I caution you to observe some of the clowns who are writing the new constitution.

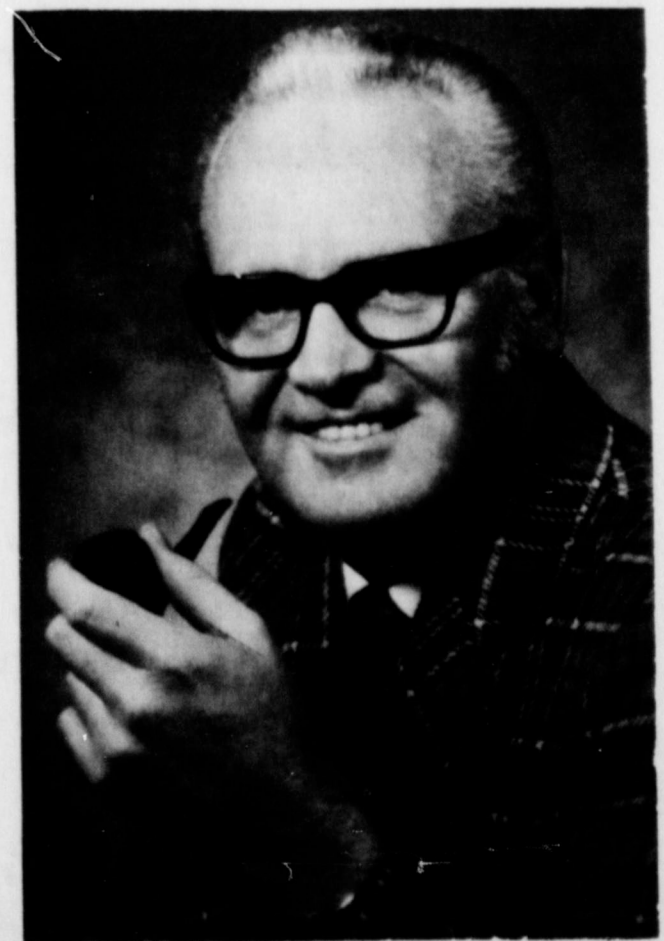

Mrs. E. C. Hudson was narrator for the event.

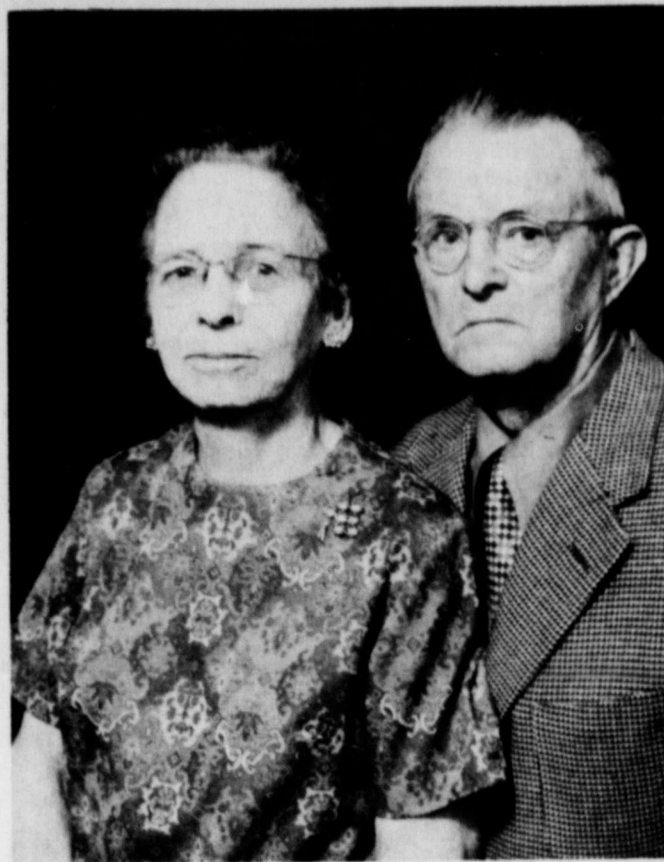

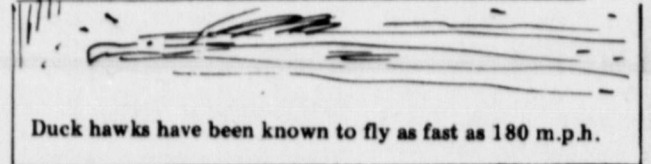

LEVELLAND--The South Plains College track team claimed the runner-up title at the Western Junior College Conference championships in Hobbs last Friday, missing the team title by a slim two-point margin.

