Parking Area East of School Grounds To Be Paved; Work Begun Monday

A long overdue project, that of improving the parking area in front of the school grounds, is now underway.

Through the combined efforts of the school district and the County and State Highway Departments, the \$13,000 paving job will be completed at an estimated cost of \$750 to the school district.

Supt. Bill Mann announced this week.

The State Highway Department which is engineering the project, will widen the highway along the east side of the school, paving up to the school property, and will

put in two 40 ft. entrance culverts. After the caliche has been hauled into the parking area in front of the school, the State will pack and level it and will shoot it with asphalt and gravel. These materials will be paid for by the school.

The road from the highway west to the bus sheds will also be paved, with the State doing the shooting after the caliche is in place, and the County will pay for the asphalt and gravel.

The hauling of the caliche is a community project and will begin Monday. The use of trucks and

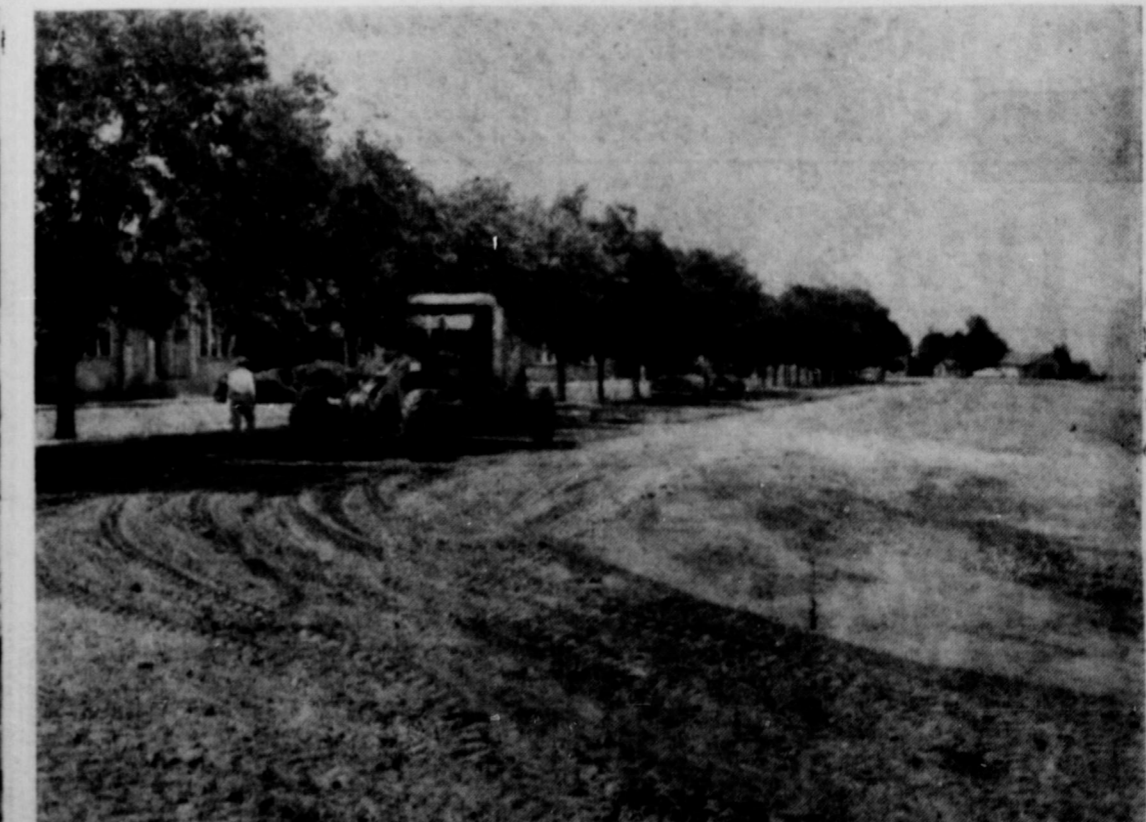
labor is being donated and a minimum of ten trucks will be needed each day. Herschell Martin is in charge of securing trucks on Monday. Arthur Barton on Tuesday and Jarvis Angeley on Wednesday. Extra drivers will be available. Anyone interested in helping with the hauling is asked to contact one of the above named men.

State engineers were at the school Monday and grading and leveling was begun.

The area to be paved has not only been a blight on the appearance of the school campus, but

has also caused much discomfort to bus and automobile drivers attempting to unload their passengers in an area convenient to their classrooms. Many times vehicles became stuck and required assistance to free them from the muddy slush.

Shrubbery and flowers on the campus have made noted growth this spring and add much to the appearance of the grounds. African bermuda grass which was set out in front of the Junior and Senior High building recently is also showing growth. A row of popular trees have been set along the fence east of the football field.

Only Small Percent Of Alloted Cotton Acreage In West Texas Put In Soil Bank

LUBBOCK — The 23 member counties of the Plains Cotton Growers Inc. in West Texas put only 6.4 percent of the 1958 cotton

allotments in the Soil Bank. From a total allotment of 2,279,436 acres, farmers in the 23 counties put only 145,777 acres in the Soil Bank.

Acreage by county ranged from a low of 142 acres put in by Yoakum County farmers to a high of 20,694 acres put in by farmers in Dickens County. It might be noted that the majority of land in both these counties is dry land acreage.

