

Opportunity Plan, Inc. Has Sponsored 11 Students From Area

During its sixteen years of operation, The Opportunity Plan, Inc. has sponsored eleven students from the Springlake-Earth area. These students borrowed \$12,404. After leaving school they all began repayment of their obligations and have repaid all except \$636.

Several important factors are considered in sponsoring a student. First, the young person who prepares himself for an occupation or profession is able to support himself and his family. He also becomes a tax-paying citizen rather than one more person on some form of welfare. He gains self-respect and is less likely to be involved in crime. Society benefits through his education.

Second, the person who borrows money in order to educate himself is making an investment that is just as sound as the person who borrows money to operate a business. If he can increase his earning power and his potential for gaining and holding employment by getting an education, then he cannot afford not to do so even if he must borrow the money to invest.

Third, sponsorship includes more to benefit the student than just lending him money. Often the student also needs counseling; he may receive financial counseling to aid in repaying and following a budget. His counseling may be of an academic nature; he may need advice about scheduling, study habits, testing techniques, degree requirements or other scholastic matters. The Opportunity Plan, Inc. tries to provide for the student whatever is necessary to make him an effective student.

Students from Springlake-Earth are fortunate to have the local division available to supply the money they may need.

Bill Sarpallus, the youngest and one of the most inspirational and enlightening speakers ever to address a graduating S-E senior class, delivered the message for this momentous occasion.

"What Does the Future Hold in America?" was the theme used by Sarpallus as he stood before an audience of approximately 900 people and made his dramatic address presentation. His opening sentence was, "In all time, 138 years is all the peace we have had, and 33 years of this period of time were when Jesus walked the

earth," which he used to illustrate the futures which generations in the past have had.

The speaker related an incident to the audience which occurred during one of his previous speaking engagements. He had asked that the American Flag be removed from the flag pole for use during his address. Sarpallus stated that the student body had to pass the pole while making their way to the auditorium. He continued, "When the student body was assembled, I asked how many of them knew that the flag was flying above their school every student there raised his hand." Sarpallus stated that he quietly reached under the podium and displayed the flag which had been removed. He then asked the local audience, "What does the future hold in America when we begin taking our flag for granted?"

Several instances of gruesome tragedy were used by the speaker to further illustrate the way of the world. The world in which we live is one composed of persons who would rather see death, misfortune and heartache befall their fellowman than to become involved. He stated that all people could share a better adjusted world if only mankind would be more willing to help one another. Sarpallus continued, "85% of all murders are caused and occur within family circles with husbands killing wives, wives killing husbands and children killing parents." He added, "What does the future hold in America? Only God and you know."

The minds and hearts of the congregation were aroused concerning "What Does the Future Hold in America?" and very softly "The Impossible Dream" could be heard in the background as Bill Sarpallus directed the closing words of his address to the graduating seniors. "Dream dreams, then make them come true. You must dream of education, dream of religion, dream of what you want to be and MAKE it come true."

Sarpallus is a 21 year old student at Clarendon College. He is a 1967 graduate of Boys Ranch and was an outstanding student and athlete during his seven years of residence there. Bill has served as Area I FFA President, State FFA President, and was recipient of a Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Scholarship and a Farm Bureau Scholarship. He is presently President of the Student Body at Clarendon College, Chairman of the Youth Advisory Committee of the Selective Service of the State of Texas, Chairman of the American Cancer Society in Donley County, member of the Boys Ranch Alumni Board of Directors and a disc jockey for KBGH radio.

