In looking over some of the many news releases we received this week, this one we found quite interesting. It was sent in from the County Extension agent.

In speaking of the concern these days over underprivileged children, children whose families lacked sufficient resources to keep up with the mainstream of American life, the question was posed about another group of children with needs. This was the children who are growing up in the midst of plenty, the overprivileged children.

These children are overindulged with money and the things money can buy (buy not necessarily with love and human values.)

These children are overprotected, covered from responsibility (but not taught self-discipline or the ability to make decisions rightly.)

These group of children are overpressured to grow to fast, to get good grades, to become sophisticated and socially adapt (but not necessarily to think for themselves, be creative or become mature persons.)

This article indicated there were as many children in the overprivileged category as in the underprivileged group, as they grow up.

Some are turning out well in spite of being overindulged. But the article pointed out, a few changes are noticeable in some members of the "New" generation. They were in three categories.

--Youth who believe the world owes them a living.

--Teens who try to escape the pressures of life through narcotics, alcohol or even suicide.

--Youth who view marriage as only a temporary arrangement, easily dissolved if unsatisfactory. Perhaps none of the 'overprivileged' factors in a child's upbringing cause these behavior patterns. But studies do show that an individual's personality is largely the result of what effect his early environment within his family had on his basic inherited tendencies.

Each individual has a strong

influence over the way his children (the future generation) develop. To put it like it is, society is nothing more than the total sum of all individuals who grew up in families.

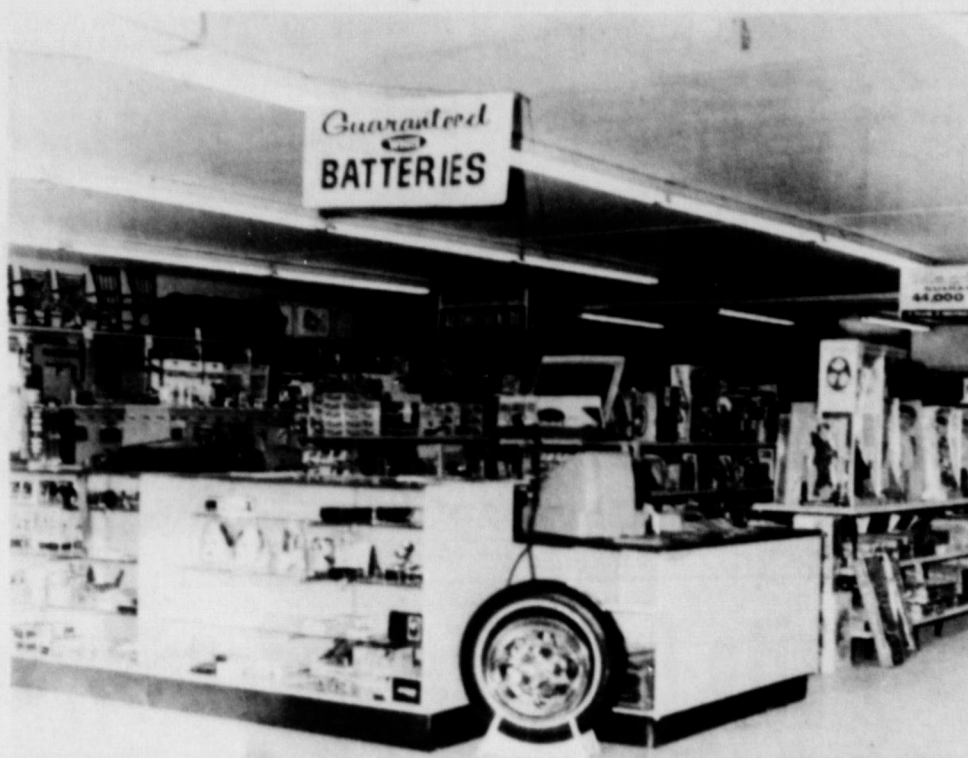

The annual drive to provide the 370 boys at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch with a new suit or clothing package began today.

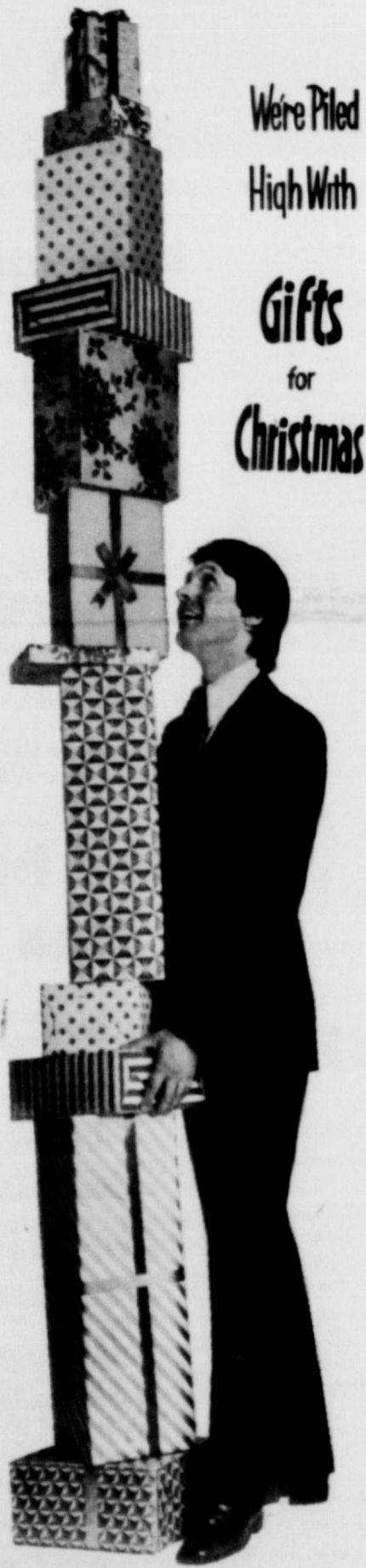

Census on Hired Farm Workers

Information about farm work done for pay during the past year and about migratory farm work will be collected by the Bureau of the Census in this area. Percy R. Millard, Director of the Bureau's Regional Office in Dallas, announced that interviewers will visit a sample of households here during the week of December 9-13.

The farm work questions are in addition to the ones asked regularly in the monthly survey on employment and unemployment conducted by the Bureau for the U. S. Department of Labor.

This ongoing survey provides a continuous measure of conditions in America's labor force. The Labor Department's report for third quarter 1974 showed that the Nation's unemployment rate averaged 5.5 percent, well above the 5.1 percent average rate of the second quarter. Employment reached a new quarterly high of 86.3 million, though the rate of growth has slowed since last year, the report states.

About 50,000 households across the country, scientifically selected to represent a cross section of U. S. households, take part in the survey each month. All information reported to the Census Bureau is confidential by law and can be published only in statistical totals so that no person or household can be identified.

The interviewer visiting households in this area is Rosemary McNeese of Amherst.
