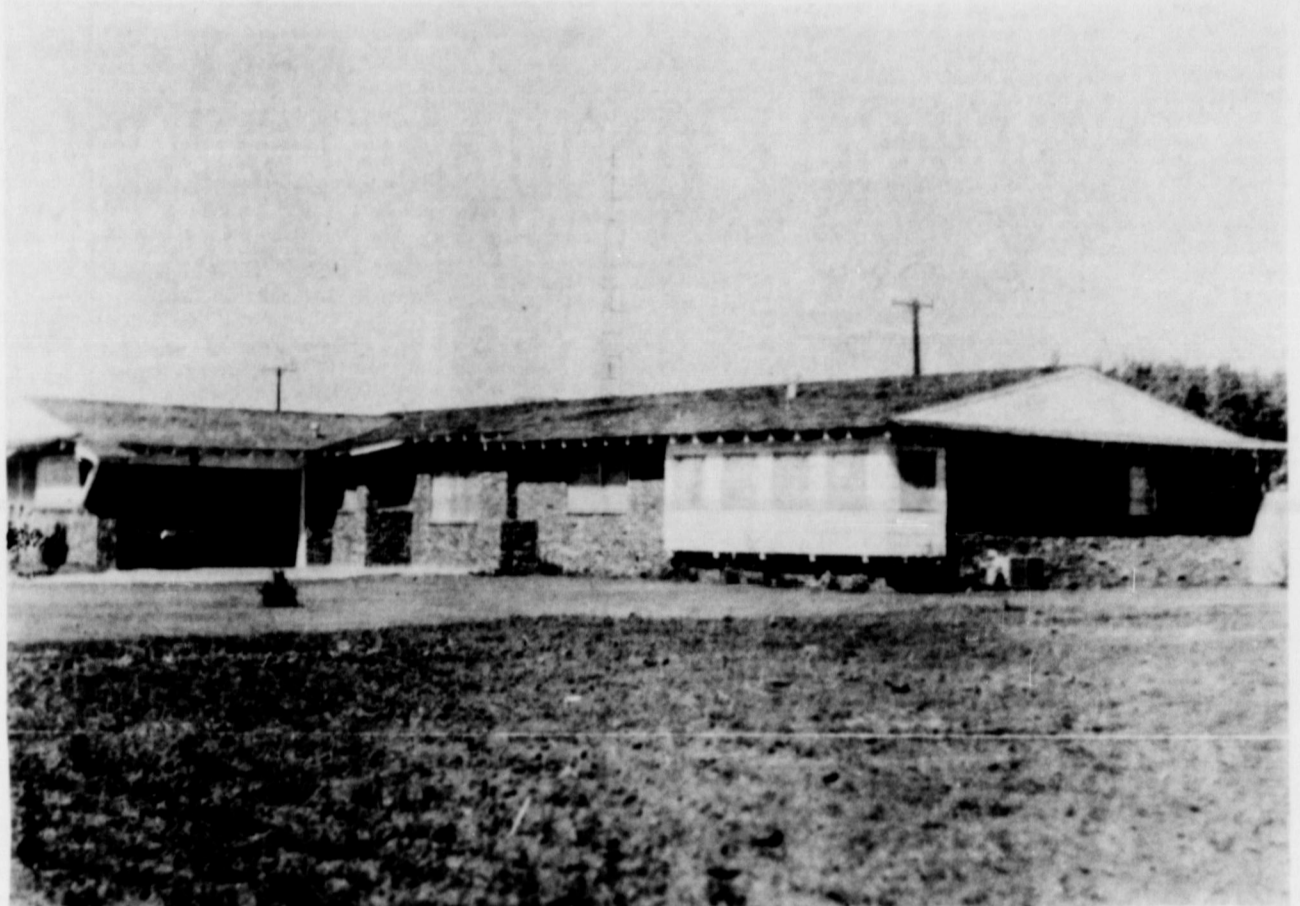

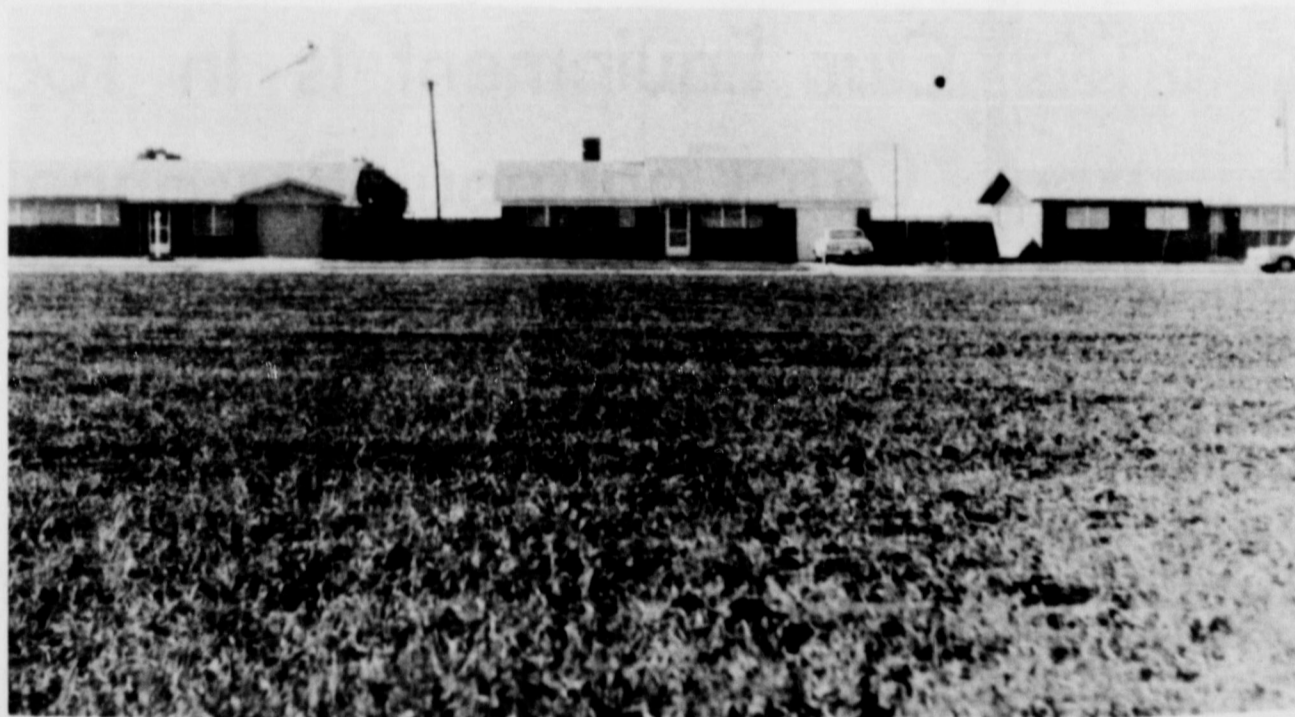

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# 35-Hour Week? You Can Kiss Off Millions of Jobs

The AFL-CIO, has a red-hot, all-out goal. It wants a 35-hour week. It indicates such a shortened week would be the cure-all for the nation's economic problems. Under the present wage and hour law, employers in interstate commerce are required to pay time-and-a-half rates to employees who work more than eight hours a day or 40 hours a week. The AFL-CIO plan would call for penalty pay of double time for all hours worked over 35 a week. Says AFL-CIO president George Meany: "If we had a 35-hour week today, we would have hardly any unemployed." We're not signing off here. What does American indus-

try, creator of jobs, have to say? In a recent exchange of letters with Meany over the relation of profits to employment, industry spokesman Charles R. Sligh, Jr. cleared away the abracadabra about the proposed 35-hour week. Mr. Sligh, executive vice-president of the National Association of Manufacturers, took aim and said: "Millions of jobs would be eliminated in marginal lines which, though barely profitable now, would be losing propositions if faced with higher labor costs. "Few businesses in America could afford such an increase in labor costs without raising prices, and mar-

kets generally simply will not permit price increase at this time. "The result would be rapidly rising unemployment as more and more companies found themselves unable to earn a profit—and were either forced to go out of business or confine their operations to those lines on which a profit still could be earned. "This country cannot maintain its economic position in the world and keep its people employed by the arbitrary adoption of a 35-hour week." To which we add: Remember the old saw, "Let George do it?" Well, we like our job. Don't let George do it.

## Anything On How To Save Money?

Had trouble trapping bobcats lately? Want to know about the sounds Black Sea fish make? Or how to control vagrant cats? The Tax Foundation, Inc. reports such information is yours for the buying—buying from the Government Printing Office which issues millions of pamphlets, leaflets and handbooks. Expectations are that GOP will sell \$11.3 million worth of printed material in fiscal 1963—and "earn" more than \$5½ million. But, notes the Foundation, the cost of paying those who research, write and edit many of these publications must be counted in

before a "profit" is claimed. GPO also sells such publications as: "Sending Gift Packages to Tunisia" or "Problems of Present-Day Poetry in Rumania." Sales price of government material is set by law at cost plus 50 per cent. Some leaflets cost only five cents. More expensive is a Russian tome, entitled "Mists Serve Man." Price: \$8.10.

