Second Largest Cotton Crop Due For High Plains

LUBBOCK — The first Texas High Plains Cotton quality report off the 1959 cotton crop was released last week by George W. Pfeiffenberger, executive vice president of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., and showed quality factors of what may be the second largest crop in history from the Texas High Plains.

Pfeiffenberger explained that the quality report is mailed to textile mill executives and cotton buyers throughout the nation in an effort to keep them posted on yield, quality and character of the 1959 crop as it is harvested. This was the first report this year. Issued semi-monthly, reports will be continued through the harvest period. Each report consist of an explanation

and six tables giving correlations between grade, staple, micronaire and tensile strength of the cotton harvested.

In the first 1959 report white cotton accounted for 84 per cent of the crop ginned thus far — approximately 100,000 bales — and 82 per cent was middling white and above. Light spots totaled 15.3 per cent with 15.2 per cent middling light spot and above. Full spotted cotton was only 0.1 per cent.

Average staple length was just thirty one — thirty seconds inch with approximately 31 per cent being one inch and longer. Only 19 per cent fell below fifteen sixteenths inch. The micronaire average was 4.2 with 98 per cent above the tenderable limit of 3.5. Fiber strength averaged 76,000 pounds per square inch with 53

per cent between 75,000 and 90,000 pounds.

Pfeiffenberger said that some of these reports also are mailed to cotton firms abroad. "We believe this is a good way to interest more buyers and mills in Texas High Plains cotton. It gives them correct and current data," he concluded.

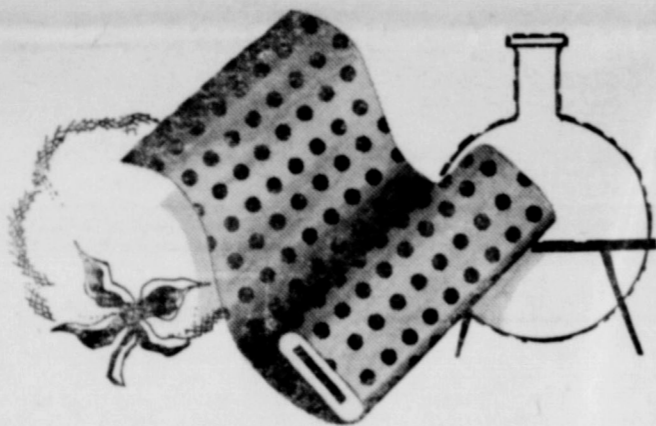

Hints Offered On Seed Marketing

College Station — When marketing seed you should follow the same steps as when marketing any other agricultural commodity, says Dr. Lee C. Coffey, extension agronomist.

The three major objectives in the sale of seed include finding a ready market, obtaining a satisfactory price and establishing a satisfied customer. The agronomist gives the following suggestions as aids to profitable seed marketing.

Your seed must first of all be good. Even though most inferior varieties today have been replaced by new and improved ones, the seed must be of high quality. Good seed must be genetically pure, free of disease, high in germination and free of insect damage. Also the variety should be recommended for the area where it is to be sold, Coffey states.

Good quality seed must be properly processed, he points out, as no farmer wants seed that are contaminated with weed or other

crop seed and inert matter.

After you have accomplished these steps, make sure it is packaged attractively and properly. Even though your seed is of the

highest quality, an unattractive, dirty bag will detract tremendously. And then make sure the package is labeled properly according to the Texas seed laws.

A carefully planned marketing program, an efficient operation and sufficient advertising to reach potential customers is also recommended, Coffey adds. Successful seed marketing for a long period

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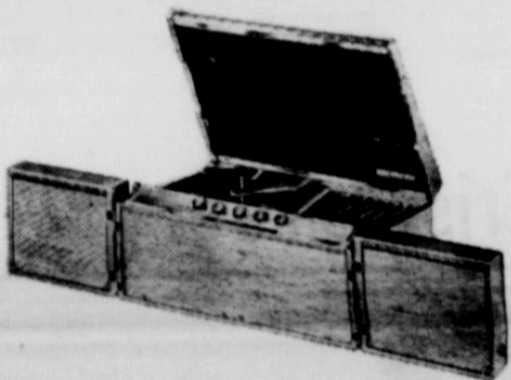

