



Man Fined For Assault On Springlake Housewife Saturday

A member of a grain harvest crew, Edward Simons 39, of Utopia, Texas was jailed Saturday morning after an early morning break-in into the bedroom of an 18 year old Springlake housewife. Simons appeared before the Justice Court, Monday and was fined \$229.50 for simple assault and released.

The housewife, an expectant mother, told officers how the intruder forced open her bedroom door, while she was in bed and her husband was away at work at a gin.

The woman, an attractive brunette told how the intruder approached her and asked if he could sleep on a couch.

When she refused he leaned over the bed and asked to sleep in the bed. She also told officers the man attempted to kiss her. She then persuaded him to leave.

Simons was later arrested and questioned before County Attorney Curtis Wilkinson and denied making any advances.

Justice of the Peace O. M. Edwards set Simons bond at \$1500 at noon Saturday.

The unnerved housewife was hospitalized for observation and later released.

Simons is married and the father of two children.

The TEC has been notified that the Secretary of Labor has certified to a shortage of workers for this area.

Mexican National Laborers may be employed to work in the harvesting of cotton, grain and vegetable harvesting.

The Mexican Nationals quota for Lamb County may not exceed 3405 from Oct. 1 to November 30, 1958.

This ceiling on employment is subject to revision as agricultural activities are completed, or whenever domestic (citizen) workers become available.

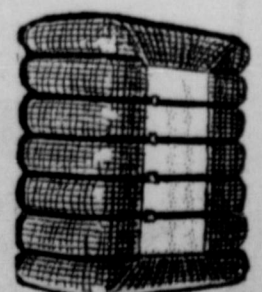
Earth Volunteer Fire Department Sponsor Trained Animal Circus

