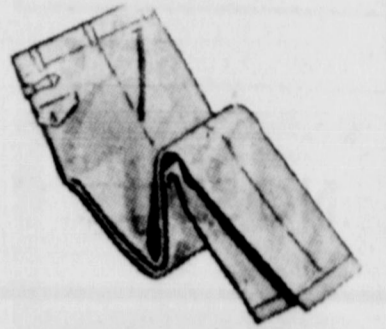

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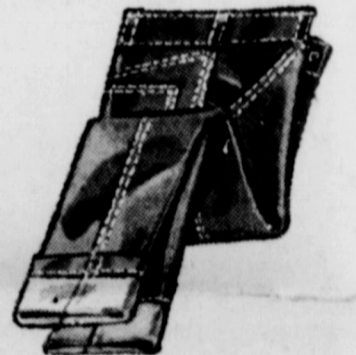
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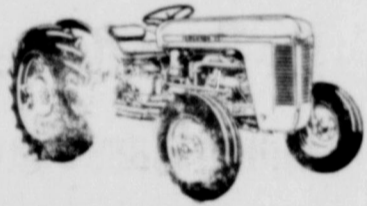

LEGAL NOTICE

LEGAL NOTICE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF LAMB TOWN OF SPRINGLAKE.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF SPRINGLAKE, TEXAS, GOVERNING THE LOCATION OF CESS POOLS AND SEPTIC TANKS WITHIN THE TOWN OF SPRINGLAKE, TEXAS, PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF ITS PROVISIONS, AND PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

SECTION 1. From and after the passage of this Ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to locate, dig, place, install, or cause to be located, placed or installed, any cess pool or septic tank in the town of Springlake, Texas, within one hundred (100) feet of any existing water well and within one hundred fifty (150) feet of any water well owned and used by the Town of Springlake, Texas, for or in connection with its municipal water system.

SECTION 2. PENALTY. Any person, firm, or corporation, violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). If such violation is committed or permitted to continue it shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such.

SECTION 3. ENFORCEMENT. In addition to the penalties above provided, any person, firm or corporation within the town of Springlake, Texas, and any of its officers or employees is hereby given the right, power or authority to enforce this Ordinance by any and all legal and equitable means and remedies.

SECTION 4. SEPARABILITY. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

SECTION 5. EMERGENCY. The fact that some persons, firms, or corporations may be contemplating digging, installing, or placing cess pools or septic tanks closer than one hundred feet to existing water wells within the Town of Springlake, Texas, thereby possibly causing the pollution and contamination of said wells which would seriously affect the health and welfare of the inhabit-

ants of the Town of Springlake, Texas, creates an emergency necessitating the elimination of the requirement of this Ordinance being read more than one time prior to its taking effect and it is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, which shall be in full force and effect immediately from and after the date of its passage.

PASSED, ADOPTED and ORDAINED by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Springlake, Texas, this 3rd day of February, 1959.

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Local Farmers Union Delegates Returns From Washington Trip

Doug Shelby and V. J. Sigman returned home Sunday, February 1 from Washington, D. C. where they had discussed farm legislation with Congressmen from this area and visited other government offices. Making the same trip were about 125 other members of the Farmers Union from Montana, North Dakota, Texas, and Minnesota. They traveled in four chartered buses, arranged by the state headquarters of their organization, and were the third of a series of such delegations going to the national capital this winter.

The Texas delegation left Wichita Falls Friday, January 23, 1959 at 5 p.m. for Washington, D. C. They spent Friday night in Rolla, Mo. and Saturday night in Columbus, Ohio; arriving in Washington Sunday night at 7 p.m.

Monday was spent sightseeing. Points of interest were the Washington Monument, Lincoln Memorial, Jefferson Memorial and others.

Tuesday morning delegations from the four states: Texas, North Dakota, Minnesota and Montana, held a panel discussion with officials of the Department of Agriculture. There, Shelby said, "The delegation had no cooperation from the officials at all in trying to discuss a new, better and more feasible farm program directed to bettering conditions of the farmer." He also said, "Questions of the delegates were either ignored or else the question at hand was manipulated around in such a way that a direct answer was never given. They completely refused to discuss the failures and shortcomings of the present administration's farm program."

Tuesday afternoon was spent in a discussion with officials of the State Department. This meeting proved to be very interesting and enlightening.

On Wednesday the delegation visited with the Congressmen of

their districts. The Texas delegation conferred with Senator Ralph Yarborough and discussed the farm problem with him. A similar discussion was held with Speaker of the House, Sam Rayburn and Majority Leader, Lyndon Johnson. Other House Representatives and Congressmen from Texas and other states were also visited.

"The Congressmen all seemed very interested in the farm situation, and Senator Johnson was found to be very powerful and respected very much in Washington."

The last day there, Thursday, was spent visiting the Smithsonian Institute and revisiting Capitol Hill and seeing more Congressmen.

The Farmers Union organization has asked Congress to consider a permanent PL480 program, involving up to \$3 billion per year of sales for foreign currencies and up to \$300 million in direct donations for foreign relief. Members of the delegation also urged their Congressmen to support the permanent extension of the special milk program for schools, non-profit summer camps and child-care centers and of some form of the food stamp plan for needy families. They expressed opposition to attempts to improve heavier interest and tax burdens on cooperatives, including rural electric and telephone units.

In visits to the Department of State and of Agriculture, the delegation heard reports on the latest farm research efforts.

Mr. Shelby says his visit to Washington impressed him to the value of strong organizations to keep Congress and administrative officials advised of farmers' problems. He reports that many of the people in official Washington showed keen interest in viewpoints brought direct from the country by such means as the Farmers Union bus trips.

