

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WHERE DO WE STOP?

David Lawrence recently wrote in U.S. News and World Report: "...no 'great society' will ever be maintained unless individual responsibility is recognized as the paramount obligation of the citizen, even as government expands and popuation grows.

"Government may guide and help its citizens but cannot supply talent to those who do not have it---or bestow ambition or ini-tlative or creative ability on those who are not born with these qualities. And the individuals who do have these God-given capacities will not require governmental stimulus as they strive to improve the 'great society' of yesteryears." This goes to the heart of the matter. Whatever the programs,


This goes to the heart of the matter, whatever the programs, whatever the dramatic names given to them, they must rely primarily on individual initiative, individual ambition, indi-vidual risk taking, and the desire of the individual to progress and to serve. Only in that way can we make material gains without sacrificing those freedoms and spiritual qualities which are the roots of true greatness.

WHAT MIGHT HAVE BEEN?

There is a somber irony in the fact that this year marks the 20th anniversary of the founding of the United Nations and that commemorative medals are to be sold to observe what is called International Co-operation Year 1965.

That brave phrase brings back the high hopes that were held the world over when the UN came into being in San Francisco. Once again, there was the feeling that was born in 1918--that the war to end wars had been fought. From now on the nations, meeting together, would see that reason, justice, truth and understanding prevailed. We all know what has happened. How much of this may have

been the fault of the UN is a matter of opinion and interpretation, and there is no profit in raking over tortured ground. But the world was never more disordered and that, tragically, is true at a time when its resources and incredible scope of knowledge are more than sufficient to make possible a civilization brilliant almost beyond imagining. The UN medal is a tribute to what might have been-not what is.



N.L.R.B. SHOULD BE CURBED


Everybody knows a worker has a right to quit his job anytime he wants to. It would seem logical Littlefield. that an employer would have a similar right to go out of business if he wants to.
