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## **Spotted** Alfalfa **Aphid Threatens Nations Hay Crop**

Since its first appearance in New Mexico's Rio Grande Valley four years ago, a new aphil with a fantastic reproduction rate and a voracion's appetite for alfalfa has spread across the central United State, from California to Virginia.


Many agricultural authorities now consider the spotted alfalfa aphid to be the nation's most seriors insect threat to agricultural production. Its rapid migration has caused widespread alarm. In 1954, the insect was reported in New Mexico, Oklahoma and Nevada. By 1956, it had moved into 15 states, penetrating north into Minnesota and South Dakota, east into Maryland and Virginia, and south to Florida. Infesting only sevenSouthern counties in Indiana in 1956, it is expected to take over the en tire state in '57. It migrates freely from field to field; travels great distances on the wind; and even "hitch-hikes" from state to state by car, train or plane.

In northern climates the female Aphid produces from two to five living young per day without mating. Cold winters are not a bar to survival. It is not eliminated degrees.

The damage caused by the spotted alfalfa aphid takes several forms Seedling plants are killed rapidly. Heavy infestations may completely destroy a young stand. Aphids feeding in a harvested field can pers and balers. prevent regrowth by completely covering the developing shoots.

Actually, it is just a mouth-filling term used in law to describe certain important pieces of paper that we normally call by simpler names.

Even though we seldom use the words, we deal with negotiable instruments all the time. Every check we write to pay the gas bill is a negotiable instrument, and so is your checkbook or pension check. The note you sign to buy a new car, the money order you purchase at the bank or post office, or the traveler's checks you take with you on a trip instead of cash, all are negotiable instruments.

The crushed ice machine has a daily capacity of 3000 pounds. The Boryms have resided in Earth for the past eleven years having owned and operated the theatre here during that time.



The present law offers producers a proposition which insures a twothirds majority vote for marketing quotas. 