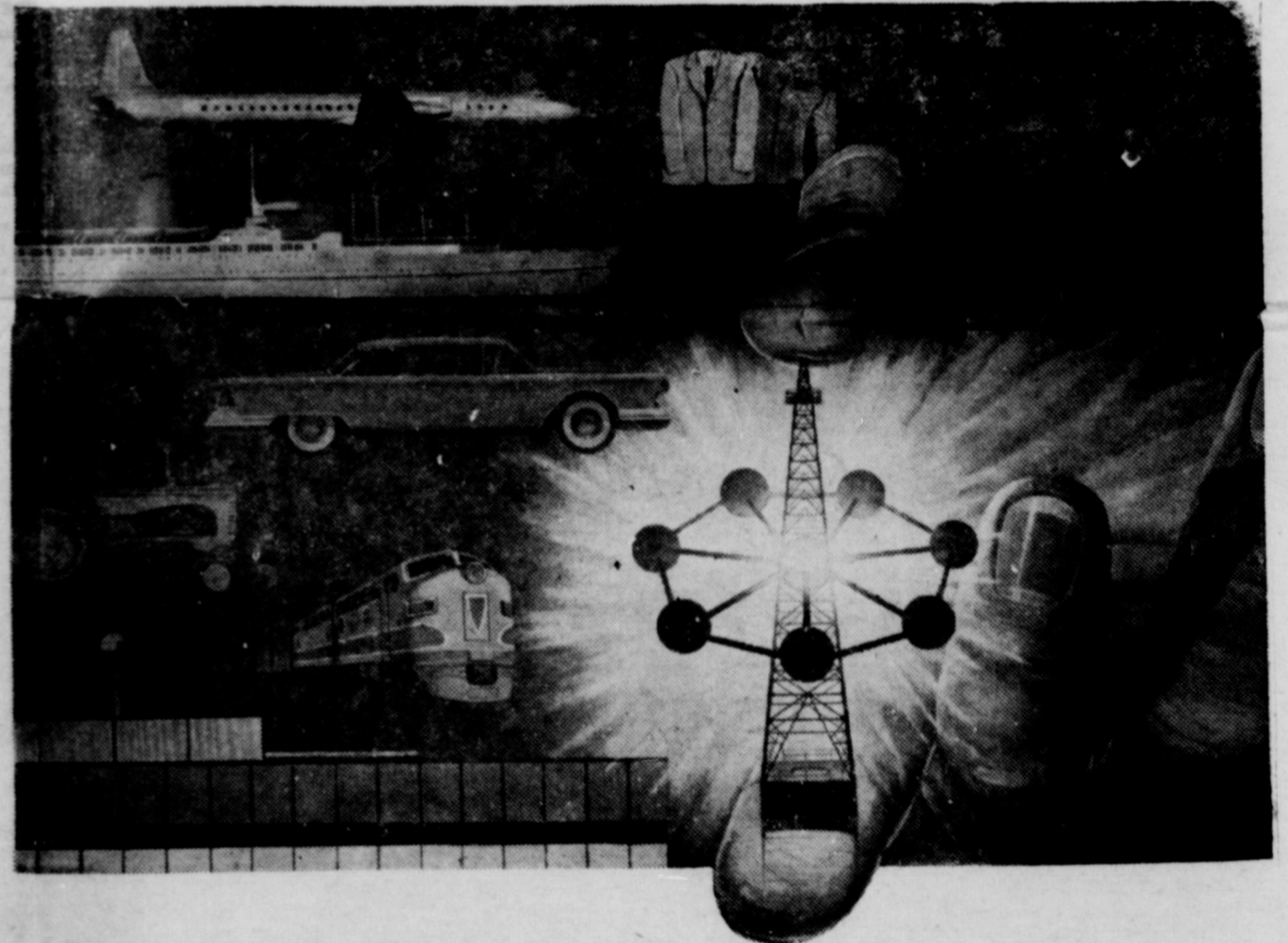

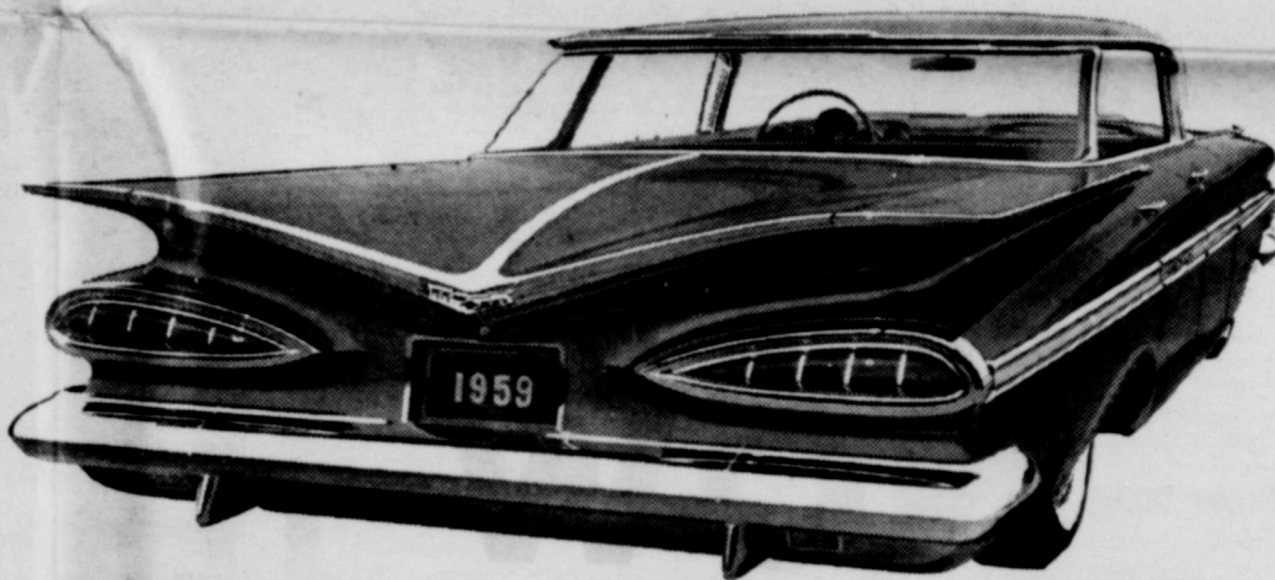

Increased Social Security Payments For 795 in Lamb County

The Social Security Amendments of 1958 will provide increased monthly payments to about 795 people in Lamb County, beginning with the checks which are due early in February 1959, according to John G. Hutton, social security district manager in Lubbock. The amount of the increase will be about 7 percent, with slight variations.

