### HENRY LEWIS REMAINS CRITICAL

## Two Injured In Wreck Near Earth Thursday

Henry W. Lewis of Earth, Lamb County Commissioner, was still listed in critical condition late Wednesday afternoon from injuries received in a car crash Thursday, north of Earth.

He is still in the Intensive Care Ward in Methodist Hospital in Lubbock with severe head injuries. Reports Tuesday indicated Lewis seemed to be a little stronger but had never regained consciousness. Wednesday the report remained about the same, no improvement over early Tuesday morning.

Orbie Armstrong, a second victim, in the two-car collision, was dismissed from the Littlefield Hospital on Monday, and is recovering from cuts about his face and bruises covering his body.



TWO WERE INJURED in a wreck Thursday afternoon near Earth. The injured were Orbie Armstrong. Both vehicles came to rest in a small lake bed on the east side of FM Road 1255.

Highway Patrolman Weldon Parson reported that Lewis was traveling east on a country road and Armstrong north on the FM 1055 when the accident occurred at the two-mile intersection north of Earth at 4:10 p. m.

Armstrong, driving a '68 Buicksaid he saw Lewis as he approached the intersection driving the 1966 Chevrolet pickup. He said he tried to avoid the crash, but failed, Lewis who is a careful driver it thought to have become an entroutee.

The Buick reportedly struck the pickup-up in the right side at the intersection and both vehicles were knocked into the lake bed on the right side of the FM Road, in an upright position. Both vehicles received severe damages.

One ambulance from Olton and one from Muleshoe brought both victims to Littlefield Hospital where Armstrong remained.

After examination, Lewis was rushed by the same ambulance to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. He was still unconscious on arrival at the Lubbock hospital.

Both men have been residents of Earth for many years.

## First Bale Of Cotton Brought In By Kendricks

The first bale of cotton in the Earth Area was brought in Monday, September 24, by H. W. "Sap" Kendricks, of the Dodd Community to the Dodd Gin Co.

The 1690 pounds of seed cotton produced 422 pounds of lint and 900 pounds of seed. The cotton is of high grade.

A premium of \$100 was paid for the seed, and \$3.50 a pound for the cotton. The first bale of cotton was ginned free.

The cotton was produced on the Branscum Estate located 1 mile west, and 1 1/2 miles south of the Dodd Gin.

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## Bill Clayton Named Chairman Of TWCA

Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake has been named chairman of the Texas Water Conservation Association (TWCA) Committee on the 160-Acre Limitation Feature of the Reclamation Law, John W. Simmons of Orange, president of TWCA, announced today.

The 11-man committee, Simmons said, will work with other similar groups in the Western states in seeking modification of the acreage limitation provisions of the federal reclamation law. The Act, passed by the Congress in 1902, limits the number of acres to 160 for which a landowner can receive irrigation water from a project without paying interest on the cost of the project.

Other members of the committee are Robert D. Lemon of Perryton, Russell Bean of Lubbock, J. W. Buchanan of Dumas, E. W. Easterling of Beaumont, David H. Brune of Arlington,

W. D. Parish of Mercedes, C. W. Weber of Houston, Walter J. Wells of Waco, Judge Guy C. Jackson, Jr., of Kerrville, who will serve as advisor to the committee, and Simmons.

Clayton, who has headed the House Interim Water Study Committee for several years, is considered one of the most knowledgeable members of the Texas House of Representatives in the field of water resources development. He and his committee are presently holding hearings in various parts of Texas on proposed water legislation.

Clayton said the TWCA committee would meet in the near future to plan its work and make plans for establishing contacts with similar groups in the other western and southwestern states.

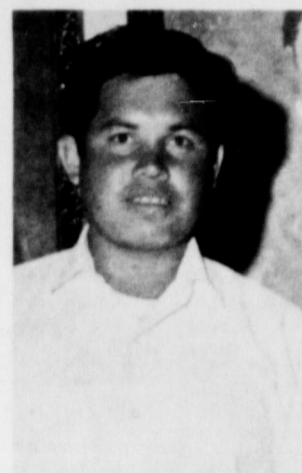
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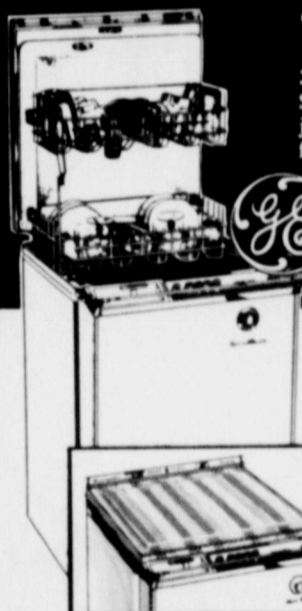
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## Charlotte Sawyer Enters Draughon's Business College

