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At It's Peril

A short time ago, a Texas community voted on a proposal for city purchase of its gas system, which is owned and operated by an investor-owned company. The town's mayor and council had endorsed this move, on the grounds that it would prevent a rate increase. Even so, the voters said No--by the heavy margin of almost three to one.

Numbers of these voters, perhaps, were familiar with the unhappy experiences of other communities which have fallen for the lure of municipal gas plants. In many cases, the end result has been disillusion. So-called "low cost" has been achieved through subsidized operation--which simply means all the taxpayers, gas users or not, must chip in to make up the losses. Then, the municipal system pays no taxes--so, once more, the bite is on the taxpayers. Also, municipal operation often means political operation, shot through with waste and inefficiency. Finally, the standards of service of a municipal plant are rarely equal to those of a private system.

There is no magic at all in municipal ownership. The plant must buy its gas from a wholesaler, precisely as the investor-owned distribution companies do. It must pay the going price. And the argument that the charges of investor-owned utilities are excessive is baseless. They have stringent public regulation, and their rates are only sufficient to meet the necessary costs of providing service, plus a modest profit.

The investor owned company is a major community asset, vitally interested in community progress on all fronts. A community which bans such an asset does so at its peril.

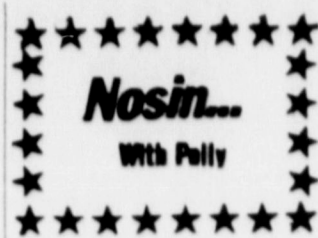
Methodists Beat Baptists 29-5

Jordan was one of seven dealers in the Amarillo district, (which covers all of west Texas and parts of New Mexico) who reached their quota or above in the selling of tractors from Nov. 1 to March 30.

There were 102 dealers who competed and Brownd & Jordan Equipment was one of the seven. The group will stay at the Villa Inn. They will have reserved seats at the Jockey Club, upstairs, at Ruudoso Downs.

Under this amendment, women could be forced to work as many hours as men. There would be no reason to differentiate between working conditions. Or, the situation could go the other way with men demanding the same protection, thus, driving many employers out of business.

There is a law which excuses mothers of young children from jury service. Under the "Equal Rights" amendment, mothers could be forced to serve on a jury while the care of their children is left to others. Here you can see an example of why men and women should not always be treated equally. In most of these laws, there is an over-riding social policy in favor of the sanctity of our families and homes. Again, this equality could boomerang and the fathers of young children could demand to be excused

Besides Property Law, there are areas in Family Law in which the woman deserves special consideration. But under this amendment they could lose those benefits. First, there is presently a presumption in a divorce case that the custody of a minor child should always go to the mother. By making men and women equal, would the mother have to spend unnecessary time and money in fighting for the custody of her children? Under this amendment, I think she would. Second, the Criminal Law of Texas makes it a crime to falsely slander a woman's virtue. But, under HJR 6, since the woman would be equal to a man, she would be fair game for every foul-mouthed individual, and she would have no legal protection.

In 1963, President Kennedy recognized that the status of women needed investigating, so he appointed the President's Commission on the Status of Women. "After months of study," the Commission reported back to the President that since the Constitution now embodies equality of rights for men and women, we conclude that a constitutional amendment need not now be sought in order to establish this principle. "They recommended that the State Legislatures move to eliminate only those laws which impose legal disabilities on women, rather than attempt to cure the problem by adding a Constitutional amendment which would

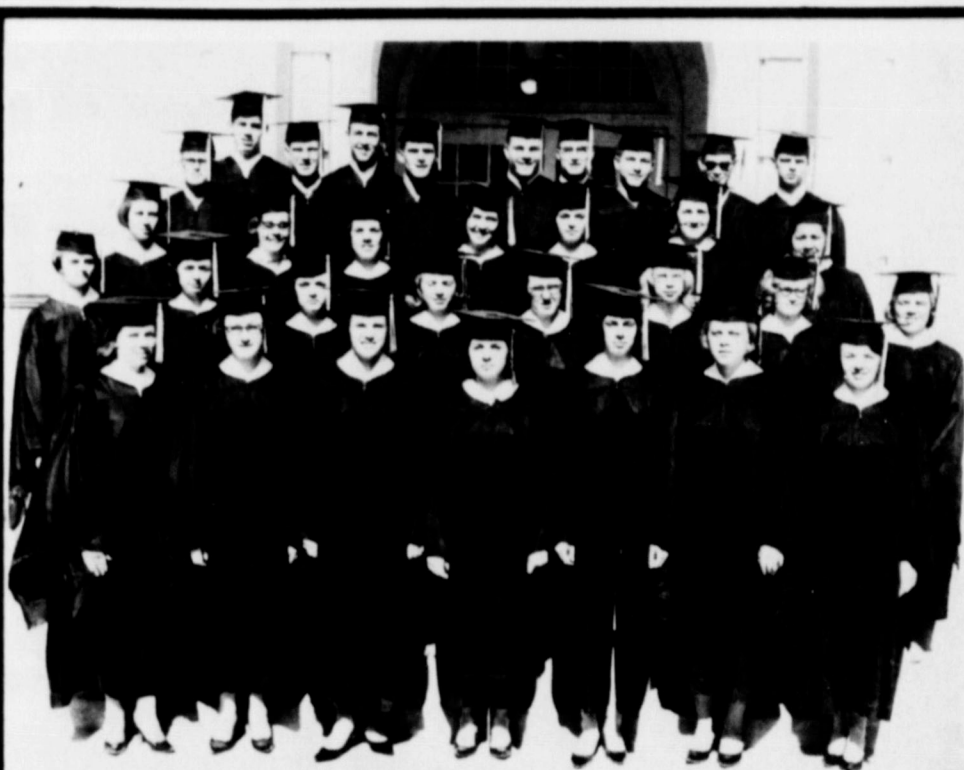