People who are already getting social security payments do not need to apply for the increase. It will be automatically added to the checks for January, which will be mailed out early in February.

Under other changes made by the new law, social security benefits will become payable to a number of people not previously eligible for payments. They must, however, apply to their social security offices before payments can start. Among the groups now eligible because of the amendments are:

Dependents of people who are 59 or over who are now getting disability insurance benefits (children under 18 or disabled; a wife of any age who has a child in her care who is entitled to benefits; a wife 62 or over; or a dependent husband 65 or over.)

Disabled people 59 or over who could not qualify for benefits under the old law because they did not have as much as one and one half years of work in the three years before they were disabled. (A total of at least five years of work under the law is still required.)

Dependent parents whose son or daughter died after 1939 and who could not qualify for benefits un-

der the old law because the son or daughter left a widow, widower, or child.

Adopted children under age 18 whose adopting parent began receiving retirement benefits less than three years after the adoption. (In many cases this provision will also make possible payments to the mother of the adopted child.)

A person receiving benefits who marries another person also receiving benefits can continue to receive monthly checks, or can become eligible as a dependent of the new husband or wife without waiting three years.

Some people in situations similar to those mentioned above may have applied for benefits in the past and been notified that they did not qualify for payments. These people should get in touch with their social security district offices promptly about filing new applications, Mr. Hutton noted.

Disabled workers whose social security disability benefits were reduced or were not payable because they received workmen's compensation or other Federal disability payments. (These people do NOT have to file applications. Their social security checks will be started automatically with checks mailed out early in September.)

Under the amendments it is easier for certain employees of non-

profit organizations and State and local governments to be brought under the law.

There is a slight change in the rates on how much a social security beneficiary may earn and still get social security benefit payments. Under a new provision a person's social security benefit will not be withheld for any month in which he neither worked in his own business nor earned over \$100 in wages.

social security tax rate for employees and employers will be two and one half percent each. The rate for self-employed people will be three and three fourths percent. These rates are scheduled to increase every three years until they reach a four and one half percent for employees and employers and six

and three fourths percent for self-employed people in 1969.

Starting with 1959 the first \$4800 of earnings in a year will be taxed for social security and will count toward social security benefits.

The Lubbock social security district office is located at 2878 - 34th St. It is open from Monday through Friday, from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mr. Hutton emphasized that it is not necessary for people already receiving monthly payments to apply for the automatic increase. It will be added to the January checks, which will be delivered on schedule early in February.

"Inquiries about the automatic increase will slow down our effort to start payments promptly to the people who can now get payments for the first time," he said.

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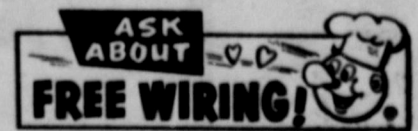
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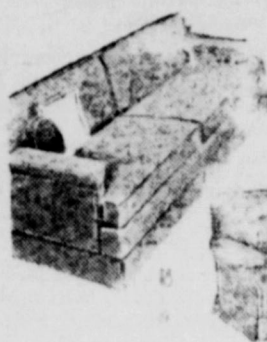

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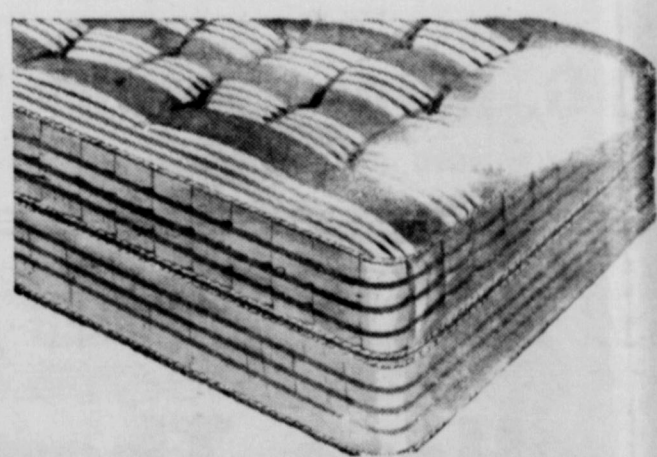

Springlake Wallops Amherst

The Springlake Wolverines bounced back from two straight defeats to down the Amherst Bulldogs 28 to 0 in an exciting ball game played at Amherst Friday night in good football weather. Though the score was fairly close, the Wolverines were pretty much in command after taking a two touchdown lead going into the final quarter. This was the last "tune-up" game before going into 3-A conference play against Sudan Friday night.

