FIRST WINTER BLAST STRIKES EARTH AND AREA THURSDAY

Winter struck its first blow to the Earth area as well as all of Lamb County, last Thursday afternoon lowering temperatures below the freezing point and dumping snow in light amounts over the area and heavier amounts on further north.

Temperatures late Thursday night and Friday morning were in the mid 20's as the killing freeze moved through the area.

Most area farmers said the freeze would not hurt the cotton crop and may even have helped. The late cotton was almost at a standstill as far as growth was concerned.

Moisture the first part of the week prevented further harvesting of the cotton crop.

Thursday night snow fell in the area but most of it melted soon after it hit the ground.

Snow was also reported at Sudan, Muleshoe, Hereford, and Dimmitt. Some snow flurries were reported in Littlefield.

Overcast skies with stiff northeasterly winds and cold prevailed over the area Sunday, with a light sprinkle and a few snow flakes falling Monday morning.

Wednesday was also cold and cloudy.