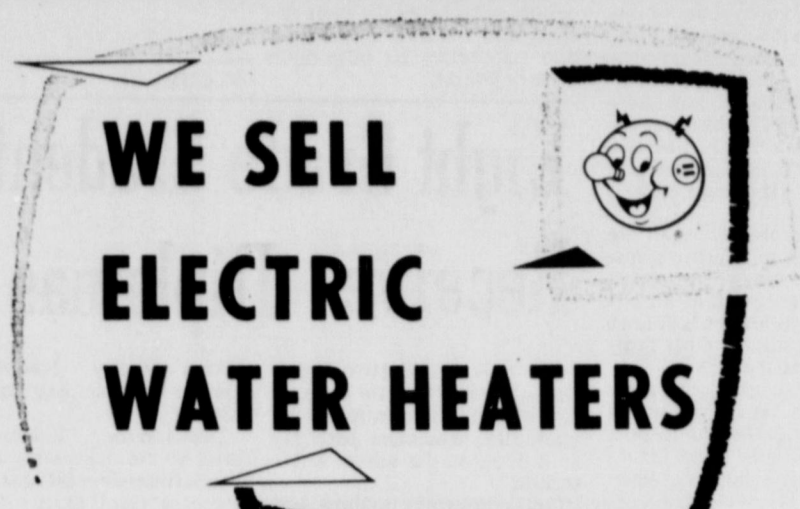

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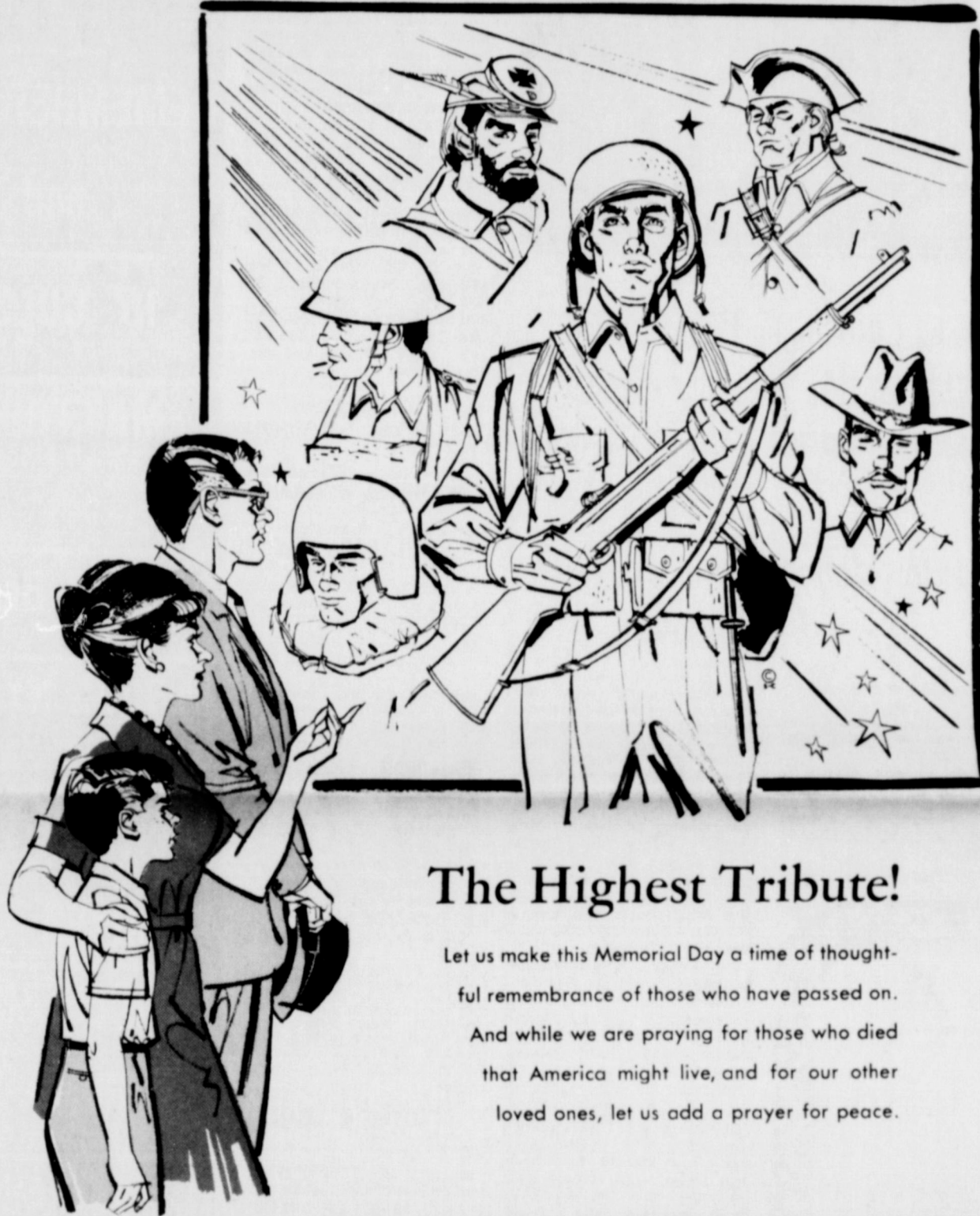

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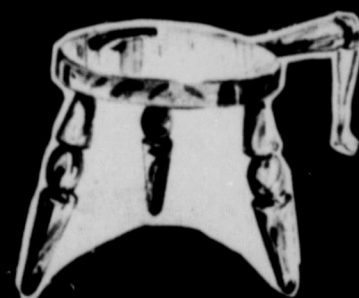
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Twosome Receives Spring Recital Superior Ratings

