IT DON'T COST TO ADVERTISE - I PAYS

In 1907 Pyle's Pearline was favorably known to most American housewives. That year the owners spent \$500,000 in advertising it. It was an outstanding success. Three years later the owner's felt it was so well known that they could afford to save that \$500,000 a year. They ceased to advertise.

Eight years later in 1915 the whole world's goodwill and all was sold for \$12,000. The public has a short memory. The advertising manager of one of the largest soap manufacturers said that according to their surveys, a manufacturer of a new brand of toilet soap today could not attain national distribution and consumption of his product for less than five million dollars or in less than five years time. The public must be told — and told again.

To prove you can't just tell the public once and expect they'll remember long I tried this out this week and asked four Earth merchants who our Earth Chamber of Commerce president was. Not one of the four remembered, but agreed they had known.

DO YOU KNOW? This is the function of the newspaper — to constantly remind the public of your business.

A sound planned advertising program should go into the budget of every businessman who expects to be successful. Don't wait on just one or two town merchants to do all the advertising and invite the folks to Earth to shop, and hope you will get part of the traffic without putting out anything. Your business may get a few stragglers, but it will definitely never be the no. 1 shopping center.

I discussed circulars, direct mail and catalogues with a merchant this week. I fall to believe anyone had rather pick up a circular and read it word for word with baited breath, without any news value at all of the city and area and people they know, in preference to reading the same advertisement in the paper. (Big advertisers have proven this wrong).

The Lucky Strike advertisement in last week's paper and appearing again in this issue and will follow up again in next week's paper is an example of success. THEIR PRODUCT HAS DOUBTLESS PLAYED A BIG PART IN THEIR HUGE SUCCESS. However, they have spent many, many, many dollars advertising their cigarettes (in fact who in America hasn't heard of Luckies? Do you suppose there is anyone?) Yet, they do not say "Oh, everyone knows about Luckies" using that as an excuse not to advertise, not so, they still continue to advertise one of the best known products in America. (May we add we are proud indeed, that Lucky Strike cigarettes are using the weekly newspaper media in their advertising program.

Funeral services for Jarley Harrison Hamilton, 73, will be held at 10 a.m. today (Thursday) at the Earth Methodist Church, with Rev. H. S. Salley, pastor officiating, assisted by Rev. H. M. Seccord, Kress, former pastor at Earth.

Burial will be in the Earth Cemetery under direction of Hammons Funeral Home of Littlefield.

Hamilton, born in Georgia, was a retired railroad worker. He moved to Earth in 1948, coming here from Childress. He began working for the Burlington Route Railroad at Childress in 1907 as a blacksmith apprentice. At the time of his retirement in 1948 he was Foreman. He was a member of the Burlington Club, for retired rail roaders. He purchased land in the Earth area in the early 1920's.

Mr. Hamilton had been a member of the Methodist Church most of his adult life.

Hamilton died about 11 p.m. Monday night in Saint Vincent's Hospital in Santa Fe, N. M. while on a vacation trip. Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton, and a son, Clarence left Earth Monday morning for a trip to Colorado. Mr. Hamilton suffered a heart attack and was taken to Saint Vincent's Hospital. Survivors include his wife, Mae, two sons, Clarence and Buryl, both of Earth; one brother, Bob Hamilton, El Cajon, Calif.; one sister, Mrs. Callie Dobson, Fort Worth; five grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Eight beginners in swimming did the penny diving with Jennifer Myers bringing up 20 pennies, in a ten minute time limit.

