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At It's Peril

A short time ago, a Texas community voted on a proposal forcity purchase of its gas system, which is owned and operated by an investor-owned company. The town's mayor and council had endorsed this move, on the grounds that it would prevent a rate increase. Even so, the voters said No--by the

heavy margin of almost three to one. Numbers of these voters, perhaps, were familiar with the un-happy experiences of other communities which have fallen for the lure of municipal gas plants. In many cases, the end result has been disillusion. So-called "low cost" has been achieved through subsidized operation--which simply means all the taxpayers, gas users or not, must chip in to make up the losses. Then, the municipal system pays no taxes -- so, once more, the bite is on the taxpayers. Also, municipal operation often means political operation, shot through with waste and inefficiency. Finially, the standards of service of a municipal plant are rarely equal to those of a private system.

There is no magic at all in municipal ownership. The plant must buy its gas from a wholesaler, precisely as the investorowned distribution companies do. It must pay the going price.

And the argument that the charges of investor-owned utilities are excessive is baseless. They have stringent public regulation, and their rates are only sufficient to meet the necessary costs

of providing service, plus a modest profit. The investor owned company is a major community asset, vitally interested in community progress on all fronts. A community which bani shes that asset does so at its peril.


