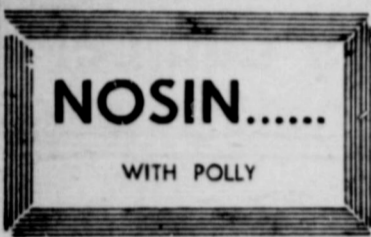




## Townspeople And Farmers Invited To C. of C. Breakfast

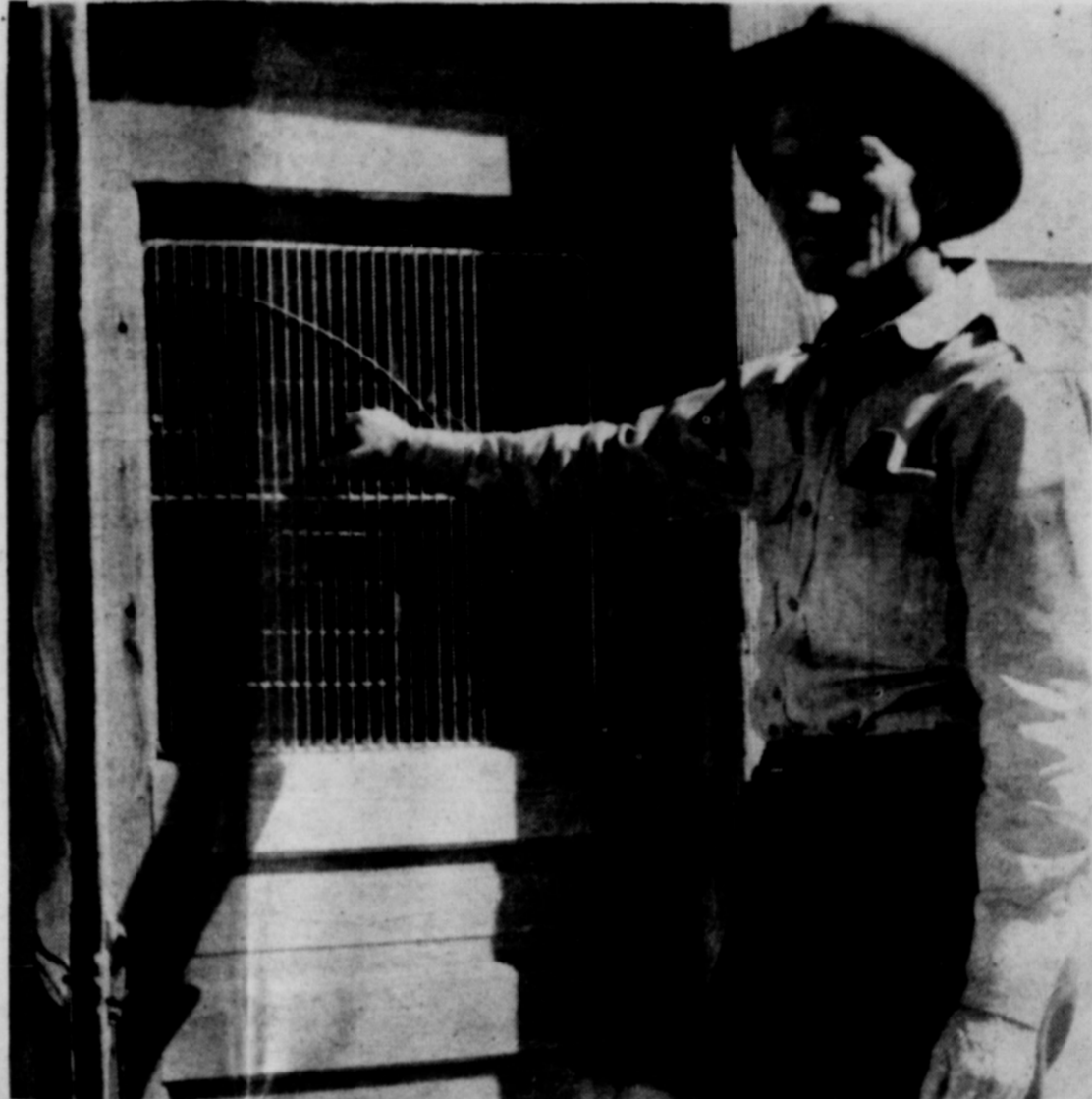
Office hours will be from 8 a. m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Friday.

## Three Break-Ins Early Sunday

Two suspects were arrested after three break-ins were reported here in Earth early Sunday morning.

Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith, Jr. said the robberies occurred sometime after 2 a.m. Sunday morning.

