Hightower spoke on the importance of teaching patriotism to our children. He began with, "What mean ye by these stones?" and gave the 4th chapter of Joshua as an example where God told Joshua to pick twelve men to carry stones from the midst of Jordan to build a memorial to the children of Israel so future generations would know the story.

He gave Rome as an example of a place where many stones had been gathered to build monuments, but he continued, "Rome withered and died, decayed within, and soon the monuments were fallen and the stones then stood for nothing. They were soon carried away and used at other places without any remembrance of their first use."

Hightower used the South as a place where many monuments of the Civil War stood. He went on to mention they presently stand for something.

"The Statue of Liberty is another example of stones placed together as a meaningful monument, also Washington's and Lincoln's monuments. He explained that today the Statue of Liberty means the land of the free and the home of the brave. It means freedom and friendship. It means HOME to Americans. It stands for the American way of life, the great opportunities that exist in this country. It means that men can exist free as long as they know about this and are willing to fight for it.

Washington's memorial stands proudly in the Washington Square, he said, so that all men may recall the cold at Valley Forge, and recall the Father of our country was a wealthy man in the Colonies, but was willing to sacrifice all for the idea of freedom.

"Lincoln," he said, "played a democratic role in our history, as Honest Abe, signer of the Declaration of Independence. These monuments within the borders of this nation mean something today, but will they always? Today no pieces can be found of the monument Joshua built long ago. No (Continued on page 8)

Roberta Gaston Injured At Cowley Home






