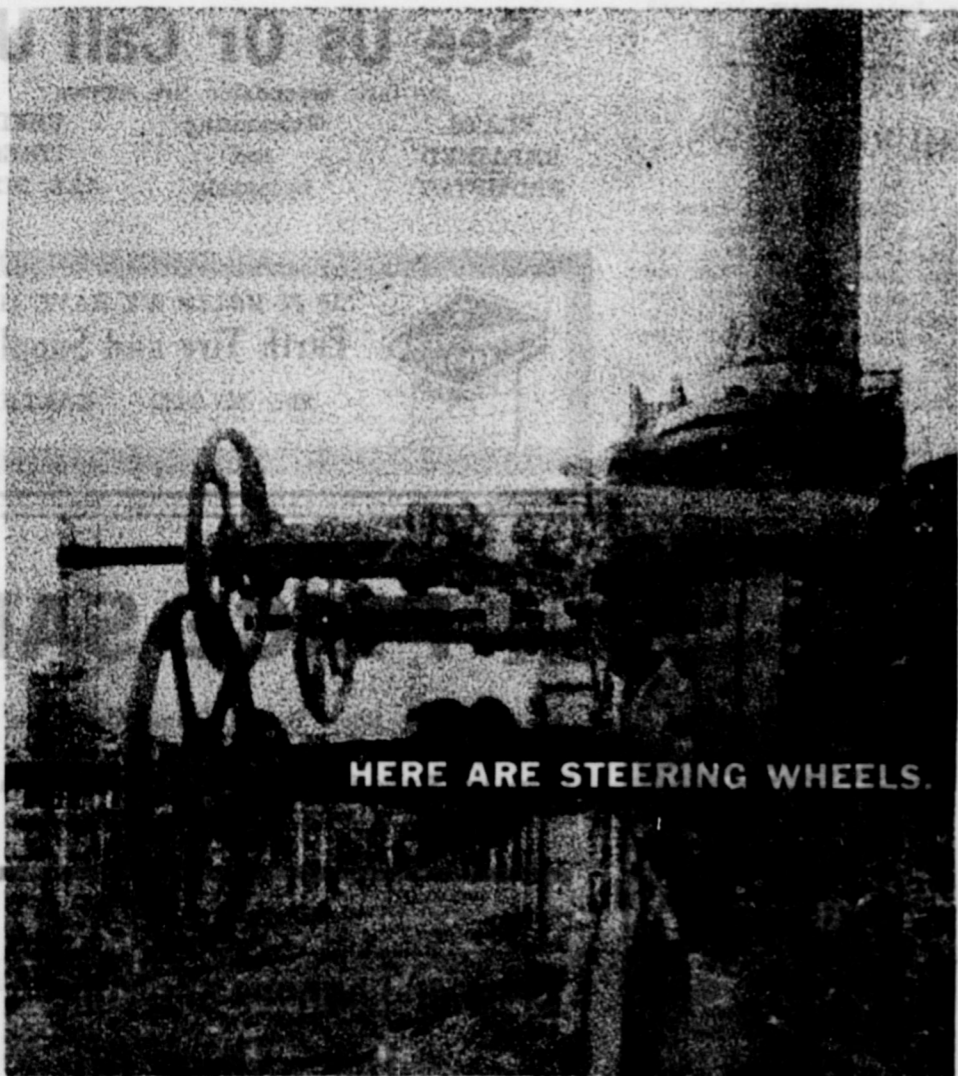

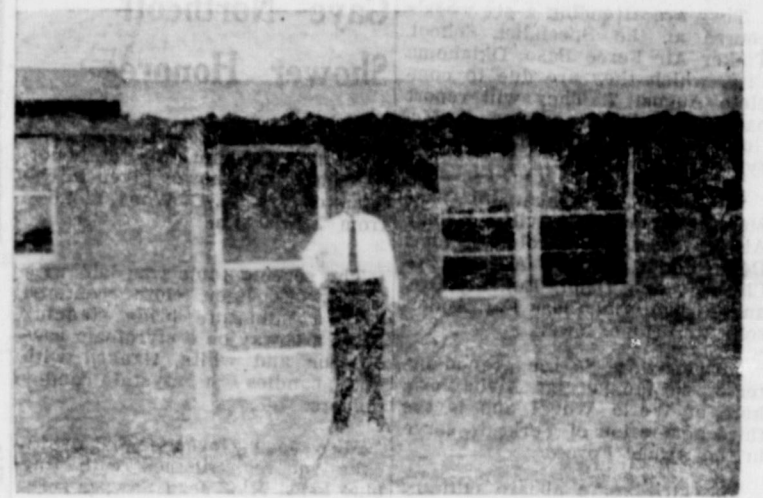

## Springlake Post Office Dedicated Saturday, W. C. White Honored

An impressive ceremony, dedicating the new Springlake Post Office was held Saturday on the east side of the modern, new structure.

Billy Wayne Clayton served as master of ceremonies.

James Winder, postmaster, welcomed the visitors and special guests.

Kenneth Parish introduced the guests which included Vernon Bell, P. O. Real Estate officer of Lubbock; J. M. Benesch, postal service officer of Amarillo; Nolan Brady, postmaster, Hereford; Marshall Kelley, retired postmaster of Earth; Ernest Davis, postmaster, Dimmitt; M. L. Crone, postmaster, Morton, and Lindsay Dennis, contractor of Olton who contracted the new building.