A glass was broken in the back door of the Furniture Exchange and Gift Shop, for the robber to gain entrance. The owners, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Dick McNeill reported five yellow gold Belfast watches, three mens Bulova watches, 23 jewel, yellow gold; one ladies Bulova, 23 jewel, yellow gold and three other watches; two transistor Arvin radios, portable Arvin radio and between 25 and 30 dollars. Neill said she doth er, n lead to be over \$500. This is the second robbery to occur at the Gift Shop within six months.

Patterson Bros. Grocery also reported a glass in the rear door of their store was broken, where the robber crawled through as the door could not be unlocked.

Hershel and Everett Patterson, owners reported only three silver dollars were stolen.

Mr. Koonce, manager said, the combination on his safe had been tampered with, but not any money or merchandise was missing.

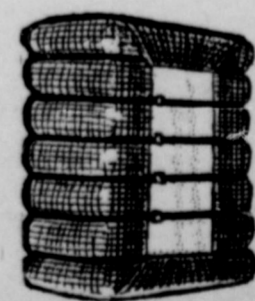

## THE DRIVER'S SEAT

Almost a million teenagers - many of them Texans - each year are learning automobile driving in special high school driver training courses.

Mass teen-age drivers training is an impressive and effective activity that slowly is reducing the number of accidents and deaths on our highways, according to safety studies.

Glance at "Sportsmanlike Driving," the most widely used text in the nation's schools, and you'll find what hundreds of thousands of youngsters are learning about motoring. Look at "Let's Drive Right" Maxwell Halsey's book, and you'll see what another large number of students will learn this year.

However, if you look closely enough you may find that a lot of important things are missing from driver training books. There is little being taught today about turnpike driving or driving in darkness or fog.

For example, "Sportsmanlike Driving" has only seven incidental references about night driving in 473 pages. "Let's Drive Right" - 473 pages - has 14 brief mentions of the special problems of driving at night.

This is the situation despite the fact that most accidents happen during the hours of darkness. According to the National Safety Council, 54 per cent of all fatalities occurred during darkness last year, although there is only about half as much traffic on the roads at night.

Similarly, turnpike driving is not given much attention in these two texts. The reason, of course, is that turnpike driving is a relatively recent development. Only lately have safety officials begun to recognize the special dangers of night driving.

So it might be worth checking the manual being used in your teen-ager's driver training course.

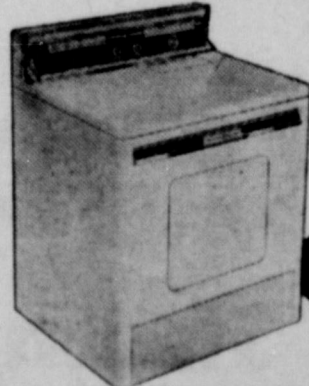
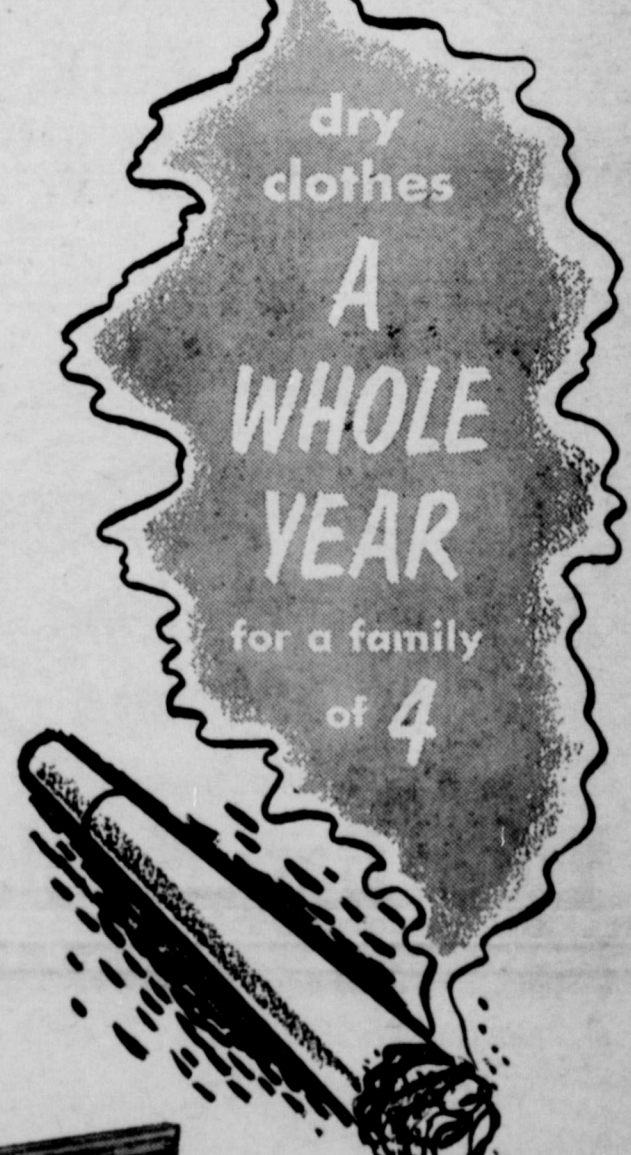