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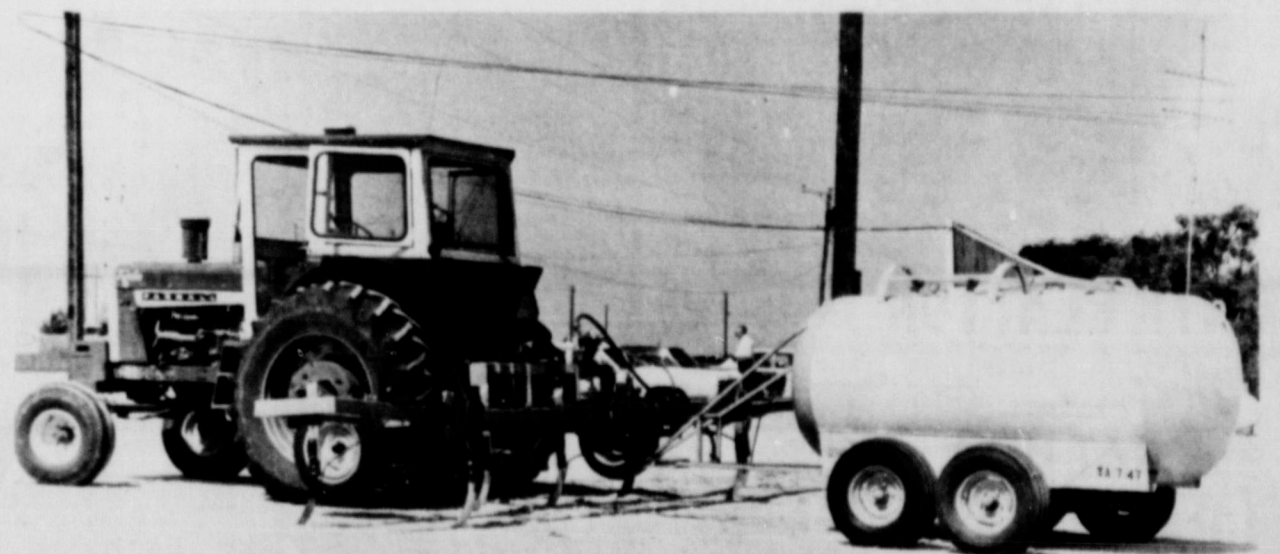
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Janita Blackburn Receives C of C VBS Award In Assembly At H. S. U. June 1-5

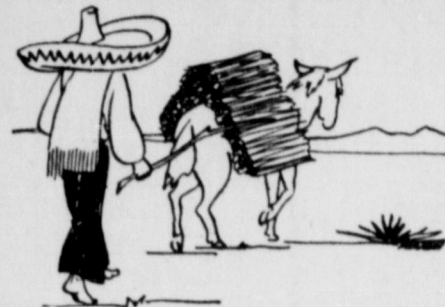

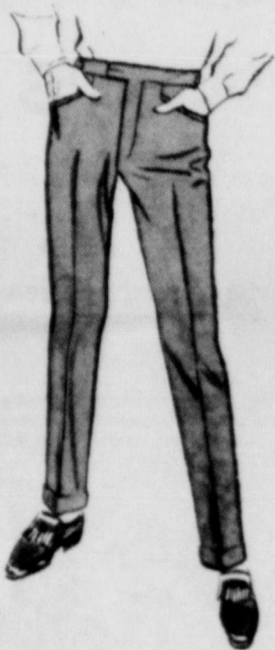

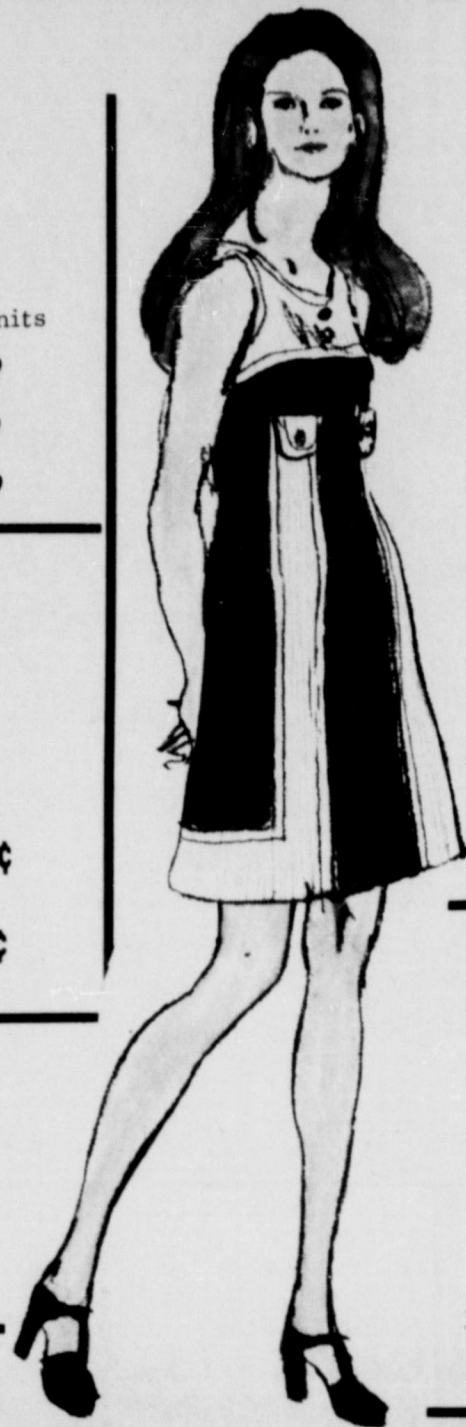