In the irrigated belt Lamb County farmers put in 17,933 and Hale County farmers put in 2,746 acres. Lubbock County, which has the largest county allotment, 229,654 acres, saw farmers put in only 9,592 acres in Soil Bank.

Farmers received slightly more than five million dollars compensation for this acreage being put in the 1958 Soil Bank.

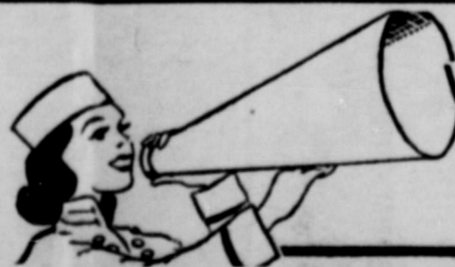

Magnesium Applications To Cotton Studied

The application of magnesium and trace element to cotton at the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation has aroused considerable interest among the High Plains farmers. These tests are a portion of the cotton research program being conducted under a grant recently made by the Plains Cotton Growers.

Dr. T. C. Longnecker, chief soil scientist and head of the Station, stated today that "observation on the effects of magnesium salts on maturity of cotton indicated that in some manner, probably through better assimilation or utilization of phosphate, magnesium is hastening the maturity of cotton and by this improving yield and quality. The proper usage of magnesium may prove very valuable to cotton growers of this area but many questions concerning its use remain unanswered. This experiment is being conducted in an effort to obtain more in-

formation concerning the effect of different forms of magnesium and trace elements on yield and quality of cotton."

In this experiment, magnesium sulfate (Epsom salts) and Sul-Po-Mag (a natural mixture of magnesium sulfate and potassium sulfate) are being applied at different rates and with and without other materials which may make them more effective in the soil.

A minor element mixture containing iron, manganese, boron and zinc is also being used in this study to determine the value of these nutrients on cotton production. A uniform application of 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre and 80 pounds of phosphate is being made along with each of the other treatments of magnesium and trace elements.

Tissue tests will be made on the cotton growing under these various treatments during the growing season to determine any difference in uptake of phosphate and magnesium. Cotton yields will be determined this fall and, in addition, grade, staple, micronaire and other quality tests will be made to determine any effects on fibre quality.

Planting of Plains Cotton Acreage Nears Completion, Crops Ahead of '57

LUBBOCK — A third or more of the Texas High Plains two million allotted acres of cotton for 1958 is reported up to a good stand and farm officials estimated as much as 90 percent was planted as of May 25.

Warm sunny days the past week enabled farmers to plant and replant where necessary. With present ideal weather conditions, the entire 2,131,000 acres available for planting is expected to be planted this month.

Farmers figure this is almost an ideal situation as compared to the 1957 planting season when more than a million acres had to be replanted in June and much of it after June 15. Thus far cotton officials estimate this year's crop is a month to five weeks ahead of 1957.

A large amount of early planted cotton in the southern counties of the High Plains is reported up to good stand and farmers are already watching for early season insects. Reports from individual counties indicate Dawson leading

with more than 50 percent up to good stands; Hale County has about 40 percent up; Lubbock, Hockley and Terry report 30 percent or more up and other counties possibly 20 percent or more up.

A cottonseed shortage, which was feared, did not develop and sufficient and desirable varieties were and are available to plant the full two million plus acres. While germination was low, farmers have tried to offset this by opening up planters and planting thicker than normal. Many good planting seed are still being advertised for sale and there is no apparent seed shortage in any section.

Plantings this year, as in 1956-

57, have been mainly Lankart, Lockett, Paymaster, Northern Star, Empire, and Gregg and Dunn, with a scattering of other varieties including Acala.

W. O. Fortenberry, president of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., urged producers to be on the lookout this year for insects and recommended early season insect control where necessary in order that farmers might preserve the early crop.

Athletic Award Presented To Rex Loftis At WTSC

CANYON, (Special) — Rex Loftis, a halfback from Springlake was one of 60 athletes to receive awards at West Texas State College for their play during the 1957-58 seasons, according to athletic director Frank Kimbrough.

Loftis, a sophomore, played the fullback position this year and saw much action. He played under all-conference Charlie Sanders, but alternated with him frequently and is expected to be a starter at halfback next year.

U. S. GRAIN— Third Largest Crop Expected

WASHINGTON — The Specter of another possible shortage of storage to take care of the nation's grain supplies is leading the government to urge farmers to erect more bins of their own.

The country moves into the new production year with a record supply of food and livestock feed grains. But the prospects of the third largest wheat crop of record and of big crops of corn and other grains raises the possibility that more storage facilities will be needed.

Pamphlets Distributed
Secretary of Agriculture Benson has said he hopes the government itself will not be forced to buy additional bins. It already owns facilities with a storage capacity of about a billion bushels. Benson hopes to get the government out of the storage business, but the continued existence of surpluses has prevented this.

The department is broadcasting through grain areas pamphlets telling producers it will pay them to buy or build storage facilities for their farms.

Loans Available
In these the department points out that it will make loans at 4 per cent interest covering up to 80 per cent of the cost of facilities. These loans are payable over a five - year period.

In addition the department offers farmers payments for storing government grain in their bins. These rates are 16 cents a bushel a year for corn and barley; 16 and 17 cents for wheat, depending on the state; 12 cents for oats; and 28 to 31 cents a hundred-weight for grain sorghums.

Officials say these payments would pay for new bins in two or three years. Hence the claim that it will pay farmers to build new bins.
