Judges for the event were Sgt. D. S. Lawson, Lee R. Hargrove and Joaquin Jackson, all of the Texas Highway Patrol and local deputy sheriff, V. L. Smith, Jr.

Sgt. Lawson who has judged many of the contests over the area and state, congratulated the Earth Jaycees on the entire program and said the affair was well conducted.

The Jaycees are now responsible in transportation for the three top winners to go to state June 11-12-13. The State Road-E-O will be held on the Tarleton State College campus. The National Road-O will be held in Washington, D. C. with a chance to win a college scholarship ranging up to \$4,500 for first place winner.

Heavy Crop Loss From Damaging Hail and Rain

Damaging hail and rain struck crops in north Lamb County and Castro County last Thursday evening.

Some wheat, and barley and cotton crops were reported to be a one hundred per cent loss.

The Edwin O'Hair home 2 miles north and 3 miles west of Flagg, received considerable damage to the roof. Hail stones, the size of golf balls, fell. Damages to the roof was estimated at \$800, water came through to the sheetrock on the ceiling.

O'Hair and his father lost all but 15 acres of wheat on one section of land. Four inches of rain fell Thursday, Saturday night and Sunday night.

Many crops are being re-planted in the Lazbuddie community. Crops belonging to V. J. Sigman was reported to be between 45 and 50 per cent loss. Sigman farms near Pleasant Valley and Lazbuddie.