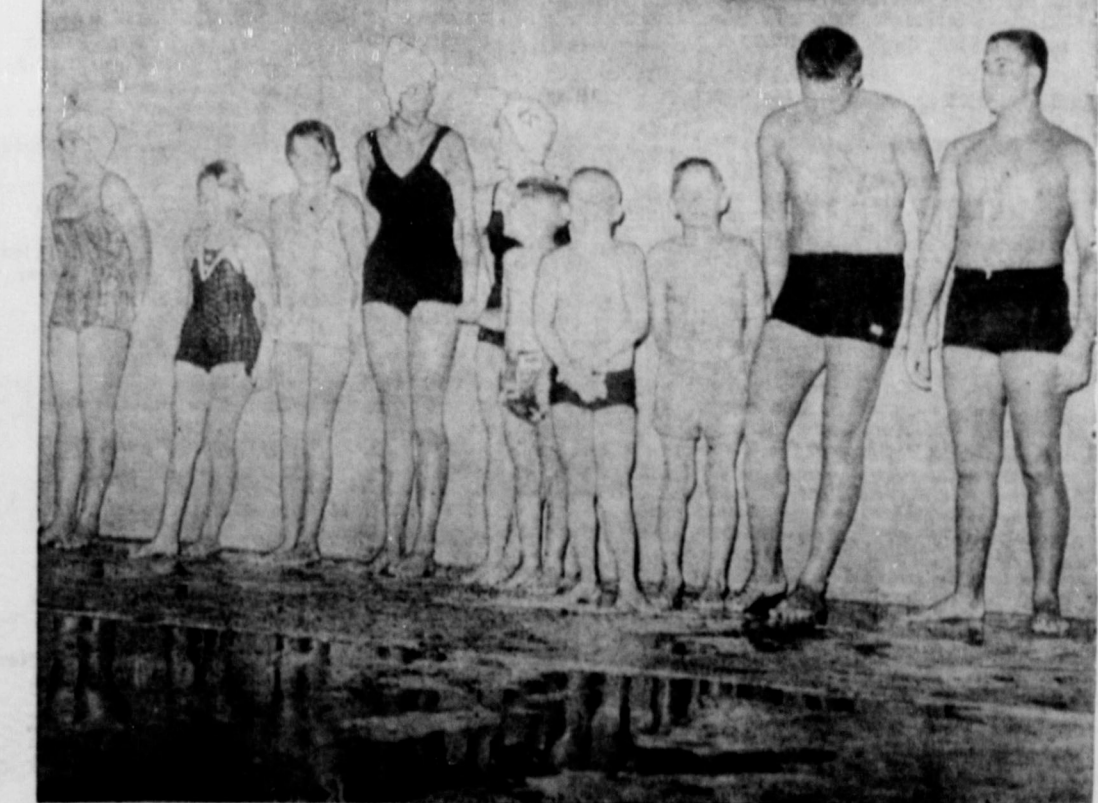
Allen Dale Angeley was second

Harris T. Ray will deliver the message for the church at Earth Sunday in the absence of Rev. Cecil Meadows.

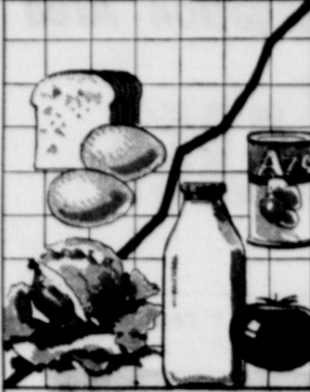
# Farm Facts

Prices of food have risen less than most other items in the consumer's budget. This is pointed out by the Agricultural Marketing Service of the Department of Agriculture.

In 1960, retail food prices were about a sixth higher than their average in 1947-49, but the Consumer Price Index—the average of prices paid by consumers for all goods and services—was up by more than a fourth. Declining food prices helped keep the Price Index from climbing higher during this period.

Retail prices of foods originating on American farms are less than the average for retail food prices, which includes prices of imported goods and non-farm foods. The slower rise in retail food prices than in the Price Index resulted entirely from the decline in farm prices, since charges for marketing these products increased at a faster rate than the Price Index.

The consumer's food dollar pays for the services of many different groups in the economy that produce, process, and

distribute food. It pays for the workers in agriculture and for the services, supplies, and equipment used in farming. It pays for processing, transporting, wholesaling, retailing, and other marketing services.