Once again Springlake had to contend with an outstanding running halfback, this time in the person of Jerry Gee, who almost single handedly brought the Bulldogs victory. He streaked into the clear on Amherst's first play from scrimmage and caught a pass and ran for a 76 yard touchdown play. Then in the second quarter he broke through the middle of the line and went 28 yards for a score. In the fourth quarter he caught a 28 yard touchdown pass. He was a one man scoring machine. Quarterback Keith Blair did a fine job on passing, and Springlake continued to show its pass defense weakness as Amherst gained 166 yards in the air while completing 10 of 17 throws. Springlake held them on running plays, other than the 80 yards sprint by Gee. To show the strength shown by the Wolverine's line, Amherst gained a total of 8 yards rushing from scrimmage, other than the one 80 yards run of Gee, and in the second half gained only 22 yards rushing. So, taking away the one long run, Springlake was almost perfect in its rushing defense.

Springlake started its scoring early in the second quarter as the Wolverines drove 55 yards in six plays sparked by a 39 yard pass from Joe Neal Ellis to Gene Stephens which took the ball down to Amherst's 25. Stephens made 11 yards, Dean Jones 12 and Dean carried the final one yard for the score. The extra two points were made on a pass from Ellis to Dick Evans, putting the Wolverines in front 8 to 6, as Amherst failed in their points try after the long run-pass touchdown play from Blair to Gee at the beginning of the game.

After its score Springlake kicked off to Amherst and the Bulldogs could not move the ball and had to punt from their own 20 yard line. Joe Neal Ellis took the punt of Amherst's 45 and went all the way for the touchdown. It was a fine run with downfield blocking.

The extra points failed. Amherst came right back after the kickoff, and on the second play from scrimmage Gee went through the middle for 80 yards and the TD, after which Blair passed to Mike Adams for the two points which tied up the game.

As the second half started the score was tied 14 to 14, but Amherst had not yet gained a first down. Springlake exploded for two touchdowns in the third quarter. Dean Jones went 40 yards for a score on a pitch-out from Ellis. Gene Stephens squirmed and fought his way across for the two points. Soon later freshman back Hal Hudson threw a 12 yard touchdown pass to Ellis in the end zone. The points failed.

In the fourth quarter Amherst filled the air with passes, throwing 11 times and completing 7 of them, one for a 28 yard touchdown Blair to Gee. The points try failed. Amherst got the ball again toward the end of the game and completed three straight passes thrown by Gee for 13, 9 and 20 yards. The last pass ended the game as it was completed on Springlake's 12 yard line.

Other than its weak pass defense, Springlake played an outstanding game on offense and defense. Perhaps the pass defense looked weak because of the outstanding passing by Blair and Gee. The Wolverines played a wonderful game in the line. All the linemen did a fine job, but Tom Messer would have to be singled out for his outstanding play at end. This was his best game of the career. He hit hard and often, and was hardly ever taken out of the play. Our backs did an outstanding job on offense, but once again one man must be singled out for his hard driving job of running, and that would be Gene Stephens. He did by far his best running of his football career. He fought for every extra yard he could get. He made yards after he should have been

Safe Travel With Tots

Your vacation trip will be easier and more fun if your children know how to be safe passengers. Here are some tips for teaching them.

Have them sit squarely back on the seat. Adult passengers should hold very young children on their laps.



Laps. Use special car seats for infants.

For water or soft drinks en route, use paper cups.

Break up long stretches of driving by frequent stops to keep the children from becoming too restless.

