## City Commission Passes Ordinance On Wiring

At the regular monthly meeting of the City Commission Monday night, in the City Hall, the Commissioners passed Ordinance Number 49, which is an ordinance enacting and establishing an electrical code for the City of Earth. This governs all consumer electrical installations in the City, provides for the office of an electrical inspector and outlines his duties. It also provides for and requires permits and instructions, for electrical installations, provides for and establishes certain requirements and standards governing the electrical installations in the City of Earth.

It also provides penalties for the violation of this Ordinance.

At the meeting Monday night the commission also voted to move the fire whistle and place it atop the city water tower.

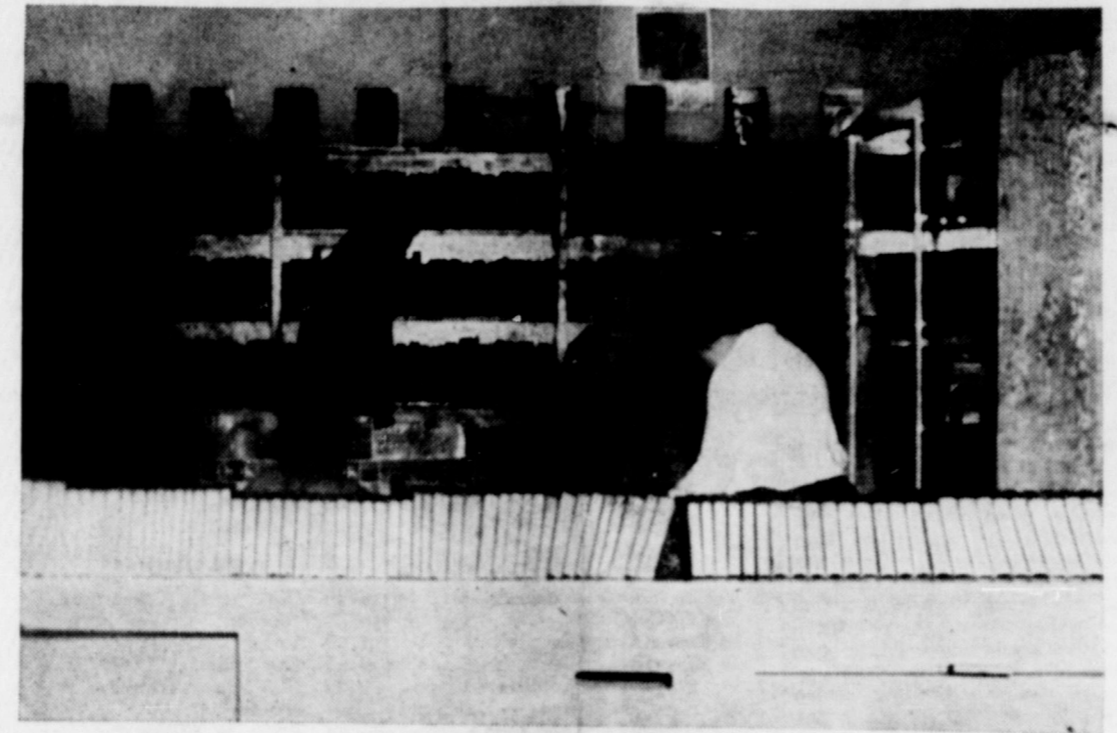
A foreign exchange student will speak at assembly at 1 p.m. in the school auditorium. All patrons are urged to attend.

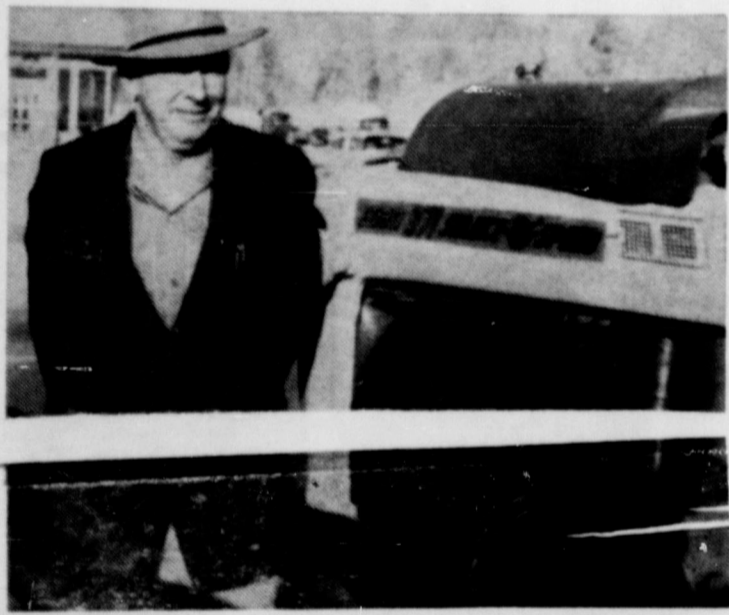

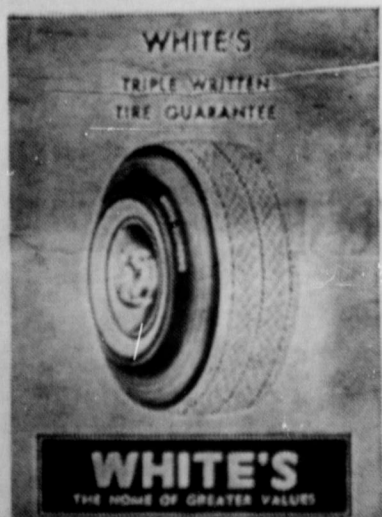

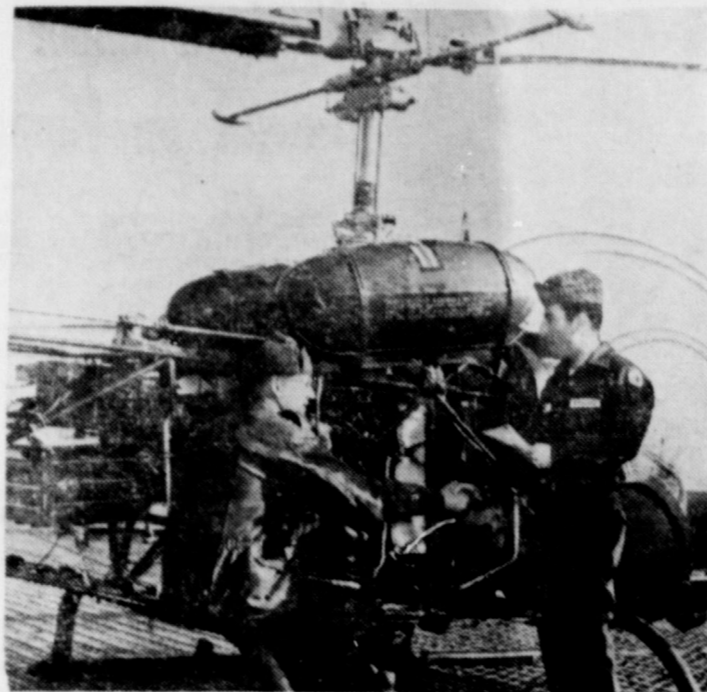
