T. A. Bell, junior high coach in the local school system, was presented with an outstanding achievement award by the Alumni Association of Pepperdine College in Los Angeles in recognition of his outstanding contributions to athletics from 1946 to 1967. The award was presented Friday night, January 26, in Freedom Hall on the campus of his alma mater.

Presenting the award was Darwin Horn, former teammate and classmate of Bell's, who is now President of the Alumni Association.

Bell is the only four sport letterman in the history of the college, lettering in all four major sports. He played right halfback on the Pepperdine football team, guard on the basketball team, center field in baseball and ran the 100 yard dash, the 220, and the 440 in track.

During his playing career, Coach Bell was selected as a Little College All American and a member of the All Pacific Coast team. He played in the W.H. Rogers Bowl, the Hawaii All Star Game in Honolulu and the All Pacific Coast All Star Game in Los Angeles.

Bell began coaching following graduation, and was head coach and athletic director at Coachella High School where his team played in the finals of the 1955 State Championship game. His 1953 and 1954 teams also gained the play-offs for state contention.

Since coming to Springlake-Earth, Coach Bell has fielded two undefeated football teams in the seventh grade and has won district twice in the eighth-grade girls' basketball, as well as winning district two years in seventh-grade track competition.

Leroy Wilkinson asked, "has any committees appointed ever done anything or completely carried out their projects?" Wilkinson explained his question further by using an example. "If anyone should want to come to Earth, and asked if we had a site available, so much land a certain distance from town, giving us a complete description of their needs, would we have the answers available for them?" Parish and Harold Miller replied, "tell them we have it."

Wilkinson continued, "there's lots of work that needs to be done before we know what we have available to offer any industry seeking location."

The subject was dropped as Phil Raught entered and was asked to supply more information concerning the Blue Ribbon City Contest. Raught told the group he had talked to Charley Duval of Littlefield, who headed the Blue Ribbon project for that city. Duval informed Raught that he would meet and explain the program at any time the C. of C., civic clubs, women's clubs, and city officials could get together for a meeting.

Pound, commented, "we must have people working together to accomplish anything in a small town, whether it be a Blue Ribbon City or any other thing worthwhile."

Pounds then asked if anyone present had any other suggestions for promoting Earth and promoting more trade.

Wilma Taylor commented, "promoting industry was good, but until we could get more industry, we had better be trying to get business to town now. She said we better work on something now, and I do think that if you have anything the people want at the price they will pay, they will travel for miles to trade with you."

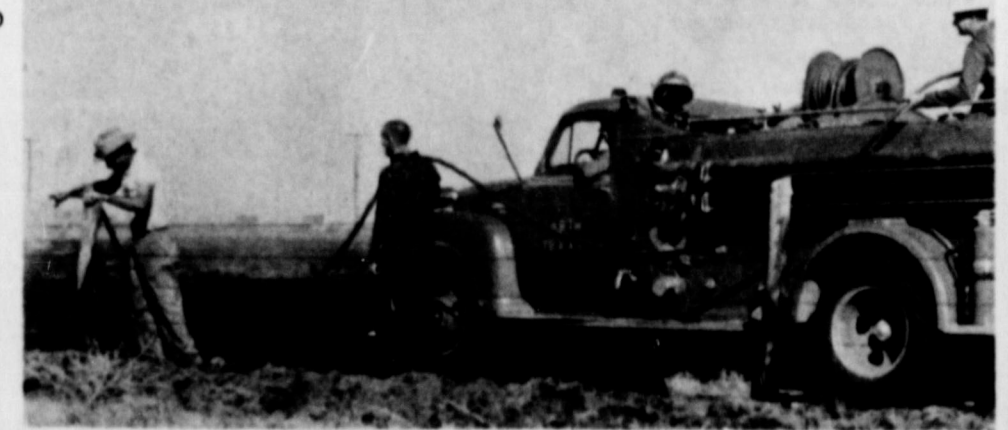

Mrs. Taylor commented on the G. E. Sales meeting she and Mr. Taylor had attended. She said the enthusiasm at the meetings just naturally rubbed off on you, and that was what we needed as much as any other thing. She said we need enthusiasm, we in Earth have it all over the larger cities by being able to supply the buyers with anything they needed with lower prices and better service, because of the lower overhead with which we operate.

Pounds asked, if there were any event or promotion those present wanted to discuss.

