## Five Injured In Bus-Pickup Mishap

A school bus and a pickup accident involving the driver of the bus, Smythe Lawrence, and Earl Davis of Hereford occurred Friday at 3:15 p. m. three miles east of the school on FM 2901 and Highway 385.

Lawrence was driving a 1961 Chevrolet Springlake-Earth school bus heading east on FM 2901 and the Davis vehicle was headed north on Highway 385. According to the investigating officer, Weldon Parson, Lawrence pulled out in front

of the Davis pickup from a stop sign and the pickup was unable to stop and hit the bus broad-side.

There were 16 to 17 students in the school bus and there were no serious injuries sustained by any of the children. Mrs. Earl Davis was an occupant in her husband's pickup and received serious injuries.

Two students were taken to the Dimmitt Hospital for minor bumps and were immediately

released.

Mr. and Mrs. Davis were taken to Hereford by Parsons ambulance at Olton where Davis was treated and released. Mrs. Davis received a broken leg, dislocated hip and lacerations.

Damage to the bus was estimated at \$400 to \$500. The pickup was declared a total loss.

Lawrence was charged with failing to yield right of way at a stop intersection.

## '71 County Budget Approved

The 1971 county budget and salaries of county officials were set last week when the Lamb County Commissioners' Court met in an extended session.

Salaries for all elected officials were approved as proposed by the commissioners' court in November.

Amendments were made on budgets submitted by several offices. County Clerk Mary Beth Willey requested the employment of four full-time deputies at \$400 per month and a part-time deputy clerk during the summer at \$250 per month, plus \$300 for conference expenses, \$3,000 for Xerox machine and supplies, \$2,200 for books and binders and \$600 for telephone expenses. Commissioners amended this to two full-time deputies at \$400 per month and two at \$375 per month.

Tax Assessor-Collector Herbert Dunn submitted a proposal for salaries of \$4,800 for two deputies and three others at \$4,200 and extra help at \$300 per month, also 30 cents each to sub stations selling tags and \$1.50 per hour plus 10 cents per mile when assessing in various communities for a total estimated fee for this office for 1971 of \$45,000.

This budget was amended to provide two deputies at \$4,500 three at \$3,900 and extras at \$250 per month, with car expenses omitted for assessing, collecting and servicing tag stations.

Budget for District Clerk Ray Lynn Britt's office totaled \$5,400 for 1971 including the salary of \$3,900 salary for one deputy clerk.

The budget approved for the Lamb County sheriff's office totaled \$52,118. This includes \$7,072.50, sheriff's salary, and five deputies at \$5,610 each annually and one deputy

at \$3,960, plus \$12,000 expenses and a new 100-watt base station radio at \$1,343.

A proposed increase of 10 per cent was made for the county agent, assistant county agent, county home demonstration agent and office secretary. Commissioners amended this, with the county's traveling expenses for the county agent, \$1,980 plus \$800 traveling expenses for the assistant county agent, \$2,280 plus \$800 traveling expenses for the county home demonstration agent, and \$3,300 for the office secretary.

The budget submitted from County Attorney Curtis Wilkinson's office was approved as submitted for estimated expenses of \$4,850 which includes \$3,300 for a secretary.

Salary for Justice of Peace Stanley Doss was set the same as the salary paid last year, \$4,980.

A proposed library book fund was cut from \$1,800 to \$1,500 and salaries of \$265 and \$240 per month were approved for the county librarian and assistant librarian.

County Treasurer Lucy Moreland requested a travel check of \$75 per month, and commissioners denied this request.

The court approved a maintenance contract of \$13,150 per year for Calvin Harvey. Salaries for other county employees were set as follows: veterans' service officer, \$137.50 per month; Amherst night watchman, \$200 per month; health officer, \$50 per month; secretary to district attorney, \$194.93 per month; county welfare agent, \$475 per month; county welfare secretary, \$12 per day; and \$66 per month for extra help in the welfare office. A salary of \$500 per month was set for county precinct equipment

operators, and \$275 per month for the county judge's secretary.

In other action, the commissioners' court approved the withdrawal of \$10,000 in bonds from the Federal Reserve Bank, approved the payment of \$2,400 into the Lamb County Soil Conservation District for 1971, approved the installation of buried cable in precincts 2 and 3 from General Telephone Co. County wide bills were considered and were ordered paid, the quarterly reports of the county treasurer were approved, and reports of the county agriculture agent, the county treasurer, county clerk and county trapper were considered and passed.

## 9,034 Swine Fed In Lamb

County stockmen handled 9,034 baby pigs and weaners during the past year, according to the 1970 Swine Survey conducted by Southwestern Public Service Company.

Eight thousand, eight hundred and eighty-seven fat hogs were sold by Lamb feeders during the past 12 months, the survey reveals.