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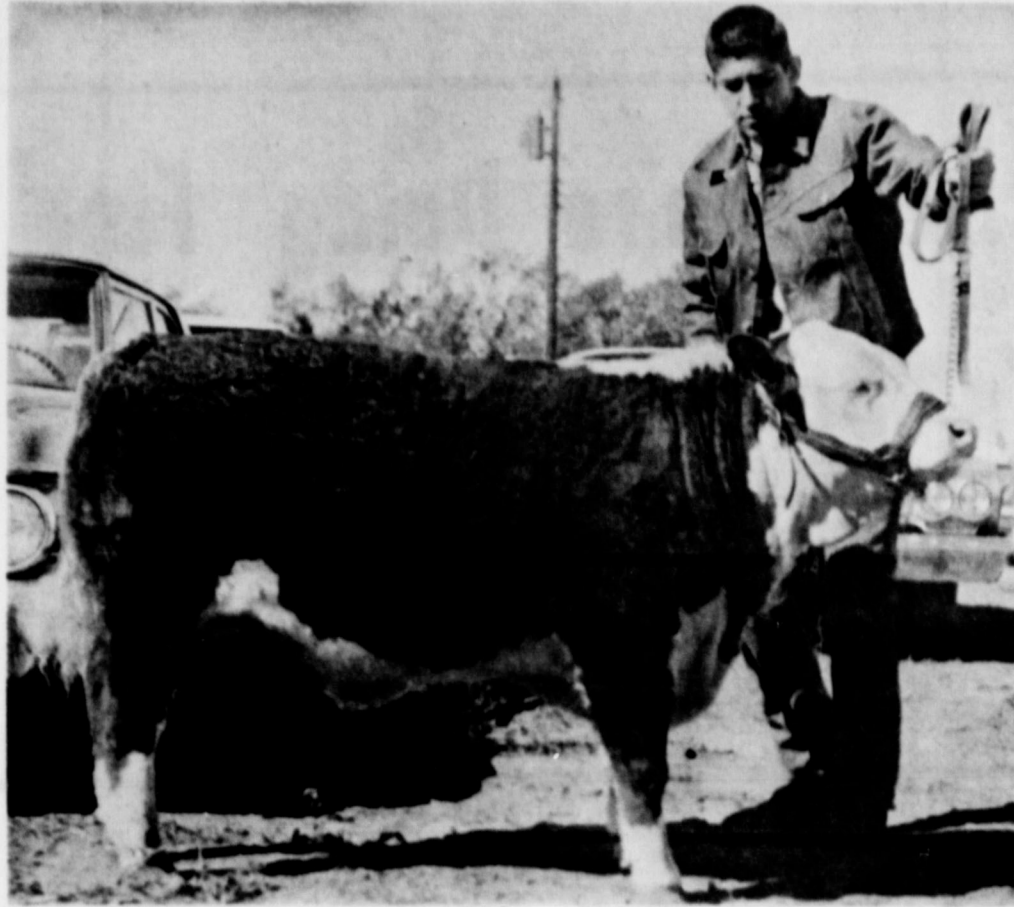

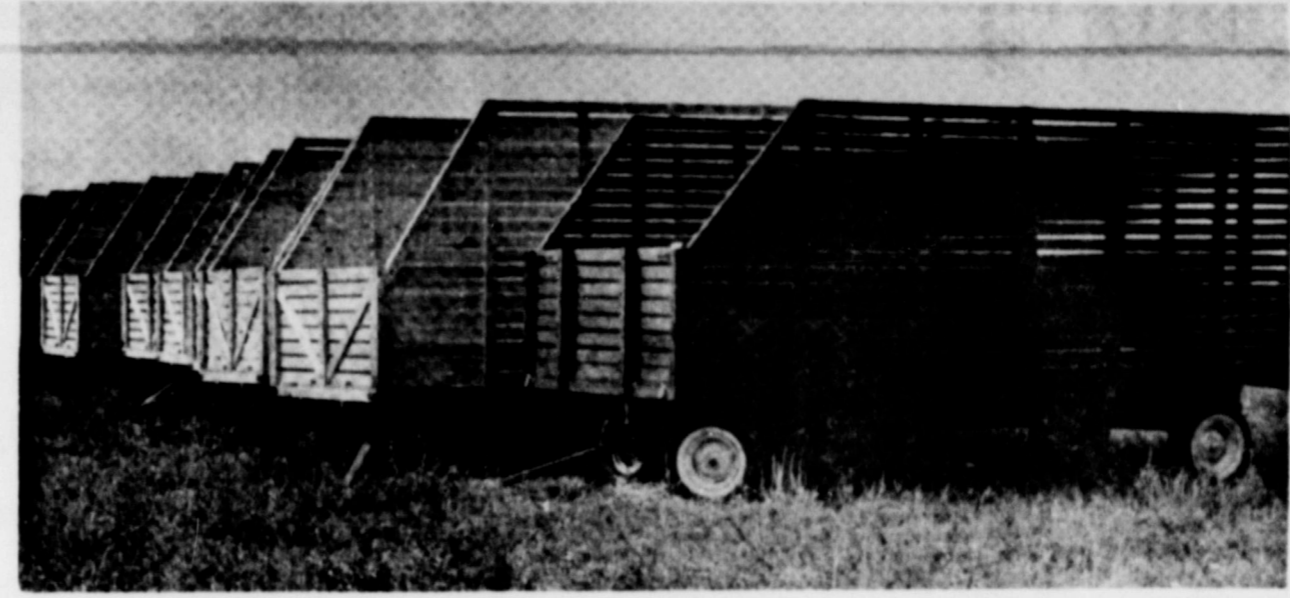
