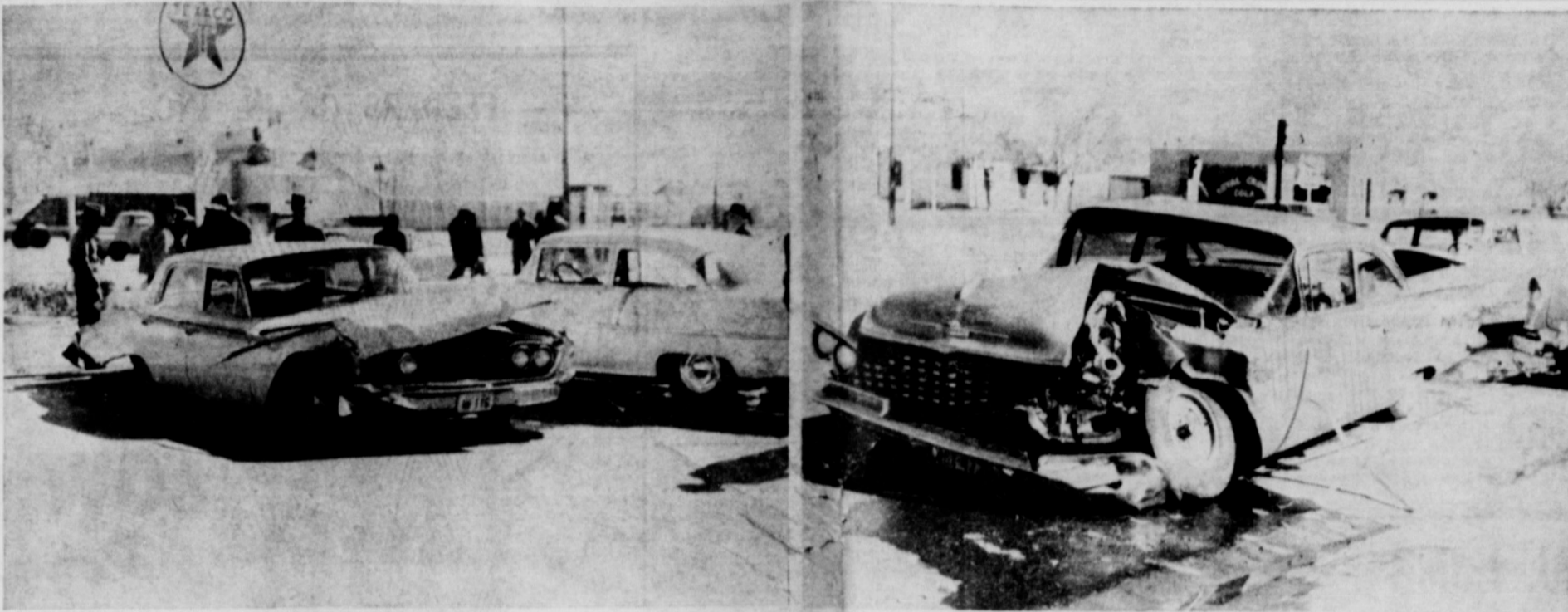

The mayor also pointed out, that this is very dangerous as some

Postponement was due to sickness and cold weather preventing the plumbing operation.

