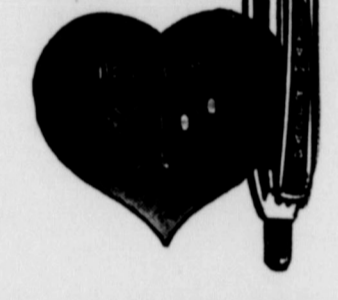

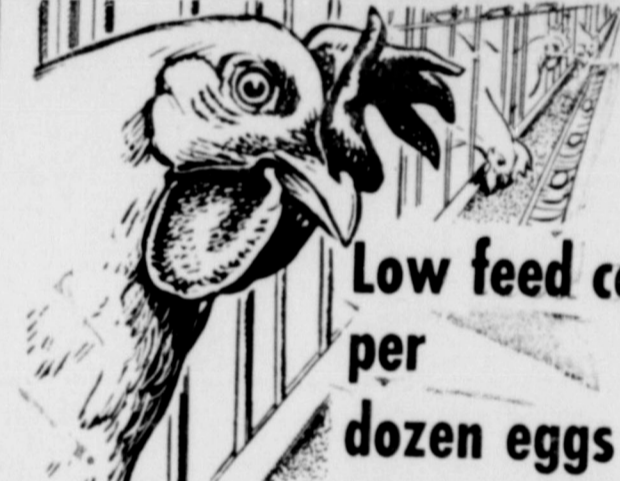

## IT'S THE LAW in TEXAS

WILL REDUCES COMPLICATIONS IN SETTLING ESTATE

A properly drawn will can be the means of short-cutting many legal formalities, and save a great deal of time in distributing the estate of a decedent among his rightful heirs. It may also serve to save many dollars in legal fees and court costs.

As an example, whenever a person dies without a will and it is necessary for the probate court to appoint an administrator of his estate, the person so appointed is required to post a bond. This bond is for the purpose of insuring the faithful performance of his duties.

The amount of the bond must be double the estimated value of the personal property of the estate plus a reasonable amount to cover prospective rents and other income from real estate involved. The administrator's bond must be kept in force until the estate is finally closed and he is discharged from his obligations by the court.

The same rule applies to an executor under a will, unless the testator has specified that no bond shall be required. This provision may be inserted or left out of the will at the option of the maker. Needless to say, there are situations in which the bond serves a real purpose. But when not needed the statutory requirement may prove a distinct annoyance to the executor and a burden upon the estate in the form of annual premium payments.

Another example: A court appointed administrator may not sell any property of an estate without an order of the court authorizing him to do so. He must make application to the court for approval of each sale. The court must be advised of and approve the sales price and the manner in which the same is to be collected. Similar provisions apply equally to the executor of a will, unless the testator has freed him from such requirements. A single short paragraph inserted in a will designating him as an independent executor in appropriate phraseology may serve this purpose. Then he will have a free hand to dispose of property upon short notice whenever a favorable opportunity arises, with a minimum of legal formality.

Since every application or other paper filed with the probate court and every order obtained from the court involves the expenditure of attorney fees for its preparation and court costs for its handling by the clerk, in proper cases many dollars may be saved for the heirs by adequate provisions of a will.

Pour mixture into freezing tray of refrigerator and set control for coldest freezing temperature. Freeze 1 hour. Then pour mixture into bowl and beat with egg beater or mixer until smooth, but not melted. Return to tray and freeze until firm. Freezing time: 1 to 4 hours. Makes 1 quart.