Evidence of the expanding swine breeding-feeding business in Lamb County is indicated by the fact that 65 sows were added to county herds last year, but local breeders plan to add 855 sows before this year ends.

Only eight counties among the 39 served by SWPSC bought more feeder pigs than the 9,034 placed on feed in this county last year.

At the end of 1970, 999 sows and 2,595 gilts and 109 boars were counted in Lamb swine herds.

If breeders follow through with plans to add 674 sows during the next 12 months, size of county herds would more than double.

Only Gray, Hale and Floyd County producers plan to enlarge their sow operations more than Lamb County during '71. While breeders in this county figure to increase their swine operations, producers in many counties plan to "scale down" their operations, due possibly to swine prices, which are much lower than last year.

This county ranked high in all categories revealed by the SWPSC survey.

## Area Chase Results In Youths' Arrests

Lamb County's sheriff's officers and highway patrol participated in a dragnet Wednesday in the northern part of Lamb County in connection with a series of car thefts in three counties.

An 18-year-old, and three juveniles, a 16-year-old boy, and two girls aged 13 and 15 were arrested in Lubbock Wednesday night following a chase that involved more than 25 highway patrolmen and sheriff's officers from five counties, a helicopter from Lubbock and a plane from Bovina.

The quartet was the subject of a wide search that started about 9:30 Tuesday morning when a late model car was reportedly stolen in Clovis, New Mexico. Another late model car was reported stolen at Hereford, and two cars were taken from Hale Center.

Lamb County officers set up a road block north of Earth and near Springlake.

The four youths were arrested by Lubbock police Wednesday night when one of the stolen automobiles was recovered on the Texas Tech campus. An 18-year-old, Leo Wilkes Miller of Lubbock, was jailed for the counts made in three counties, with action pending from Hale County.

## Rep. Bill Clayton Returns From Meeting In Washington, D.C.

State Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake just returned from a two-day meeting with other state legislators in Washington, D. C., on programs and problems requiring effective working relationships between state officials and the federal government.

Rep. Clayton serves with 65 other state legislators from 37 States on the National Legislative Conference's Intergovernmental Relations Committee which met on Friday and Saturday, January 8 and 9, with Congressional and Administration officials.

As Chairman of the Committee's Task Force on Natural Resources, Clayton spent considerable time working with federal and state officials on programs affecting conservation, resources management, air and water quality, and other aspects of environmental control of importance to the States. Give-and-take discussions were conducted between Task Force members and representatives of the Federal Council on Environmental Quality, and the Environmental Protection Agency.

The Intergovernmental Relations Committee is a vehicle by which state legislators actively contribute to federal decisions having a state impact. The Committee formulates legislators' views on significant federal-state issues and then communicates them through testimony and informal contacts to congressional committees and federal agencies.

Upon returning, Rep. Clayton noted that "because of the complexity and nature of problems facing this Nation, all levels of government must take an active part in their solution." He called for a continued reshaping of the governmental process, specifically the added perspective and increased involvement by representative groups of state legislators such as the Intergovernmental Relations Committee.

Priority issues considered by the full Committee included urban affairs, government operations, human resources, public safety, natural resources, and commerce and transportation.

### Loud Noises Cause Loss Of Hearing

A Pennsylvania State University professor has found a common denominator for heavy industry, rock music, sheet shooting, and power mowers. It is noise--generated at high enough levels to impair the hearing of half of America's workers over a period of years, according to Dr. Paul L. Michael, who is reflecting the consensus of hearing specialists.

"Hearing loss is an insidious thing," Dr. Michael says. "Susceptibility to damage varies greatly among people. Some can hear very loud noises over long periods without any effect, while others suffer permanent damage. Unfortunately, at present there is no good way to find out who is susceptible, so we must protect everybody as if he were."

The best way to prevent hearing damage is by using ear protectors. "The purpose of ear protectors," Dr. Michael says, "is to put a barrier between the inner ear and the noise. Without it, the energy produced as a result of noise gradually destroys the delicate nerve endings which pick up vibrations and carry them to the brain."

A noise-induced hearing loss is similar to that affecting people in old age. The sufferer hears a speaker but can't understand what he is saying. Until the day when permanent answers to noise pollution are found, Dr. Michael says, "ear protectors seem to be our best bet."