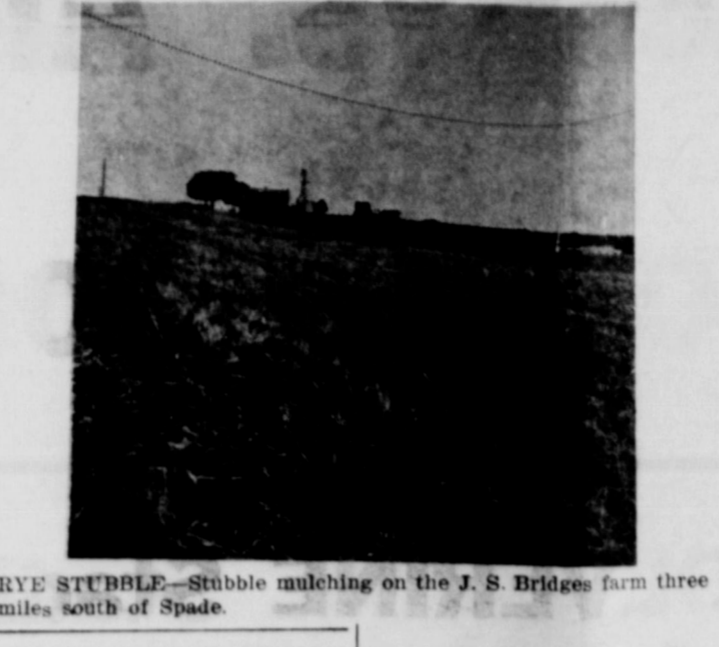

and water erosion, maintaining organic matter, increasing bacteria and bacterial action in the soil, increasing moisture holding capacity, increasing the fertility ability of the soil, making possible better moisture and air relationship and accompanying wide variation of soil temperatures.

Proper management of crop residue is important if maximum benefits are expected. The residue must be left on or near the soil surface and not plowed under four to six inches deep. Some of the best methods of handling residue are by chiseling, one-way, tandem discing, or leaving all standing stubble and listing back to the old stubble. Other tools that can be used are sweeps, which will do no damage if they are run under the stubble but still leave it on the soil surface. To see a good example of what the residue will do for the soil, check where an old straw or hay stack has been and see the difference there in moisture and the plants compared with the surrounding area.

Farmers who have practiced crop residue management say that it is one of the cheapest and easiest ways to maintain or increase production as well as protecting from wind and water erosion.

Anyone who would like further information on different methods of how to manage their crop residue or applying cotton burrs and their management, contact any of the Soil Conservation personnel in the basement of the Courthouse in Littlefield.

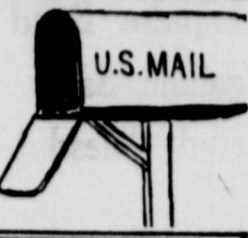

Dear Mr. Middleton:

With the advertisement which appeared last week in your paper the Association of American Railroads broke advertising precedent to include every daily and weekly newspaper of general circulation in the United States in a single, massive-coverage ad schedule.

Nearly 10,000 newspapers, ranging from the largest metropolitan dailies to the smallest home-town weeklies and blanketing every section of the nation, received this railroad advertisement simultaneously.

In railroad advertising, this was an historic first. Consequently, we feel sure you will be interested in the story behind the ad.

In lineage, this ad was a relatively modest ad (we wish it could have been larger), but it had a kingsize job to do. It carried a message of vital importance to all the American people. That's the down-to-earth reason it was scheduled to run in all American newspapers.

There's another reason we believe this ad merits nation-wide

massive circulation. It was designed to present the basic principle on which American railroads will stand when labor-management negotiations open next month on the elimination of costly featherbedding and make-work practices among the operating crafts of the railroad industry.