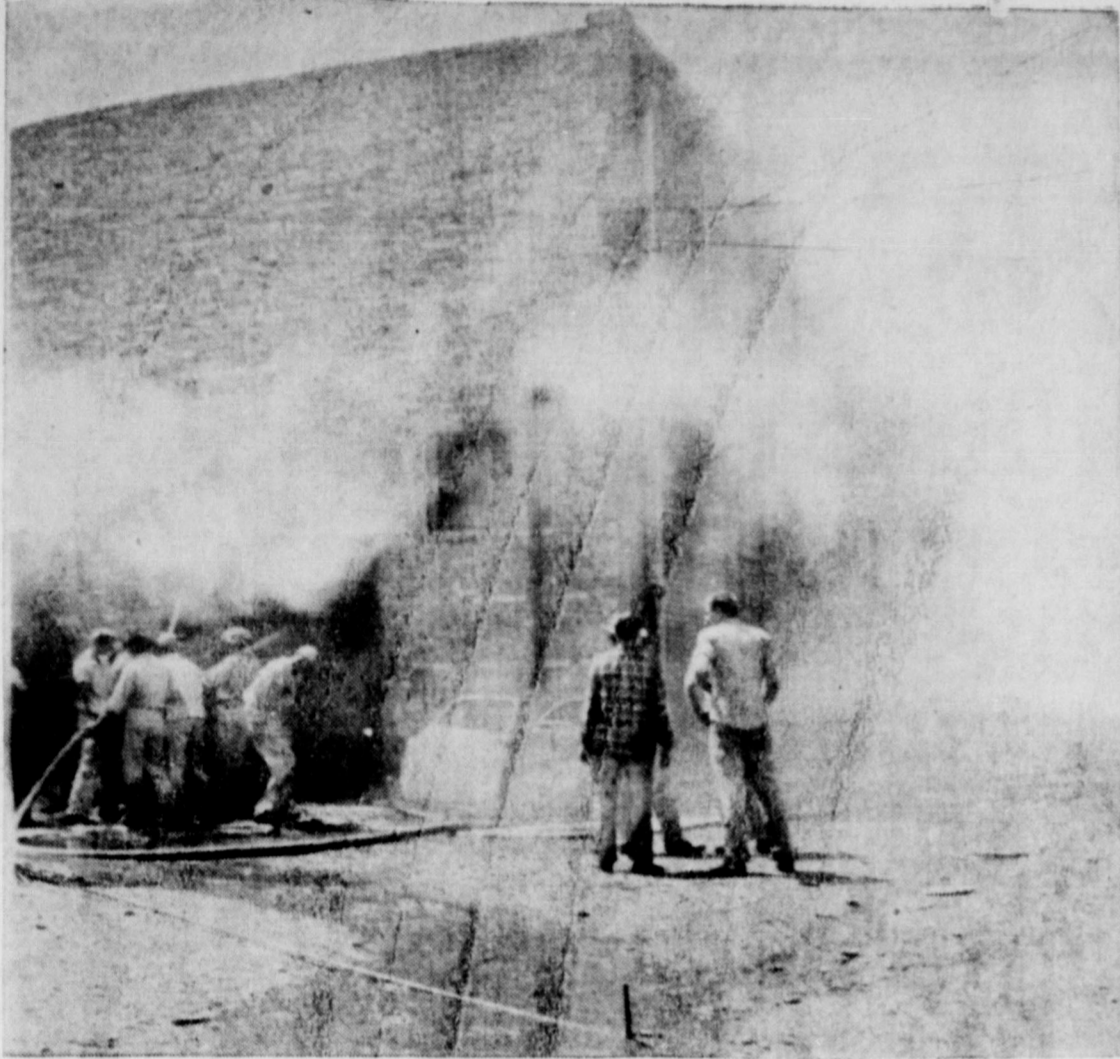

## TGRA's HIGHWAY HIGHLIGHTS

### FEDERAL AID PROGRAM APPROVED

The United States — with the world's most highly motorized economy — will this year begin history's largest road-building program. Action by Congress has assured the start of this \$33 billion project.

Importance of the Federal program, of course, is that nine dollars out of ten will come from the Federal government. This represents a complete departure from past precedent, when Washington abstained from highway construction aid altogether for nearly 100 years and, even after the advent of the automotive age, continued to limit the extent of Federal participation with the States. The new program, as presently conceived, is not permanent; it amounts to an emergency drive to modernize an interstate, metropolitan-linking network through a concentrated, all-out program.