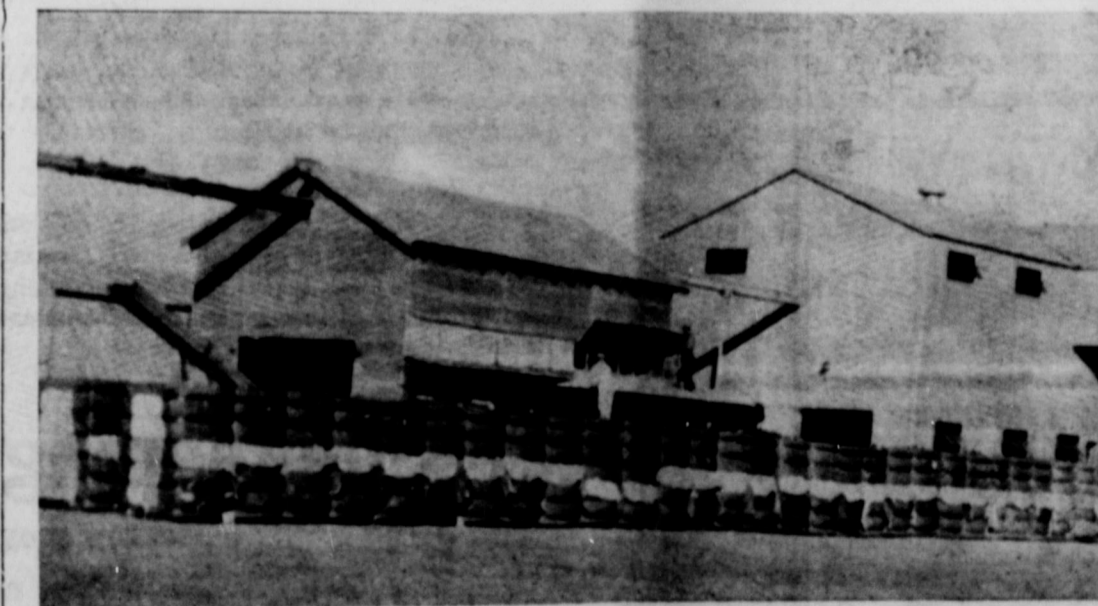
Dolan Fennell will manage the independent gas station, located west of Earth on Highway 70 on the lots of Earth Butane Co.