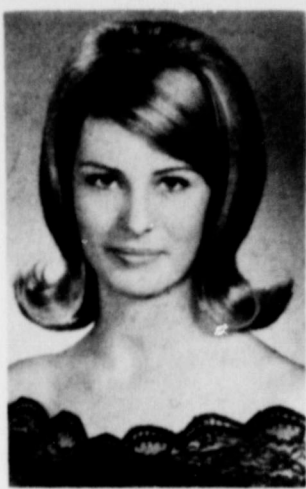

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## MAILING TIME OCTOBER 1 What Does A GI Want For Christmas?

What does a serviceman in Vietnam really want for Christmas? A recent survey by the United Service Organization disclosed that items high on their "want" list include shaving equipment, foot spray, shampoo in plastic bottles, penlight, insect repellent, small jigsaw puzzles, first aid kits, key chains and key-cases, ballpoint pens, writing materials, medicated cleansing cream, small face towels, miniature sewing kits, large work handkerchiefs, hard candy in tins, and paperback books. Small three-inch recording tapes, medical scrub brushes, foam insoles for combat boots, heavy work socks, one inch paint brushes, and small crossword puzzle books are also popular.

LAST YEAR, in addition to those gifts received directly by individual servicemen from relatives and friends, hundreds of gifts were received by USO clubs in Vietnam and distributed to servicemen visitors, to hospitals, and by airlift to remote units. Monetary contributions to USO made possible Christmas Day programs in Vietnam USO clubs which featured entertainment and free home cooked dinners with all the traditional trimmings. With the increase in troop strength in recent months, USO staff members are already busily making plans for Christmas 1968 in the hope that this year's observance will be bigger and better than ever to help ease the loneliness of servicemen everywhere in Vietnam, many of whom are away from home for the first time.

UNITED STATES postal authorities will no longer accept packages addressed to "A Serviceman in Vietnam." However, where donors desire that USO distribute gifts to "Any Serviceman in Vietnam," the USO advises that gift packages addressed to USO Club Directors at specific APO addresses, and bearing an outside label identifying the contents, are acceptable and will be distributed by USO staff during the holidays. Donors pay postage from their hometowns to the APO in San Francisco, and surface mail parcels should be mailed by October 1st to insure delivery in Vietnam by Christmas.

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
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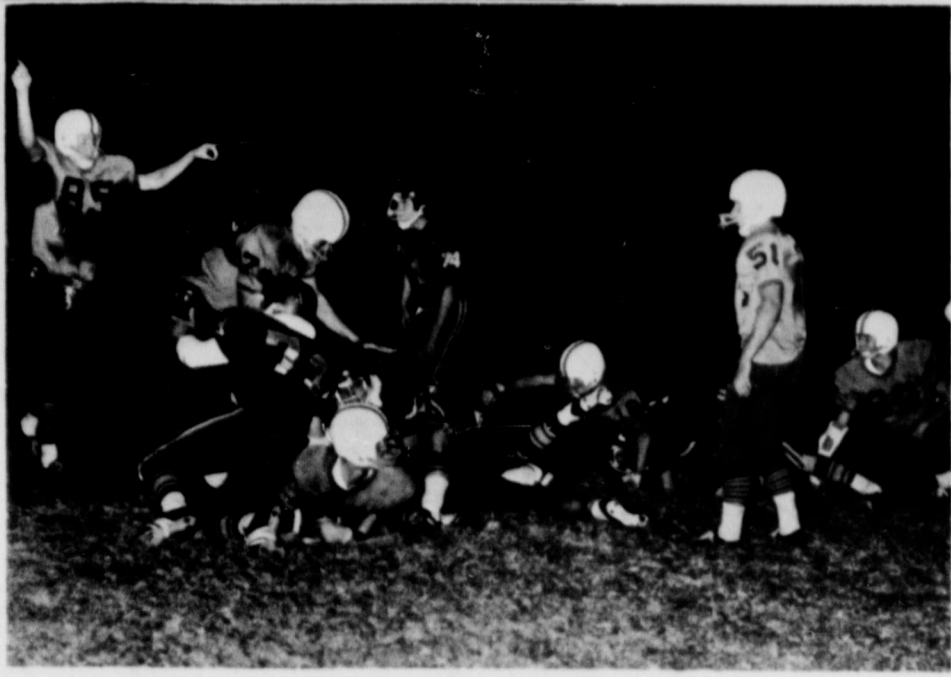