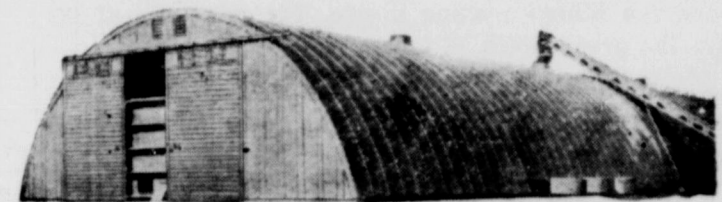

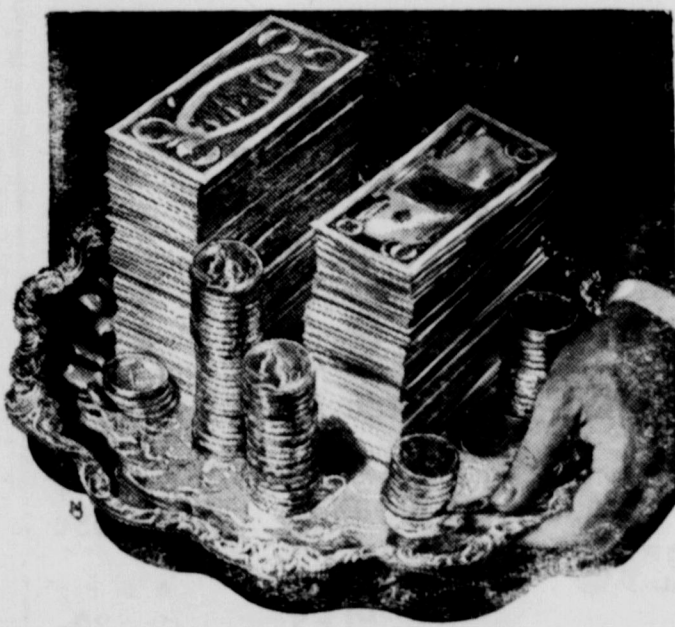

It is possible that Nikita Khrushchev has heard of Horace Greeley. We hope that Mrs. Khrushchev is also aware of a bit of Mr. Greeley's philosophy: "It is impossible to mentally or socially enslave a Bible-reading people. The principles of the Bible are the groundwork of human freedom."

The nineteenth annual observance of National Bible Week will be from October 19 to 25, 1959. The theme for the Week will be, "The Bible and You."

H. E. Humphreys, Jr., chairman of the board, United States Rubber Company, is the national chairman for this year's Bible Week observance. In his statement on the Week, Mr. Humphreys said, "There is no better guide, no better set of principles or source of inner strength than the Holy Bible. It is the answer for us as individuals, as a society, and as a world searching for the truth."

NON-PARTISAN SPIRIT —

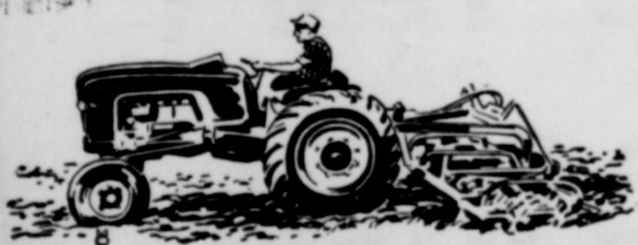
The principal labor leaders are going all out in a campaign to persuade the American people that the labor bill passed by the last Congress and signed by the President is, in reality, a slave labor law which will destroy legitimate labor gains made over many years. And the leaders will do everything in their power to try to get the bill repealed or at least weakened by amendments in coming Congressional sessions.

This gives significance to something Fortune says editorially, in its October issue: "Indeed, one of the most interesting aspects of the new labor legislation is the nonpartisan spirit in which it is debated. Toward the end of the long congressional debates on this 'tough' bill, it seemed as though the bill were scarcely controversial; legislators who voice the union line seem to be almost nonexistent these days. Senate liberals like Paul Douglas and Hubert Humphrey, who had shouted themselves hoarse against Taft-Hartley, this time stood on the sidelines, and finally voted for the bill without a murmur. Even Pat McNamara, who went to Congress after eighteen years as president of a Detroit pipefitters' local ended up among the ninety-five Senators who voted yea."

Why did labor's best friends in Congress vote for the bill? They did so for but one reason — the obvious fact that corruption and abuses within the labor movement had reached the point where the interests of the members themselves and the public at large made correction a matter of utmost urgency. There could no longer be delays. And there could no longer be any justification for a milk-and-water bill.

Well, the new bill is law. It now remains to be seen whether it is strong enough.

New Marriage Law Clamps Down on Minors

Texas new marriage law means a clamping down on minors under the ages of 18 years and 21 years.

No marriage licenses will be issued, except upon the consent and expressly given by the parents or guardians of such underage applicants in the presence of the authority issuing such licenses. The license may be issued on the written consent accompanied with medical certificate.

If a minor has neither parent or guardian, a license cannot be issued without the consent of the County Judge of the county of the residence of the minor and be in writing and signed by the County Judge.

Upon application, the parties under the ages of 18 and 21 must present the County Clerk, birth certificates, motor vehicle, commercial or chauffeur license. Applications must be on file in the County Clerk's office for a period
