

Connally, Smith, Carr, Pool and Clayton Top Demos in Election

John Connally, former Navy Secretary will meet Republican Jack Cox, an outspoken conservative, in what might be the bitter battle in the Nov. 6 general election.

Connally defeated A. B. V. V. though, a Houston lawyer in last Saturday's runoff election. Returns from all 254 counties with 231 complete gave for Governor, Connally 564,731, Yarborough 538,827.






