## Superintendent Attends Hearing On Education Bill

Bill Mann, superintendent of the Springlake-Earth Schools, and Norman Hinchliffe, vice-president of the local school board, were in the State House of Representatives on the bill which included the provisions of the Governor's Committee Report on Education.

The bill was sponsored in the House by Dewitt Hale, representative for Corpus Christi. It will be sponsored in the Senate by A. R. Swartz, senator from Galveston.

The hearing began at 1:30 p. m. Tuesday and went to approximately 1 a. m. Wednesday.

The first five hours of the hearing were used by those testifying in favor of the bill, with the main portion being presented by Glenn Ivy who did the statistical work for the Governor's committee. The presentation of the group was well organized, using film strips, diagrams, etc.

Approximately 25 persons testified against the bill, pointing out the disadvantages.

Representative Hale made the statement at the onset of his presentation that for political reasons a forced consolidation of school districts should be left out of the bill, although he hoped to include something that would make it financially advantageous for school districts to consolidate.

One strong opponent of the bill was Representative Heatley, Chairman of the House Appropriation Committee. He circulated a letter explaining that basing the distribution of state aid on the market value of property would force the farmers out of business.

The hearing was well attended, starting with a full House, but as the day progressed the crowd grew lighter. Approximately 99 percent of those present were against the bill. A number of times the House was asked to refrain from demonstrating, applause, etc.

Mr. Mann stated that representatives from other towns in the area were also present at the hearing.

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## Excessive Amounts Of Vitamins A And D Can Be Dangerous

College Station, - Is a vitamin-a-day insurance of good health? Not necessarily.

Vitamins are needed for good health, but excessive amounts can be dangerous. When daily food intake is adequate, Frances Reasonover, Extension nutritionist, says you don't need to take vitamin pills.

Individuals differ in the amounts and types of vitamins needed and a doctor can prescribe the type to suit individual needs. The Texas A&M University specialist advises seeing a physician if you feel you need vitamins.

Excess amounts of Vitamins B and C are easily disposed of by the body without harm. However, too much Vitamins A and D can be dangerous because the body has no way of getting rid of excess.

Good food sources of Vitamin A are liver, egg yolk, dark green and yellow vegetables, deep yellow fruits, whole milk, cheddar-type cheese and ice cream. Miss Reasonover notes that most people do not get enough Vitamin A.

Symptoms of excessive intakes of Vitamin A include fatigue, abdominal discomfort, bone and joint pain, loss of body hair, headaches

and yellowing of skin. Excessive Vitamin D leads to nausea, frequent urination and diarrhea. It can also cause weakness and depression, explains Miss Reasonover.

Foods high in Vitamin D are fish liver oils, egg yolks, liver and milk fortified with Vitamin D.

A well-balanced diet is the
