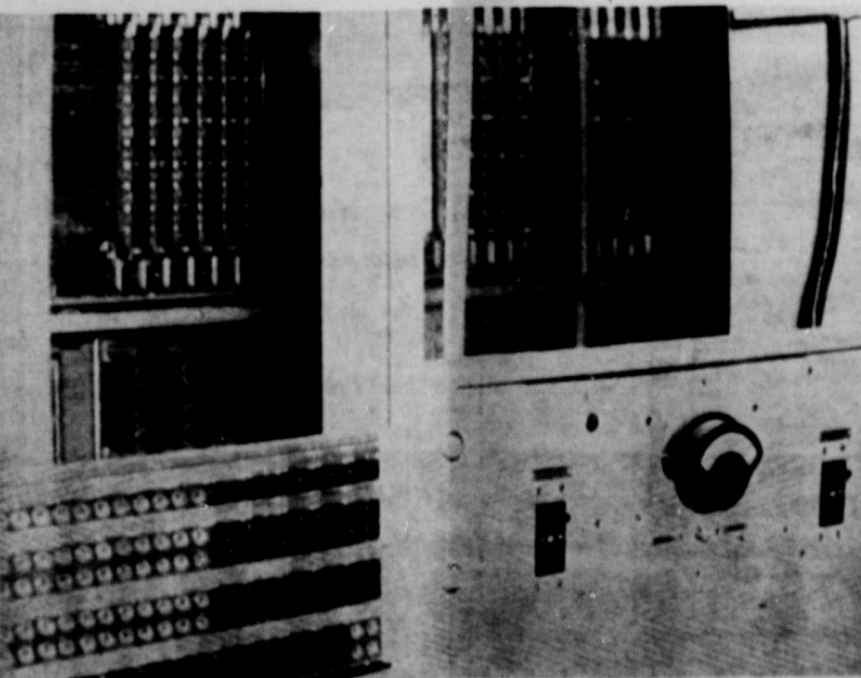
Springlake's first three digits will be (986) for a number on the new exchange.

Littlefields dial numbers will also be a total of seven digits, three prefix numbers instead of "FV" as originally planned.

Residents of the Earth - Springlake communities have already received their seven digit numbers and the new temporary telephone directories.

Earth and Springlake is the first towns in West Texas to begin to use the numerical system however, General Telephone is working to make the complete change over for all exchanges.

Bob Saunders, District Manager, said there was a possibility of a little trouble in the Springlake area telephones for a little while until all the equipment was thoroughly checked out. He expressed his appreciation for the consideration and patience from telephone users in Springlake for the past few days while telephone workers were checking and testing the new equipment.

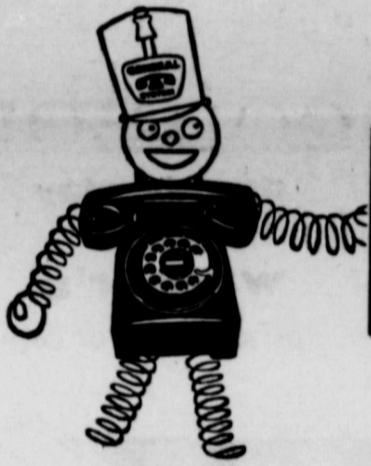

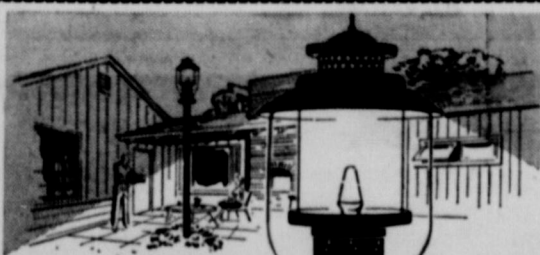

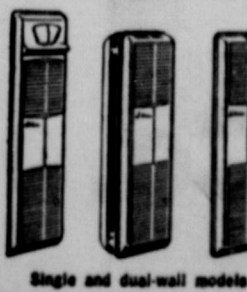

## April 15 Deadline For Motor Vehicle Inspection Sticker

"There are less than 15 working days left until the April 15 deadline for the new Motor Vehicle Inspection sticker," according to Captain Alan Johnson, Captain Johnson, Service Commander for the Motor Vehicle Inspection service of the Texas Department of Public Safety, pointed out that only 44 per cent of the 459,372 registered motor vehicles in this region had been inspected as of March 1, 1960.