### WHAT IT MEANS TO TEXAS

For Texas, the Federal program means a 200 percent increase in highway aid, mostly for some 2,900 miles of designated Interstate routes: U.S. 65 across the Panhandle; U.S. 80 from Texas-N.M. border at El Paso to Texas-La. border at Marshall; U.S. 290, State 27, and U.S. 87 from Van Horn to San Antonio; U.S. 90 from San Antonio to near Orange; U.S. 81 from Texas-Mexico border at Laredo to Fort Worth; U.S. 77 from Hillsboro to Texas-Okla. border near Gainesville; U.S. 67 from Dallas to Texas-Ark. border at Texarkana; U.S. 75 from Dallas to Galveston. About \$97 million per year will be spent on these segments of the

Egg raising has come of age. From the time when grandpa "kept a few chickens," to the present day, egg raising has gone "scientific." Producers today carefully manage their chickens determining correctly balanced rations, taking proper sanitary precautions, all with an eye to a better price per dozen.

However, all the precautions are to no avail if freshly laid eggs are not cooled from their 106 degree temperature to the 55 degrees necessary to grade "A" quality. It has been proven that eggs kept for a week at 55 degrees and 85% relative humidity are superior in quality as compared to eggs not cooled and kept only one day under

average Texas summer temperatures. Eggs deteriorate even more rapidly in hotter weather.

What does egg cooling mean to the egg producer? It has several advantages: 1. He gets a higher price per dozen for his quality eggs because the ultimate consumer is willing to pay more for eggs that he knows are quality. 2. He is assured of a constant market because cooled eggs are a better edible food product. 3. He needs to make fewer trips to market, thereby saving on hauling costs and time. 4. Obviously the investment in egg cooling equipment will more than pay off.

What kind of cooling equipment will do both the cooling and humidifying job needed to maintain quality? Tests at the Texas Agricultural Extension Service found that refrigerative equipment must be used, and that, in general, a twelve case cooler will handle the production from 1,800 laying hens by marketing twice weekly. The cost, expressed in terms of kilowatt hours used, is only 1 1/2 kilowatt hours of electricity per case of eggs cooled. This is indeed cheap insurance for keeping your market eggs at top quality. Incidentally, those who have tried evaporative egg coolers found that in high temperatures the method failed to bring egg temperatures down to 55 degrees and that humidity control was lacking. Too much relative humidity may cause mold to develop on the eggs, while too little may cause weight shrinkage, as much as 3 1/2% in five to seven days.

Most farm store dealers have access to a line of moderately priced refrigerative egg coolers and will be glad to give you information on their particular brand



"For better eggs and better prices, the eggs should be gathered often and cooled immediately," says Herbert Hunt, "because eggs, like milk, are a perishable product." ## Price Daniels Thanks Voters

Senator Price Daniel this week thanked the 622,000 Texans who gave him an overwhelming lead in the first primary race for Governor, putting him more than 162,000 votes ahead of his runoff opponent.

"This is the widest lead a candidate for Governor ever had in a run-off," Daniel said. "I am confident that, with hard work, we can win a landslide victory on August 25."

Daniel, a native of Liberty County, maintains his family home on a small ranch near his birthplace and is a member of the REA.

As a U. S. Senator, he supported 90 per cent parity on basic crops, authored an amendment to the farm bill which placed grain sorghum supports at a comparable level as corn, and helped obtain more realistic farm credit provisions.

Daniel is advocating a statewide water and soil conservation program, and a state drought relief program that would include loans to farmers and ranchers facing mortgage foreclosure.

His program also includes stepped-up research into proposals to create additional water supplies, such as conversion of salt water and artificial "rainmaking."

Daniel said that as Governor he would "put the full power of the State Government behind our farmers and ranchers, to help them regain their fair share of the national income and to help them fight the worst drought disaster in our history."

cratic Convention is a subject of heated debate.

Actual outcome will not be known until the meeting gets underway in Fort Worth. Rival conservative and liberal delegates will struggle for nearly 600 seats. Convention control hinges on these places.

Precinct and county conventions named some 577 definitely liberal delegates, about 224 conservatives. But neither side can control the 1900-vote convention without the contested seats.