Clayton remarked on the changes and progress which is taking place in the Springlake area, once known as Punkin Center.

Mr. Benesch presented an honorable recognition certificate to Willis C. White who became postmaster in 1928 and retired in 1959 after 31 years of dedicated and unselfish service to the post-office department. Mr. White was asked to give a brief history of the Springlake post office being located one half mile northeast of the cemetery and was established in 1908. The first mail was delivered on July 4 of that year.

The first Annual Springlake FFA Swine Sale held Monday at the local FFA show barn was quite successful according to Mr. Gaston, local FFA instructor.

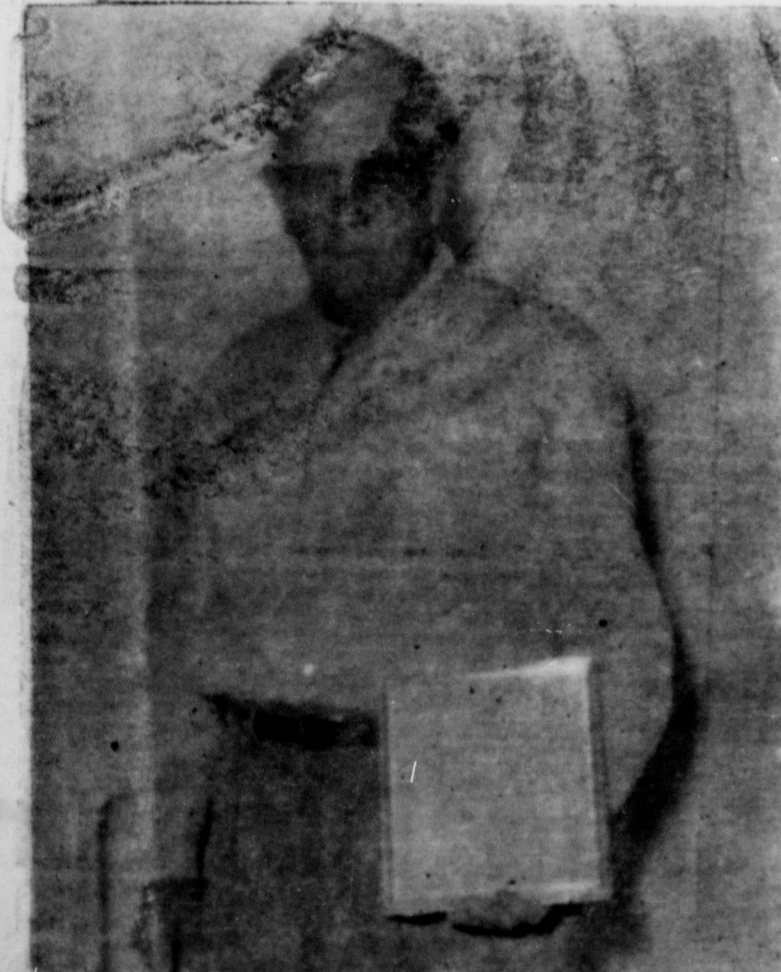
