During its sixteen years of op-eration, The Opportunity Plan, Inc. has sponsored eleven students from the Springlake-Earth area, These students borrowed \$12,404. After leaving school they all began repay-ment of their obligations and have repaid all except \$636.

Several important factors are considered in sponsoring a student. First, the young person who prepares himself for an occupation or profession is able to support himself and his fam-He also becomes a taxpaying citizen rather than one more person on some form of welfare. He gains self-respect and is less likely to be involved in crime. Society bene-fits through his education.

Second, the person who borrows money in order to educate himself is making an investment that is just as sound as the person who borrows money to operate a business. If he can increase his earning power and his potential for gaining and holding employment by getting an education, then he cannot afford not to do so even if he must borrow the money to invest.

Third, sponsorship includes more to benefit the student than just lending him money. Often the student also needs counseling; he may receive financial counseling to aid in perparing and following a budget. His counseling may be of an academic nature; he may need advice about scheduling, study habits, testing techniques, degree requirements or other scholastic matters. The Opportunity Plan, Inc. tries to provide for the student whatever is necessary to make him an effective student,