New Mexico Junior College topped the Texans for the title, 96-94, while Odessa finished third with 77 points and New Mexico Military Institute was a distant fourth with seven points.

In the first running event of the day--the 440-yard relay--SPC established a new conference and school record by turning in a spry 40.8 time. The time recorded by Oida Lewis of Lubbock, James Parker of Clovis, N. M., James Sanders of New Deal and Marvin Baker of Midland is the second best time in the nation this year for the event. The former WJCC record was 40.9 set by NMJC last season. The SPC record was 41.2 set earlier this year.

The Texans had two double winners. Lewis won both the long and triple jumps with leaps of 24 feet and 45 feet, one inch respectively. Tim Givens of Olton was impressive with his two hurdle victories, beating

performers who previously had topped him in the 120-yard high hurdles and the 440-yard intermediates. "His 56.3 time in the intermediates was very good considering the condition of the track," Ramsey said.

The conference championship eluded the Texans when Parker, leading in the 220-yard dash by three yards with 40 to go, slipped in a puddle of water in his lane. He finished fifth in that race after taking second in the 100 in a dead heat with NMJC's Willie Johnson.

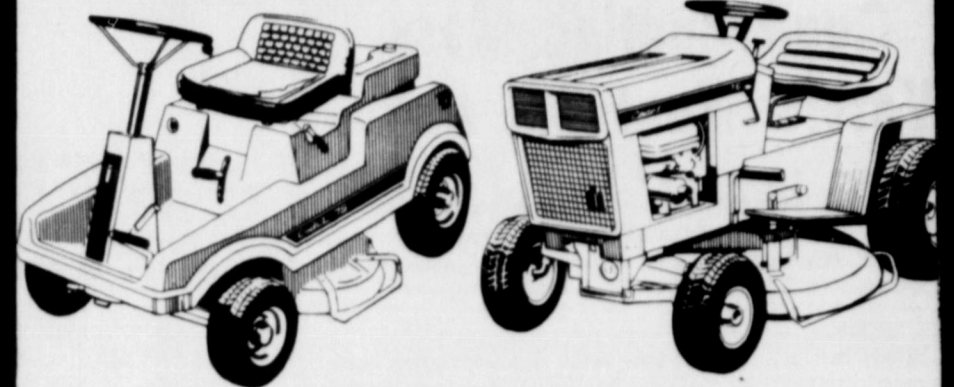

Trim Off Excess Weight

Many people find those tasty delights remain with them, in the form of extra pounds.

Sally Springer, foods and nutrition specialist with the "It's best to take off extra pounds as soon as possible. Otherwise, it may get put off and never be done."

"You should lose those extra five pounds in two to three weeks by cutting down 1,000 calories daily, or in about five weeks by cutting down 500 calories daily," she said.

When reducing, the specialist advised being sensible. "Reduce size of servings but eat a wide variety of foods. Cut down on calories, not nutrients."

"To do this, choose foods wisely, avoid 'empty-calorie' foods with lots of calories but few vitamins and minerals."

Using fortified skim milk helps cut down on calories, Miss Springer noted. "It con-

tains half the calories of whole milk, but the same valuable calcium, riboflavin and protein without extra fat.

"Citrus fruits, on the other hand, are low in calories and rich in vitamin C, another important nutrient."

The specialist offered some suggestions in meal preparation to help reduce calorie intake.

"For one, serve steamed or poached vegetables such as broccoli or carrots. They furnish lots of vitamin A but few calories."

"Also, avoid adding extra fat, cream or cheese sauces to vegetables. Instead, experiment with different herbs and spices to please family tastes."

"In addition, trim excess fat from meat before cooking it, the specialist continued.

"Dieting doesn't mean avoiding enriched breads and cereals, they supply essential B-vitamins

Bedwetting Termed "Not So Serious" Problem

Bedwetting usually isn't as serious as some parents think, one authority contends.

She's Dorothy Taylor, family life education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

The specialist termed bedwetting "simple inconvenient--unless the family puts undue pressure on the child by making him view it as a problem. "Actually, it's just one part of toilet training and a natural step in a child's development.

"However, it requires more parental help than other development processes--and lots of patience and understanding from the entire family."

Most parents just expect too much too soon, Miss Taylor said. "They forget that children aren't little adults. Parents should expect only what children can accomplish."