Mrs. Kathleen Voigt of San Antonio, liberal leader, charged last week the conservative executive committee planned to 'steal' the convention. She asked that the May state convention, which was recessed rather than adjourned, be reconvened to take charge of the situation.

Executive Committee Chairman, George Sandlin dismissed Mrs. Voigt's charges as "the same old thing, every two years."

He promised the committee would give all contested delegations a fair hearing and seat those legally entitled to places. He predicted the convention would be made up of middle-of-the-road conservatives "with no ax to grind."

As for the May convention, he felt the intervening precinct and county conventions had made it past history.

**WEBB INVESTIGATORS IN CONTROVERSY...** Who should investigate alleged voting irregularities in Webb County is still being debated.

Atty. Gen. John Ben Sheppard has twice been set back in efforts to set up a state-level inquiry. But his office said he intends to continue the fight.

At Sheppard's request, Austin Dist. Judge Charles O. Betts sent Dan Moody Jr. to Laredo to act as master in chancery of an inquiry.

Webb County Dist. Judge R. D. Wright issued an injunction to stop the Moody investigation. He claimed prior jurisdiction for the questioning being conducted in his own court.

Sheppard and Moody took the matter to the State Supreme Court which rejected their petition.

Meanwhile, the Webb County grand jury indicted seven persons. But spokesmen for the Reform Party called this "window dressing." They were still working for an investigation originating in Austin.

**RE-HEARING ASKED IN SANTA FE CASE.** Awaiting the Supreme Court when it reconvenes in October will be a motion for re-hearing in the long-contested Santa Fe Railway case.

In July the court upheld the right of unions to make closed shop agreements in the railway industry. Such contracts are prohibited by the state "right to work" law, but allowed by the federal railway act.

In their motion, railway attorneys asked the court either to reverse the July ruling or modify it. They contended that union contracts should allow only for collection of "dues and assessments necessary to support collective bargaining action."

**SMALLER COTTON CROP SEEN**...King Cotton is wearing a drought-scarred crown.

U. S. Dept. of Agriculture estimates put Texas' 1956 cotton crop at 3,600,000 bales, compared to 4,039,000 last year.

Prospective yields ran to extremes. They were termed "extremely poor" in dryland areas, "excellent" in irrigation sections.

Farmers who did not grow cotton will get the lion's share of Texas' soil bank payments. Of the \$22 million to be paid to Texas farmers by the federal government within the next few weeks, more than

A complaint was filed before the U. S. Commissioner of Clarkdale, Mississippi on September 22, 1953, charging Payne with a violation of Title 18, U. S. Code Section 1073, in that he fled from the State of Mississippi to avoid prosecution for the crime of murder.

Payne is described as follows: Age 47, born July 18, 1909, Scott, Mississippi; Height, 5' 11"; Weight, 139 to 165 pounds; Build, slender; Hair, black, wavy; Eyes, brown; Complexion, brown; Race, Negro; Nationality, American; Occupations, laborer, farmer; Scars and marks, cut scar on right temple, cut scar on chin, spot and cut scar on left forearm, vaccination scar on left arm, cut scar on lower right buttock, two spot scars on back of right hand, cut scar on back of head; Remarks, may be wearing mustache, has a loud voice.

Payne has been convicted previously for murder. He is reportedly armed with a pistol at all times and should be considered extremely dangerous.

C., or the Special Agent in Charge of the Federal Bureau of Investigation Office nearest his city.

**FEDERAL INQUIRY OF US TRUST...** A federal grand jury investigation of the bankrupt US Trust and Guaranty Co. is scheduled for September 24.

Federal officials would have the power to prosecute if they found the company had violated U. S. postal regulations or securities laws.

**SHORT SNOOTHS...** Withdrawal of Sen. A. M. Aikin Jr. from the lieutenant governor's race for health reasons caused only minor delays in second primary preparations.

State Health Department officials last week warned gardeners against use of some of the newer "organic phosphate" insecticides. Such sprays are safe only in the hands of professionals who use protective clothing, goggles and respirators, said the department.
