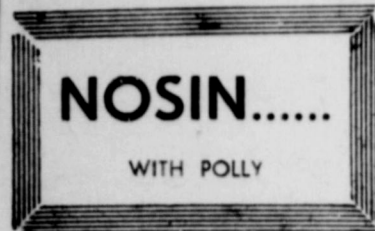

New grain dryers have been installed at the Earth Elevator, Springlake Elevator and Sunnyside Grain Co. and will be in operation for this year's fall grain harvest.

The Earth Elevator and Sunnyside Grain Co. have installed the Arid Air Dryer and the Springlake Elevator has installed the Shanser Air Dryer which has a drying capacity of 600 bushels per hour, with a 45 ft. high tower type.

No charges will be made on the drying of the farmer's grain, but each farmer is expected to take care of his shrinkage.

Carroll Blackwell and Roy Byers, managers of the three elevators urged every farmer who could to let his grain dry as much in the field as possible.

Grain is beginning to ripen and the grain harvest is expected to be in full swing in the next few weeks.

Morning services will be at 10 a.m., prayer service at 7:30 p.m. and worship service at 8 p.m.

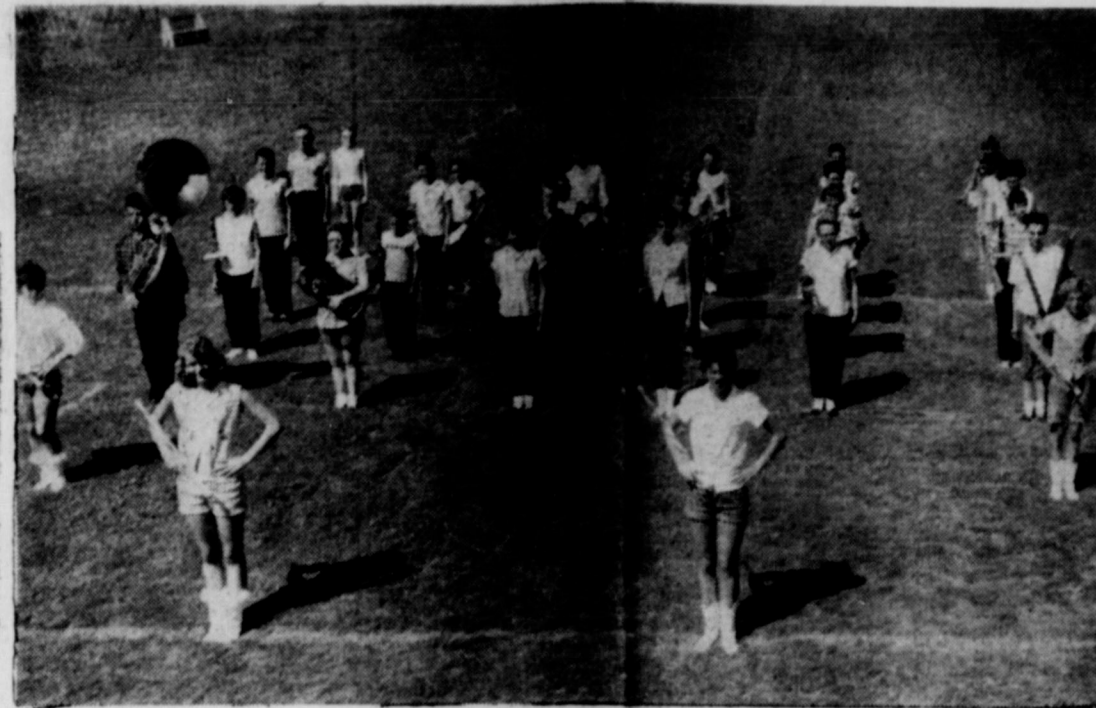
Saturday, September 6 a Brotherhood Breakfast will be held at 7:00 a.m.

