City Dads Accept Ordinance Regulating Traffic, Travel and Parking in Earth

City Dads gathered in the City Hall Conference Room Monday night for a regular meeting. They read and accepted Ordinance Number 62, An Ordinance regulating traffic, travel, and parking on certain streets and Highway 70 within the city limits of Earth. The ordinance, which appears in its entirety within this issue, declares it unlawful to make a "U" turn with any kind of a motor vehicle, in any manner, at the caution light in Earth where Highway 70 and Farm to Market Road 1055 intersect.

Other articles in the ordinance made it unlawful for any person to park a truck, bus, trailer or any commercial vehicle over one-half ton rating on either side of main street on Highway 70 from the caution light easterly to the street corner beyond the Citizen State Bank in Earth.

The ordinance also provided for a clearing of 10 foot along each curb from the corner of city streets East and West on Cedar, Birch, and the Farm to Market intersection.

City Dads also voted to enforce parallel parking only, on Farm to Market 1055. On January 15, 1967 all residents within the city limits, where sewer lines are available, will be charged the local sewer fee whether they are connected to the sewer or not. This time limit to January 15 was provided to allow ample time for citizens now using septic tanks within the city limits, a chance to connect on before the monthly fee charges begin. This step was taken to insure better health conditions for local citizens.

On Saturday, October 29, the girls will work at the Good Will Centre.



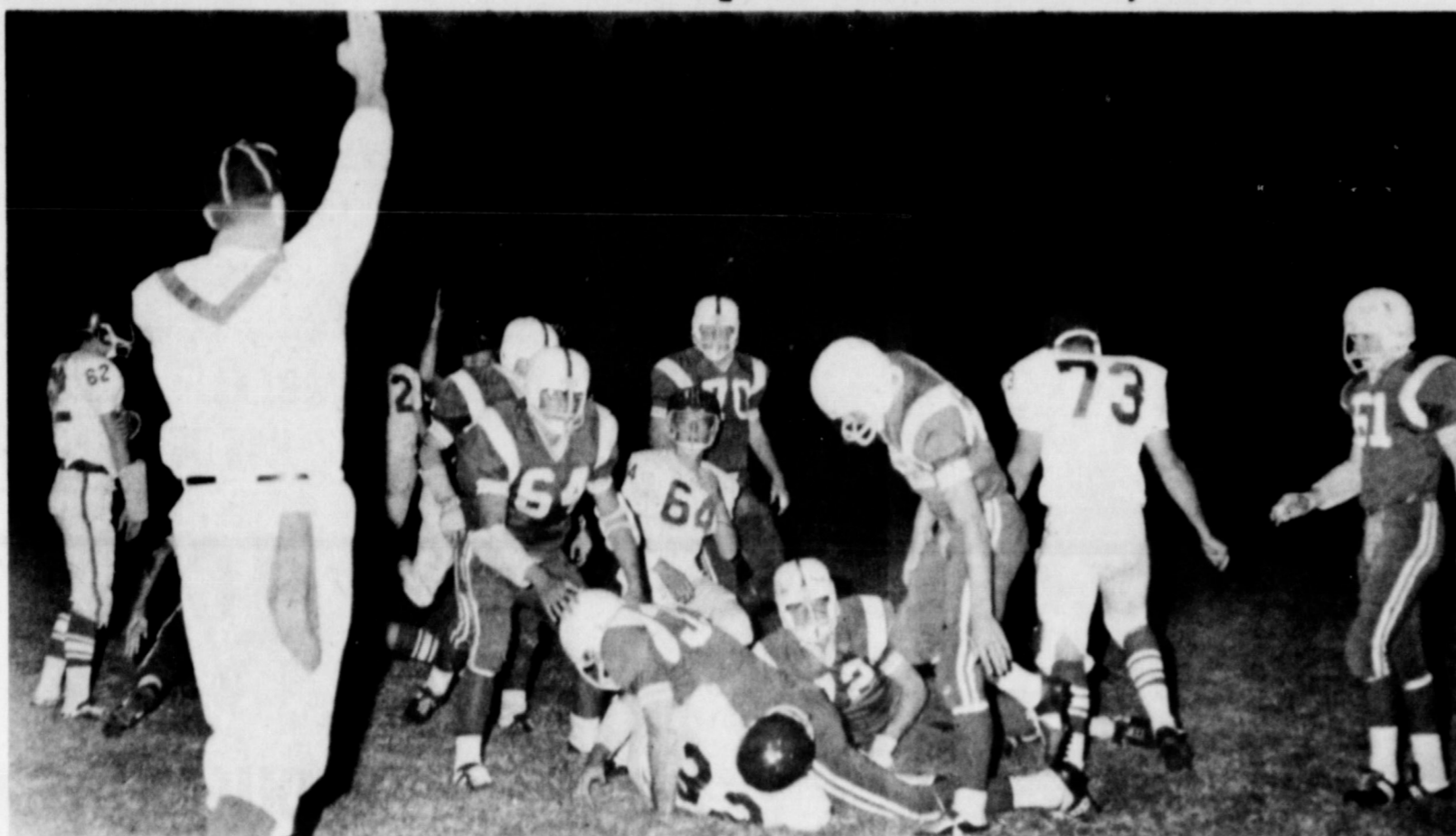
When the first district game of the year for Farwell and Springlake-Earth got underway, The fans could sense the spirit and enthusiasm that both teams showed for their respective schools.

Moments later a fired up Farwell team came roaring back and struck like lightning with Bobby Field, the Steer Quarterback, heaving a mighty pass to Johnny Schell who took the ball over his shoulder and out ran Randy Clayton for 50 yards and the Steer's first touchdown. Ordinance No. 62

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING TRAFFIC, TRAVEL, AND PARKING ON CERTAIN STREETS AND HIGHWAYS LOCATED WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF EARTH, TEXAS, PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS OF THE PROVISIONS THEREOF, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EARTH, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: No person shall make a "U" turn with any kind of motor vehicle, in any manner, at the intersection of U. S. Hy. No. 70 and Farm to Market Hy. No. 1055 within the City Limits of the City of Earth, Texas.

SECTION 2: It shall be unlawful for any person to park any truck, bus, trailer, or any commercial vehicle over one-half (1/2) ton rating on either side of the curb and paralleling U. S. Hy. No. 70 from Farm to Market Hy. No. 1055 and its intersection with U. S. Hy. No. 70, Easterly, to the Street known as Cedar Street, within the City Limits of the City of Earth, Texas.

SECTION 3: It shall be unlawful for any person to park any kind of motor vehicle of any kind or description along U. S. Hy. No. 70, within the City Limits of the City of Earth, Texas, and along and paralleling the curb thereof on either side of said Highway as follows:

1. Along the curb from Farm to Market Hy. No. 1055, Thence West, for a distance of ten (10) feet;
2. Along the curb from Farm to Market Hy. No. 1055, Thence East, for a distance of ten (10) feet;
3. Along the curb from the Street known as Birch Street, Thence West, for a distance of ten (10) feet;
4. Along the curb from the Street known as Birch Street, Thence East, for a distance of ten (10) feet;
5. Along the curb from the Street known as Cedar Street, Thence West, for a distance of ten (10) feet;
6. Along the curb from the Street known as Cedar Street, Thence East, for a distance of ten (10) feet.

SECTION 4: Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$200.00.