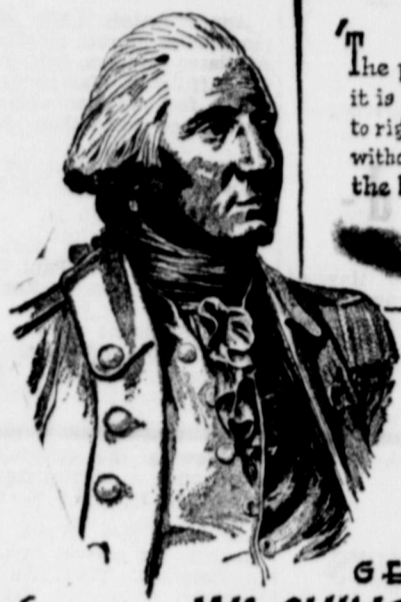

### Farmers Advised To Ask For Gas Tax Refund

College Station — Farmers are reminded by C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist, of their eligibility for a refund of the 4-cent per gallon Federal gasoline tax on that used for farming purposes. The claim should include all eligible gasoline gallonage purchased between July 1, 1960 and June 30, 1961.

The claim for refund should be filed on Form 2240 and not later than September 30, Bates said. The gasoline on which a refund may be claimed covers that used for farming purposes and includes most normal production operations. Three exceptions, however, are noted by the specialist. They are gasoline used on the highway, even though for transporting farm products; that used for processing, packaging, freezing or canning operations and that used for non-farming or personal purposes. Records of fuel purchases should be kept to verify the refund request and care should be exercised to avoid inaccurate or excessive claims, Bates said. He noted that Form 2240 does not apply to diesel and special motor fuels. Farmers who have questions regarding taxes on these fuels are advised to contact an Internal Revenue Service director.

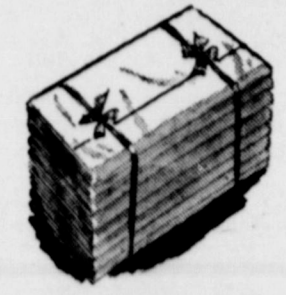

## Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

Seventeen varieties of wheat were tested at the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway the 1960-61 season. The wheat was planted on October 15, 1960 and harvested June 24, 1961. DeForest Langford, Associate Agronomist, in making the report, said that the wheat project was an intra-state wheat variety test made in cooperation with Dr. I. M. Atkins, Agronomist in charge of Small Grain Research for the state of Texas at Texas A. & M.

The pre-plant fertilizer application was 300 pounds of 10-30-10, applied on October 7th. A top-dressing of 30 pounds of nitrogen from ammonium nitrate was made in March. The wheat was not grazed.

The yields of the different varieties were: Improved Triumph, 85.9 bushels; Super Triumph, 85.5 bushels; Tascosa, 77.9 bushels; Early Blackhull, 76.8 bushels; Concho, 76.6 bushels; a hybrid MQ-ORO x Wichita, 70.6 bushels; Kaw, 68.7 bushels; Kharhof, 67.5 bushels; Crockett, 66.1 bushels; Comanche, 65.5 bushels; Red Chief, 63.1 bushels; Wichita, 62.1 bushels; Bison, 57.9 bushels; Rodco, 47.0 bushels; Aztec, 46.3 bushels; Tejas, 45.0 bushels.

Birth Certificates

## May Be Obtained From Austin

This time of year mothers begin to get slightly frantic with all the details of getting children ready for school. Especially frantic are mothers who have small children who will begin school for the first time.

There are more to be done than meets the eye. There are shots to be administered, clothes to buy, teeth to be checked, health examinations, and birth certificate copies to be arranged for.

Most school districts require proof-of-age for children beginning school. The most convenient proof for most parents is a copy of the child's birth certificate.

Such copies are available from local registrars, county clerks, or from the Texas State Department of Health's Records and Statistics Section.

Certified birth certificate copies may be obtained by sending one dollar (\$1.00) to the Texas State Department of Health at 410 East Fifth Street in Austin.

Along with the dollar, the child's name, place and date of birth, and the parents' names should be included to speed the records search.