Do not permit any climbing from the back to the front seat while the car is in motion. Always pull off the road and stop before permitting such a change.

No leaning out of windows, no fooling with door handles, shift lever, or ignition key.

No candy wrappers (or other waste material) should be tossed out of the window. No toy airplanes—for example—to be held out the window.

No roughhouse allowed. Gossiping or word games should keep older children entertained. For the very small fry: toys of plastic or rubber.

The don'ts are basic. But the games and toys are important. Keep the children interested, and it's easier to keep them happy and safe.

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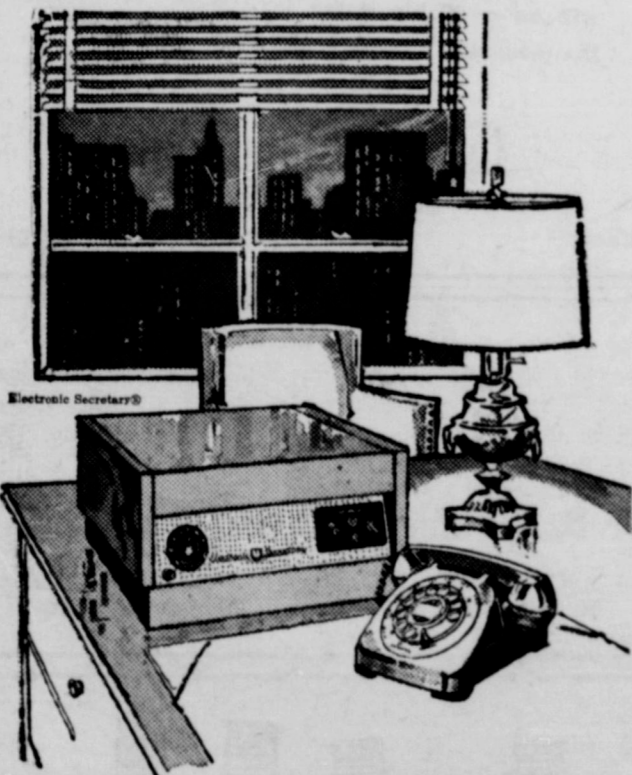

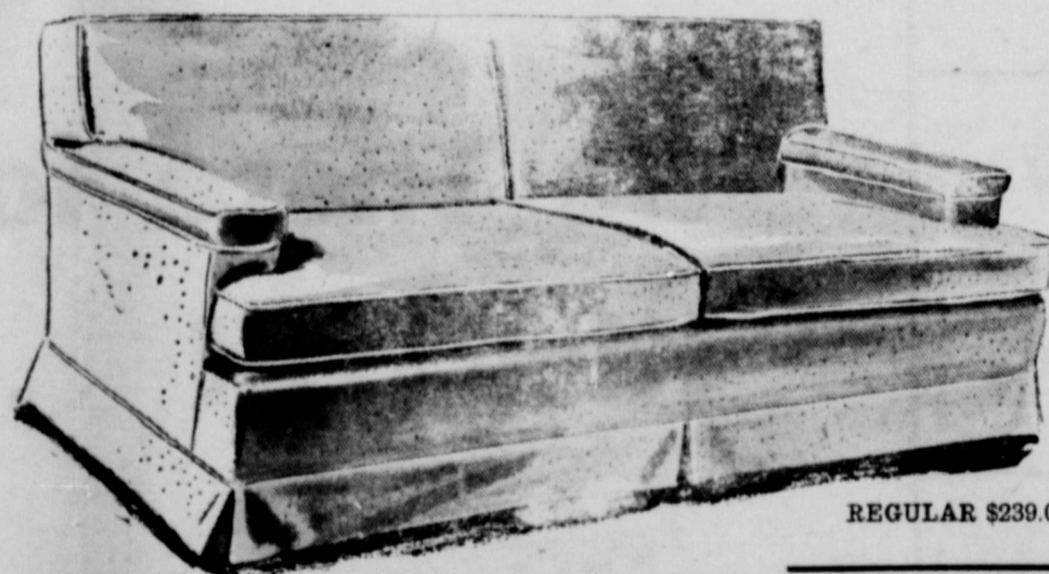