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# Springlake Wolverines Bows To Crosbyton 38 to 6

In almost perfect football weather the Crosbyton Chiefs swamped the Wolverines 38 to 6 Friday night in Wolverine Stadium. The weather was the only thing perfect from Springlake's viewpoint, as the Wolverines played probably their worst game of the season. They seemed "down," possibly a reaction from their terrific struggle with Muleshoe the week before. They took a physical beating in that game, and possibly they had not sufficiently recovered. Also some of the boys were a bit under the weather with severe colds and light cases of flu.

Whatever the cause, Crosbyton dominated the game almost completely. They were a fast and smart team, working together beautifully. In the first quarter, Springlake received the kickoff but couldn't move the ball and had to punt. Speedy halfback Duane Cornelius, though weighing only 138 was a thorn in Springlake's side all night, ran the punt back 18 yards. Then Dewayne Winters, another speedy back weighing 130 pounds, ran 55 yards from scrimmage on the first play for the touchdown. Edwards ran it across for the two points. Springlake couldn't move the ball again so had to punt. Crosbyton then started a 83 yard drive which took them 15 plays to score on the second play in the second quarter on a one yard pass from quarterback Charlie Moore to end George Fergus. The points try failed. In the first quarter Springlake was able to run only six plays to 17 for Crosbyton, and 15 for Springlake during the half-to 31 for Crosbyton.

Late in the second quarter Crosbyton scored again on a 70 yard drive sparked by a 52 yard run by Winters. The touchdown came on an 8 yard pass from Moore to Wheeler. Cornelius ran it across for two points.

In the third quarter, fullback David Edwards ran 77 yards for Crosbyton's fourth touchdown, and Cornelius again ran it across for the two extra points.



MUCH ACTION was demonstrated by the Wolverines in the Friday night game, but not enough to upset the powerful Crosbyton team. The Wolverines go to Amherst Friday night hoping to get up more steam to win over the Amherst Bulldogs.

Springlake fans had about their only opportunity to cheer as Hall Hudson, freshman back, started around the left side of his line, cut toward the middle, and went 55 yards for the Wolverine's only score. The points try failed. In the last part of the game, with Springlake's reserves playing, Crosbyton's Charlie Moore threw a pass to Cornelius which covered 68 yards. Cornelius was pulled down from behind by Mike Stockard on the 2, and Edwards plunged across for the score. Moore passed to Edwards for the two points.

The Wolverines travel to Amherst Friday night to do battle with the team which coach Townsend coached last year. This is always a fine ballgame because of the deep rivalry of the two communities. We hope the boys will be "up" for this game, and we think they will. The Amherst game will be the last non-conference game for the Wolverines, as they will open the 3-A conference fight against Sudan the following Friday

night, October 17, in Sudan.

Let's all go to Amherst Friday night and help the boys get on the victory trail again and get ready for conference battle. Incidentally, even in defeat, the Wolverines gained more yards from scrimmage against Crosbyton than ever before this year. They gained 230 yards rushing and 35 passing for a total of 265 yards. But Crosbyton gained 410 yards rushing, 100 passing for 510 yards, the most gained against Springlake this year.

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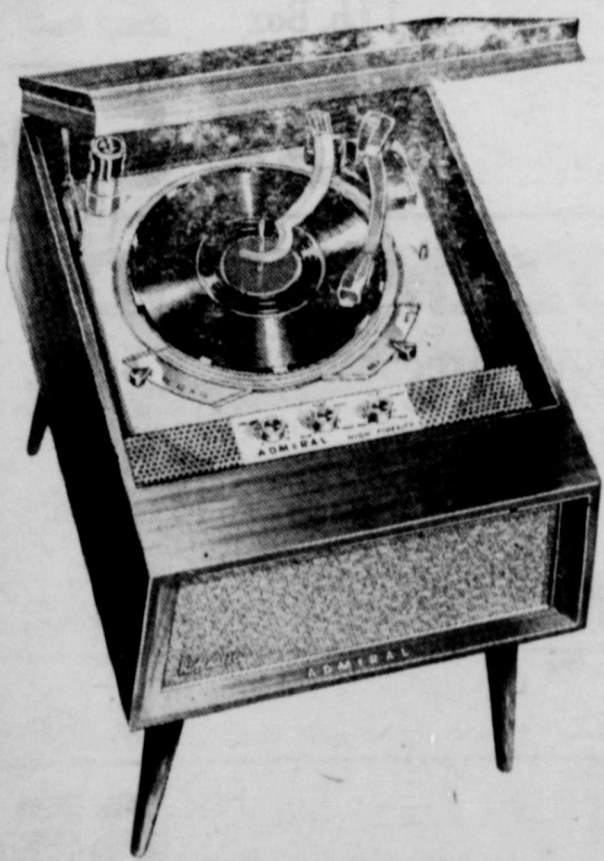

### Traffic Safety Awards

If you have been doing traffic safety work in your community, June 15th is an important date for you.

