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Census on Employment to be Taken Here Monday

Local representatives of the Bureau of the Census will conduct a survey of employment in this area during the week of January 20-24, 1975, Percy R. Millard, Director of the Bureau's regional office in Dallas announced today.

The survey is conducted monthly by the Bureau for the U.S. Department of Labor in a scientifically designed sample of households throughout the entire United States. Employment and unemployment statistics which are based on results of this survey are used to provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the Nation. Total employment, as measured by the monthly sample survey of households, declined by nearly 800, 000 in November to 85.7 million a level approximating that of a year earlier. Until this decline, employment has been advancing although slowly and unevenly, through-





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
