



Lamb County's Planter Box Survey On Cotton Seed

Lamb County's local Texas Agricultural Extension Service personnel and cotton ginners from throughout the county are now in the process of conducting the Planter Box Survey in Lamb County. All farmers contacted are urged to give this survey their fullest cooperation. Much good information will be obtained from this survey and this information will be able to help the cotton industry immeasurably in future years by assisting in the improvement of planting seed. Farmers are reminded that the information will be confidential on an individual basis and will be published only on findings for the entire county.

Listed below is information which will be obtained from the survey:

- 1. The percentage of the cotton acreage in Lamb County planted to adapted and non-adapted varieties.
2. The percentage of the planting seed that are certified and non-certified.
3. If seed are non-certified, we can determine the average number of generations the seed are from certified seed.
4. The principal source of certified and non-certified seed and the acres planted to seed from each source.
5. The percentage of certified and non-certified seed that were treated, the percentage treated with recommended treatment and the percentage of each source of seed that were chemically treated.