In general, daytime bladder control comes first-- followed by control at night. For most children, this happens by age three, she noted.

"We view bedwetting as a slight problem if a child doesn't accomplish this training by age three. Even so, most children outgrow bedwetting by school age."

Physicians can diagnose and treat organically caused bed-

wetting. In such cases--although not very numerous--family understanding is a "must," the specialist continued.

"When there's no organic reason for bedwetting, a physician can suggest training methods which usually meet success. However, for these to succeed, parents must be willing to work with the child rather than nag at him.

"In addition, they can de-emphasize--or at least help the child cope with--any emotional factors accompanying bedwetting."

Giving credit when credit's due is one of the best things parents can do, Miss Taylor pointed out.

"A child likes to be praised as his efforts result in small triumphs.

"As with any other effort, this shows he's making progress--and helps him continue toward eventual success."

She stressed the parental--and family--role in reassuring and supporting the child in his efforts.

"Of course, the opposite also can happen. Criticism or punishment can undo any accomplishments a child has made. Pressuring him for immediate or consistent dryness may only delay the process.

"Dryness results as the child grows and learns his parents' expectations and his own capabilities," the specialist added.

Translating 'Mexican Food' Labels

Translating "Mexican food" labels doesn't require a knowledge of Spanish, one authority points out.

Mrs. Karen Walker, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, offered some guidelines for determining contents of canned and frozen Mexican foods.

First, she said that all meats product labels list ingredients in decreasing order--according to weight in the recipe.

"Consumers also can use USDA requirements to help translate labels.

"For example, meat tacos or taquitos (miniature tacos) must contain at least 15 per cent meat.

"Meat taco filling purchased separately--and put in tortillas at home--is no less than 40 per cent meat."

As for chili con carne, Mrs. Walker noted it has a minimum of 40 per cent meat, while "poultry chili" must contain at least 28 per cent poultry meat.

"Meat chili percentages are based on raw meat weight, which is reduced during processing--while poultry chili percentages are based on the cooked weight, which does not reduce during processing.

"Chili con carne with beans" has 25 per cent or more meat, she added.

"That favorite hot dog topper, chili sauce with meat, has at least six per cent meat."

The specialist also said tamales contain at least 25 per cent meat--"tamales with sauce" or "tamales with gravy" have at least 20 per cent meat.

Enchiladas with meat and burritos containing meat must meet minimum requirements of 15 per cent meat.

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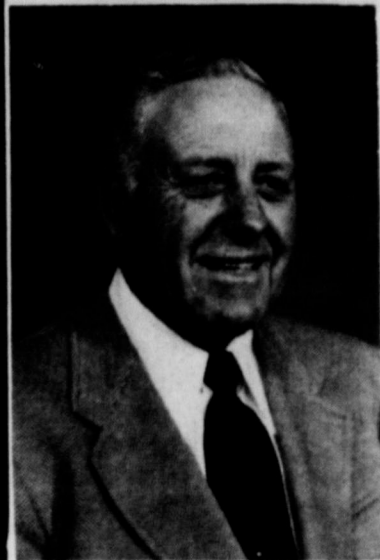

"Besides serving as versatile storage and display units, shelving works as a decorating aid," Anna Marie Gottschalk, housing and home furnishings specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas

A&M University System, noted. Used properly, shelves provide unity of space and shape, she said.

"For example, to unify a room, match shelf color to that of the room.

"To accent shelving, cover the wall behind it with contrasting colorful cloth, paper or paint.

"Another possibility involves papering shelves and wall with a dynamic print."

For shelving, the specialist advised consumers to keep personal needs in mind--but remember that flexibility results in long-lasting use. Also, plan shelves in relation to the room and surrounding spaces.

"Available either unfinished or finished--in wood stains or bright enamel paints, individual shelves are sold in many different lengths and widths. To install them, use brackets

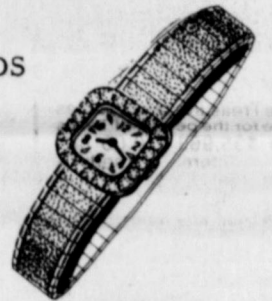
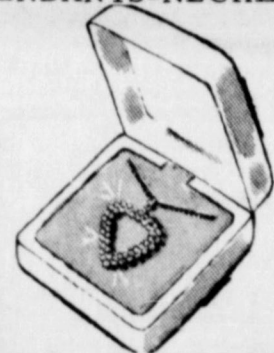

Sorghum Exports Increasing Steadily

Sorghum has come to the forefront as a major export grain, and its markets are strong and steady.