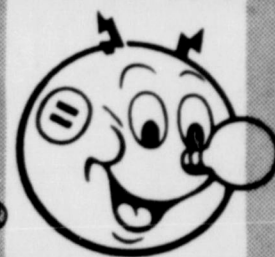

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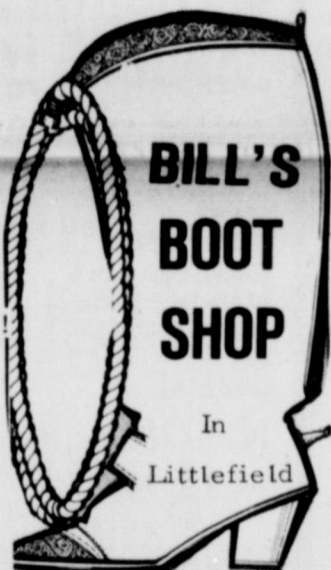

## 10% Of Nation's Youth With VD Are Texans

The most common communicable infection is the common cold, but ranking not far behind it in frequency is a group of infectious diseases which may come as a surprise to most persons--venereal disease.

Measles, rubella and chicken pox are diseases which are mentioned often, says the Texas State Department of Health, but VD is surging across the nation.

The United State Public Health Service estimates that there were more than 1.5 million cases of gonorrhea and about 70,000 cases of syphilis in this country last year. But despite the widespread incidence of the disease it is considered a "silent epidemic" because few people outside the health field seem to want to talk about it, let alone admit the problem exists in such vast proportions.

One form of VD, gonorrhea, is so widespread in this country that public health officials say flatly that it is an epidem-

ic. Only twice before has VD been considered of epidemic proportions in the United States. That was at the close of both world wars. The Public Health Service lists gonorrhea as the top problem among reportable communicable diseases in this country.

Texas has its share of venereal infections. State Health Department communicable disease authorities can only guess at the actual case total, because not all cases come to official attention. Nearly 55,000 cases were officially reported last year. That's more than 150 cases each day, or more than one case every ten minutes.

In Texas more than 50 per cent of the venereal disease reported to the State Health Department is in young people 15 through 24 years of age. Texas is now reporting 10 per cent of all the venereally infected young adults in the nation.

The public still seems to lack an awareness and concern over Texas' VD problem, but the health department has sounded a call to action on the parts of private physicians and public health officials.

You as an individual can help! Both syphilis and gonorrhea can be cured. But it is important to go to a doctor or health clinic immediately if VD is suspected. The earlier treatment is begun, the easier the diseases are to cure.

Parents can learn the facts about syphilis and gonorrhea and see that their youngsters learn them, too either at home or at school. Teachers are urged to tackle these diseases in their proper context in the school curriculum by at least the eighth grade. If you are a member of an organization, devote a meeting to finding out more about the VD problem and its solution. Excellent speakers and motion pictures are available on request from the health department. Single copies of educational leaflets written in easy-to-understand language are available free of charge from the State Health Department or your local health department. As a responsible citizen, you can urge others to actively support eradication of VD in Texas as a serious health problem.

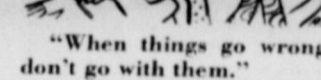

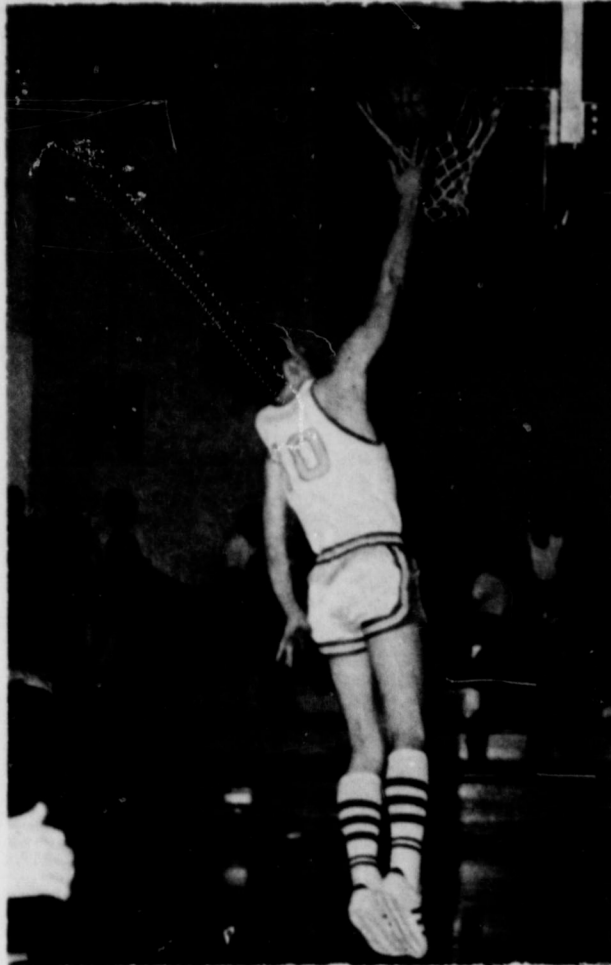