That's the day applications close for the 1958 Carol Lane Awards for Traffic Safety.

These awards go to the three



individual women and three women's or parents' groups who in the opinion of the judges have originated and carried through the most effective traffic safety programs in their community or state. The awards are administered by the National Safety Council through a grant of Shell Oil Company and are named for Shell's women's travel director.

First, second and third place winners in each category receive \$1,000, \$500 and \$250, respectively, in savings bonds, plus bronze sculptures symbolizing "Woman's protective instinct." The three individual winners and three women representing the top clubs travel to Chicago in October to receive their honors during the National Safety Congress.

If you have been active in traffic safety work during the past year, why not make a report on your project and submit it for the awards? 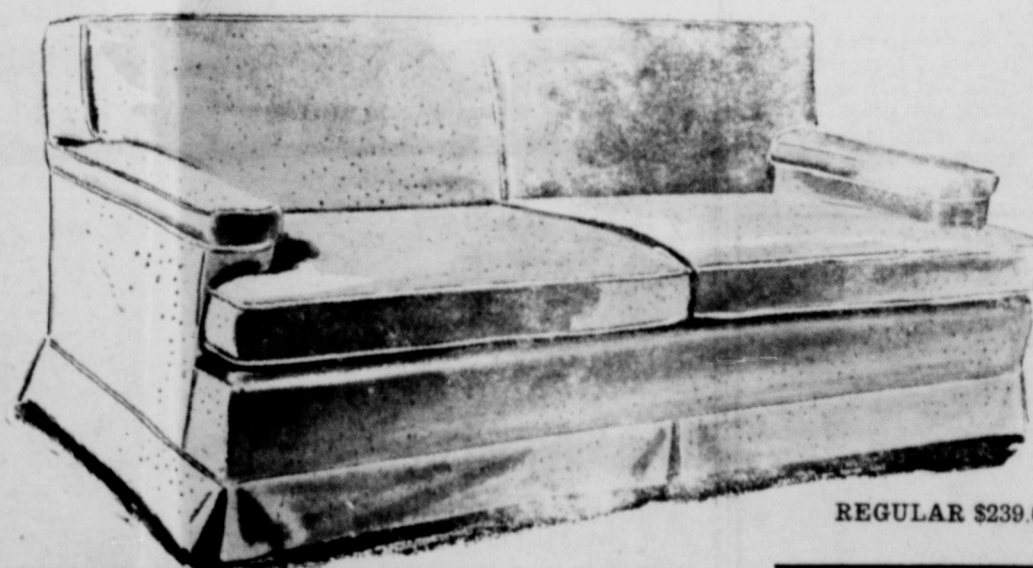

## Methodist District Superintendents And Leaders Meet

DALLAS — Methodist district superintendents from throughout the North Texas, Central Texas and Northwest Texas Conferences were in Dallas, Wednesday through Thursday, Sept. 17-18, for the annual Dallas - Fort Worth Episcopal Area Council meeting. They were joined on Friday, Sept. 19, by other ministerial and lay leaders, who will assist with a series of leadership schools to be held in the districts beginning Monday, Sept. 22.


During the separate two-day session, the district superintendents recommended that the area goals include four mission projects for each local church. Called Advance Specials, the projects are over and above regular budget giving to missions and include the following fields: world missions, national or home missions, the Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief and conference sponsored missions.

Another recommendation to local churches concerned the dropping of members from church rolls. Churches were asked to follow current legislation which says that names are not to be dropped until a member has gone for two years without any contact with the church and the whereabouts is not

known by the congregation. At that time, names may be dropped, if the church so desires.

Some of the chief topics of concern during the area council meeting included the rural church, local church finance, evangelism and missions. Rev. Philip W. Walker of Sherman, Sherman - McKinney district superintendent, stressed the need for "a gospel preacher and leader" for rural churches, declaring that they are often served by student pastors, who stay for short periods of time. "You cannot serve rural people on the run," he declared.

Five district superintendents, who will complete their six-year terms at the close of the conference year next June 1 and must take other assignments at that time.