Thousands of birth certificate requests are processed each week in the Austin facility. However, during the late summer months the load increase substantially because of the many extra requests from parents with children beginning school.

The work load has been extremely heavy this summer because of the pending raise in birth certificate copy rates from \$1.00 to \$1.50 effective September 1, 1961. Many Texans are trying to beat the deadline.

For this reason authorities recommended that parents make their requests early enough to insure delivery in time for school. Ordinarily, about a week is required including mailing time.

So mother should take a hint and get those certificate requests mailed off early, in addition to the million-and-one other details she must attend to before school starts.

Nearly 300,000 children will be entering Texas schools for the first time this year.

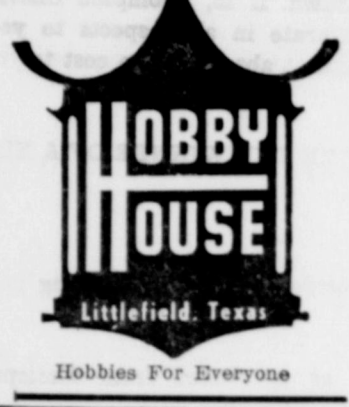

In fact Bailey County Electric Cooperative is one of this area's largest taxpayers, paying \$12,595 in Bailey, Cochran, Castro, Lamb and Parmer counties last year. Local tax payments, such as these, represent typical additional contributions by almost 1,000 rural electric systems organized to bring electric service to people who could get electricity in no other way. Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association, made possible by a loan from the Rural Electrification Administration, now operates 1950 miles of line in five (5) counties. We serve farms, country stores, schools, churches, irrigation wells, zins, elevators, and outside lighting — a total of 4100 member-owners. However, there are about 900 idle services which are either seasonal or pay a very small amount per year. This is less than cost of lines and services. Despite the difficulties involved in serving sparsely settled rural areas we already have repaid \$2,112,955, in principal and interest on our REA loans of \$6,025,000. Like other locally owned and operated rural electric systems in the U. S., we are proud to fulfill our local, state and federal obligations while we help build a better community and a stronger America.

## Tech High School Journalism Workshop Scheduled Aug. 13-17

Lubbock — Teenaged journalists... more than 200 of them... have indicated they will attend Texas Tech's High School Newspaper Yearbook Photography workshop slated Aug. 13-17 on campus.

Pro. W. E. Gaet, Tech journalism department head and workshop coordinator, said high school students from as far east as Shreveport, La., and as far west as Albuquerque and Grants, N. M., have registered for the four-day session.

Purpose of the workshop is twofold: to help high school students improve their newspaper and yearbook publications and to encourage interest in journalism as a career.

Kick-off speaker for the workshop will be William H. Graham Jr. of Farwell, Texas, publisher

of the State-Line Tribune and the Priona Star. A specialist in off-set publishing of weekly news papers, Graham will describe photo-journalism needs of the future. He will speak at 9 a.m. Aug. 14 in the Agriculture Memorial Auditorium.

Guests will direct the newspaper workshop which will feature panel discussions on seven subjects moderated by officers of the West Texas High School Press Assn.

High school writers with school paper experience will work on a special edition of the Torsador, Tech campus paper, while beginning students will receive an intensive short-course in news writing and editing.

Ralph Sellmeyer, assistant professor of journalism at Tech will direct the publications photography section of the workshop. This section has been limited to 20 students and high school teachers who want to learn basic camera and photo processing techniques.

The photo students will work with yearbook section students who will produce a 16-page publication utilizing yearbook-type photographs and layout. Subject of the publication to be published by Taylor Publishing Co. will be the workshop in operation at Tech.

The yearbook section of the workshop will be directed by Phil Orman, Tech student publications director. Featured consultants will be Charles Dolan of Dallas, Taylor Publishing Co., and H. H. Kesler of Inter-Collegiate Press, Kansas City, Mo.

