Service Stations Must Keep Trap Plugs Intact

Business discussed and voted on at the regular monthly meeting of the Earth City Council, January 5, was removal of trap plugs on wash racks in service stations.

The councilmen voted to notify all wash rack operators that trap plugs were to remain intact and if any trap plugs should be removed from the wash rack drains, the wash rack would be required to cease operation until the trap is rebuilt to meet specifications stated in the City Ordinance.

Removing of the trap causes grease and debris to go down into the sewer lines, causing a grease coating to form inside of the line. This eventually becomes clogged and causes the sewer line to stop draining.

There will be a periodic check of all wash racks in Earth.

Assault With Intent To Murder, Kidnapping Filed On Garcia

Two charges, assault with intent to murder and kidnapping were filed against Noe Garcia 26, Latin - American of Earth, after being arrested Wednesday at 12:30 a.m. in Lubbock, by Lubbock officers.

Garcia was picked up following an alert by Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith, Jr. of Earth.

The trouble began Tuesday about 5 p.m. at the Garcia home on the Eddi Wheat farm where he was employed. According to Deputy Sheriff Smith, Garcia was intoxicated and tried to kill his 22 year old wife Higna.

Mrs. Garcia charged that he shot at her once, she slapped the gun from his hand and ran.

Mrs. Garcia came into Earth and filed charges against her husband, with City Marshall A. M. Camp and the alert was begun to pick up Garcia.

Meanwhile, according to officers who were attempting to locate Garcia for arrest. He forced C. C. Garza, Latin - American at gunpoint to drive him to a cafe located on Aven'e D in Lubbock. Garza said, he held a gun on him and told him he would kill him if he didn't get him to Lubbock.

Garza took him to the cafe in the Spanish section of Lubbock, and escaped from Garcia when he went into a back room of the establishment. Garza returned hurriedly to Earth, where he telephoned City Marshal Camp and Deputy Sheriff Smith and told them where to find Garcia, after filing charges against him.

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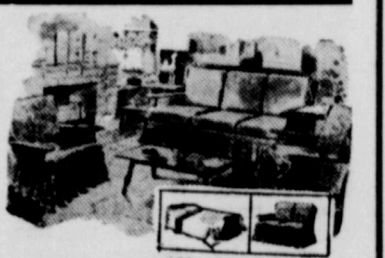

• HISTORY

In The Fore In Peace and War

The National Guard tradition of service to country and community is an unbroken line which links the missile age of today with the era of the Minute Man.

Although the heroic figure of the Minute Man and the "Spirits of '76" have come to symbolize the 20th Century concept of the civilian-soldier, the fact is that the National Guard tradition is even more deeply-rooted in the American past.

It began, in a sense, when the first settlers patrolled the perimeters of Jamestown and Plymouth, Mass. It flourished in the courageous "trained hands" who protected the settlements and opened roads through primeval forest.

The colonists' philosophy was that an able-bodied man would "join the avocation of a soldier" to whatever business or trade happened to be livelihood. This was the philosophy which led to the reliance that was to be placed in the militia over the years. An American phenomenon, it defied the European tradition that arms were to be borne only by "professionals" led by noblemen.

Nevertheless, Colonial militia forces fought shoulder to shoulder with the British in the French and Indian Wars. They helped win the siege of Louisbourg with skill which startled the professionals. British noblemen were inclined to look down their noses at "a regiment of New England farmers and fish-

ermen — led by a lumber merchant!" Britain's professionals and noblemen would meet these provincials again.

It began, the history books tell us, at Lexington, Massachusetts. This is where the tradition of the Minute Man got its impetus.

What is now known as the "National Guard" was first the Organized Militia. The term National Guard was first associated with the militia in 1824 when the 2nd Battalion, 11th New York Artillery (later, the famous 7th Regiment) was selected to serve as guard of honor for the visiting Marquis de Lafayette. The New Yorkers promptly re-named their outfit the "National Guard" in deference to his "Garde Nationale."

Of great importance to the military structure of the U. S. was the passage of, first, the Dick Act of 1903 which set the stage for modernizing the Guard along the same lines as the Regular Army. The National Defense Act of 1916 officially bestowed the title "National Guard" upon the elements of the old Organized Militia, ordered the organization of the Guard to conform to that of the Army itself. This established the Guard firmly as a part of the Nation's organized peacetime establishment as well as an integral part of the Army of the United States when in active service.

In 1916 some 159,000 Guardsmen were mobilized for duty along the Mexican Border. In World War I the National Guard furnished 17 divisions. Eleven of them saw service under General Pershing in the AEF. Of eight U. S. divisions

rated "excellent" or "superior" by the German High Command, six were National Guard divisions.

In August 1940, the President of the United States ordered the National Guard into active military service. This brought into service more than 300,000 men in 18 combat divisions as well as numerous non-divisional units and 29 air observation squadrons. This at one stroke doubled the strength of our traditionally meager peacetime Regular Army.

Guard units and individual Guardsmen served with great distinction on every World War II battlefield from Bataan to Okinawa, from North Africa to D-Day and the Battle of the Bulge.

In July of 1950 the U. S. engaged communist forces in Korea and a "partial mobilization" of our forces took place. During 1950-53, 183,000 members of the National Guard saw active service. Eight infantry divisions, 22 air wings, and hundreds of other units of both the Army and the Air National Guard were ordered to duty. Two divisions were hurried to bolster our forces in Europe; two divisions and two air wings were rushed to Korea.

Battle-tested and time-tested, the National Guard up-to-the Minute Men are ready today just as they have always been ready, willing and able in over 300 years of service to country and community.

He is married to the former Wilma Charlotte Leubart, of Earth, and they have a daughter, Terry Loraine, aged four months.

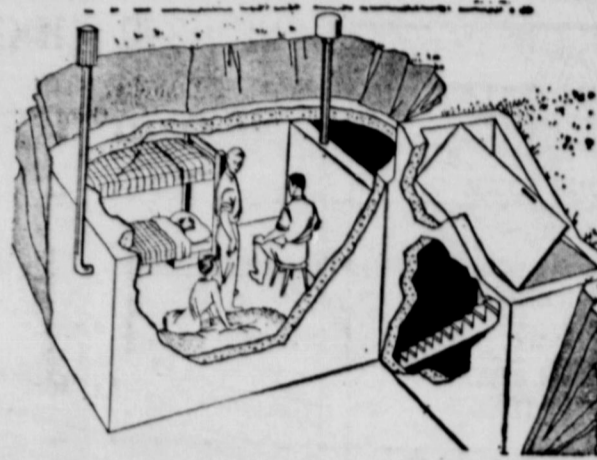

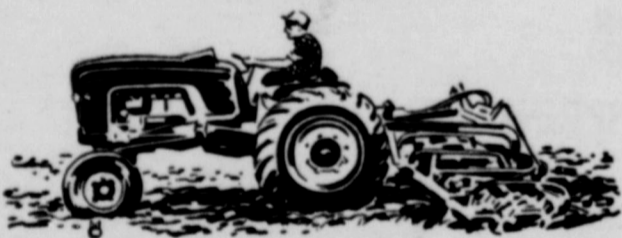