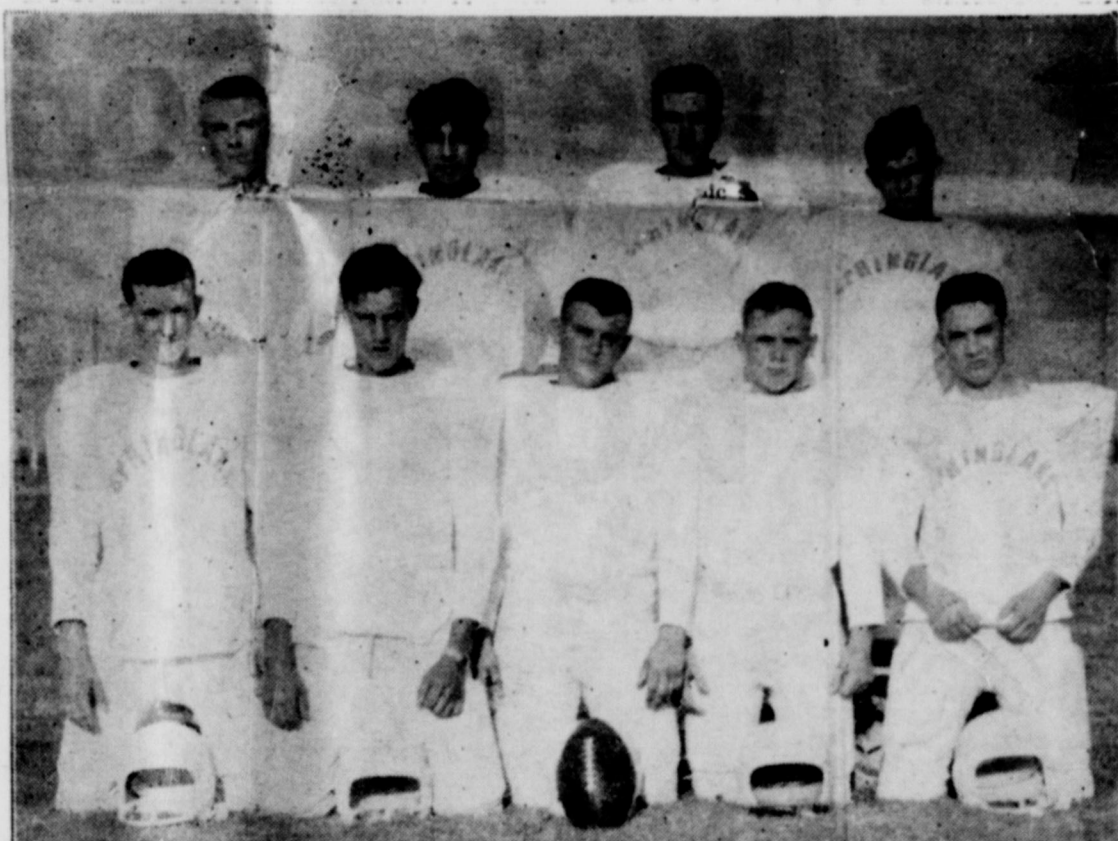

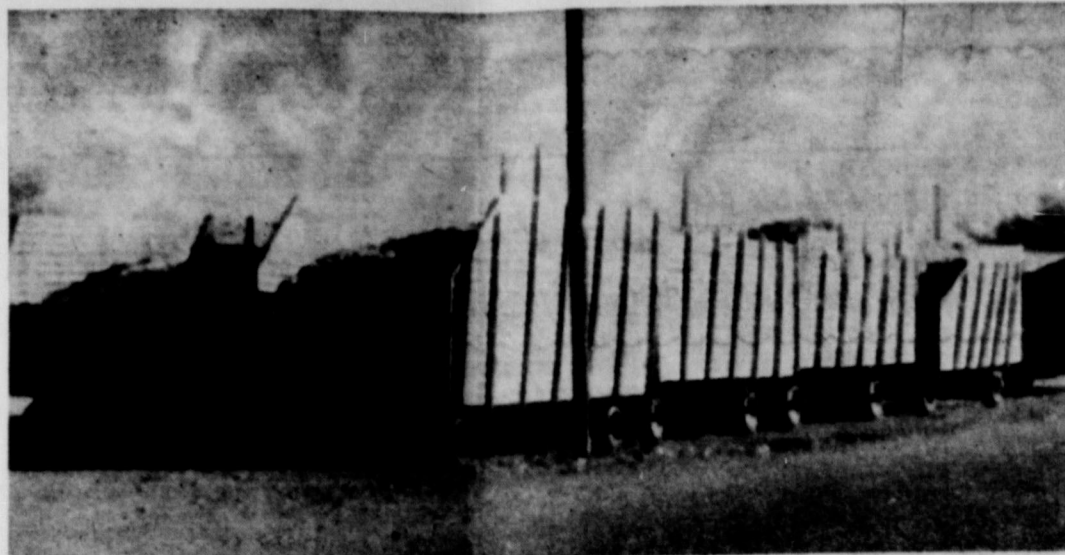

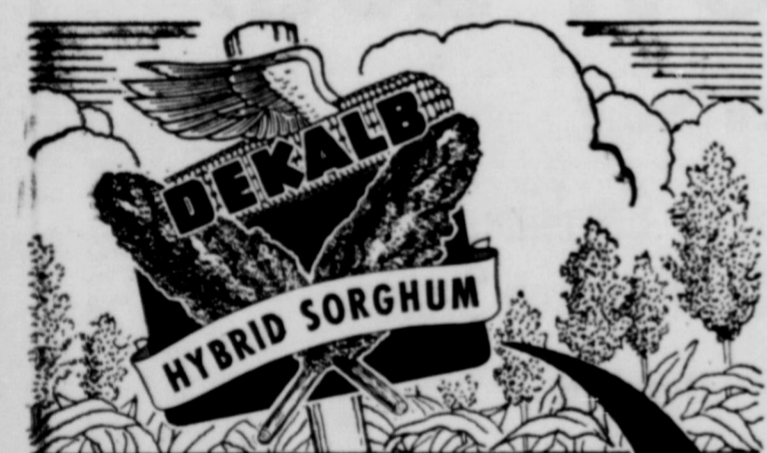