# Wolverines Drop Heart Breaker To Hale Center 12-7

The underrated Wolverines of Springlake-Earth gave warning to Class AA Schools Friday night when they were going to be reckoned with on the football field.

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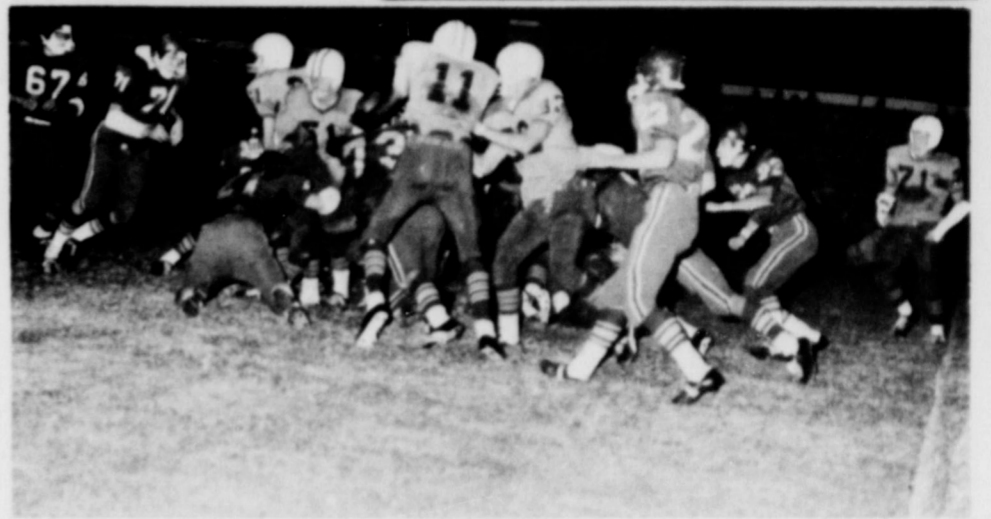

## Belew Elected To PCGA Board

Hershel Belew of Earth was elected one of the 2 new directors of the Plains Cotton Ginners Association in a business meeting held in Lubbock Saturday, September 14.

350 persons met at the Lubbock Country Club to discuss a proposal to extend the Agricultural Act of 1965. This proposal is slated to come before Congress once more this week.

The House has approved a one-year extension of the bill with a limitation on federal payments of \$20,000 to any single farmer. A four-year extension without individual farm payment limitation has come out of the Senate.

These are the major differences: a conference committee is expected to attempt to resolve, but Rep. Paul Findley (R-III.) so far has blocked efforts to get the matter before joint House-Senate Conference.

Johnson said House Agriculture Committee leaders plan to bring the issue to a head Tuesday or Wednesday. If these efforts are successful, a conference committee compromise could be ready for action by the full House and Senate perhaps by Thursday, he added.

The 1965 Act is scheduled to expire at the end of 1969. If there is an extension at this session of Congress, it will be for a one-year period without a payment limitation feature, Johnson predicted.

This would mean the current cotton, feed grains and wheat programs would be extended through 1970. Revisions for 1969, of course, still could be made within the framework of the present basic law for each commodity program.

Whatever happens, Johnson said, Rep. Bob Poage of Waco, chairman of the House Agriculture Committee has candidly admitted the farm bill he is fighting for now could be the last one of its type.

