Those who helped with the food did so without having to be asked, according to Mary Kate Belew. They called her to ask what they could do to help.

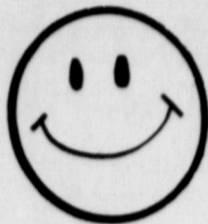

1 lb. bulk sausage
1 lb. hamburger
1 cup diced onion
1 cup diced green pepper
2 cups diced tomatoes
2 cups uncooked vermicelli
1/8 tablespoon camino
1 tablespoon chili powder
1 tablespoon salt
Brown sausage, hamburger, onions, green pepper in skillet. Add tomatoes, buttered vermicelli, chili powder, camino and salt. Cover and simmer for 2 minutes. Serves 6.

NO-FRY DOUGHNUTS

BY: Jennifer Templeton

1 pkg. active dry yeast
1/8 cup warm water (105-115°)
3/4 cup lukewarm milk (scalded then cooled)
1/4 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/8 teaspoon cinnamon
1 egg
1/6 cup shortening
2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
In large bowl, dissolve yeast in warm water. Add milk,

sugar, salt, nutmeg, cinnamon, egg, shortening and 1 cup flour. Blend 1/2 minute on low speed, scraping bowl constantly. Beat 2 minutes on medium speed, scraping bowl occasionally. Stir in remaining flour until smooth. Cover; let rise in warm place (85°) until double, 50-60 minutes.

Turn dough onto well floured cloth covered board; roll lightly to coat with flour, (dough will be soft to handle.) With floured stocking-covered rolling pin, gently roll dough about 1/8 inch thick. Cut with floured 2 1/2 inch doughnut cutter. Lift doughnut carefully with spatula, place 2 inches apart on greased baking sheet. Brush with melted butter. Cover, let rise until double, 20 minutes. Bake 8 to 10 minutes at 425 degrees. Immediately brush with melted butter and spread with creamy glaze. Serves 12.

CREAMY GLAZE

Melt 1/3 cup margarine in saucepan. Blend 2 cups confectioners sugar and 1 1/2 tsp. vanilla. Stir in 4-6 tsp. water, 1 tsp. at a time, until the glaze is of proper consistency. Glaze about 1 dozen doughnuts.

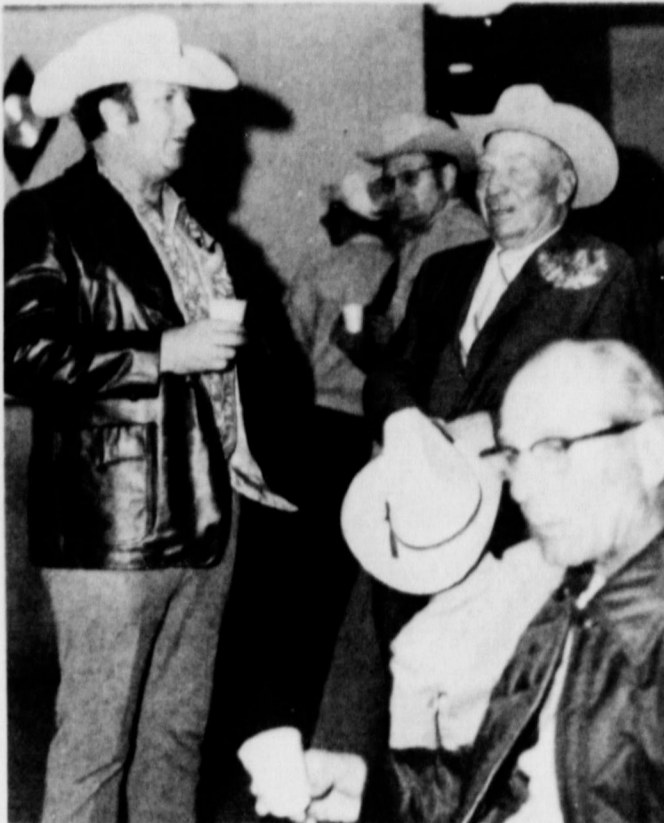

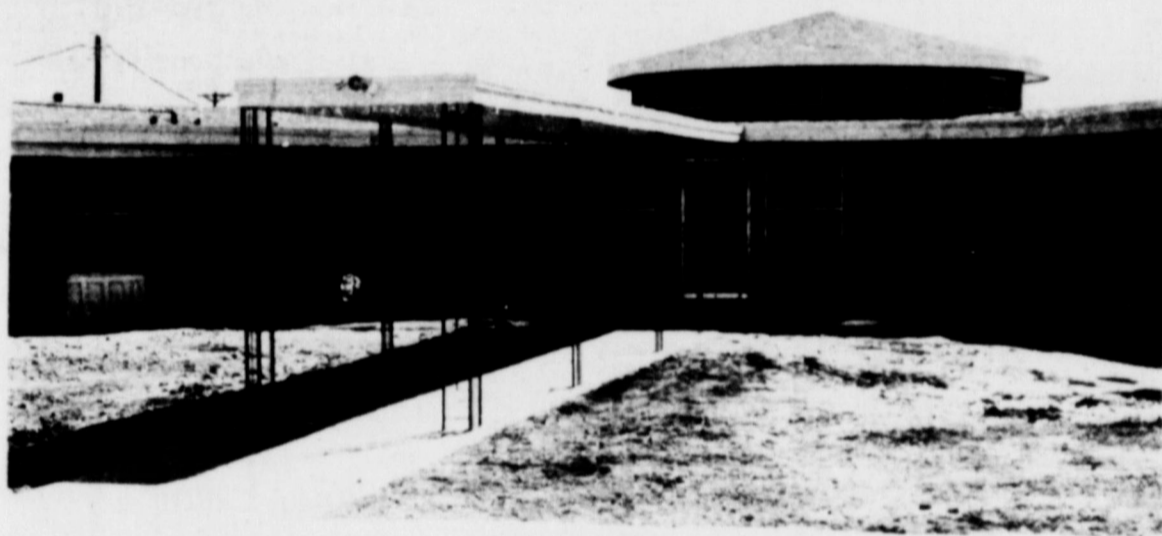

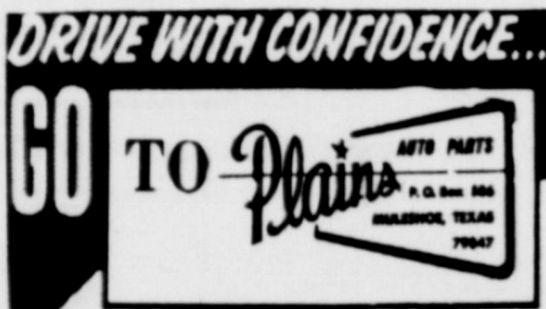