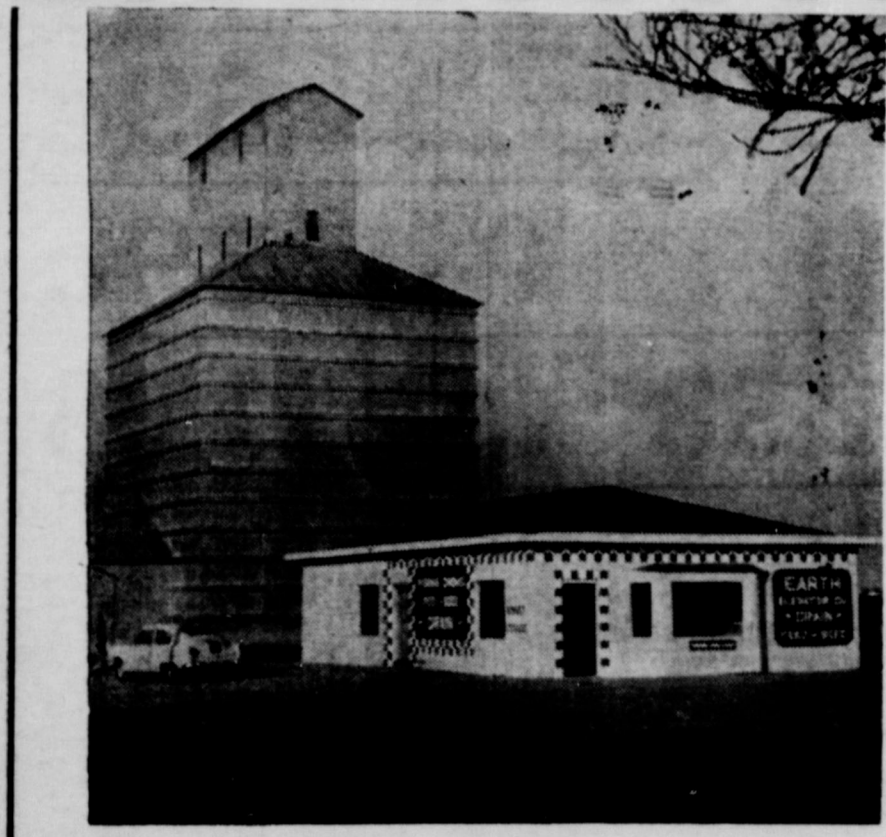

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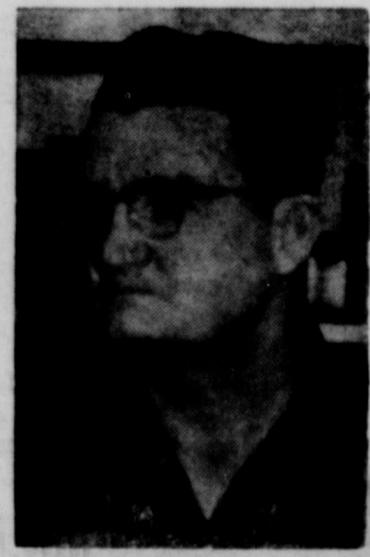

## School Lunch Fund Increased

**COLLEGE STATION** — First installment of \$5,488,245 of federal funds for Texas schools in the national school lunch program will be released by the food distribution division, Agricultural Marketing Service, Dallas, around Sept. 1, reports John J. Slaughter, chief of the Dallas AMS office.

Texas public schools will get \$5,166,017, an increase of \$661,449 over last year and private schools will get \$322,228, an increase of \$72,970, according to Slaughter.

Funds appropriated by Congress for the program are released to the states according to the number of children 5 to 17 years of age, inclusive, and the relation of the per capita

income in the U. S. to the per capita in the state.

The public school allotment for Texas will be the Texas Education Agency to reimburse schools in part for the food bought from local merchants. Texas private schools secure their allotments directly from Slaughter's office. Last year about 3,000 public and private schools operating under the school lunch program spent about \$20,780,935 with local merchants for food, Slaughter said. They served 90,860,139 meals, nearly all with a half pint of milk and the average cost was about 25.4 cents during November, the peak month of participation last year.

"With the use of USDA funds and foods, schools can keep the cost of lunches at the lowest possible level," Slaughter said, emphasizing that each school determines the cost of its lunches on a non-profit basis.

The program is designed to improve the diets of school children

and to enlarge the market of farmers. At the same time, it creates local business and jobs.

### TIME TO MAKE A DECISION . . .

The Rural Electrification Administration borrows money from the government at 2 per cent. But the government has to pay a higher rate of interest on the money that it borrows. This simply means that all the taxpayers are subsidizing REA loans and REA customers. To make matters worse, REA pays no federal tax.

This situation has disturbed a great many people whose primary interest is the long-range welfare of the farmer. One is Charlie B. Shuman, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation. He says: "So long as we depend upon direct government loans, we are subject to the whims of Congress. It is time for rural electric cooperative leaders to make a decision. Do they believe in private enterprise . . . or do they prefer government ownership and control? It is my considered opinion that the greatest threat to the future of our rural electric cooperatives is the threat of a socialist, federally-owned power system . . ."

A similar view comes from Tom Anderson, publisher of Farm and Ranch. He says: "REA should hereafter stay in its own backyard, get its money from private sources just like its competitors do, and pay the same taxes."

The fact is that rural electrification is virtually complete in this country. But REA is still after huge expansion loans and more taxpayer subsidies so that it can move into industrial and other non-agricultural areas of service. It comes as good news that farm leaders and farm spokesmen are now fighting against that.

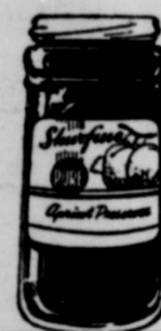

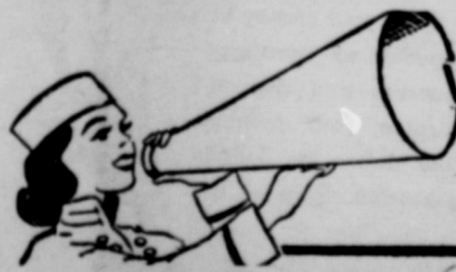