Mrs. Beulah Newton said she thought it would be good to have something, other towns had a Dollar day or some regular event and she felt we should have something.

Mrs. Taylor said, it would have to be consistent and over a long period of time. We couldn't do it once and expect to know if it would work or not. Everyone present agreed on this; she said they had 140 people in a three hour period on one of the three Midnight Madness Promotions. The general idea took hold and a monthly promotion will begin next week. The question of a city sales tax was brought up by Doug Parish, which city officials are discussing at this time as a means to bring more revenue into the city treasury. Most of those present were not in favor of a sales tax.

According to my friend, the boy was of the aggressive type, not given, (at least on the surface) to displays of good behavior or mannerisms. When the clerk first hesitated, the boy acted as though he would throw the usual temper tantrum, as benefits people of rude character, and a scowl came over his face.

Finally, after telling the boy he had already rung up the sale and put the money in the cash register, the clerk asked him if he were going to purchase something else. The lad slowly, and very hesitantly, nodded yes. He replaced the candy bar, took the nickel from the clerk, and walked toward the end of the counter. He paused, looked up with a shy grin on his face, then quickly dropped the nickel in a collection box marked "Help Crippled Children" and ran out the door without looking back.

Now I think this is a very wonderful story. It won't make any headlines and the young fellow's

deed will go unnoticed. The amount was small but the very fact that he did it is proof that in our youth of today is a hope for a better tomorrow.

I believe that this young person is an example of, rather than an exception to, our young people. I believe they are unselfish to a great degree, and that inherently they wish for and seek to do what is right. That any cause of confusion they may have is not from themselves, but rather from somewhat chaotic condition of internal and international affairs and a genuine fear of the future.

It's too bad there are not more girls like you, to write the G.I.'s in Vietnam. A letter from the states like yours, shows that there are still a few people thinking about the hard job they're doing. It is hard for anybody who has not put up with the physical and mental hardships of that backward country, to realize that even a simple card like yours, could be so much help, in helping them relax a little of the fear, anxiety, loneliness and pressure they feel for the entire time they are there. I think you must have at least a little idea how they feel but in any case you have the thoughtfulness and personality to show your concern; where a lot of people either don't have the courage to back up what their country believes is essential; or they are so apathetic to do anything to show how they feel; you do!

I want to thank you once more, and if there is anything I can do to help you in the way of information or such, I will do my best.