Springlake's basketball teams upset Kress Friday night in Springlake's gym, with the girls winning 43 to 38, and the boys completely dominating their game 69 to 50.

In the boy's game it was a complete reversal to the outcome when the teams met earlier in Kress. At that time Kress won by over 20 points with their star, Freeman, making 29 points. This time Wolverines were able to hold Freeman to 5 points with a tight zone defense. Springlake jumped to a 39 to 18 lead at the half, scoring 26 points in the second quarter, the highest one quarter production of the year for the Wolverines. For Kress Campbell poured in 32 of her team's total 38 points.

Applications Open For Arizona Cypress Tree Seedlings

The Lamb County Soil Conservation District is now taking applications for Arizona Cypress seedlings to be planted this spring.

Practice What You Preach Says

Like civility, safety should begin at home — then followed up at school and in the community.

Regrettably, far too few parents realize the importance of proper home training in the development of safety habits. Habits that may in later years mean the difference between a healthy, fruitful life or one of injury, regret and, possibly, an early death.

By proper home training I don't mean just plain, "No! No! Johnny — that'll hurt." Certainly, the kind I'm speaking of requires direction and the dictation of the do — and — don't type but the most important lessons will be learned from parental example.

Tell a child to be careful when riding a bicycle, or not to dash into the street, is of little avail if he sees father driving past a stop sign, or mother jay-walking to the dress shop across the street.

If you doubt that parents are safety thoughtless, ask any school patrol boy. He will tell you that it is generally the parents who have the least regard for traffic safety rules; it is the parents who do the double-parking ("... I have to get back home; ... It's only for a minute; ad infinitum)."

who get out from the wrong side of a car or disregard crosswalk markings.

Anyone of these, and dozens of other such careless habits, are not of tremendous importance when singled out, but when viewed in the whole — as a child does — they build an attitude in the youngster's mind. (One of careless respect) that lasts a lifetime.

Without question, a universal respect of safety rules, for the common good is the ultimate answer to our safety problems — whether they be at work, play, home or in traffic.

How great is the need for proper traffic safety training? It is great enough that if our present traffic habits go unchallenged we can expect every second pre-school child in Texas, today, to experience a traffic accident before he or she reaches voting age.

Let me sound like an alarmist, let me hasten to add that such a statement isn't so far fetched in the light of present facts.

This year, according to Texas Safety Association records, two

and a half-million Texans will operate more than four and a quarter million motor vehicles in excess of forty-billion miles. And, in so doing, they will pile up a total of nearly 275-thousand accidents. The cost? It has been conservatively placed at \$275-million.

Indeed, this is not a bright picture and promises to worsen as Texas population increases with greater and greater rapidity.

What can we do to extricate ourselves from the horns of this traffic dilemma? The first step should be taken in the home, through consistent safety training by both parents. Secondly, by careful examples. Finally, by combining the first two steps to build healthy safety attitudes.

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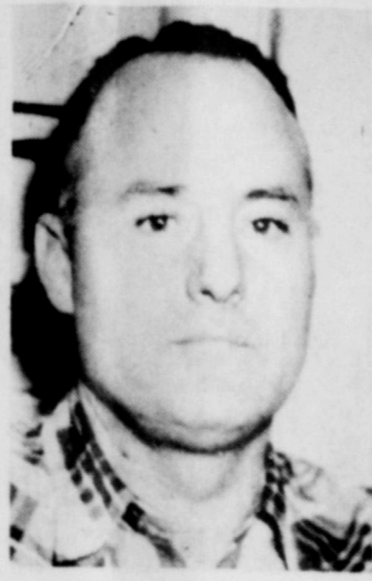
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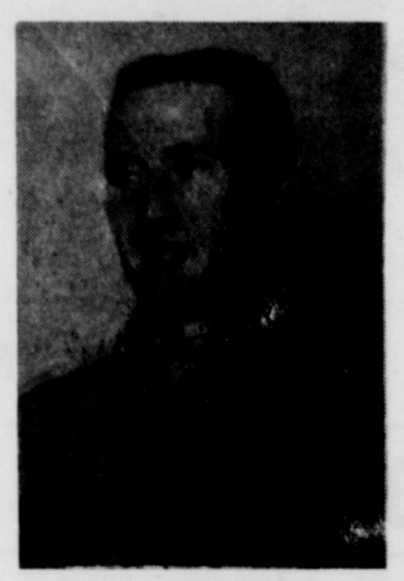

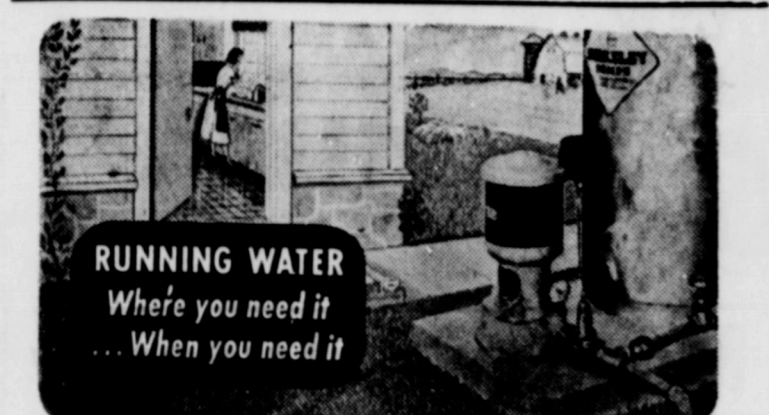