This indicates that many motorists continue to postpone having their vehicle inspected. By failing to do it now, drivers face the possibility of waiting in line at one of the state approved inspection stations as the deadline approaches. If bad weather continues, this adds to the burden because in inspection stations do not make inspection while the streets are wet.

Texas Registered vehicles operated on public streets and highways after April 15 must display the 1960 Motor Vehicle Inspection sticker. Failure to do so often leads to traffic arrest for the driver without a current inspection sticker displayed on his vehicle.

Lamb County has a registration of 13,500 with 5615 of the vehicles having been inspected which is 49 per cent of the vehicles registered.

## What Does The Bible Say About Walking By Faith?

Reading Time: 4 Minutes

A little girl in Sunday school was asked, "What is faith?" She replied, "Believing what God says without asking any questions." We often times comment upon the frankness of children and their unique ways of answering questions. There is probably no better definition of faith than the one given by this little girl. Truly it is believing what God says "without asking questions."

But, too many times we want to put ourselves up before God as authority on various subjects, expecting that He succumb to our wills in such matters, even though it means He will have to forfeit His position on the subject. Will God do it? We may, at times, think that He will, but when we deliberate seriously we know better.

When God speaks we are not left with an opinion of our own. His word is always the final authority and if we believe, we accept it as such. Paul says in 2 Cor. 5:7, "For we walk by faith and not by sight." In Rom. 10:17 the same apostle says, "So then faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the word of God."

Then, in the matter of religion, if a thing cannot be found in God's Word it is not a matter of faith. When the disciples told Jesus on one occasion that His mother and brothers stood without the Lord asked, "Who is my mother, and who are my brethren?" Then with a panoramic gesture which took in the multitudes, He said, "Behold my mother and my brethren! For whosoever shall do the will of my Father who is in heaven, he is my brother, and sister, and mother" (Matt. 12:46-50). To "do the will" of God is the same as to obey His Word, and that is walking by faith.

NOAH is an example of a man who walked by faith. God told him to build an ark of a certain type wood, of certain dimensions, and other specifications. Had Noah changed the directions, in any way, he would not have been walking by faith in God. But he didn't substitute anything, add anything, or subtract anything. The Bible says, "Thus did Noah; according to all that God commanded him, so did he" (Gen. 6:22). Thus, he prepared the ark "by faith" (Heb. 11:7).

On the famous day of Pentecost in the New Testament, a multitude of sinners asked the apostles, "Men and brethren, what shall we do?" (Acts 2:37). The reply of Peter was, "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remissions of sins" (V 38). The record says, "Then they that gladly received his word were baptized; and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls. . . . And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved" (V 41, 47). When these people obeyed the command to be baptized, they were acting "by faith." To fail to be baptized is to fail to walk by faith.

Often times today when we teach people that they must be baptized for the remission of sins, someone says, "But, I thought we are saved by faith?" They have failed to understand that when a person obeys the commandments of God, that THEN they ARE saved by faith. God has commanded baptism and the man who wants to be saved by faith must be baptized in the name of Christ for the remission of sins.

ABEL is an example of a man walking by faith in his worship of God (Heb. 11:4). Though he is dead, yet he speaks this lesson to us. Abel worshiped God just as God wanted, without changing the directions. Today if we would worship God by faith, we must worship only as His word directs. To do otherwise is to fail to walk by faith, and therefore, to be displeasing to God (Heb. 11:6). Cain, the brother of Abel, also made worship to God but his offering was rejected. Why? Because it was not by faith—it was not according to the Word of God.

When we depart from the written Word to follow the teachings of men, we cease walking by faith. Jesus rebuked the Pharisees severely for this, and said of them, "In vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men" (Matt. 15:9).