"About one-fifth of the millet in the United States is exported each year, making it the top sorghum exporting country," says Roland Smith, grain marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"A continuing upturn can be expected in the long run although exports may soften some this year. Japan continues as the leading importer. Israel looks like she will continue importing along with India, Venezuela, Chile, Nicaragua, the Netherlands, Iran, Niger, Mauritania, Upper Volta and Senegal, the last four being African countries," points out the Texas A&M University System specialist.

The volume of sorghum moving to Japan this year should exceed the 105 million bushels

imported in 1973. This was more than half of all the sorghum exported. The Japanese use the grain for chicken and cattle feed.

Israel ranks as the second most important importer with orders exceeding 20 million bushels.

"India is not far behind but its market is dependent on human food production. When there is enough wheat and rice to go around, Indian millet imports drop. In times of food shortages sorghum is consumed as a cereal grain," says Smith.

Using sorghum as basic chicken feed, the Netherlands imports about five million bushels yearly.

Some 14 million bushels of sorghum were shipped to Venezuela last year where the grain is used primarily for feeding cattle.

Weeds, A Major Crop Problem

Crop-robbing weeds are a direct problem in raising food and fiber crops, but consumers eventually pay most of the bill through high production costs, says the assistant director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Dr. Dudley T. Smith said southern farmers have been fighting weeds by sharply increasing their use of herbicides—the cheapest and most effective means. The State Agricultural Experiment Stations and U. S. Department of Agriculture weed scientists have worked cooperatively with various commodity organizations and chemical companies in developing effective, low cost weed control methods. However, crop losses due to weeds are still greater than those of any other plant pest.

In 1958, herbicides were applied to 15 per cent of the seven leading crops — corn, cotton, sorghum, soybeans, rice, peanuts and vegetables — in southern states. By 1968, treat-

ment acreage rose to 70 per cent. An estimated 90 to 95 per cent of cotton, rice and peanuts is treated today.

Smith said current successful herbicide research, development and marketing are strongly oriented toward two areas—weed removal economics and the ecological succession of new problem species.

He pointed out that losses in southern crops may range from 40 to 90 per cent due to seasonal competition by weed pests. Even when weeds were removed after four to six weeks, yields were generally reduced 8 to 30 per cent. Losses were greatest in cotton and peanuts due to the long growing seasons of these crops.

The economics of weed control is a major concern. For example, each pigweed in cotton costs about 2 cents. This means, Smith said, that a light infestation of 250 weeds per acre would impose an economic loss of \$5 per acre. That is after all the usual weed control methods have been employed. Since

farm fuel prices will probably go up, producers may have to rely on herbicides even more to do the cheapest job of weed control in crops.

Perennial weed species are even bigger trouble makers. These pests usually have a head start on the crop, re-grow from roots, fewer control measures are available, and they are "We have found that moderate perennial weed infestations (50 per cent of maximum density) caused cotton losses of \$24 to \$78 per acre, while sorghum losses were \$36 to \$64 per acre. Where perennials achieved maximum density, despite cultivation and hoeing, there was a total loss in both crops, Smith said.

The assistant director pointed out that weed scientists have noted how discontinued tillage or repeated herbicide use can lead to invasion by a different or new pest. When one weed type is knocked out, another species may take its place.

"We have new weeds entering all the time. Hence, old chemicals may be good now but do

Stop Screwworms This Spring by Submitting Samples

Livestock producers should be aware that 1974 has the earmarks of an extremely bad screwworm season, and should make every effort to reduce the number of outbreaks. This word comes from County Extension Agent Buddy C. Logsdon.

Program officials are asking producers to refrain from livestock surgery or other man-made wounds or prevent screw-

worm infestations. The Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association has pointed out that at least 30 per cent of this season's cases have resulted from dehorning, branding, docking, and similar practices.

County Agent Buddy Logsdon urges all livestock producers to support the screwworm eradication effort by carrying out three key practices: (1) Inspecting their animals frequently; (2) Treating all wounds found with an approved product; and (3) Collecting and sending worm samples from wounds to the USDA Screwworm laboratory at Mission, Texas for identification. The post office box is 969.

As cases are confirmed, sterile screwworm fly treatment is initiated by the USDA. "It is vitally important for program officials to know where cases are happening in order to begin the sterile fly treatment before cases are too numerous," the County Agent reminds.

