move registeration of voters from the Constitution and place in the hands of the Legislature. Any future Legislature could weaken requirements for voting or allow registration so near to election dates as to invite problems the reform elements sought to end in 1902. It took a long time and hard struggle to get a statewide sy-stem of voter registration in Texas and it was not acheived until it was written into the Constitution in mandatory form. The poll tax receipt is a badge, both to the responsible citizen and the qualified voter. The kind of people we elect to public office is only as good as the voters themselves. To repeal the poll tax would not upgrade the caliber of the vo-ter but would have the opposite effect -- then it can be assumed that the caliber of people we elect to public office will be reduced. If the poll tax is repealed,
