School taxes in the Springlake Independent School District for the '61-'62 school year have been raised (\$12,000) twelve thousand dollars.

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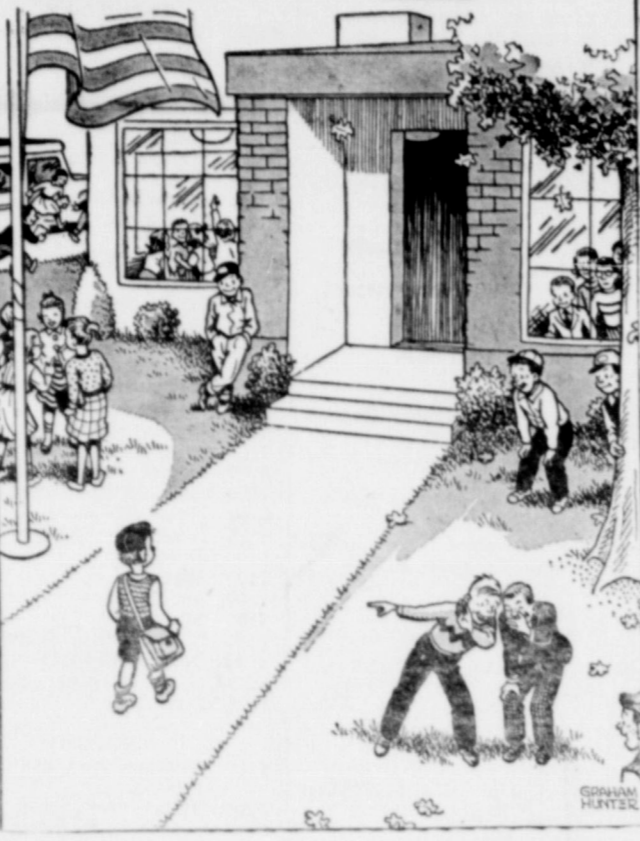

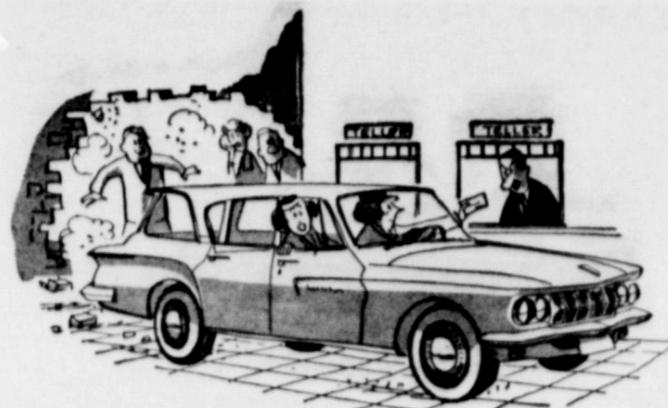