Let us heed the advice of Solomon, "Add thou not unto his words, lest he prove thee, and thou be found a liar" (Prov. 30:6). Let us say, "Speak, Lord; for thy servant heareth. Command, and he will obey." (Paid Advertisement)



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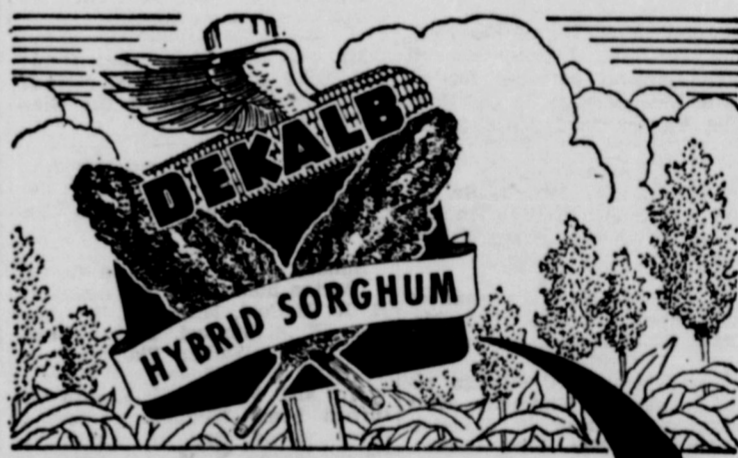

## Area Seniors To Take Examinations At Muleshoe For Wayland Scholarships

Plainview, — (spl.) — Muleshoe High School has been designated as one of seven testing centers in Wayland Baptist College's search for 10 outstanding high school seniors.

Competitive examinations will be administered by Maurice J. Sharp, Wayland Dean of students at 4 p.m. on April 1 at Muleshoe High School. Graduating seniors from area schools in Texas, as well as New Mexico, may take the intelligence type examination for which seniors can make no special preparation.

Wayland also gives scholarships to valedictorians and salutatorians in the amounts of \$100 a semester for four semesters and to the highest ranking Baptist boy and Baptist girl in each graduating class in amounts of \$100 for three semesters. If scholastic average is maintained, a student may receive only one of these three scholarships.

### Sudan Area Strongest For B-Cotton Plan In Lamb County

Figures released Friday by ASC office manager, Lamar Aten, Jr. indicate the Sudan area went stronger for the B-Cotton plan than any other part of the county.

The county as a whole will have a cotton allotment of about 203,295 acres in 1960, which is practically the same acreage as last year.

Included in that figure is a 22,437 acre increase over the regular allotment.

Farmers taking the B-Plan get 49 per cent more acreage, but receive lower price supports if they put their cotton in government loan.

Tabulations show 690 farms in the B-Plan which is 28 per cent of the total of 2461 farms in the county.

In the Earth area the regular allotment 35,449 acres; number of farms, 410; acres in Plan B, 9578 (27 per cent); farms in B-Plan, 104 (25 per cent); increase in allotment, 3831 acres (11 per cent).

### Census Takers Attend Training Session

Census takers who will visit every dwelling unit in the area during the 1960 Census of Population and Housing which starts April 1 will participate in four training sessions next week, District Supervisor Earl E. Kerr announced today.

The training sessions, to be conducted by the crew leaders, will be held March 28, 29, and 30, 31. Each census taker will receive a total of approximately nine hours of instruction. Emphasis will be placed on the importance of a systematic, thorough canvass of every dwelling unit during the census to insure a complete count. Class room training will cover proper manner of asking questions, use of the Census questionnaire, Census definitions, and map reading.

Map reading is an important census-taking technique since, without maps, defining the limits of each district to which a census taker is assigned, the job would be a welter of confusion. About 250,000 maps have been prepared for the 1960 Census. This provides an individual map for each of the 250,000 districts into which the country has been divided for the census. Every census taker will be furnished with a map of his district. As they make their rounds, census takers will be required to canvass every street and road and visit every housing unit within the boundaries of their assignments shown on these maps.

### Added Paving For Lamb Scheduled

Mr. O. L. Crain, District Engineer of District Five, Texas Highway Department in Lubbock, has announced that the Texas Highway Commission has approved the 1961-62 advance Planning Consolidated Program for this district.

Projects approved for Lamb County are U. S. Highway 84 from approximately 3 miles Southeast of Littlefield, Southeast to the Hockley County Line, a distance of 8 miles.

The Highway Department will construct 2 additional lanes and reconstruct sections of existing lanes for a 4 lane highway. Estimated cost is set at \$570,000.
