



# Four Local Men Rated Top Sorghum Growers

Four men from the Earth area were among the nation's top sorghum growers in the area and have been accorded national recognition as members of Northrup King & Company's 1970 Carload Sorghum Club. The awards are given in acknowledgment of production achievement. The 1970 NK Carload Sorghum Club is made up of 667 sorghum growers from sixteen states. Their total production from more than 150,000 acres exceeded 2,750 carloads of grain, more than 550 million pounds. The 667 NK Carload Club growers averaged over 3,800 pounds of grain per acre, this exceeds the national production average by more than 1,000 pounds per acre. The four Earth men include Kenneth Sawyer, Truman Stine, Lowell and Delvin Walden.

Kenneth Sawyer harvested nearly two carloads of grain from 65 acres of NK 275. This 350,000 pound crop averaged over 5,470 pounds of grain per acre. The crop received 2 inches of rainfall during the growing season and only 3 light waterings. Truman Stine harvested more than four carloads, 840,000 pounds, of grain from 110 acres of NK 280. This good crop of NK 280 was produced on a stand planted at 7.1 pounds of seed per acre in double rows on 40 inch bed. The crop was planted May 8 and harvested September 29. The average yield for the production of NK 280 was 7,636 pounds per acre. Lowell Walden harvested 21 carloads of grain from 76 acres of NK 275. This excellent crop averaged 6,670 pounds of grain per acre, was planted May 5 at 7 1/2 pounds per acre. The

crop received 100 pounds of fertilizer preplant and 190 pounds of N10 as a starter fertilizer. During the growing season the crop received 4 irrigations. Delvin Walden harvested 2 1/2 carloads of grain, over 490,000 pounds, from 75 acres of NK 275. The excellent crop of NK 275 was planted May 3 at 7 1/2 pounds per acre on 40 inch rows. The crop received 3 irrigations during the growing season. The purpose of the award program, NK officials explain, is to call attention to the fact that the new grain sorghum hybrids are rapidly becoming one of the nation's major grain crops. The annual awards program recognizes the achievements of growers throughout the nation's sorghum belt and includes a national conference of top winners designed to stimulate an interchange of new ideas and techniques in sorghum production.

# "New Sexual Morality" Argumentative PTA Topic

"The New Sexual Morality" was the PTA subject matter Monday evening at the Springlake-Earth cafeteria and created a lot of arguments in agreement and disagreement with the new code of ethics which the younger generation appears to think a lot about. A panel composed of Sammy Johnston, Mrs. Lena Locke, Mrs. Nancy Howard, Roberta Gaston and Johnny McNamara were given topics including drug effects on unborn children, venereal diseases, premarital sex, birth control pills for unmarried girls and last, abortion. Audience participation was invited.

The first question brought before the panel was how they felt about an expectant mother who was on drugs. Members of the panel related factual information on what agony newborn babies would go through until all drugs were eliminated from their systems, a process which often takes a period as long as three weeks. The question asked about venereal disease was "Why is the problem rising?" A lot of the blame seems to go to ignorance of the fact as to just what the signs are and also the fact that people still keep this matter in the dark and will not discuss such diseases. Concerning pre-marital sex, the question of sex before marriage being right or wrong was asked. Viewpoints were given by both the panel and the audience. A member of the audience felt that the reason for a lot of the living together by students is caused by unhappy homes. They want to try and see how living together is before marriage so they will not make the same mistakes their parents made. A member of the panel said she felt pre-marital sex is not this important. She felt couples should learn to know each other during an engagement and keep sex for marriage only.

Birth control by using pills for unmarried girls presented arguments such as "Are they demoralizing or not?" Some felt this opens the door for pre-marital sex. Others felt this does not stop unwanted or unneeded children. That in the long-run, birth control pills were better than an abortion or an unwanted child. The last topic concerning abortion was the one arousing the most emotion. The argument that seemed to be the whole thing in a nutshell is "When is a fetus a human?" Many felt as soon as a child is conceived it is human and to have an abortion is an outright murder. Others felt circumstances had a lot to do with whether an abortion should take place. To date, only four states have legalized abortions. They are New York, Colorado, California and New Mexico. The Texas Legislature is currently studying two new bills in the House which concern common-law marriages and sex education in the school. Senate Bill #98 would require parental consent to consider common-law marriages for a male under 19 and over 16 and a female under 18 and over 14. Senate Bill #14 concerns sex education in the schools. However, the wording in the bill is not effective and could create more harm than good. Mrs. Ray Joe Riley thanked the panel and audience for their participation and then reminded each person attending that the school board election is to be held April 3. Absentee voting began Monday March 15, and will continue through March 30.

The next PTA meeting will be the last meeting of the year to be held April 26 at 8:00 p.m. in the Springlake-Earth cafeteria. The program will consist of a talent show, installation of district officers and service awards to the teachers.

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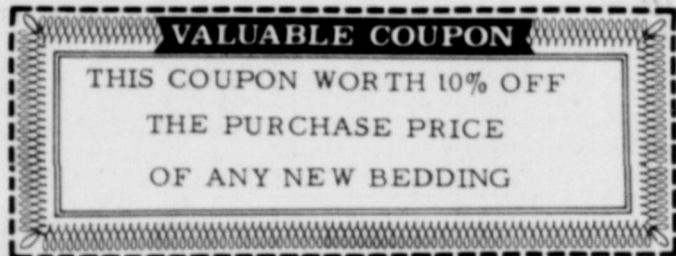
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## GA's Have Clean-Up