As spring migrations of fertile flies from south of the Rio Grande continue, the cases move northward across Texas rather rapidly. Already, positive cases have been confirmed as far north as Brown and Haskell Counties, so all southern, central and west Texas areas should watch for screwworms, says Logsdon.

ical attention, especially for children. "These symptoms include throat discomfort when swallowing, swollen glands in the neck and pain when pressed gently under the angle of the jaw. "Also if the child feels feverish--with a temperature of 101-104 degrees, which usually indicates a strep infection--or if he complains of headache or nausea, or was in contact with other children who have scarlet fever or sore throats, take

him to the doctor. "Only a physician can determine whether or not there's a strep infection. Proper medical

treatment early in the course of infection usually will prevent complications," she said. Turning to possible complications, the specialist explained that rheumatic fever can permanently damage a child's heart. This condition, known as most prevalent between the ages of five and 15.

"Glomerulonephritis, on the other hand, results in an inflammation of kidney structures. Blood in the urine, swelling, high blood pressure--and in severe cases, shortness of breath, delirium, convulsions and coma-- characterize this condition.

"Although exact cause is unknown, this disease often follows other infections, especially those of the upper respiratory tract," Dr. Sears added.

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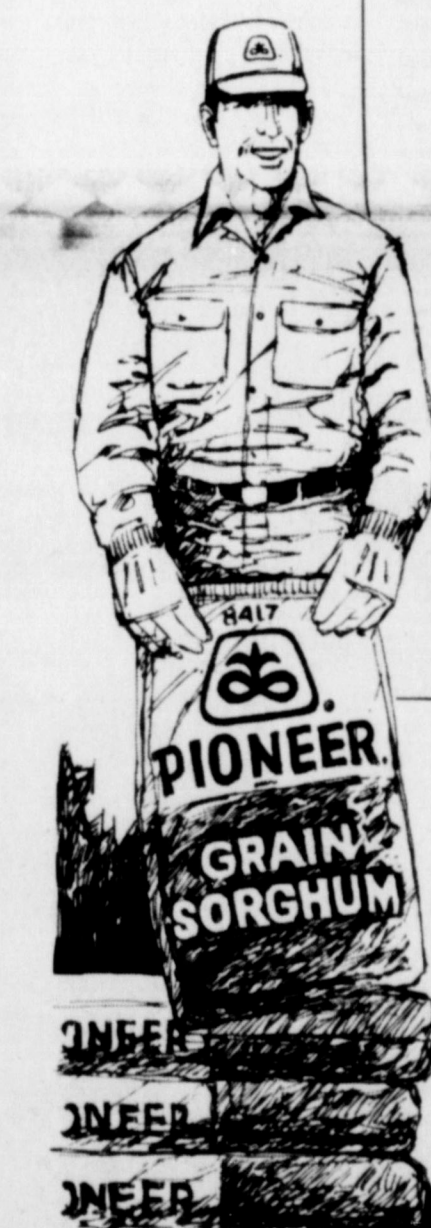
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West Texas Irrigation Wells Face Shutdown

Irrigation wells and pumps in drought-stricken West Texas may soon be forced to close down because of a shortage of lubricating oils, State Representative Bill Clayton (D-Springlake) warned today.

Clayton, who recently led a large number of his colleagues in the Texas Legislature to petition the Federal Energy Office for a reassessment of the F. E. O. lube oil priority, stated that while he has been assured that a new priority is being written for agricultural use of lube-oil products, the priority change probably will not go into effect until June 1. Clayton cautioned that many areas of the state will be completely out of lubricating oil before the new priority gives them any relief.

To help avoid the possible shutdown of these essential irrigation wells, Representative Clayton reported that he is encouraging all dealers and distributors who are running out of lube oil to contact the Texas Railroad Commission's Fuel Allocation division in Austin to find out if any additional lubricants may be available in their particular case. The Austin number of this department is 512/475-5491. In addition, Rep. Clayton urged all persons with such problems to contact his Austin office at 512/475-3400.

After conferring with several energy officials and lube oil distributors last week, Rep. Clayton left for Atlanta to meet with the Southern Legislative Conference, of which he is an Executive Board member. At this meeting of legislators from across the southern states, Rep. Clayton pushed for solutions which would bring quicker response to the problems of energy crisis. One solution which Rep. Clayton suggested that met with a good response was a proposal that the states push for authority to be allowed to handle their own fuel allocation programs. Many of those in attendance agreed with Rep. Clayton that such a program would work better than the federal allocation program because of the fact that the states will have a better knowledge of their own energy problems and needs.