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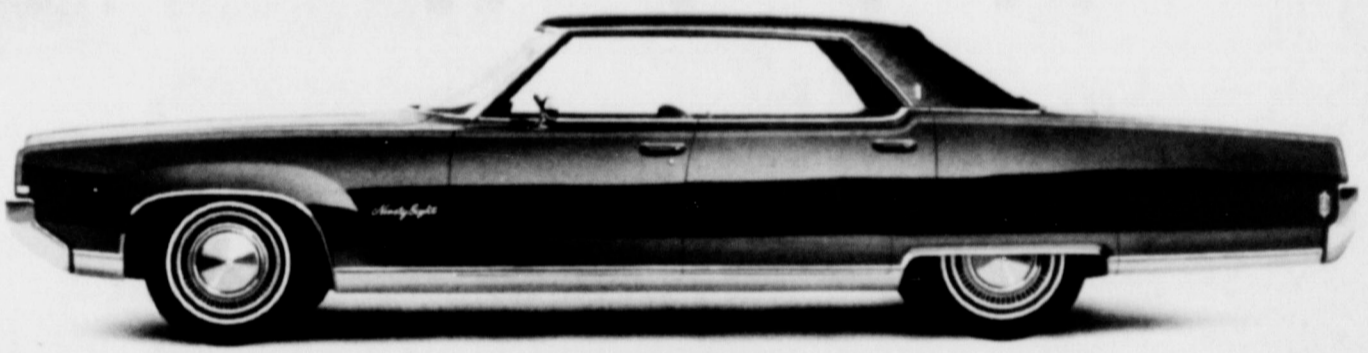

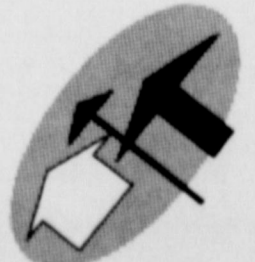
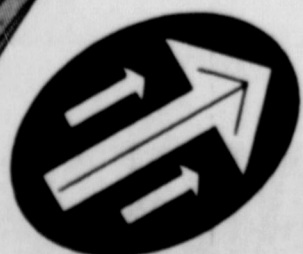

# Rep. Clayton To Speak At Texas County Judges And Commissioners Meet In Austin

AUSTIN-- Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake will be one of the principle speakers at the annual meeting of the Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association in Austin on Thursday, October 10.

Clayton will discuss the role of county government in relation to the State Legislature. As Chairman of the Counties Committee, Clayton directs all legislation relating to county matters in the Texas House of Representatives. During the last session of the Legislature his committee handled more than 230 bills.

"I believe it is extremely important that county officials be informed on what the Legislature is doing that affects their affairs," Clayton said. "One thing I will suggest is that county officials seek legislation allowing the creation of an organization to represent them in Austin that would keep them informed and also make their views known to members of the Legislature. An advocate of strong local government, Clayton said the volume of bills affecting counties has grown tremendously in recent years and that it is now virtually impossible for each county official to keep up with what is happening in Austin. He said that unless county officials keep a close liaison with state government, they are in danger of having the powers of local self government eroded away."

"I believe they can best serve the interests of the citizens of every county in Texas by an active association dealing directly with legislative matters," Clayton said.

Clayton said one of the pending legislative matters affecting all counties will be compliance with the U. S. Supreme Court ruling on the Midland case, which will require all county commissioner precincts to be reapportioned on the "one-man, one vote" principle.

"The Legislature is certain to consider this apportionment next year," he said. "And this is a problem that is of great importance to every county government, since it is certain to make drastic changes in the makeup of many of them."

Clayton is serving his third term as the representative of Legislative District 78, which includes Castro, Deaf Smith, Lamb,

Oldham and Farmer Counties, and is running for another term with the District being changed by adding Bailey and Cochran Counties and deleting Oldham County.

## The Label Is A Window

COLLEGE STATION-- The label is a window to see inside a package. But you may find some peculiarities, like no list of ingredients.

If the manufacturers use a standard recipe, he need not list ingredients, says Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist.

The label may have only a partial list if a standard recipe is used with the addition of some ingredients. Or you may find a full list of ingredients.

There is no listing of ingredients for enriched white bread. If made according to Federal standards says the Texas A&M University specialist. However, the law requires that the label have sodium propionate, a harmless mold inhibitor, listed on it if it was added. Although made according to federal standards manufacturers using choice ingredients, such as 99 score butter and fresh milk, may wish to name the ingredients.

Read the list of ingredients when they are on the label. Remember that the ingredients are listed in the order of their predominance, from the most to the least, says Mrs. Clyatt. It's a good idea to read the list of ingredients of even familiar products occasionally to determine nutritive value and cost of the food.

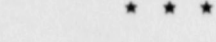