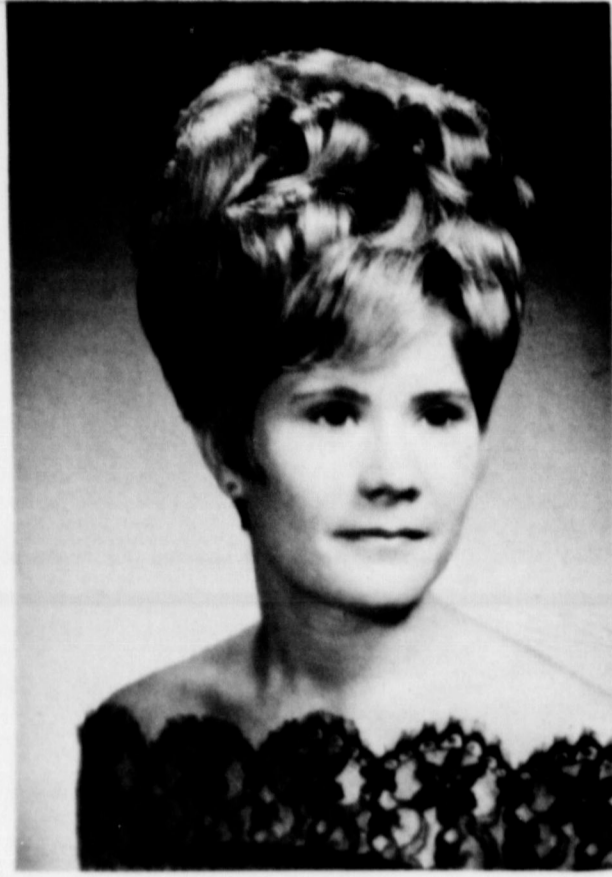

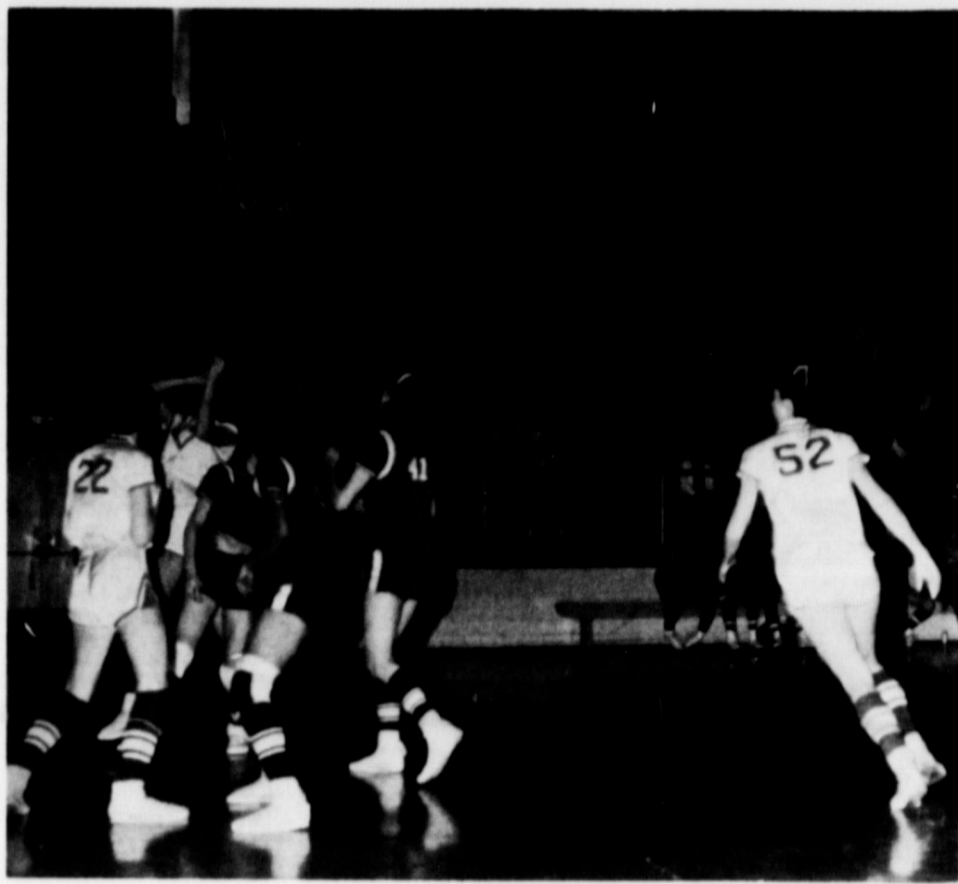

Hints To Homemakers

Here are a few more home-making tips that I hope will make your housework a little easier, brighter and more economical. Did you know that you could take and boxed cake and add a cup of cooking oil and it would be just like the one grandmother use to make? Do not use any more as the cake will be tender that it will fall apart.

The secret of high meringues on pies is to add about 1 tsp. of baking powder to room temperature egg whites before beating. It seems to "swell the meringue and make it higher.

Leftover baked potatoes may be reheated by dipping them in hot water and baking them again in a moderate oven.

Did you know that a little vanilla poured on a piece of cotton and placed in the refrigerator will eliminate odors? When something spills or cools over in your oven just sprinkle salt immediately over it. When the oven cools use your pancake turner and pick up the burned pile of "goop". Wipe with a damp sponge. Terrefic!

To clean the outside of your iron use a damp paper towel and a small amount of toothpaste. Then wipe it clean with another clean, damp paper towel. The iron must be cool to use this method. This also shines the sides of the iron.

To clean the stained cooper bottoms of pots and pans; pour a little vinegar on the bottom of the pan, then sprinkle some table salt over it. No rubbing is necessary. Wash and rinse as usual.

To remove white water marks from table tops, etc., apply mayonnaise and rub it in. Let stand and wipe clean with a soft cloth after an hour.

If two drinking glasses are stuck together, one inside the other; fill the inner glass with cold water and set the other glass in hot water and they will come apart easily. The cold water causes the inner glass to shrink slightly and the hot water will expand the other glass just enough so that they will come apart with no breakage.

Did you know that to open a tight fitting lid on a catsup bottle or other bottles or jars of this type simply strike the bottom of the upside down bottle with the palm of your hand several times and presto the lid will unscrew easily?

Try adding one package of onion soup to your meat loaves and some canned evaporated milk. Great....
