




The sale of brooms, mops, door mats, light bulbs and numerous other items exceeded last year's ale of \$700.

The Edwin O'Hair home 2 miles north and 3 miles west of Flagg. received considerable damage to the roof. Hail stones, the size of golf balls, fell. Damages to the roof was estimated at \$800., water came through to the sheetrock on the ceiling.

O'Hair and his father lost all but 15 acreas of wheat on one section of land. Four inches of rain fell Thursday, Saturday night and Sunday night.