Dolan and Kesler each will lecture and supervise laboratory work on the high schoolers' own yearbook problems. The students have been encouraged to bring plans for the 1961-62 academic year and many will complete plans for next year's annual at the workshop.

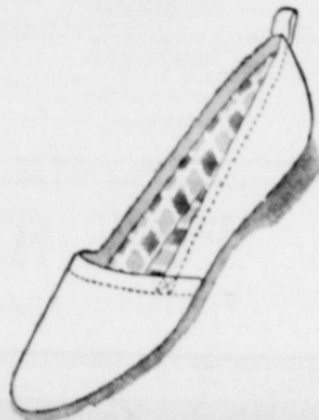

## Area Farmers Sign Contracts For Forecast Missile Bases

Possible sites for Minuteman missile silos are being sought in the Lubbock area by field men of the U. S. Corps of Engineers, indicating that the Panhandle-South Plains area is under study as a site for a multi-million dollar intercontinental ballistic missile base area.

Congressman George Mahon of Lubbock says Reese Air Force Base at Lubbock and Tinker Air Force Base at Oklahoma City are "sites for consideration for Minuteman missile bases."

Several area farmers, along with farmers over Lamb County have signed contracts with the U. S. Government for right of entry to test and survey for Missile Bases.

Johnie Haberer has signed a contract for 12 acres of his land north west of Earth. Ed Steinbock in that area has also been contacted as well as farmers in the Flag community.

Should the forecast Missile bases for the Lubbock area become a reality several other locations in Lamb County, apparently will be the location for some of the Missile sites.

Counties in this area would form a protective ring for the Air Base at Lubbock and for the city of Lubbock itself.

The survey now in progress is to see if the area is suitable for Air Force facility and several rights of entry have already been conveyed to the government by Lamb County land owners.

A radius of 150 miles of Lubbock is being tested with Reese Air Force Base in mind as the Control Center.

Fred Schaefer, Olton has signed a contract for 40 acres of his land which is located north west of Olton. Also other farmers in that area have been contacted. They are James Cowart and DeWayne Wilkes.

Farmers near Hart and Springlake have also signed the "exploratory" contracts, which gives the government 24 months in which to enter the land and make tests. Damages to the land will be paid for.

If the land proves suitable, apparently, five to 12 acres will be needed at each site.

The exploration includes 17 counties and about 190 sites.

Congress has already voted funds for the project. It has been reported that the sites would contain about 12 missiles each and would be located about five miles apart. The Missiles would be housed in 80 foot deep sites and would not be fired except in case of war.

Several teams have been working on the preliminary contracts with land owners.

The pattern has been the selection of two pieces of property, with a view to selecting one location in that vicinity. Testing operations are scheduled to begin this month. These include seismograph tests and core borings.

## Springlake Seeking Means For Safer Intersection

Springlake is seeking to obtain means for a safer intersection of U. S. Highways 70 and 385.

C. C. Hopping states that this corner has been the site of numerous wrecks and many near-misses.

A recent wreck at the intersection focused more attention to the fact that "something needs to be done."

Mr. Hopping said, "We want something done about this intersection before a disaster occurs. We need some way to slow down the cars on Highway 70 and make the ones on 385 come to a stop before crossing."

In an attempt to get some help, Mr. Hopping has written a letter, which was approved by Floyd Crawford, Mayor of Springlake, O. D. Crain, District Highway Engineer, at Lubbock. eling through, or to the Highway Patrolmen who occasionally patrol the area, or even to some of our own townsmen and farmers who pass through this intersection every day."

Hopping's letter continued, "I request — that not only a survey or study be made of our intersection, but some means of making the stop signs more noticeable to the people who travel north and south and some measure be taken to slow the traffic travelling east and west on Highway 70."

Mr. Hopping stated to the Earth News-Sun office that the Police Department at Littlefield, Deputy V. L. Smith, Jr. Earth, as well as other law enforcement officers had been very co-operative in the matter.

Hopping is still working toward a safer intersection and plans to write to D. C. Greer, head Consultant of the Highway Department, at Austin.
